

### Coca Cola's Extensive Display.

A recent issue of Printers' Ink contains a lengthy interview with the secretary of the toea Coln Company, of Atlanta, Ga., anent that concern's extensive and persistent advertising, and his declaration regarding the poster and paint method of publicity are worthy of attention. They are as follows: "Outdoor display is a most important feature with us. We started painting in 1893. We are investing \$39,600 in painted signs annually. This year we painted Kentucky, Tennessee, Alabama, Mississippl, Leu s ana, Texas, Arkansas, Fiortila and Ceorg a, secarting the locations as near the center of large cities as possible. We have some very large signs that are calling torth much comment. Our painted signs are, as a rule, on side walls, and the cost to us four and one-half cents per square foot. Our twenty-two traveling salesmen inspect and report to us the location and condition of our advert sing. Next came posters. We are covering the Atlante and Southern States thoroughly, putting out 2(0,000 sheets at a cost for printing and posting of five cents per sheet per month, or for our season of five months about \$0,000. We seed to the order of the season they contract with local bill posters to cover cach city where our goods are on sale. We are pleased with poster advertising. So are the local dispensers."

#### Box Office Sharps.

"If a man in the box office depended upon he salary alone he would not wear demonds, I ve at the bost hotel and have a dozen suits of clothes," remarked one of a group of gentlemen, who were talking of ticket sellers, as they sat in front of the t'opeland Theater, says the Topeka Journal. "I lave heard that in some of the popular places of amusement in the East the privilege of selling tickets is paid for. I do not know that the statement is true, but I do know that it is very probable. You can readily appreciate this if you have ever purchased a ticket at the box office and forgotten the change. I have heard men say who have been in the business that in a good theater the 'rake off' anounits to several hundred dollars a month. Of course, if any money is left at the window it helongs to the ticket seller, as he has to account only for the number of tickets token at the door, and if there is a good crowd and a rush he is bound to get the best of it, even if he is perfectly homest, and does not attempt to 'short change' any one. Many people will get lit line, approach the window and call for the number of tickets they desire. When the tekets are received they take them and the change, if there is any, and walk on without thinking of the money. A large majority of the people are careful; they know how huse hie tickets should cost, and count their change; but the number who do not is surprisingly large. If there is a great rush, as there usually is at a c'rous ticket wagon, it is very easy for the ticket seller to short change the buyer. Even in small theaters the 'rake-off' is quite an item to the man in the box office. He was the proprieter of the old Olympic on Clark street, and frought out many performers who afterward secured considerable fame. Among these were Edd e Fey, John Iturke and John Gilbert. #### MODEL METHOD OF ADVERTISING A FAIR.

The above is a photograph of the Advertising Route Wagous which are being used in the interest of the Southern State Fair. This picture was taken just as the wagons were starting out a out a fortnight ago. The poster behind the wagon is a 24-sheet Bryan stand that the boys have just put up. These wagons travel constantly through the state until the opening day of the Fair, posting bills and distributing advertising matter. The Southern Inter-State Fair will post throughout the country and in the larger cities about 180 coo sheets of paper. This method of indivertising having wagons built especially for the purpose, conveniently arranged so as to hold paper as dequipment, and sending a manager and bill ofter with each wagon, is somewhat new in the South.

#### OUR ENGLISH COUSINS.

The conference dinner of the United Bill Posters' Association of Great Britain, which took place at the Windsor Hotel In Glasgow, Scotland, immediately after the business session of the regular annual convention, was an exceptionally enjoyable affair. For, in addition to the dainty, appetizing and epicurean impulse that brought the large assemblage around the festive board, there was also a feast of reason and flow of soul that will ceralnly meet with a cordial responsivepess in the breasts of bill posters throughout the world. After the usual Joyal and patriotic toasts had been July pledged, Councillor Graham gave a brief sketch of the history of bill eposting, referring to the improved status of the members of the trade and dwelling at some length upon its Deducative Influences. To his mind. lecorative posters on the public meardings were object-lessons in art o every boy and girl passing along he streets. The association was based puppon the strong principle of helping he weak, and during the past year to fewer than seventeen corporations thad endeavored to obtain acts of Par-Trament glving them power to regulate buildings and heardings. This emdrasized the necessity of their assu-Wiation keeping a close watch on curhiporations, and safeguarding their inerests. In responding, Walter Hill, f London, said they found themelves attacked on every side by cominations bamled together to do them arm. He was glad to say, however, v dat in union there was strength, and the association gave another proof of arke aptness of the old proverb that in multitude of counsels there was the theafety. They had many and varied interests to deal with, and it was Cometimes difficult to reconcile them

all. But he was happy to say that in the work of the association they had had gratifying results, which he attributed to the strong basis upon which it was founded. Sentlmentallsts and faddists had done their best to end the existence of bill posters, and those well-meaning, but ill-informed people had had sufficient influence to get their views placed before nunicipal and corporate hodies, and even before Parliament. Furtunately, however, they had not attained their desires, and he would suggest to them that their efforts would be better extended in relieving poverty and diminishing crime.

According to "Newspaperdom," a street falr, held recently in Sacramento, Cal., was highly successful, the management attributing its success to the work of bili posters and special agents, ignoring entirely the work of the newspapers. In which no space was purchased, but which gave freely of notices. This cool assumption so worked upon the "Sacramento Record-Union," that it proceeded to read the managers of the fair enterprise a lecture on lugratitude in general, and ignorance of the value and application of advertising in particular.

At a recent meeting of the Colorada Editorial Association, one of the members contributed a paper which cantained some very pertinent and truthful remarks which any honest and broad-ganged editor should appreciate. Speaking of the manner in which the editorial department of any imblication should be conducted, he said: "First of all, I would get at the truth at all hazards. If the truth limits your adversary, of course, you will tell it out loud and plain. If it hurts your side of the case, tell the truth also, Truth will win in the end. It is a thing to be loved, and not to be feared. The editor is presumed to be a wise man, thoroughly conversant with the current l'appenings aml conditions. His deductions and comments are valcable. I would not allow an editor to cheapen his writing by warping and twisting his expressed views to lit the dictates of any person, party or clique. No party is all good or all bad. The old adage of giving the devil his due is applicable. If there be good in anything, elevate it: if there he evil, deery it; if there be vulgarity, suppress it, if possible. I told him I would not sign anything that was liable to bring me into a controversy. He said he did not want to use it for that purpose. I then signed as above explained, anything added to which was "ruhbered." I have been told since that Kane went to William Waugh, the liveryman, and others to get a statement. Now, if you wish to publish Mr. Kane's statement, you are perfectly at liberty to do so, provided you also publish my statement in full.
