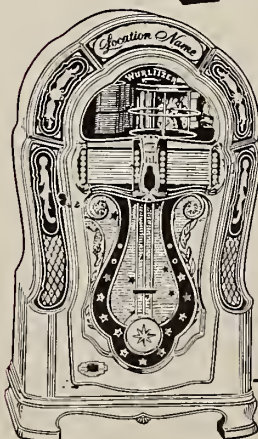
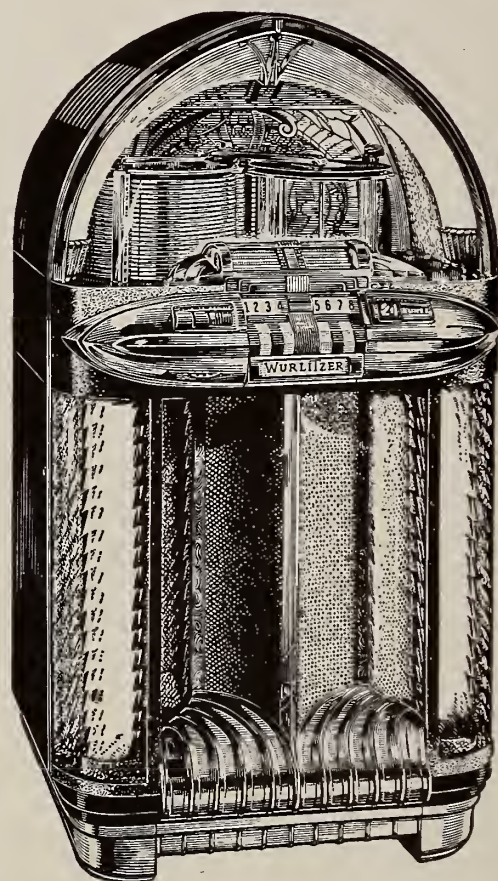

Walked into a bar the other day and found it jammed.

Saw a baseball game that drew the largest crowd in all the park's history.

Recession? Depression? NUTS!

Never saw so many people playing a game that appealed to them.

Never before heard so many guys cluck-cluck-clucking with their noses buried deep down in feed boxes—just like a bunch of old, wet hens.

Never believed that the nation's peoples would ever again fear fear.

Recession?

Depression?

NUTS!

Have you ever seen so many brand new autos jamming the streets of every city, every town, every village, every highway—bumper to bumper?

Is this depression?

NUTS!

Ever seen so many new, bright, sparkling homes—and a housing shortage prevailing at the same time? Ever seen so many new refrigerators, so many new household appliances, so many, many expensive gadgets of all kinds—everywhere in the nation?

Is this recession?

NUTS!

Operators crying? Sure! And why? Because they simply won't follow the logical rules of good business practice. Because they refuse to cooperate with each other for their mutual benefit. Because they think that they, and they alone, can do everything that can be done by all cooperating as a single, solid, strong unit.

Hear of one of 'em who hasn't decided where and when and why he'll take his vacation, and also take his whole family along?

Is this depression?

NUTS!

Readjustment, yes! Levelling off period from wartime inflation, sure! But, depression? Recession? NUTS!!

How far can anyone go who fears fear?

And why should he fear fear—when he's living in a period of higher employment and bigger wages than ever before in the history of the world?

With workers featuring new cars. With people buying new homes, expensive television sets, new gadgets, new everything.

Is this recession? Depression? NUTS! And double NUTS!

Everywhere in the country people are gradually beginning to

But, let him use as his "basing point" his "average" over the past ten years, from 1939 to 1949. He'll find that he ISN'T OFF at all. In fact, his earnings are far above AVERAGE.

Recession? Depression? NUTS!

The only recession or depression that exists is in the minds of those men who fear fear. Who are too lazy to work hard anymore, who want that "easy buck" again, who want the buyer to phone and plead and beg for merchandise.

Brother, the party's over. Roll up your sleeves. Tighten your belt. Get your face and hands good and dirty once again. WORK LIKE HELL!

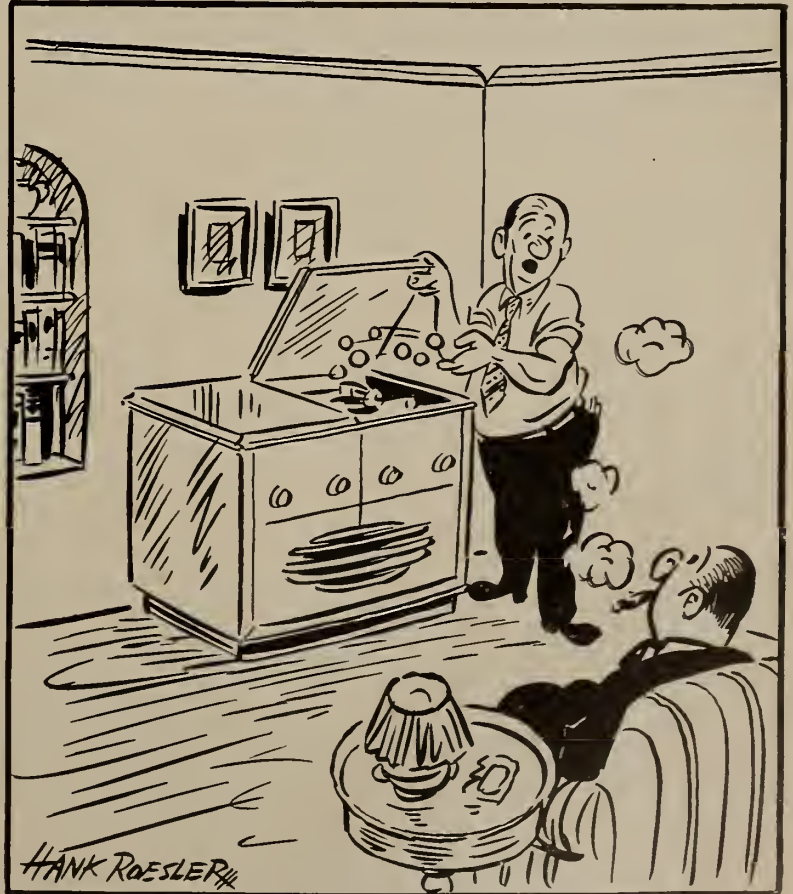

"Chocolate Whiskey and Vanilla Gin" (2:53)

"No, No And No" (3:07)

EDMUNDO ROS ORCH.
(London 469)

● Here's a side that should have juke box fans standing ten deep in line to play! It's a terrific Latin item by the Edmundo Ros orchestra, with the maestro hogging a well deserved spotlight on "Chocolate Whiskey & Vanilla Gin." Ditty is a cute rumba that makes you wanna dance along with the music. Lyrics of the song add up to a ton of mirth and merriment. The flip, "No, No & No," with an English and Spanish vocal is fair enough as it stands. Top deck can't miss!

"Me And My Bundle" (2:47)

"Nothing Less Than Beautiful" (3:02)

BUDDY CLARK
(Columbia 38548)

● Pair of fair sides by piper Buddy Clark, with the refrain of "Me And My Bundle" and "Nothing Less Than Beautiful" in the offing for music operators. Top deck is from the musical production "Miss Liberty." Song is a light romantic air that should please many of Buddy's fans. The other end turns out to be a dramatic presentation, replete with choir and a section of singing strings under the direction of maestro Harry Zimmerman. The song itself is wrapped up in the title, with Buddy coming thru in fine style. Both sides are there for the asking—ops take it from here.

"Dime A Dozen" (2:43)

"Mission Bells And Wishin' Wells" (2:34)

KAY KYSER ORCH.
(Columbia 38549)

● Ditty that seems certain of nabbing a top spot on music popularity lists is this item titled "Dime A Dozen." Offered here by the Kay Kyser krew, the wax stacks up as a hot bit for music ops to take a peek at. Chirp Gloria Wood and the band render the vocal work on the side, and come thru in fine fashion. Song is a mellow one—done up in bright, happy metro throughout. It's the kind of tune you wanna get up and dance to. Fond hand clap adds to the luster of the side. On the other end with "Mission Bells & Wishin' Wells," piper Bob Carroll delivers some effective vocal work on a pleasing romantic tune. "Dime A Dozen" will go.

MARGARET WHITING

● There's no mistake about this one! A cinch to clinch with phono fans throughout the nation is this latest biscuit by Margaret Whiting. Titled "Dime A Dozen," Maggie delivers a socko vocal on this merry up-tempo ditty, with some great instrumental backing by the Frank DeVol ork trickling throughout the

side. The wax whirls in fast tempo, with a mellow hand-clap keeping time to the music. Lyrics of the song make you wanna get up and sing, dance and whistle right along with the platter. It's the type of tune that will have a wide range of appeal to the nation's music fans. The rendition is certainly a feather in chirp Whiting's cap. On the flip with "Whirlwind," Maggie really demonstrates her versatile vocal style by coming up with this unusual platter. Song is spun in a down-to-earth vein, with exceptional music offered by maestro DeVol. Both sides of this platter are hot—with a slight edge going to "Dime A Dozen." Ops should hop on the bandwagon!

"Jealous Heart" (2:51)

"Turnabout" (2:56)

AL MORGAN
(London 500)

● Platter that is kicking up a storm in many sections of the nation is this bit rendered here by piper Al Morgan. The tune, a natural for the many tavern locations throughout the nation, is a tender hearts-and-flowers ditty, handled in top notch vocal manner by Al. Slight echo chamber is used on the side, which flavors the wax all the more. On the other side "Turnabout," picks up the tempo a bit, but delivers another excellent piece of music. "Jealous Heart" is a winner.

"Reckon I'm In Love" (2:50)

"Somehow" (2:47)

THE PIED PIPERS
(RCA Victor 20-3515)

● Mellow vocal harmony of the Pied Pipers, and the set-up of a pair of cute ones in "Reckon I'm In Love" and "Somehow." Top deck is a light, bouncy ditty that rolls along in moderate tempo. The Pipers' soothing vocal efforts on this side make for relaxing moments of musical pleasure throughout the entire dishing. The flip slows down a bit, with the group offering a pleasing romantic air that should hold its own. "Reckon I'm In Love" is the side to ride with.

"You're Like A Gypsy Tune" (2:49)

"Drifting Alone" (2:53)

ALAN FOSTER
(Delvar 110)

● Some wax that might perk up and prove to be a hot juke box item is this pair of sides by balladeer Alan Foster. Titled "You're Like A Gypsy Tune" and "Drifting Alone," Alan delivers an effective bit of vocal work on both sides, to set the stage for some potential coin play. Top deck is a slow romantic ballad, while the flip continues in the same tempo, with a bit of a gallop added. Musical background by the Ed Farley ork is fair enough as it stands. Top deck is the better of the pair.

"Blues In The Night March" (2:51)

"The One Who Gets You" (2:53)

TEX BENEKE ORCH.
(RCA Victor 20-3513)

● Orkster Tex Beneke on the bandstand with a pair of fresh ones in this coupling of "Blues In The Night March" and "The One Who Gets You." Top deck, the subject of some heavy plugging, is a follow-up to the maestro's "St. Louis Blues March" winner. Music ops should know the melody well, since the original tune was a big item years ago. The flip has Tex and the Moonlight Serenaders offering a rhythm romance tune that should hold its own. Big side is the top one.

"Song Of Surrender" (3:01)

"Blame My Absent Minded Heart" (2:56)

MINDY CARSON
(RCA Victor 20-3508)

● The sultry vocal style of chirp Mindy Carson is displayed in all its grandeur on this latest waxing tagged "Song Of Surrender" and "Blame My Absent Minded Heart." Top deck, a plush romantic item, is the title song of the Paramount flicker of the same name, and should receive some heavy ballyhoo. Mindy's delivery on this pleasing bit of music is first rate from start to finish. The flip, from the Warner Brothers film "It's A Great Feeling," is another cute little cupiditty that should satisfy the rapidly growing clan of Mindy's fans. We like "Song Of Surrender."

"In An Old Cathedral Town" (2:48)

"The Girl I Love" (2:40)

DICK JAMES
(London 465)

● Pair of sides by balladeer Dick James that have some coin culling potential are these titled "In An Old Cathedral Town" and "The Girl I Love." Top deck, with Dick aided by a vocal choir, is a plush, dramatic ballad that makes you stop and listen. Lyrics of the tune are exceptionally heart-warming and are easy on the ears. The flip is a slow ballad that should hold its own. Top deck rates ops' listening time—and more.

"My Bolero" (2:50)

"Through A Long And Sleepless Night" (2:57)

VIC DAMONE
(Mercury 5313)

● Continuing his current string of hot platters, Vic Damone comes up with a pair that seem to beckon some heavy coin play. "My Bolero" is a strong up-tempo ballad, styled to vocal perfection by Vic. Song has a world of infectious melody in it, and should do well on the boxes. The flip is the plug tune from the 20th Century-Fox film "Come To The Stable," and as such should prove to be a big winner. Both sides rate music ops' avid attention.

"Azar" (2:53)

"Rhumba Jubilee" (2:52)

STEVE KISLEY ORCH.
(Star 609)

● Ditty that might crop up and blossom out is this piece by the Steve Kisley ork, with baladeer Ralph Young in the spotlight. Wax, titled "Azar" is a strong bit of music that serves Ralph's vocal strains well. Tempo is moderate, with the lyrics making the listener stop and pay close attention. It's Ralph's vocal work on the side that makes this disk a potential winner. The flip, "Rhumba Jubilee" is a pleasing rhumba-ditty, with a fond hand-clap added. Side should satisfy the many hip-swivelers. Top deck rates ops listening time—and more.

"Twilight" (3:12)

"I Get Sentimental Over Nothing"
(2:28)

ANNE SHELTON
(London 458)

● Ditty that seems to have a ton of coin winning potential is this musical item by thrush Anne Shelton tagged "Twilight." The song is a plush romantic piece that receives a wonderful send-off by Anne, and the Paul Fenoulhet ork, with a vocal choir filling in the background. Tempo is slow, and the song is rendered in exciting, dramatic style. The flip, "I Get Sentimental Over Nothing" is another tune that might catch on. An excellent ballad, handled in superb manner, the tune might take off and prove to be a big winner. Ops should get with this disk.

"Who Were You With Last Night"

"There's A Lovely Lake In London"

PRIMO SCALA ORCH.
(London 448)

● The great Primo Scala ork on deck with a pair, and the set up of "Who Were You With Last Night" and "There's A Lovely Lake In London" in the offing for music ops. Both sides of this platter are offered in mellow, string band manner, with The Keynotes harmonizing wonderfully on the pair. Top deck is the side we really go for. It's a cute, up tempo novelty tune that will receive some heavy applause from all sets of music fans. The flip weaves about the title, and also makes for great listening. Platter rates a spot on music ops' machines.

Bound to attract a sensational amount of attention in the disk business, and result in a harvest of silver for music operators is this platter by piper Bill Darnel. Bill's spooning of these sides, with a world of top notch jazz intonation in his vocal, is grade A work from start to finish. Both sides of this platter beckon an avalanche of coin play.

The top deck, "So Much," has Bill spooning a terrific blues ballad that weaves in slow, infectious tempo. Lyrics of the song, added to Bill's great vocal, make for excellent listening pleasure. His slow, deliberate tones on the side make you perk up and pay close attention. It's the type of disk that will have a wide range of appeal to all sets of music fans. On the other end with "Hoe Cake, Hominy & Sassafras Tea," Bill switches tempo to turn in another superb dinking. Ditty is a mellow, up tempo novelty tune that makes you wanna sing right along with him. The rhythm and phrasing displayed by Bill on this side should certainly boost him into a blazing spotlight in the very near future. Ork backing on the pair by Alvy West and The Little Band is top drawer stuff from start to finish. Both sides of this cookie are sizzling hot—music ops should grab 'em by the boxful!

Musicraft Gets Offer To Buy 200,000 Disks

NEW YORK—A proposal to purchase a large quantity of Musicraft records was to have been presented to the plattery's creditors and Referee Herbert Lowenthal in Federal District Court this past week. The offer reportedly came from Harry Flaxman, Hartford, Conn., who proposed to buy 20,000 single records and 12,000 albums recorded by Musicraft, at very low prices.

The recently reported MGM leasing plan is scheduled to be presented to the firm's creditors, as will Musicraft exec Oliver Sabin's rental and purchase plan. It was learned that the MGM plan had received Referee Lowenthal's approval at a meeting last week. The MGM proposal calls for the payment of a one-cent royalty to Musicraft, in addition to a \$25,000 advance royalty. Special arrangements were to have been included in this plan for the many kiddie records and Sarah Vaughan sides in the Musicraft catalog.

While these offers thus far had been the only ones forthcoming in the settlement of the Musicraft tangle, it was reported that other majors were interested in purchasing some Musicraft masters. Columbia Records were supposed to have been interested in purchasing the Sarah Vaughan sides, especially so, since Sarah is now featured on the Columbia label. Offers were also reportedly being made from several independent platteries intent on buying many of the race and jazz sides the Musicraft plattery issued during their term of business operation.

Hampton Boys Cut For Spire Records

FRESNO, Calif.—Lionel Hampton is now in a drive to push members of his orchestra into stardom. Latest effort was recording of tenor-sax Gene Morris, with the Hamptones, and Sonny Parker on vocals, to be released through Spire Records, Fresno, California.

Two jump numbers and two blues were recorded in the first session, with something excitingly different offered in "King Trotter," an instrumental that features Morris. Chester Lew, Spire Prexy announces that first release of the Hamptones will be August 15.

● Hot on the heels of their sensational success with "Rickey's Blues," The Ravens come up with another terrific recording in this bit of music titled "There's Nothing Like A Woman In Love" and "Careless Love." There is no

doubt about it—this group certainly has what it takes to put a piece of material over. The great vocal styling of bass Jimmy Ricks takes the lead on the top deck, with some fine tenor vocal work riding thru in addition. The song is a tremendously infectious piece, and is one that makes you stop and listen. Harmony the gang offers is hard to beat, and is a sure thing to meet with instant approval. On the other end with "Careless Love," The Ravens bounce back with another superb vocal platter on a ditty that is rapidly kicking up a storm. This rendition should prove to be one of the biggest and best around. Music ops won't have to hesitate one second once they hear this recording. Hop to it!

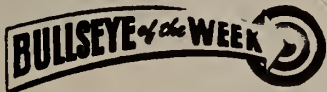

Some great wax by Andy Parker and the Plainsmen, and the excellent refrain of "By The Light Of The Alter Candles" and "Whippoorwill Waltz" notches this featured spot this week. Both sides of this platter beckon some heavy coin play the songs are that good. Top deck is a deeply touching piece, with Charlie Morgan wailing the comely, infectious wordage. Lyrics spin about the title, and a

vocal chorus in back of Charlie chants in perfect harmony to add to the luster and glow of the music. It's a slow, moving piece—one that makes you stop and pay close attention. On the flip, Charlie and the gang bounce back with still another great piece of wax in this attractive waltz. The platter shows a world of promise—either side can boom music operators' juke box play immensely. Climb on the bandwagon—get a boxful!

"Standing Outside Of Heaven" (2:17)

The widely popular Jimmy Wakely on deck with a pair, and the echo of "Standing Outside Of Heaven" and "When I Take My Vacation In Heaven" seeping thru the platter. Titles of both tunes give off the bill of fare here, altho you've got to listen to the wax to appreciate Jimmy's fine vocal work. It's slow tempting stuff that Jimmy offers, with some very effective instrumental work rounding out the sides in top fashion. Music ops should listen in.

Some wax which music operators may care to use as filler items are these offered by Art Gibson. Top deck is a cute bit that might catch on. The coupling is just what the title sez it is, a romantic folk lament. Art's heavy following may account for unusual play of these sides.

Both sides spill in ultra slow fashion, with a very effective bit of vocal work coming thru. It's slow, tempting stuff, the sort that always finds a warm spot with phono fans. Top deck, "Alone Again" gets the edge here. Listen in.

Music operators in the market for some religious sides, should by all means, pay close attention to this recording by the Johnson Family Singers. Offering "Let's Ride That Plane" and "God Is My Landlord," the group display some excellent vocal tones on the pair, to set the stage for some potential coin play. Unison vocal on both sides of the disk is easy to take to, and makes for mellow listening pleasure. Wax has to be heard in order to be fully appreciated—and that is just what we recommend.

Pair of sides by Ramblin' Jimmie Dolan, and the set up of "Good Bye My One & Only" and "Tennessee Baby" in the offing for music ops. Top deck is a medium slow tempo'd musical item, with some excellent guitar work flashing throughout. Vocal by Jimmie is fair enough on the side, and should be greeted warmly. The flip is just what the title indicates, an ode to a Tennessee gal. The many fans Jimmie has should go for this duo—ops take note.

"You'll Find Her Name Written There" (2:56)

"Smokey Mountain Boogie" (2:53)

TENNESSEE ERNIE
(Capitol 57-40212)

A side that has some heavy potential coin play is this one rendered by Tennessee Ernie. Titled "You'll Find Her Name Written There," the tune spins in slow, fragrant tempo, with a soft, push air about it. Vocal work on the side fits the mood and manner of the tune like a glove. It's a tender lament—one that should cause music ops and fans alike to sit up and take notice. The flip switches tempo to a mellow up tempo boogie tune that should meet with better than average reception. Ops should get with the top deck.

Her voice has been termed "the smoky voice" by many of her followers, who have been anxious to hear Jilla on records.

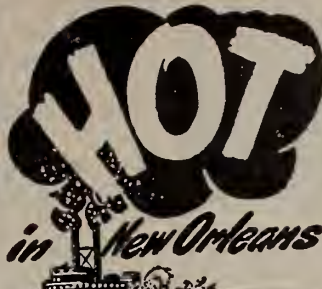

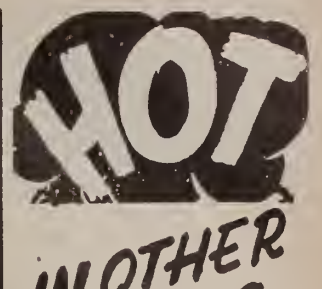

MFERS BACK MOA CONVENTION

OAKLAND, CALIF.—George A. Miller, National Chairman of MOA (Music Operators of America) reported this past week from his headquarters in this city that he has already received a great many letters and phone calls from leading manufacturers of automatic music equipment as well as from allied industry manufacturers stating that they are going to attend the first national convention of MOA in Chicago on November 7, 8 and 9.

At the same time all the manufacturers are impressed with the fact that this first national convention of MOA is a non-profit meet and that the manufacturers will not be forced to use expensive display space and just as expensive booths.

All the men were happy to hear that they could take suites in whatever Chicago hotel will be decided on for the convention and that they will then be able to meet with the nation's music operators in these rooms.

Miller reported, "I have many letters from various manufacturers, and have even received telephone calls from as far away as Chicago, stating that most of the manufacturing representatives believe that they should have their own rooms to display their merchandise in the same hotel that our convention is being held.

"They felt that they could entertain the operators individually and, at the same time, those operators who are interested in whatever products they have will be the one who will call in each of the manufacturers' rooms.

"Further, I felt that our convention should not be a mercenary convention for the purpose of making a profit or causing the participants to spend a lot of money unnecessarily."

Further facts regarding the hotel which will be chosen as well as complete details of the meetings will be discussed in Chicago at the Morrison Hotel on September 12 and 13 when the Executive Committee meets (August 6 issue of *The Cash Box* gave a complete report in this regard).

In the meantime music operators from all over the nation, independents as well as association members, have already signified their intention of attending this first MOA convention in Chicago.

Silver King Has Triplets

CHICAGO—H. F. Burt of the Silver-King Corp., this city, announced this past week that the firm had just given birth to triplets.

"The same machines will also be built in various colors and trim for special products, which several operating companies and sales organizations desire to promote unique and new merchandise.

Sanitation Helps Sales From Drink Vendors

NEW YORK—The obvious cleanliness of a soft drink vended from an automatic machine in a paper cup is one of the industry's biggest assets in competing with beverage stands where glasses must be washed behind a counter with inadequate facilities. Part of the machines' reputation for cleanliness comes from their use of single service paper cups, a type of drinking vessel the public associates with high standards of sanitation. Additional support for superiority of paper cups now comes from studies recently completed by the American Paper and Pulp Association showing that paper as a material is remarkably free from germs.

At the request of the Association, the Institute of Paper Chemistry went into 28 paper mills located all over the country and made bacteriological tests of 2500 samples of 35 types of paper and paperboard normally used in food packaging and service. When the results were in, not a single sample showed the presence of disease producing bacteria.

In an experimental run, the biologists from the Institute proceeded to introduce harmful bacteria into the early stages of paper manufacture. In one case, for instance, a heavy suspension of *Escherichia coli*, a bacterium found in the digestive tract of humans and other warm blooded animals, was sprayed onto the wet sheet just before it entered the drier section of a paper machine. Analyses of this wet web after the spraying showed a coliform count as high as 4,577,000 bacteria per gram of paper, and yet after the paper had passed over the driers, analyses showed that all of the coliform bacteria had been destroyed.

The game is a twin coin-head bell-type console available with nickel-quarter, double-nickel or double-quarter coin-mechanisms. Two players may play the game at the same time. The name, Clover-Bell, refers to four-leaf clover symbols on the backglass. When clovers remain lit, after the flash, player's score is doubled.

Jenkins also pointed out that Clover-Bell has the "spotted symbols" feature first introduced in Spot-Bell with an additional symbol. "In addition to normal winning symbols," Jenkins explained, "a single cherry, single orange and single plum flash when extra coins are played. When a single symbol remains lit after the flash, it remains lit during entire game. All three single symbols may light, giving player three extra winners to play for. Extra coins also advance odds from 2 up to special and super-special. Odds always either advance or remain as high as on previous coin and never drop back to a lower bracket."

Jenkins stated that prolonged location tests indicate that Clover-Bell has unusual earning power and he predicted that the game would enjoy a long run of popularity.

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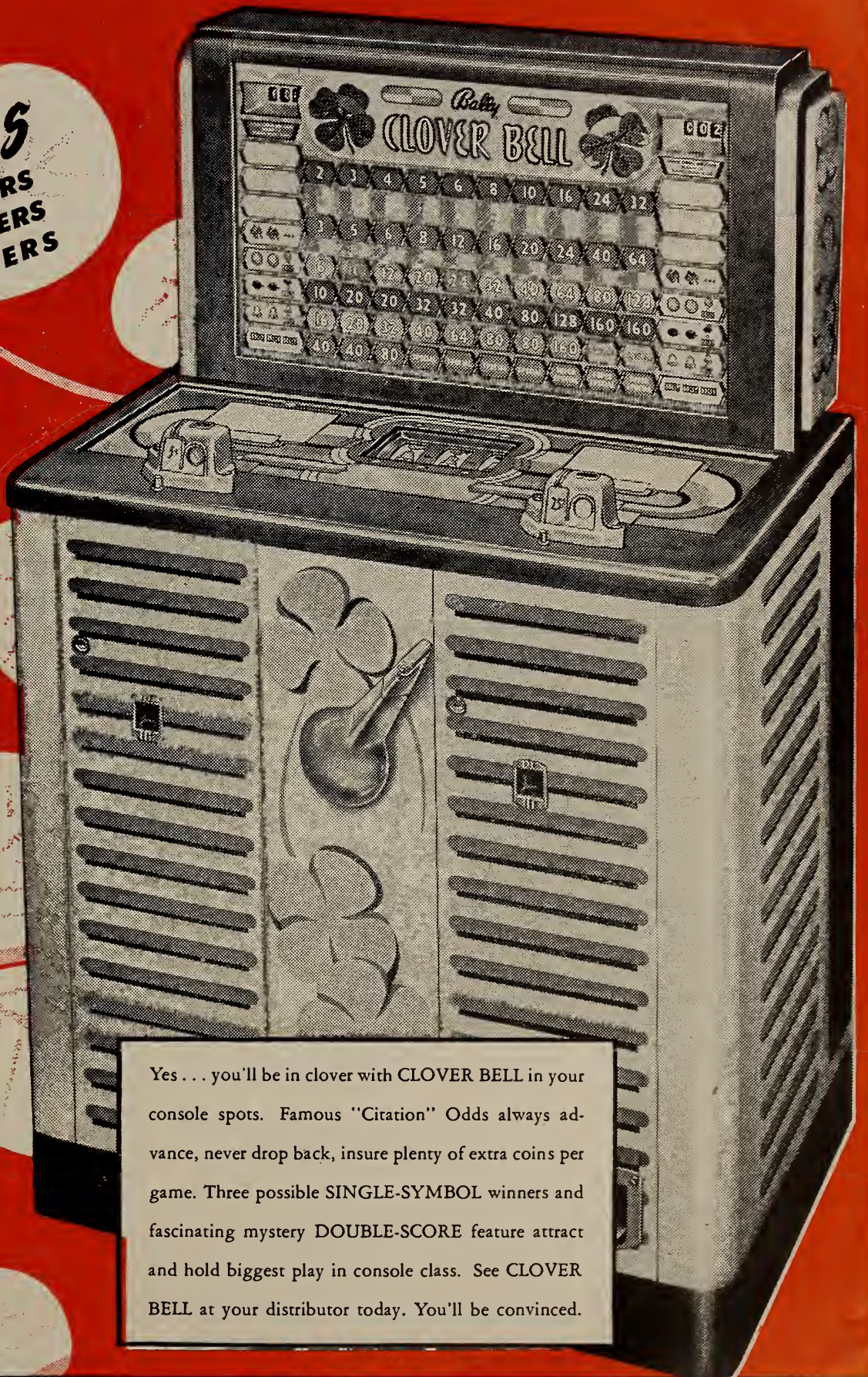

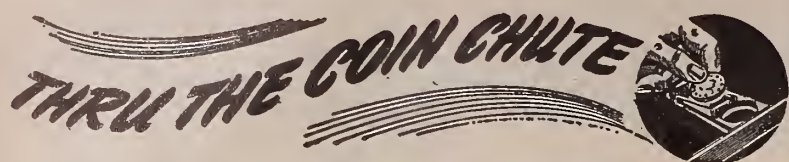

METHOD: "The Confidential Price Lists" should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price for the week; Second price listed is highest price. Where only one price appears this should be considered lowest price.

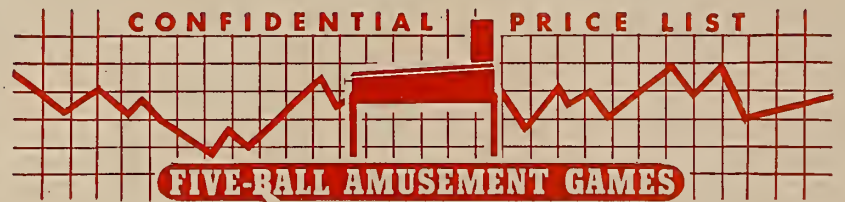

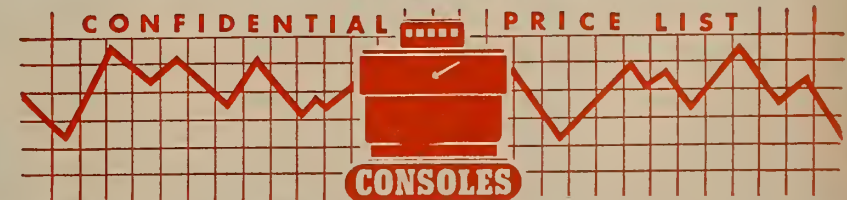

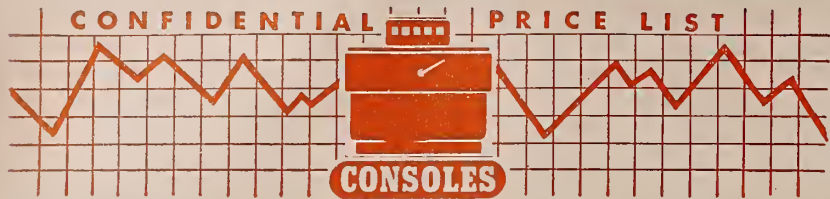
