Talking It Over



Leaders in the entertainment world believe that one great reason for the loss of trade most of them are enduring at this time is the fact that "everything is too high priced." They point to their labor cost, to what they must charge for food and drinks, to what their shows cost and, they claim, there seems to be no way out of the morass of highly inflated overhead with which they are surrounded so that they can, once again, bring economical entertainment to the general public.

"But," as one of these men stated, "the coin operated amusement and music machines world is destined to hit the top while the public is intent on only economical entertainment." He speaks truth here. Every time the public has turned against expensive entertainment, it has returned to the economical diversion offered by coin operated machines.

The coin chute of today is the "power chute" of the entertainment world. The success which the shuffleboards are enjoying is much due to the fact that the public appreciate such low cost entertainment. Lots of fun for just a few coins.

The same is also true of the coin operated music industry. Gradually collections have continued upward. Many operators now report that they foresee a very good year ahead of them.

Some of these ops claim that this is due to the fact that they haven't been buying much new equipment and that they haven't had to meet notes which formerly cut deeply into their income. This may be true to some extent. But, from the standpoint of the more progressive music op, it isn't the whole truth. He is still buying and is still going ahead. And, he finds, that the real reason is because the public now more greatly appreciate the economical entertainment his machines offer.

Those ops who have been able to arrange for a better commission basis, a more equitable percentage of the gross income for themselves, are now enjoying the fruits of their efforts. With the public's return to more economical entertainment and with collections going up, they have been enjoying better profits.

The coin operated industry again stands to gain a great lead in the business of selling entertainment to the public, because the entertainment it sells is so very economical.

Yet, unless each and everyone of the men engaged in the sale of this economical entertainment arrange for a better share of the collections, they won't enjoy this return to coin operated machine play as they should.

Whatever other statements may be made in the days to come that "economical entertainment is the answer to what the public now wants," most important to the operator (the purveyor of this entertainment) is that he simply must arrange to enjoy an equitable share of the profits.

The only way he can do that is to immediately arrange for a commission basis a helluva lot better than the present 50%-50% basis which is still in effect in the greater majority of locations thruout the nation.

OPS' ORGANIZATIONS WILL ATTEMPT TO ARRIVE AT BETTER COMMISSION BASIS

Meets Planned at CMI Show. Will Attempt to Arrange for More Equitable Commission Basis Thruout Nation. Believe Ops' Future Bright. Claim Better Commish Basis is Answer.

Most important and outstanding feature of the operators organizations' meeting at the forthcoming Coin Machine Institute (CMI) convention at the Sherman Hotel in Chicago, January 17, 18, 19, 1949, will be to arrive at a more equitable commission percentage on a national basis.

For some years now, as is well known thruout the entire coin machine industry, *The Cash Box* was first, and has continued to propose to the operators of the nation, that they arrange for a better commission basis. They must obtain a more equitable share of the intake of their machines. This means the difference between profit and loss. And the operators have, this year, come to more strongly realize this fact more than ever before.

This past year saw organization after organization of ops thruout the country coming together for the sole purpose of arranging for a more equitable share from the intake of their equipment. These operators realized that, unless they received a better commission percentage basis for themselves, they could not long continue in this industry on a profitable scale.

Today, those ops who are getting a better commission basis, whether it be in the form of front money guarantees, or whether it be a higher percentage of the gross income, are the ops who are prospering. And who believe that, "This is the greatest business in the world."

One answer to what has been going on for years, in editorial after editorial, which has appeared in this publication regarding a better share of the gross income for the operator, is the fact that when the shuffleboards were presented to the public in the midwest and western parts of the nation as "coin operated machines" they were introduced with 10c play and as much as \$1 and more can be taken in per sheet where regular bowling sheet play is featured.

This alone, indicates the trend which the industry is striving for and the fact that ops are at long last in agreement that there is inflation. That they simply must obtain more from the machine's gross intake than they have in former years.

Overhead has increased far over 200% for the operator. Parts, supplies and labor are away up in the blue, blue sky and, yet, the op continues to "sell" his entertainment at 5c and ask for only 50% of the share of the gross income.

The national organizations of ops which are springing up are only because these men have found that they simply must get together on a basis which will be mutually profitable to themselves, as well as to the storekeepers of the nation.

When a storekeeper gets 50% of the gross income, over 40% of that is "profit" for him. Net profit. At the same time any operator in the country who employs an accountant will admit that from his 50% of the intake there is less than 5% left for him as "net" income. And no operator, at today's overhead costs, can continue to profitably operate on this sort of net.

Regardless of the fact that operators are cutting down deeply on the purchase of new equipment and, further, regardless of the fact that they have cut down on overhead wherever and whenever possible by eliminating extra employees and by also eliminating purchases here and there, they still cannot show profit unless they obtain better than 50% of the intake from their machines.

The answer, then, as the members of the national organizations believe, is to convince operators to set up an entirely new percentage commission basis for the majority now in this industry to continue profitably.

The merchandise machine operator has been doing this right along. As the price of candy and cigarettes went up, he matched the price. He also cut down on commissions. He even went to the extent of paying no commissions on certain specified minimum sales. He has also cut down on the size of candy bars, etc. He has, in short, been a good business man, and has met whatever conditions prevailed.

The same must be true of the automatic entertainment fields. The music and amusement machine op must be able to continue on profitably. He must be in position to purchase new equipment, and to continuously change over to better locations. All his local fellow ops agree with him that a better and more equitable commission basis must come into being.

Storekeepers haven't hesitated to raise prices of their merchandise as they have felt the rise in prices. The ops must do the same. There is no other alternative.

This is the plan of leading ops thruout the nation. A proposal which will be presented at the CMI convention in Chicago. The largest and smallest ops in every territory will be asked to adhere to this better plan so that the entire industry will have every opportunity of continuing on a successful basis for the future.

There is no longer any doubt, as labor demands more and still more wages (to meet generally inflated conditions), that the prices of machines will not go down. In fact, many expect them to continue going up. This being the case, the operator must realize that he will be paying more, not less, for new equipment in the future. And, since he's having a tough time now, with prices lower than what they will be, then what will face him as the need for new machines comes around?

There is no doubt that new machines are the lifeblood of this business. This has most definitely and absolutely been proved by what has happened in the Dominion of Canada where amusement machine ops have quit the business, only because they haven't been able to get new equipment to hold the interest of the players.

The answer is for the operator to get a much better share from the income of the machines he operates.

The average operator says that he agrees. But, he claims, he has his competitors to think about.

That is why the national organizations have come into being. To propose, to plan, to show the way to the operators. That is also why some of the best known men in the field have come to the point of suggesting the appointment of a "national leader" for the entire industry.

The time has come for the operator to stop kidding himself. The national organizations will and must logically point out the facts to him.

He should be present to listen to what they have to say. And he should become a member of this effort in his behalf.

● One of earlier King Cole platters, and one that really reaped harvest for music operators throughout the nation is this offering coupling "For Sentimental Reasons" and "I Can't See For Lookin'." Top deck was a smash not too long ago—music ops should remember the tune quite well. Always a hot contender for phono honors, the top side should suffice and boost ops take. Flip, "I Can't See For Lookin'" might do more. It's light, bright vocal and instrumental patter that beats true all the way. Both tunes are there for the asking.

● The tenor vocal styling of young Clark Dennis and a sweet, sentimental offering in "I'm So Lonesome I Could Cry." Ditty suits Clark's light tonsils to a T, with Clark lending the air loads of feeling and meaning in his lyric. On the flip with an oldie, Clark renders "Tenderly," a song that caught its fair share of coin not too long ago. This version should fill the bill of requests always cropping up. Instrumental backing by the Walter Gross Trio rounds out the wax in fair manner. Platter won't stop traffic by any means, altho it will make a decent filler item.

● First dinking by Bosh Pritchard, famed for his end runs with the Philly Football Eagles, and the set up of two mellow tunes that might grab on. Top deck with "That Would Be Heaven" grabs the glory. Bosh's voice is definitely in there all the way, pitching in fine style. Ditty is adapted from "Cielito Lindo," an Italian folk air that is widely known. On the flip with "Blondie," Bosh switches to some light stuff with the title offering ops the bill of fare. Backing by the Unison Four is pleasant and rounds out the wax. Wax rates ops listening time—and more.

● Light, pleasant melody ably suited for those many tavern locations is offered here by Lee Monti's Tu-Tones. It's the fond refrain of that ever-lovin' "They Go Wild Over Me" the combo offers, with piper Mario Lozer spooning the comely wordage. Song is tailor made for those who like to reminisce. On the flip with a Neapolitan ditty, Mario bounces back with "My Anina." Song is there for the asking. We go for the oldie, "They Go Wild Over Me"—we're sure you will too.

Both sides of this platter are tagged hit material. With Vaughn one of the hottest bands in the biz today, we see no reason for this duo not grabbing on and

scoring. "If I Steal A Kiss" hogs the limelight, with Vaughn wailing the strong, powerful wordage in smart, fashioned tones that satisfy. It's music easy to listen and dance to; styled in the manner that the romance kids love. Orchestral backing on this side is tops throughout, as the crew display their fine instrumental wares in brilliant fashion. The tune should get quite a send-off via the picture attachment, which is sure to boost and hypo attention to it. On the flip with "What's Wrong With Me," Vaughn once again delivers some excellent vocal work, with the Moon Maids joining in for some vocal background work. It's a pleasant rhythm ballad, one which operators can use to extremely excellent advantage. Both sides of this platter are sure to add to the ops take. Get with it!

Orchestral backing by the Van Alexander ork makes for pleasant listening, and rounds out the side in favorable fashion. Music ops take it from here.

● Following on the heels of the tremendous success he met with the fabulous "Twelfth Street Rag," Pee Wee Hunt and his Dixie crew bounce back with more pleasant wax to keep the trend hot. Top side, "Wabash Blues" always has received some heavy play in the boxes. This rendition by Pee Wee and the boys shows the crew in mellow style throughout. Trombone solo and a pick up on the ivories opens the wax, with the ensemble joining in to ride out the side. On the flip with "High Society," the gang offer some up tempo Dixie rhythm with loads of drive and some fine instrumentation throughout. Stuff should find a spot in ops machines.

"The Goggle-Eye-Ghee" (2:48)

● The heavy tonsiling of Arthur Godfrey and some wax music ops can take a look at. Topside with the oldie "When I Lost You," has Art purring the ever-lovin' lyric in that rasping vocal style for which he has become widely known and popular. Disk is one which may meet with fair approval in those tavern spots. On the flip, with a novelty tune, Art gags it up all the way with "The Goggle-Eye-Ghee." Cute double-tongue lyrics throughout the platter make you stop and listen. Ops who have the spots that go for this brand of music would do well to pay attention to this recording.

"Sweet And Hot Mop" (2:45)

"I'll Never Be The Same" (2:57)

STAN HASSELGARD SEXTETTE
(Capitol 15302)

● One of the brightest stars on the musical horizon, clarinetist Stan Hasselgard bows into the disk spotlight via this coupling of "Sweet & Hot Mop" and "I'll Never Be The Same." Top deck is an excellent version of small combo jazz filling the air light, pleasant spots of bop. Wax is easily taken to and should be greeted by those who go for the better brand in music, with great applause. Flip is the standard "I'll Never Be The Same," with Stan swinging his clary a la Benny Goodman in mellow style. Wax is refreshing and mellow throughout. Ops take note.

"I Gotta Right To Sing The Blues" (2:44)

"My Ideal" (2:38)

LESLEY GREY
(Bullet 1052)

● Pair of standards by freshman Lesly Grey, bowing into the disk spotlight via this duo, set the beam bright and sharp on the thrush in pleasant manner. Mellow pitch of "I Gotta Right To Sing The Blues" and "My Ideal" make for nice listening throughout both sides of this waxing. Both sides spill in slow manner with the top deck hogging the limelight. The gal's tonsils are there for the asking. Ops who have room in their machines for this brand of music should take note of chirp Lesly and this coupling.

"Senorita" (2:50)

"Yours Is My Heart Alone" (2:43)

DENNIS DAY
(Victor 20-3208)

● Strong vocal pitch of balladeer Dennis Day and the set up of beautiful melodies which appear to be headed for a top spot in phonos throughout the land. It's the soft, lilting refrain of "Senorita" that Dennis offers on the topside. Ditty is from the MGM flicker "The Kissing Bandit" and should prove to garner a slew of publicity—but pronto. This is one of the better versions of this well-recorded tune. On the flip with the standard "Yours Is My Heart Alone," Dennis lends this warm air his strong tonsils in meaningful tones that ring true throughout. It's the top deck we go for—we're sure you will too.

● Pair of new sides by the hot Harmonicats and some wax that seems certain to find a spot in music ops machines. Top deck is the one that'll reap harvest for ops. It's the standard, "Diane," with the Cats harmonicats leaving a trail of beautiful melodious music. Smart instrumental work flashes throughout the waxing, and makes for mellow listening pleasure. It's a disk that can easily garner repeat play—one that is a cinch to satisfy phono fans and music ops alike. On the flip with some classier stuff in the "Dance Of The Comedians," the group give out with some more brilliant rhythm. We go for "Diane"—listen in.

● The light, bright vocal patter of The Mel-Tones, and one of the better new Christmas songs to come forth this season. Wax, titled "A Song For Santa," makes for beautiful listening pleasure throughout the needling. It's a neat bit of wax, with superb vocal harmony spilling all thru. Wax spills in slow tempo with the combo throat-ing the smart lyric in soft, refreshing tones that satisfy. On the backside with a bit of a novelty tune, the group display their excellent versatile vocal styling to bounce back with another cute piece. Wordage parrots the title here and should meet with fair reaction in the quiet spots. Top side for the moola.

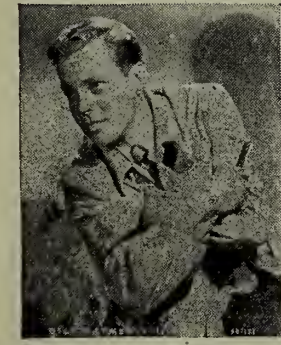

THE KEYNOTES WITH PRIMO SCALA ORCH. (London 341)

● Pair of sides by The Keynotes, teamed with the Primo Scala ork and the set-up of "Show Me The Way To Go Home" and "Wheezy Anna." Top deck might draw some interest in those tavern locations. Vocal blending on this side is effective, with the Primo Scala ork rounding out the wax in fair fashion. Flip, light pleasant melody beats a path around the title and should meet with fair approval. Music operators take it from here.

"White Christmas" (3:00)

"Dearest Santa" (2:56)

EDDY HOWARD ORCH. (Mercury 5216)

● More reissue wax from the Eddy Howard ork and some Christmas items for music operators to get with. Songs should be well known to ops since they have kicked around a bit. Both tunes are rendered in soft, smooth styling and fill the air with light melody easily taken to. Stuff can only be used during the season. Music operators who haven't as yet heard the sides should do so by all means—and pronto.

"He Tickles My Fancy" (2:47)

"Say It Isn't So" (2:51)

PATTI CLAYTON (Bullet 1064)

● Chirp Patti Clayton in the vocal limelight with a duo that seeps thru the wax in fair fashion. Stuff is there for the asking and might come in for a spot on the phonos if ops have the call for this brand. Wax, tagged "He Tickles My Fancy" and "Say It Isn't So" is offered in fair vocal fashion, with Patti's warbling clear and mellow throughout. Top deck is done up in light, bright fashion with a strong beat in the background. Flip, the standard, is rendered in straight, stock tempo that is effective. Ops who need filler material might look in this direction.

"To Each His Own" (3:07)

"Missouri Waltz" (3:00)

EDDY HOWARD ORCH. (Mercury 5219)

● Reissue of orkster-balladeer Eddy Howard's greatest recording still packs a heavy wallop for the phono trade. Ops undoubtedly know the song well since it was one of the biggest items to hit the music biz ever. Slow, spoonful mood and melody here is nothing less than sensational. On the flip with "Missouri Waltz," Eddy and his trio bring out loads of nostalgic flavor this waxing has. It's smooth stuff, the kind you can listen to after a zillion earfuls. Ops who have the room on their machines, and that covers plenty of territory, should listen in.

AL JOLSON

● The Daddy of 'em all—Al Jolson—bounces back into the musical limelight with this dinking certain to garner a top spot in music machines throughout the land. Always a strong contender for top juke box honors, Al pitches his great set of pipes behind "I Wish I Had A Girl"

and "By The Light Of The Silvery Moon." Top tune is really a great one and is sure to come in for a barrel-full of attention. It's slow stuff, the kind you wanna snuggle up to and listen to time and again. It's a song that is sure to make for repeat play in the boxes. Wordage of the song echo's the title throughout, with Al's deep, meaningful tones wailing the hearts and flowers lyrics in strong, sobbing tones that score. On the flip with "By The Light Of The Silvery Moon," Al bounces back with a sensational rendition of this grand oldie. Male vocal chorus in the background adds to the brilliance and splendor of this waxing to make it a platter ops should get after all the more. Both sides of this recording spell coin play in a big way. Don't hesitate—climb on the bandwagon.

"Jeanine, I Dream Of Lilac Time" (2:51)

"I Couldn't Stay Away From You" (2:59)

BOB CHESTER ORCH. (Collegiate 2957)

● Long missing from the musical spotlight as a name attraction, orkster Bob Chester sets with a pair here that might come in for some heavy play. Wax, titled "Jeanine, I Dream Of Lilac Time" and "I Couldn't Stay Away From You" is fashionable enough and makes for fairly pleasant listening. Vocal piping on the pair by Alan Foster adds to the charm of the material all the more. Top deck spins in jump time with some nice licks by the band seeping thru. Flip is a slow ballad, with Alan in the limelight all the way. Ops should listen in here.

"You Darling" (2:48)

"On New Year's Eve" (2:51)

KAY CARROLL (Collegiate 2053)

● Pair of sides ops may care to take a look at are these rendered by chirp Kay Carroll. Titled "You Darling" and "On New Year's Eve," the tunes themselves are fairly pleasant altho the thrush's warbling doesn't come up to par. Gal lacks balance and tone in her pipes, and offers no meaning to the songs. Topside parrots the lyric with some pleasant, if not mediocre, background music rendered by the John Hill group. Flip, a seasonal piece, makes for decent listening pleasure. Ops who have the room in their machines might take a peek in this direction.

"So Tired" (3:16)

"I Hear Music" (3:07)

RUSS MORGAN ORCH. (Decca 24521)

● Ditty already starting to pick up in a slew of locations throughout the nation is this piece by the Russ Morgan ork. Tagged "So Tired," the deck resounds with some of the old Morgan magic touch, and has the spark of becoming a hot phono item. Title is repeated throughout the song, with the maestro shining in the vocal spot. Fond music in the Morgan Manner resounds throughout the platter and makes for excellent listening pleasure. It's music that's easily taken to—stuff that can be listened to time and gain. On the flip with more slow stuff, piper Jimmy Lewis hogs the limelight on "I Hear Music." Vocal is infectious and in there in mellow mood all the way. "So Tired" is the side ops should get after.

"I'm Putting My Dreams All Behind Me" (2:39)

"Merry-Go-Round" (2:41)

BRET MORRISON (Mero 7473)

● Pair of sides music ops can take a peek at and possibly use as filler items are these offered here by piper Bret Morrison. Titled "I'm Putting My Dreams All Behind Me" and "Merry-Go-Round," the wax appears suited for those tavern spots that go for this brand. Monotone vocalizing, altho not the best, is in there in pitch at any rate. Top deck rolls along in slow tempo with Bret echoing the title. Flip is light and fanciful and might perk up. Ops know their routes better than we do—take it from here.

"At Sundown" (2:58)

"Angela Mia" (3:05)

JIMMY DORSEY ORCH. (MGM 10816)

● Pair of sides by the Jimmy Dorsey ork, and the set up of the pleasant, "At Sundown" and "Angela Mia." Topside should be well known to music ops since it went quite well not too many moons ago. Vocal spotlight on chirp Dee Parker is in there all the way, and altho the platter doesn't stack up to be a smash, it should fill the bill. Flip, a strong Neapolitan ditty with piper Bob Carroll on deck shows as a fair tune with a not too pleasing vocal spot. Bob's tones are too harsh for this piece. Song doesn't showcase his usually well-rounded pipes. Wax can be used for filler material.

"My Dear" (2:41)

"Soft Shoe Shuffle" (3:13)

JAN GARBER ORCH. (Capitol 15305)

● Music styled in the Jan Garber manner and the instrumental refrain of "My Dear" and "Soft Shoe Shuffle" echoing thru the wax. Both sides show the Garber ork in fair manner, with the crew displaying their best musical wares throughout. Top deck, "My Dear" is the familiar theme song of the Garber orchestra. It's an intimate melody, played softly and slowly in the warm, invigorating manner identifying the band. On the flip with "Soft Shoe Shuffle," the ork switches to a light up-tempo piece with some mellow beat seeping thru. Wax won't create havoc or the like—it should fill the bill though.

"After You've Gone" (2:44)

"Sunny Side Of The Street" (2:56) PEE WEE HUNT ORCH. (Regent 139)

● More wax via the Pee Wee Hunt ork, and the set up of a pair that beat mellow all thru. It's a pair of standards that Pee Wee and his Dixie crew offer, with the top deck, "After You've Gone" hogging the limelight. An all instrumental affair, Pee and the boys offer some great jazz on this side, sure to meet with wide approval. Mellow spots of hot clary and trombone reek throughout the needling in top notch styling. On the flip with "Sunny Side Of The Street," Pee Wee grabs the mike to wail a flock of first-rate ever-lovin' lyrics. Stuff is there for the asking—and more.

"That Certain Party" (2:33)

"Life Gets Tee-Jus" (3:12) PETER LIND HAYES (Decca 24520)

● Talk about novel and unique diskings—ya' just ain't heard nothin' yet. Latest release by Peter Lind Hayes is this hot coin culler tagged "Life Gets Tee-Jus." Pete doesn't sing this ditty at all. It's straight monologue—that comes out fine as wine. Once you get past the first chorus, you just wanna stay and listen all the more—and then come right back and spin the thing time and again. Lyrics are smarter than a Broadway cop and make you listen up real close. On the flip with another current pop tune, Pete renders "That Certain Party." Waxing makes for pleasant listening and should add to the popularity of the song. "Life Gets Tee-Jus" is the deck to watch.

Lyrics ring around the title, with their deep meaning being echoed by Jimmy in first rate fashion. On the flip with "Pretty Mama Boogie," Jimmy switches to some hot and holler with the title of the tune giving off the bill of fare. Topside for a barrel-full of moola.

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**Music Ops Dress Up Machines With
Printed Title Strips. Phone Service
Brings Prompt Delivery On All Labels**

**Star Title Strip Firm Aids Ops In Placing Orders
For Printed Strips On All Major & Indie Records**

NEW YORK—With competition in the automatic music operating field getting tighter each and every day, music operators throughout the nation began dressing up their machines in an effort to boost phonograph play thru the use of printed title strips in their machines.

The nation's largest title strip manufacturer, the Star Title Strip Co., Pittsburgh, Pa., this past week disclosed that they have geared their operational and productive capacity to handle the printing of title strips covering any and all recording companies, major and independent alike. In addition, the firm has set up a telephone service, whereby music operators in New York, Chicago, Detroit, Philadelphia and Pittsburgh may call up and place their order. The firm emphasized that particular attention is being paid to music operator orders and prompt service and delivery is assured.

Music ops have found that thru the use of printed title strips, the volume of play per phonograph has increased. It is easily seen that juke box patrons would be leery of playing a phonograph when they could not distinguish one title from another, as well as one artist from another.

Operators also voiced their opinion with regard to the apparent disinter-

est shown on the part of record manufacturers to supply ops with title strips. Most of the nations diskers supplied the ops with printed title strips prior to the war. This condition in the industry has not returned to any extent at all. It has rather become aggravated with the result that the diskers themselves are suffering in repeat sales and promotion value. Recording artists as well are hurt in that their names more often than ever are being left off of the strips. Trade viewers point out that the cost of title strips is actually negligible, and record companies would profit in the long run by their issuance.

Trade associations leaders throughout the nation were learned to be planning stimulating campaigns along the lines of acquainting recording companies and their operator members with the vast benefits to be reaped from the use of printed title strips.

Title strips should be issued to music operators at the point of sale—one title strip with each record purchase. Operators also point out the disregard shown to ops pleas, by sounding out tremendous amount of promotion material given to retail dealers such as window posters and displays, counter cards, record brushes etc., while the operator receives little or no exploitation material.

STAN KENTON TO DISBAND ORK AFTER PARAMOUNT THEATRE DATE

NEW YORK—The leader of one of the nation's top jazz bands, Stan Kenton, announced this past week that, following his current New York Paramount Theater engagement, he would immediately disband his entire organization.

This news came as a complete shock to the music business as Kenton is generally recognized as a key man in big bands today. His Progressive Jazz concerts throughout the United States have been highly successful from both artistic and financial standpoints.

Kenton believes that this drastic move is the only feasible way of drawing attention to the existent conditions in the music business today, and, as he is in no way considering a permanent departure from music, it will give him the needed time to work out his plans for creating more adequate rooms, or halls, where jazz can be played and heard without the sacrifices that theaters and dance halls demand from the musician.

Before coming to this decision, Kenton seriously considered the outlets for his music between now and when his next concert tour begins in the Fall of 1949. Kenton came to the realization that unless he conforms his specialized music to dancer's needs, becomes part of a theater stage show where the band is allowed but two or three numbers, or, goes into a small club with a jazz policy but whose total capacity does not afford the maintenance of a large band, he must remain inactive for approximately eight months of the year.

Another important factor in Ken-

ton's plan is to try to convince promoters, hotel owners and directors of radio stations where music is featured, that jazz and popular music are two separate musics and should be treated as such. Kenton bookings in hotel spots, altho they have been financial successes, have not clicked with the customers, the bulk of whom wish to dance.

Following his Paramount Theatre engagement, Kenton will spend the Christmas holidays on the Coast and then proceed with his plans to create more suitable locations where-in the modern jazz he purveys can be properly presented. When and if this is accomplished, he will then reorganize his band and return to the jazz front.

Of course, condition, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, etc., must all be taken into consideration. The C.M.I. Blue Book reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

METHOD: The C.M.I. Blue Book should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price for the week: Second price listed is highest price. Where only one price appears this should be considered lowest price.
