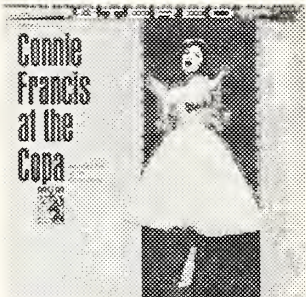

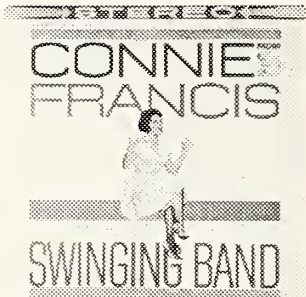

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We're proud

Pardon us if we sound a bit boastful for a moment, but, as we, the publishers and staff of *The Cash Box* near our second year of blanket coverage of the International Record Market, we would like to use this space to report to our readers on a success story of which we are quite proud.

Having recognized the steadily increasing significance of the international record market, *The Cash Box*, in 1959 introduced the first in a weekly series of chart and news reports from numerous key record markets outside the United States. We are happy to say we have accomplished this goal in less than two years. As a result, our international readership has grown tremendously. Ninety-six percent of all the advertising placed in American record trade publications by record firms and publishers outside the U.S. has appeared in *The Cash Box*.

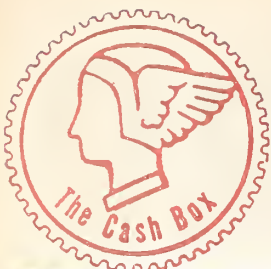
Most gratifying have been the comments from our American clients who, upon returning from abroad, have found it almost neces-

sary to call us and comment on our overwhelming acceptance in every country visited. In so many words, all have said that *The Cash Box* is the record trade paper of the world. We are continually receiving letters of thanks from record execs of many nations who express appreciation for the emergence of a "much needed world-wide music trade publication." And these same people find it a must, when they are in the U.S., to visit our offices.

But last week, we received our most rewarding testimonial when our competitor in the trade publication field, *The Billboard*, announced it would discontinue publishing its Overseas Edition with its final issue dated May 8—a publication introduced to the trade following the debut of *The Cash Box*' International Section.

What our competitor seems to have recognized is that the record industry wants no abbreviated picture of the world-wide record scene, but complete coverage of all key record markets. This is what *The Cash Box* initiated and will continue to offer with greater scope every week.

The Cash Box Pick of the Week

"THAT OLD BLACK MAGIC" "DON'T BE AFRAID (TO FALL
(2:28) [Famous ASCAP—Mercer, Arlen] IN LOVE)" (2:18)
[Lowe, Kallman ASCAP—Mann]

BOBBY RYDELL (Cameo 190)

The pro young talent, whose stock has been soaring by leaps and bounds, should again cop top wax laurels with this new pairing. One half is a tremendous new teen rock revival of "That Old Magic." Bobby, the ork and chorus shine on this session culled from his newest LP, "The Great Ones." The "Don't Be Afraid" side is an ultra-lovely, soft Latin beat ballad romancer that rests warmly in the artist's capable hands.

"LITTLE DEVIL" (2:37) [Aldon BMI—Sedaka, Greenfield]
"I MUST BE DREAMING" (2:10) [Aldon BMI—Sedaka, Greenfield]
NEIL SEDAKA (RCA Victor 7874)

Sedaka, who's been latching on to the top-ten'ers at a record clip (the latest one being "Calendar Girl"), is a cinch to capture another one in "Little Devil." It's a refreshing jumper that displays the songsters' sparkling vocal style against a stellar Stan Applebaum ork-chorus backdrop. The charming lilter, flipside, makes this a two-sided listening treat. Once again, both sides were clefted by Neil and Howard Greenfield (and produced by Nevins-Kirshner).

"KISSIN' GAME" (2:36) [Trio BMI—Philips, Vance]
"HEAVEN HELP ME" (2:01) [Just BMI—Lynn, Medley]
DION (Laurie 3090)

This looks like the songster's third-in-a-row ("Lonely Teenager" and "Havin' Fun") since becoming a single. Tune, dubbed "Kissin' Game," is a most attractive romancer set in an intriguing Latin-teen beat format. "Heaven Help Me" is a catchy thumper knocked out in sunny style. Top notch (Stan Applebaum-led) rock and choral backing.

"YOU'RE GONNA NEED MAGIC" (2:42)
[We Three BMI—Brass, Levine]
"TO THE ONE I LOVE" (2:24) [Saxon BMI—Hamilton, Chase]
ROY HAMILTON (Epic 9443)

Hamilton's sensational ride to hitsville via the "You Can Have Her" special should soon be repeated with this Epic session. It's a fabulous, driving handclapper, titled "You're Gonna Need Magic," that continues the excitement of the previous platter. Thrilling Sammy Lowe ork-choral showcase. "To The One I Love" is a beautiful, cha cha beat performance also loaded with sales dynamite.

"A LITTLE FEELING
(CALLED LOVE)" (2:40) "NOW THAT I" (2:25)
[Wolfpack SESAC—Scott] [Wolfpack SESAC—Scott]
JACK SCOTT (Capitol 4554)

Scott, who already owns a host of hits under the Carlton and Top Rank banner, can add two more with his Capitol bow, "A Little Feeling (Called Love)" and "Now That I." Former's a slow, emotional ballad romancer while the latter's striking rhythmic opus. Chalk up two grade "A" choral-ork assists for Stan Applebaum & Co.

"RAINDROPS" (2:37) "I WANT TO LOVE YOU" (2:12)
[Conrad BMI—Clark] [Conrad BMI—Clark]
DEE CLARK (VeeJay 383)

Take your pick here. Clark has two sensational follow-ups to his current chart-rider, "Your Friends." "Raindrops" is a cha cha beat, crying towel beauty (arranged by Riley C. Hampton). Can go all the way up the sales ladder. Tempo changes to a rafter-shakin' beat on the exciting "I Want To Love You" lid. Fantastic coupling that should have the kids listening, dancing and buying.

"THAT'S THE WAY WITH LOVE" (2:59) "THAT'S THE WAY WITH LOVE" (2:50)
[Southern ASCAP— Beretta, Soffici, Malgoni] [Southern ASCAP— Sigman, Beretta, Soffici, Malgoni]
"HOW IN THE WORLD" (2:59) "THE GOLDEN CHAIN" (2:32)
[United Artists ASCAP—Costa] [Summit ASCAP—Roberts]
DON COSTA (United Artists 318) TOMMY EDWARDS (MGM 13002)

These are two excellent interpretations of a beautiful, "Theme From A Summer Place"-flavored import tagged "That's The Way With Love (Viaggio Nell' Infinito)" (an instrumental introduced last week by Soffici-Malgoni on Kip). One's an enchanting strings-with-a-beat instrumental by Don Costa's (with sans-lyric choral chants) crew on UA while the other feature's Tommy Edwards' sincere ballad-way (with an attractive LeRoy Holmes triplet-string support). Costa has a string-beat lovely flipside while Edwards swings lightly on an engaging coupler.

THE CUMBERLAND THREE
(Roulette 4357)

(B+) "OLD DOG BLUE" (2:23)
[Melody Trails BMI — Goode Kuhl] Fine folk crew solidly warble the striking folk tune. This is first-rate work in a commercial folk vein.

(B) "YOU CAN TELL THE WORLD" (2:07) [Melody Trails BMI — Gibson, Camp] Boys give a robust reading of the joyous spiritual-type number.

THE K-NINE (Vista 801)

(B+) "101 DALMATIANS" (1:47)
[Wonderland BMI—Sherman, Sherman] Chorus and some actual Dalmatians agreeably read the cheerful title-tune of Walt Disney's new (and successful) feature-length cartoon. Mostly kiddie audience here.

(B) "CRUELLA DE VIL" (1:15)
[Walt Disney ASCAP — Leven] Another item from the pic.

LLOYD PRICE ORCH.
(ABC-Paramount 10206)

(B+) "STRING OF PEARLS" (2:49) [Mutual ASCAP — Gray] The famed Glenn Miller vehicle receives a fine shuffle-beat band sound from an ork headed by the popular songster. Solid teen/adult programming.

(B) "CHANTILLY LACE" (2:51)
[Glad BMI—Richardson] Hit by the late Big Bopper returns in bright, Latinish band garb. Some vocal shouts are included.

JOHNNY HOLMES (Strand 25036)

(B) "LIGHT A CANDLE" (2:15)
[Sylvia & Steary BMI—Council, Dailey] Holmes warmly relates the feelingful romantic inspirational and receives attractive soft-spoken combo-femme chorus support. Touching performance.

(B) "SO MEAN" (2:11) [Sylvia BMI — Darin, Kirschner] Catchy R&B-type track.

SIL AUSTIN (Mercury 71808)

(B+) "THE CONTINENTAL STROLL — Part 1" (2:30)
[Meridian BMI — Hendricks, Otis, Benton] The vet saxist, with organ-harmonica solos, heads an effective funky instrumental based on two popular teen steps. A listening/dancing treat for the youngsters.

(B+) "THE CONTINENTAL STROLL — Part 2" (2:25)
[Meridian BMI — Hendricks, Otis, Benton] Session continued.

DON DELL & UPSTARTS
(East Coast 101)

(B+) "MAY IT BE MY FORTUNE" (2:05) [Wonder BMI—Hard] Newly formed label, in New York, displays teen-market awareness in this solid-sounding intimate pose by the lead songster Bell, backed with a cozy touch by the other singers and combo. Enough exposure could mean a chart run for this striking teen-romantic.

(B) "TIME" (2:00) [Bildo BMI—Bruno] Lighter beat moments in this bouncy session.

EMILIO PERICOLI/GINO PAOLI
(Warner Bros. 5205)

(B) "AL DI LA'" (2:22) [M. Witmark ASCAP — Mogol, Donida] Italian songster Emilio Pericoli gives a sensitive Italian-sung reading of this year's San Remo winner. Pretty ork accompaniment.

(B) "SASSI" (2:30) [M. Witmark ASCAP—Paoli] This distinctively Italian sound is headed by popular Italian songster Gino Paoli.

MELINA MERCOURI
(United Artists 304)

(B) "CRIANCAS DE ATENAS (Children of Athens)" (3:22) [Esteem & Sidmore BMI—Hadji-dakis] This is a soundtrack version of the "Never On Sunday" tune—up for an Academy Award this year—sung prettily by the star of the successful Greek comedy pic. Mandolin-like sound backs-up.

(B) "DANSE YORGO" (3:02)
[Esteem & Sidmore BMI — Hadjidakis] A charming instrumental from the soundtrack. Both sides are included in the label's soundtrack LP of "Sunday" music.

JERRY JACKSON (Kapp 387)

(B+) "TIME" (2:46) [E. H. Morris ASCAP—Kaye, Springer] A pro, colorful rock-a-string outing headed by songster Jackson. Teen-wise tune tells of an enduring love. A stand that could come-up with lots of coin.

(B) "SE HABLA ESPANOL" (2:27) [E. H. Morris ASCAP —Kaye, Springer] Affable light-beat rock-a-cha novelty.

SCOTTY & BOBO/THE MASTERTONES (Bandbox 238)

(B) "FOR THE REST OF MY LIFE" (2:52) [Monument BMI—McCoy, Singleton] This portion, featuring late songster Jimmy Scott, is an effective teen-market ballad outing. Strings have been arranged with originality.

(B) "MAMACITA MIA" (3:10)
[Band Box — Watson] The Mastertones combo solos in good-sounding bluesy Latin-rock fashion.

JACK EVANS (Envoy 2301)

(B+) "GIRLS" (1:10) [Shepley BMI—Evans] Singer Evans and the rock-a-string & femme chorus setting offer a very likable rock-a-cha novelty. It's a catchy teen enterprise that could make noise.

(B) "COME PRIMA" (1:58)
[A.M.C. ASCAP—Ram, Panzeri, Taccani, Dipaola] Performer does a mostly English rock-ballad version of the recent Italian success.

TINO CAIRO (Hi-Q 5020)
(B) "LOVE IN PORTOFINO" (2:12) [Trianon BMI—Cairo] Offbeat and catchy Latin-rock sound, with Cairo offering a dialect English vocal against an intriguing combo-chorus sound.

(B) "WOW! BABY SITTE" (2:20) [Trianon BMI—Brown] More familiar teen stuff is this well-done driving novelty.

"LITTLE EGYPT" (2:51)

[Progressive, Trio BMI—Leiber, Stoller]

Strings swirl in the setting. Could prove chart item.

IRMA THOMAS (Minit 625)

Here, he sings of man who works hard to support his family, and receives a Floyd Cramer-type combo-chorus setting. Commercial cut for the vet artist.

(B) **"THE LONG BLACK VEIL" (3:02)** [Cedarwood BMI—Wilkin, Hill] Tragedy-type folk ballad is told with a haunting style by Ives and the vocal-instrumental backing.

ROY ETZEL (President 820)

(B+) **"TELL LAURA I LOVE HER" (2:23)** [E. B. Marks BMI—Bary, Raleigh] The recent Ray Peterson hit shows up as a pretty instrumental ala the Bert Kaempfert sound (trumpet heads the arrangement). Tune works-in nicely as an instrumental, and could make noise again in this form. London distributes the label.

(B+) **"REACH FOR THE STARS" (2:40)** [Piccadilly BMI—Jergens] Lovely tune goes a similar route. Should also be eyed.

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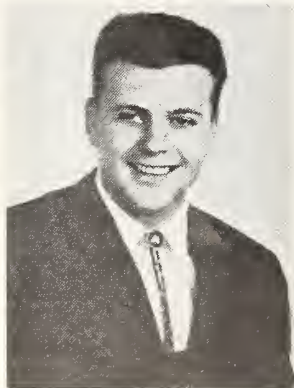

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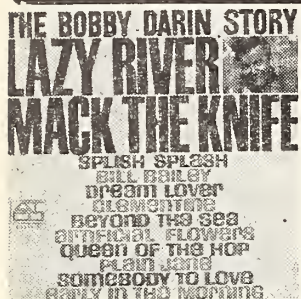

POPULAR PICKS OF THE WEEK



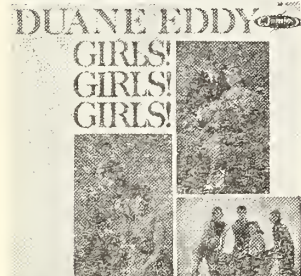
"THE BOBBY DARIN STORY"—Atco 33-131
The single record successes of Bobby Darin have been compiled into a chronological review of the youngster's rise, from his five disks as a rock 'n' roll idol ("Splish, Splash," "Queen of the Hop," "Dream Lover") through the more widely accepted "Mack the Knife," "Clementine," "Bill Bailey" and "Lazy River." Occasional narration by Darin lends the session a personal touch. Should be a huge sales bonanza.



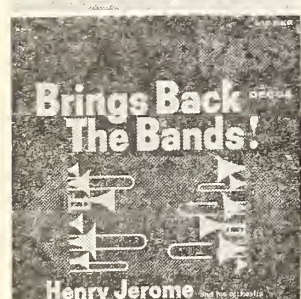
"HERE'S JONATHAN"—Jonathan Winters—Verve V-15025
Jonathan Winters once more in a hilarious series of sketches. His amazing voice characterizations include here a test flight, Maude Frickert—the oldest airline stewardess, a flying saucer and a child psychiatrist. The eight tracks were culled from various "live" west coast appearances and include various impromptu remarks of priceless hilarity. Another big winner from the comic.



"GOLDEN PIANO HITS"—Ferrante & Teicher—Ultra Audio WWS 8505
Twin pianists Ferrante & Teicher recreate a dozen famed keyboard classics, beginning with their own million-selling "Exodus" and on through such memorabilia as "Autumn Leaves," "Miserlou," Warsaw Concerto," "Near You" and "Till." Full string ork and chorus accompanies. Standout performances with sound quality an important factor. Strong scoring potential.



"GIRLS! GIRLS! GIRLS!"—Duane Eddy-Jamie JLP-70-3019
Eddy's twangy guitar offers charming portraits of a dozen likeable femmes. Along with such stalwarts as "Sioux City Sue," "Mona Lisa" and "Tammy," Eddy's pen contributes special nods to such current favorites as "Annette," "Connie" and "Brenda"—a medley of the star's hits. The musical picture is completed by able accompaniment by the Rebels and the Anita Kerr Singers and the Jordanares. Has that chart gleam.



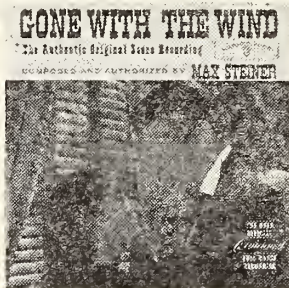
"BRAZEN BRASS BRINGS BACK THE BANDS"—Henry Jerome and his Orchestra—Decca DL 74125
Fourth in what is proving a highly successful series features the big hits of the Swing Era all dressed up in a modern new look by Dick Jacobs arrangements and Henry Jerome's stereo minded direction. The mellow flavor of the chestnuts is retained but a sharper beat is added along with crisp brass assaults on the famous solos. Selections include "In the Mood," "Dipsy Doodle," "Begin the Beguine," "Woodchopper's Ball," "Cherokee" and "Song of India." Earns a chart prediction.



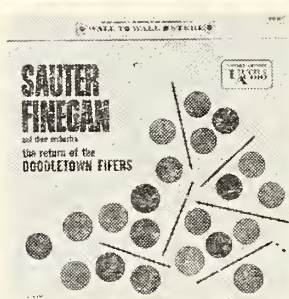
"FOOTLIGHT PERCUSSION"—Terry Snyder—Ultra Audio WWS 8508
Broadway, past and present, provides Terry Snyder with a dozen superb vehicles for his outstanding percussion talents. Such tuneful items as "If I Were A Bell," "I Could Have Danced All Night," "Til There Was You" and "Guys And Dolls" are neatly wrapped in lively small band surroundings with a healthy helping of vivid percussive effects, highlighting the Snyder bongos. Could make a strong showing.



"ANDRE PREVIN PLAYS SONGS BY HAROLD ARLEN"—Contemporary M3586
Ten superb songs by Harold Arlen have been chosen for Previn's third in his solo composer series for the label. (Others were Kern and Duke.) This solo Previn style defies classification as either pop or jazz. There is adherence to the melody and a freedom of improvisational expression (but not in ordinary jazz lines) and even a certain classical feeling in some instances. In total, it is outstanding keyboard entertainment by an artist of stature. Among the tunes are "My Shining Hour," "Over the Rainbow," "Let's Fall In Love" and "That Old Black Magic."



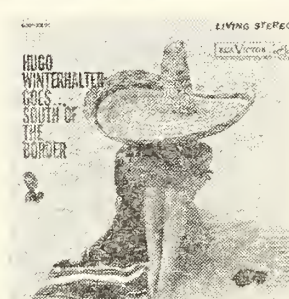
"GONE WITH THE WIND"—Muir Mathieson conducting the London Sinfonia—Warner Bros. W1322
Music from the sound track of the great motion picture is re-released here by WB in conjunction with the re-release of the film for the centennial celebration of the Civil War. Since "GWTW" precedes sound track disks this recording has been tagged the "complete authentic recording of the original score" authorized by composer Max Steiner. Renewed flick interest should certainly reflect in increased disk sales.



"THE RETURN OF THE DOODLETOWN FIFERS"—Sauter-Finegan—Ultra Audio WWS 8511
In the early Fifties there emerged on the big band scene an orchestra that now can be said was about 10 years ahead of its time. Ed Sauter and Bill Finegan then achieved only mild success with their "new" ideas, sounds and arrangements. Now, with stereo firmly established, a comeback has been paved for the talented two. In this debut set for the label, "deluxe" sound engineering provides a perfect medium for a recreation of "The Doodletown Fifers" (the band's big hit), and inventively conceived treatments of a few standards and several outstanding originals—"The Churchmouse," "Thursday's Child" and "Sleighride." This is a sound that deserves recognition.



"THE SHAPE OF SOUNDS TO COME"—Larry Elgart—MGM E3896
Larry Elgart is one of the more adventuresome band leaders of today, looking for and almost always achieving that extra something that distinguishes his band from many others. He has been most successful here as he leads his crack aggregation through novel arrangements by Bill Finegan, John Murtaugh, Bobby Scott and others on such items as "I've Got You Under My Skin," "I've Heard That Song Before," "Rain On the Roof" and "Get Out of Town." An easy-going, gently swinging session with a colorful additive that will attract many admirers.



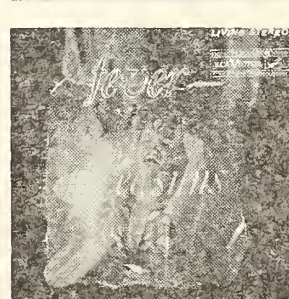
"HUGO WINTERHALTER GOES . . . SOUTH OF THE BORDER"—RCA Victor LSP-2271
For his current musical journey (previous LP's have taken him far and wide), Hugo Winterhalter heads south with his ork and chorus for a pleasurable interlude with our hemispheric cousins. The mood is established via the scintillating "Mexican Hat Dance" opener, from whence he ventures through a brace of authentic Latin-inspired U.S. pops and a couple of first-time-on-wax originals. Among them are "Orchids In the Moonlight," "Yours," "La Cucaracha," "Rum And Coca-Cola" (with a cleaned-up lyric) and "Carioca."



"MAVIS"—Mavis Rivers—Reprise R-2002
After several mildly successful LP's on Capitol and wide critical acclaim for her superb vocal style, Mavis Rivers moves over to Reprise and intros here on a dozen Marty Paich arrangements. Possessing a particularly clear, crisp phrasing style, she can be at one moment vibrantly swinging, and the next in a murky, moody manner. Paich has provided her with an excellent small band format for performances of "Day In, Day Out," "A Sleepin' Bee," "People Will Say We're In Love" and "Saturday Night Is The Loneliest Night In The Week."



"THE SECOND TIME AROUND"—Jane Morgan—Kapp KL-1239
The thrush exudes radiance in her romantic vocal stylings. Here she performs "My Favorite Things," "Our Language of Love," "Love Is A Simple Thing," "The Second Time Around" and "The Angry Sea." Accompaniment, by full string ork and chorus, is sympathetic to the lark's sentimental manner. A pop favorite.



"FEVER AND SMOKE"—The Three Suns—RCA Victor LSP-2310
Venturing far from their usual gentle musical moods, the Three Suns turn out a sensuously stimulating program here. Percussion augments the usual Suns instrumentation in pulsating, exciting versions of "Fever," "Tequila," "Petite Fleur," "Sleep Walk" and "Misty." A colorful musical adventure.

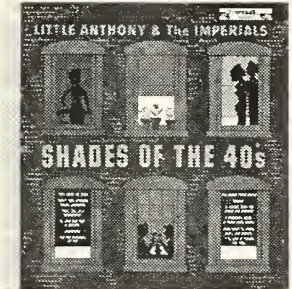

"LONELY BLUE NIGHTS"—Rosie—Brunswick 754102

New teen thrush bows LP-wise in a package tagged from her current hit single. Along with this side, the deck also includes such original Rosie rock tracks as "Angel From Above," "It's Time To Go Home" and "My Darling Forever." Several could qualify as potential single outings. Good package for the youngsters.



"SHADES OF THE 40's"—Little Anthony & The Imperials—End LP-311

The teen favorites offer their rock-accented versions of a bevy of evergreens that bloomed in the fabulous Forties. Here in modern dress are "This Love of Mine," "I'll Never Smile Again," "Don't Get Around Much Anymore" and "I've Got A Crush On You." A tastefully executed session that will appeal to both adults and teenagers.



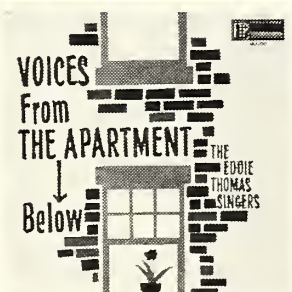
"THE BELAFONTE FOLK SINGERS AT HOME AND ABROAD"—RCA Victor LSP-2309

Robert DeCormier, long associated as choral director with Harry Belafonte, has molded a group of professional singers into a refreshing, thoroughly honest folksinging chorus. Their biggest forte is American Negro songs—in this vein they perform here "In That New Jerusalem," "Didn't It Rain" and "Muleskinner Blues"—but they are also proficient in folk music of foreign origin, here singing "Mi Caballo Blanco," "Sano Duso," a Yugoslav love song, and "Les Raftsmen" from the French-Canadian woodsmen. Invigorating pop/folk entertainment.



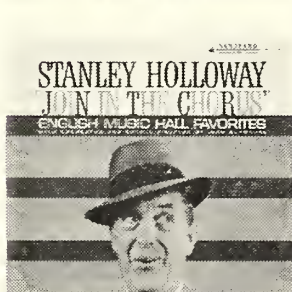
"A SONG AT TWILIGHT"—The Roger Wagner Chorale—Capitol SP 8543

The most comforting and endearing songs in history—a veritable family songfest treasury—are gathered here and rendered with due respect and gentility by the hushed voices of the chorale. Package contains "Home Sweet Home," "Love's Old Sweet Song," "Believe Me If All Those Endearing Young Charms," "Flow Gently, Sweet Afton," "Drink To Me Only With Thine Eyes" and six more. Lovable collection.



"VOICES FROM THE APARTMENT BELOW"—The Eddie Thomas Singers—FTP Records MLP-7001

A sextet (4 men, 2 women) blends its voices in smooth harmony on a lineup of 12 standards. These are smart, sophisticated vocal stylings in a semi-jazz vein. Combo accompaniment by jazz musicians, further enhances the mood. Tunes include "Let's Face the Music And Dance," "You Go to My Head," "Where Or When," "Old Devil Moon" and "Spring Is Here." Solid adult entertainment.



"JOIN IN THE CHORUS"—English Music Hall Favorites—Stanley Holloway—Vanguard VRS-9086

The classic songs of the English music hall could not find a more appropriate purveyor than that Cockney chap from "My Fair Lady," Stanley Holloway. With tongue-in-cheek he approaches the sticky sentimental ballads, the gay, raucous tap routines, the soft-shoe and other moods. He presents a perfect caricature of the music hall entertainer and provides loads of fun with his interpretations here. Tunes include "Any Old Iron," "While Strolling in the Park," "Down At the Old Bull and Bush" and "Where Did You Get That Hat."



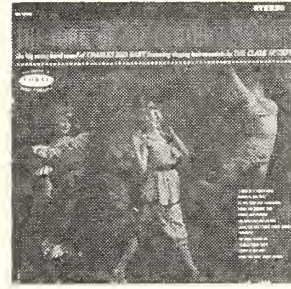
"MONGO Y SU CHARANGA"—Mongo Santamaria—Fantasy—3314

Fantasy joins the pachanga-charanga bandwagon with an album by its Afro-Cuban conga drummer, Mongo. Leading an aggregation of musicians well versed in this increasingly popular authentic Cuban band sound, Mongo portrays 13 tunes in the idiom, ranging from the briskly exciting to the gently easy going. In addition, there is the added attraction of jazz improvising on several tracks. Latin dance faddists will go for this date.



"LET'S DANCE WITH FAJARDO"—Jose Fajardo and his Charanga All-Stars—Panart 3077

With the pachanga blossoming into a national craze, Fajardo, who's been playing this kind of authentic Cuban music for years, should be coming to the fore as one of the leaders in the movement. Here, in his seventh album for Panart, the flutist leads his aggregation through a thoroughly delightful program of danceables—pachangas, cha cha chas, boleros and others. Basically, they all fall into the same loose category. Each band features Spanish language vocals.



"THE TURN OF THE CENTURY SWINGS"—Charles Bud Dant Orch. & the Clark Sisters—Coral CRL 757345

Arranger-ork leader Dant offers big band swing versions of a dozen tunes from the vintage years at the turn of the century. The Clark Sisters keep pace with wordless chanting of the melodies. Among them are "A Bird In a Gilded Cage," "Hearts and Flowers," "Narcissus," "The Band Played On" and "In the Good Old Summertime." Delightfully playful instrumental fun here.



"MAGIC HARMONICA"—The Harmonica Trio—Fiesta FLP 1295

A trio of harmonicas beefed up by electronic methods and with orchestral accompaniment offer a pleasing program of Latin melodies. An enjoyable dance and/or listening package that includes "Te Quiero," "It's Only A Paper Moon," "Chica Chica Bum" and "Mambo Martinique."



"LET'S SING WITH HAWAII CALLS"—Al Kealoha Perry—Capitol SKAO 1518

"Hawaii Calls," an internationally syndicated radio program emanating from Waikiki for the past 25 years, features audience participation in singing the authentic Hawaiian music. Here, Webley Edwards has produced a typical sing-along session featuring Al Kealoha Perry and a group of eager voices. It's a pleasant package that includes such tunes as "The Hawaiian Wedding Song," "Maui Girl," "Farewell," "Now Is the Hour" and "On the Beach at Waikiki." Lyrics are printed inside double-fold jacket.

JAZZ PICKS OF THE WEEK



"ON TOUR"—Pete Fountain—Coral CRL 757357

Far and away the biggest jazz commercial success in years, Pete Fountain is heard again in a sparklingly Swing-Dixie set on Coral. The clarinetist's musical itinerary here includes delightfully contagious visits to "Hindustan," "Manhattan," "Indiana," "Chicago," "New Orleans" and "Isle of Capri." Mark this as the latest in a series of money-making disks by Fountain.

The vehicle is a five-part (42 minutes) suite clefted by Brazilian Boris Schifrin (Lalo) titled "Gillespiana." It is an adventurous work, skillfully orchestrated by Lalo and expertly performed by the Gillespie big band. Dizzy's trumpet is pure delight as it weaves through the intricate patterns. A perfect mating of idea and execution.



"SABU MARTINEZ AND HIS JAZZ ESPAGNOLE"—Alegre LPA 802

Conga drummer Sabu Martinez, well-versed in jazz ideas and experience, intros his group in a vibrantly exciting session of Latin-jazz. Marty Sheller (trumpet) and Bobby Porcelli (alto) prove capable jazz soloists, but it is the wildly pulsating rhythms of Sabu and others which gain the upper hand here. Selections range from the jazz standards "Nica's Dream" and "Woody'n You" to a handful of Latin originals. Turbulent entertainment for both jazz fans and Latin dance buffs.

Born in New Orleans, Joe became interested in music at an early age. After his music education he headed a seventeen piece band for about four years. He then joined B. B. King's band as arranger and pianist, travelling extensively with the band and gaining valuable professional experience. After leaving King he formed his own instrumental group which worked as support for many of the top vocal stars.

Jones collaborated with songwriter Reggie Hall in composing "You Talk Too Much" which became his introductory hit and led to a Roulette recording pact. His latest Roulette single is titled "California Sun."

ALL ABOUT DISK JOCKEYS

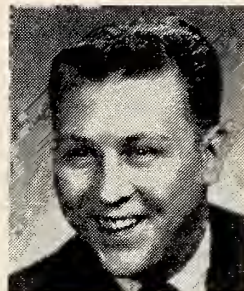
KDWB-Minneapolis disk jockey Sam Sherwood established a new marathon bowling record of 44 hours, 41 minutes, adding a full hour and ten minutes to the old mark set by deejay Pat Tallman of San Antonio. Sherwood's efforts were presented by the station to spearhead the Twin Cities' annual drive on behalf of the American Cancer Society. In addition to setting a new marathon record for total consecutive hours bowled, Sherwood also racked two new notches in the record books for total pins and total consecutive lines bowled. In his assault on the old record, station statisticians calculated Sherwood topped 14,044 pins while bowling against 219 different challengers. He lifted the equivalent of 15½ tons of bowling balls while averaging a phenomenal 116.

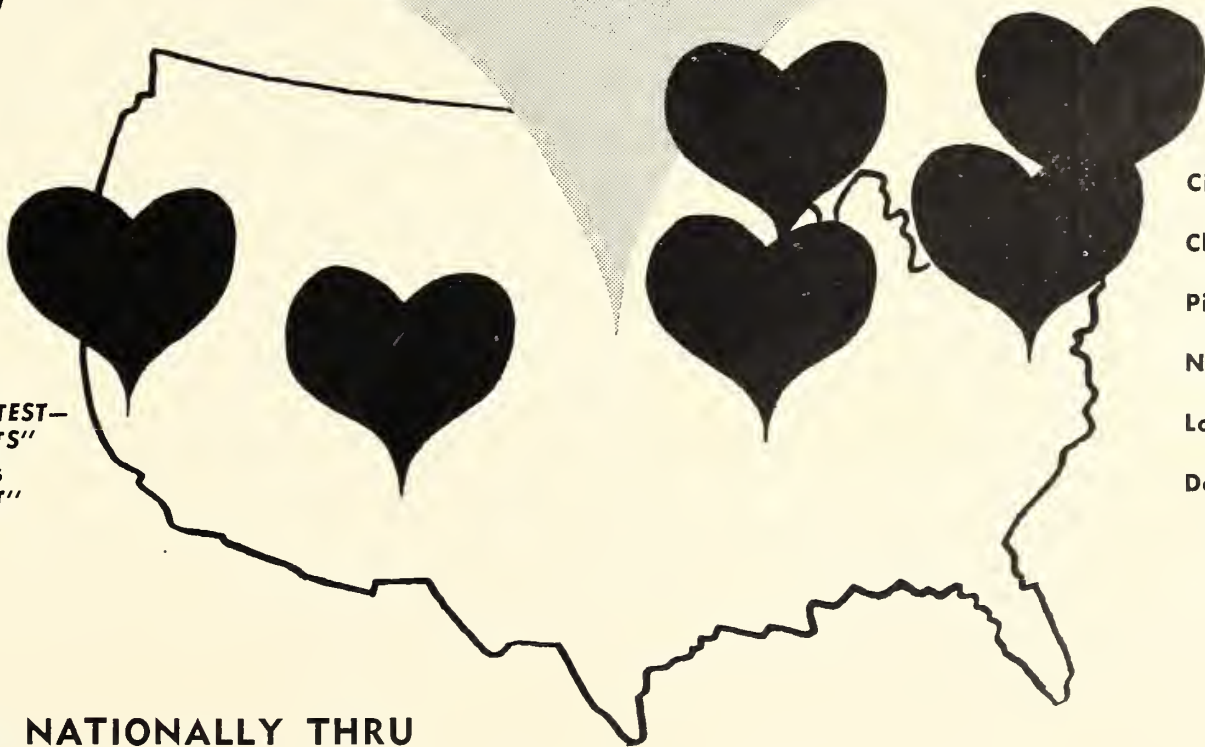

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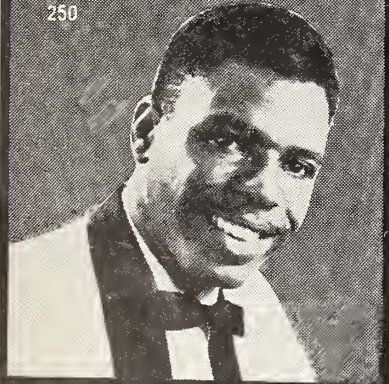
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NARAS Names '60 "Grammy" Winners

Percy Faith Resigns As Columbia's Coast Musical Head; Stays As Artist

NEW YORK—The resignation of Percy Faith as West Coast musical director for Columbia Records was announced last week by Goddard Lieberson, president of the firm. Increasing activity in composing for films and television, as well as a heavy personal recording schedule, led to Faith's decision to discontinue his staff work, an announcement said. He will, however, continue under his long term contract to record exclusively for Columbia.

"It is with the greatest regret that we accept Mr. Faith's resignation from our staff," Lieberson stated. "Percy Faith has been an invaluable member of Columbia's A & R group for eleven years. He has contributed significantly to the company's growth in the triple role of composer, conductor and arranger. Our regret is tempered only by the fact that Mr. Faith is now embarked on a new phase of his distinguished career—film scoring—and we wish him every success."

During the past year in Hollywood, Faith has added to his collection of hits, the "Theme For A Summer Place." He has also arranged and conducted a series of best-selling albums for the label: "Jealousy," "Percy Faith's Greatest Hits," Lerner and Loewe's score for "Camelot," a collection of original compositions titled "Carefree" and the latest, "Tara's Theme," a group of motion picture themes headlined by the selection from "Gone With The Wind," currently in successful re-release.

Canadian-born Percy Faith won success in his own country as a theatre and radio conductor before coming to the U.S. in 1947 to conduct the first of a series of radio hours. He moved from New York to the west coast in 1960.

UA's Mathews To Handle Sales For Musicor

NEW YORK—With the Musicor label stepping up its release schedule, and signing additional new artists for immediate recording activity, Andy Miele, national sales manager of United Artists Records, distributor of the label, has announced that Eddie Mathews has been appointed to handle the sales activities of Musicor.

Mathews, who will be responsible to Miele in the Musicor sales post, is also national promotion director of the UA label and will continue in that capacity.

"Extensive activity of the Musicor label," Miele said, "which has been paced by the outstanding performance of Gene Pitney on his initial two releases, plus the new releases by the Darby Sisters and Ernie Tucker this week, makes it imperative that we offer the best possible services to distributors and dealers in relation to Musicor's product. Through the appointment of Mathews, who is constantly in touch with our distribution points, we believe we will greatly increase the efficiency of Musicor's distribution, promotion and sales."

Miele said the appointment of Mathews will become effective immediately, with Mathews scheduled to spend most of his time in the immediate future on the road visiting with distributors in his dual capacity with UA.

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Mercury Extends "Spring" LP Promo To May 1

CHICAGO—Irwin H. Steinberg, executive vice president, Mercury Records, announced last week the extension of the firm's annual spring sales plan, "Spring Sale-A-Rama" to May 1. The fifteen day extension is the result of "requests from all across the country based on the success of the plan and on the success of the product which was offered within the plan," an announcement said.

The plan offers the entire Mercury catalog, other than those items in the Perfect Presence Sound Series and the Living Presence Sound Series, on a basis of one free record for every three records purchased. For the PPSS and the LPSS, including such releases as "Fennell Conducts Gershwin" and "Exciting Sounds" by Clebanoff Strings and Percussion, one record may be selected for every five purchases within a given price group. A 100 per cent return privilege applies to all PPSS and LPSS items. Also included in the plan, beside the entire Mercury catalog, is the entire WING catalog and the entire EP line.

Mercury regular schedule of releases will be resumed immediately following the end of the extension of the "Spring Sale-A-Rama" plan.

First 7" 33 On Charts: Presley's "Flaming Star"

NEW YORK—The first chart recognition of a seven-inch 33 disk has come from the RCA Victor "Compact 33 Double" dinking by Elvis Presley, "Flaming Star."

The issue, containing four songs, makes its Top 100 appearance this week in the #89 slot. Tunes include two new Presley dates, the title song, from a new Presley pic of the same name, and "Summer Kisses, Winter Tears" plus two smash singles, "Are You Lonesome Tonight" and "It's Now Or Never."

The label has released the waxing in 33 form only, and, according to a label spokesman, there is no intention of releasing it via a 45 rpm EP.

Kapp Predicts Labels Will Produce Musicals

NEW YORK—A prediction that diskeries would soon be producing musicals was made last week by Kapp Records prexy Dave Kapp, whose firm is co-producer of the upcoming musical, "Donnybrook!"

Kapp, who made his prediction in an interview last week with New York Daily News music critic Douglas Watt, was thinking of label participation in musicals not only on a financial level, but in the actual make-up of the show.

In recent years, parent companies of several labels or labels themselves have put major financial backing into various musicals. The Columbia Broadcasting System invested in two Lerner & Loewe musicals, "My Fair Lady" and "Camelot," reaping original-cast rewards for its affiliate Columbia Records. Capitol Records major financial backing of "The Unsinkable Molly Brown" meant an original-cast LP click, and MGM Pictures is a principal backer of the new hit musical, "Carnival," whose original-cast LP is going to MGM Records.

"After all," Kapp told Watt, "if a record company puts up all or a large part of the money for a musical for the sake of securing the cast-album rights, why shouldn't it share in the production end, too?"

Kapp said he intends to co-produce two or three more shows, (he doesn't think he has enough experience yet to go it alone) and then possibly take-on a show on his own.

Kapp and his late brother, Jack, were pioneers in original-cast record field when with Decca they cut the original-cast members of "Oklahoma!" in 1943, the first musical to be represented with all its principals for commercial release.

Time Buys Nix Master

NEW YORK—Time Records has purchased a master from the Nix label of Pittsburgh, "One Little Kiss" by The Holidays, according to Time topper Bob Shad. Disk, which retains its original label, has been reportedly making noise in the Pittsburgh and Chicago areas.

Carlton To Handle New Parker Label

NEW YORK—Carlton Records will handle national distribution of the Charlie Parker Record Company. The agreement was made last week between Joe Carlton, president of the Carlton diskery and Mrs. Doris Parker, wife of the late jazz great Charlie Parker; Aubrey Mayhew, business manager for the jazz label and Mrs. Parker, and Florence R. Kennedy, attorney.

This is the first time that Carlton Records has entered into a distribution agreement with another company.

Under the new pact, Carlton will distribute the Parker line in the U.S. through its current distributors and has the right to place the line with record manufacturers throughout the world for international distribution.

Mrs. Parker has in her catalog of tapes enough material for 25 Charlie Parker albums, 15 Lester Young albums and three Billie Holiday albums. None of this material was ever released on records. Carlton will introduce the first CPRC product on April 24th to distributors and dealers

as well as to rack jobbers at the forthcoming National Association of Record Merchandisers Convention in Florida.

The first three LP's to be introduced include: Charlie Parker—"A New Series of Modern Jazz Masterpieces by the Immortal Charlie Parker" subtitled (Bird Is Free); "A New Series of Modern Jazz Masterpieces by the Immortal Lester Young," subtitled (Prez); and an album by the contemporary jazz artist, Cecil Payne called "Cecil Payne Performing Charlie Parker Music."

The Parker and Young disks, available only in monaural, will list for \$5.98. The Payne LP will sell for \$5.98 in both monaural and stereo. The new label expects to have approximately 25 packages released by this time next year.

The new CPRC will have a two-fold function. It of course is the outlet for some of the classic tapes by Parker, Young and Holiday. But it will also be the spawning ground for new talent and contemporary jazz names.

Decca's "Brenda Lee Day" Seen As Label's Biggest Promo Success

NEW YORK—Len Salidor, Decca Records' promotion and publicity director reported last week that the label's recent "Brenda Lee Day" promotion was "probably the most successful of any previously undertaken by the company."

"The impact of this exposure was felt at the dealer level since latest available figures indicate that this most likely will be Brenda's biggest album to date," Salidor said.

Claude Brennan, Decca national sales manager, stated that as a direct result of the promotion 125,000 albums were sold within the twenty-four hour duration of the special offer. This represented an extensively coordinated effort on the part of Decca's sales force, factory and traffic departments from coast-to-coast.

Some of the highlights of the Day follow: Atlanta—Governor Ernest A. Vandiver officially declared March 29th as Brenda Lee Day in the state of Georgia and sent a personal letter to the artist congratulating her for her achievements as a native daughter of the state and thanking her for reflecting honor on her birthplace.

Buffalo—Mayor Frank A. Sedita accepted a copy of her album, "Emotions" and issued a city-wide declaration that the lark was the embodiment of teenage spirit and an example to the city's youth worth emulating. Radio station contests were held and the winners were personally called by Brenda.

New York—most stations in the area featured "Emotions" as their

album of the day. WNEW, WMCA, WABC and WINS used one cut from the album on each show throughout the day.

San Francisco—She appeared in the area a few days prior to the 29th and did a film clip for station KPIX and taped interviews for other local stations. Store displays and dealer ads were also effected.

Boston—A sound truck decorated with Brenda Lee posters and album covers toured city and nearby suburban streets, announcing where the album could be purchased and played cuts from the album throughout the day.

New Orleans—Brenda Lee look-alike and sing-alike contests were held with winners being honored at their schools or clubs.

Los Angeles—Performer in L.A. to film her first movie, took over the microphone at top-rated station KFVB for two hours, answering telephone calls, doing commercials and announcing her own and other records. The station reported over one thousand written requests for autographed pictures in a one day period. KFVB program director, Jim Hawthorne stated that it was the most overwhelming response to any promotion in the station's history.

"According to the planning," Talmadge said, "the two convention days feature be devoted entirely to ARMADA business, with the manufacturer-distributor sessions, each consuming one-half day, scheduled to start Saturday, June 24, and continue on for several days after the ARMADA meet is concluded."

"This year," Talmadge revealed, "a complete program covering the two-day convention has been planned, and will cover a series of symposiums, roundtables and workshops in which both the manufacturers and the distributors will participate. A new format for a more realistic Buying Power Index will be outlined to the membership, and the Group Life Insurance Program which ARMADA has developed and is now ready to imple-

Strand Extends LP Plan

NEW YORK—In response to requests of distributors throughout the country, Si Pastner, general manager of Strand Records, has agreed to a thirty-day extension of the company's album sales plan which was to have expired on April 30. The plan will now be in effect through May 31.

Pastner stated that he felt this was "only fair" since adverse weather conditions in late February and March held up many salesmen. He noted that in the majority of territories quotas have been exceeded "beyond all expectations," some of them by as high as 200% over the mark set.

Dealers should contact their Strand distributors for details on the program.

Four new albums to be released shortly are being included in the sales plan: Karen Chandler's "Dear Mr. Gable"; Brock Peter's "Inspiration Africa"; "Seing Israel With George Jessel"; and "Jeannie Thomas Sings For The Boys."

New Prado Mgr.

NEW YORK—Latin maestro Perez Prado has signed a new manager, Herman A. Diaz, son of Herman Diaz, Jr., A&R head of RCA Victor Records international department. Young Diaz recently completed three and a half years in the Navy as an Air Intelligence Officer with a Fighter Squadron based in California, his tour of duty keeping him in the Asiatic area for over a year. In addition, he has travelled extensively in Europe and Latin America.

NEW YORK—As part of "Peter DeRose Memorial Week," in honor of the late composer of "Blue Prelude" and many other songs, Duffy Square in New York will be known as "Peter DeRose Memorial Square" on April 24. The event, the eighth such commemorative anniversary, is being conducted from April 23-30. Various record stores and other establishments will have DeRose displays in their windows.

Talmadge also announced this week that the Group Life Insurance Program has now officially been adopted and will be handled through the Philadelphia Life Insurance Company. Under the program, officers and supervisory employees of corporate members and owners and supervisory employees of partners and proprietorships are eligible. Owners, partners and officers of firms who are actively employed may obtain up to \$20,000 coverage through age 60, employees up to \$5,000.

Talmadge said, "The preliminary notice of the insurance program has been sent to all members of ARMADA. A life insurance program was suggested by our counsel Steinberg, Balder, & Steinbrook, and this particular plan was selected by the board of directors of ARMADA and counsel. In the opinion of our counsel the premiums paid on this type of insurance by corporations on the lives of both active officers and employees are tax deductible as a legitimate business expense, and for partnerships and proprietorships it is tax deductible for insurance on the lives of employees only. Application forms and descriptive material concerning cost and coverage will be mailed to members by the beginning of May. This plan will also be available for any new members and affiliate members of ARMADA who may join us in the future."

Talmadge added that "this is only one of the many benefits that ARMADA will be offering to its members and affiliate members in the near future."

Talmadge announced that, through arrangement with United Artists films, a major UA pic would be sneak-previewed for the conventioners. The film will not have been seen in the U.S.

Joy Acquires Master; Greenman On Road

NEW YORK—Eddie Joy of Joy Records, this city, has purchased a master, "The King of the Beat Generation" by Gregg Madden for immediate release. Acquisition was from Gus Generao, a Philly audio-electronics expert who also has own label, Darrow Records.

In other Joy news, David Greenman, the label's national promo manager, takes to the road this week (17) on current Joy releases. Covering the Baltimore-Washington-Virginia area, Greenman will work on Jamie Horton's "Yes, I'll Be Your Girl," Wallie Hawkins' "Don't Believe Them" and "Feeling This Thing Called Love" and the Freddie Scott noise-maker, "Lost The Right." Scott was in Cleveland last weekend for an appearance on one of Cleveland's biggest hops, conducted by WJMO deejay Ken Hawkins. This week (21) is appearing in Pittsburgh for the big "WAMO Show," emceed by deejay Bill Powell.

WB Gets Rights To "Camelot" Flick

NEW YORK—"Camelot," the hit musical by Lerner & Loewe, will be filmed by Warner Bros. Pictures, whose purchases of the film rights was learned last week. Though the purchase price was not revealed, it was believed to have been \$2 million and a percentage of the receipts. There was no agreement as to the soundtrack rights, but there was a chance that WB Records might get it, a label spokesman said.

Under the terms of the agreement, the pic version of "Camelot" cannot be released before April of 1964.

Lerner, who wrote the book and lyrics of the stage version, will write the screenplay, and, if required, both he and composer Loewe will write new songs for the film. The pair and "Camelot" director Moss Hart worked together on "My Fair Lady."

Liberty Cuts Compact 33 For Stockholders Report

HOLLYWOOD—Liberty Records first annual report to their stockholders, which will be issued next month, will include a compact 33 titled "The Sounds Of Liberty," according to an announcement from Hal Linick, label's vice-president and treasurer. The disk, produced by chairman of the board Si Waronker, will feature special dialogue and entertainment by such Liberty stars as David Seville, Julie London, Felix Slatkin, Spike Jones, Gogi Grant, Martin Denny and the label's teenage line-up. Production will review the company's achievements in the comparatively short term of its existence. Deck winds-up with special statements by Al Bennett, Liberty's prexy, and Waronker.

Klase-Bruns Form Coast Music Prod. Firm

HOLLYWOOD—West Coast composer-conductors Irving Klase and George Bruns have joined forces in the formation of their own musical production company, for film scoring and recordings.

Bruns, musical director for Disney Studios, is the composer of "Davey Crockett," smash seller of a few years ago, and currently has scored "101 Dalmations" and "The Absent Minded Professor," two Disney pic hits.

Klase, former general manager for C-G and Motif Records, has had an extended career in the music and recording fields. He recently batoned Huntington Hartford dates for both Sammy Davis Jr., and Josephine Baker.

A "busy" schedule of recordings and film scores is planned for the future.

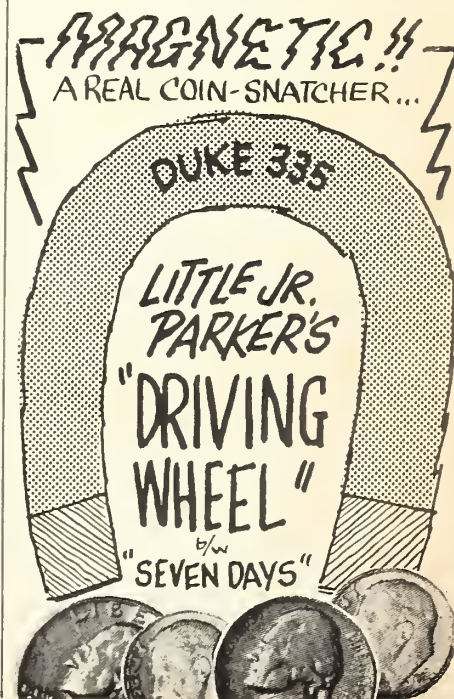

(cut at the Miami Beach nitery); "Return to Rome" with singer Rudy Adamo; in the "Birdland" series Chris Connor-Maynard Ferguson Orch.'s "Two's Company," done via a special exchange deal with Atlantic Records, Miss Connor's label; and "The Most" (Vol. 4), various jazz artists in the Roulette catalog; "Seven Deadly Sins"—William Russo Orch. (original jazz

composition); "Gretsch Drum Night at Birdland" (Vol. 2) featuring drummers Philly Joe Jones, Elvin Jones, Charlie Persip and Art Blakey.

Roost Records, Roulette's subsid, is offering "Sonny Side Up" with alto-tenor saxist Sonny Stitt. In the label's Tico catalog, two new additions are "Dance La Pachanga" with Jose Fajardo and Rosendo Ruiz, Jr. and "Piano Percussion" with Marco Rizo His Piano & Rhythm.

The label is bowing a Spoken Word series with "Saloon Society," narrated by Bill Manville and based on a newspaper book column (later a book) about the "hip" generation and non-conformists.

Roulette plans a full scale promotional and merchandising campaign on the new releases including a complete disk jockey and reviewer service. National consumer advertising as well as a local co-op advertising program has been set for this release.

MGM Extends "Grass Roots" Promo; Artists To Shopping Centers

NEW YORK—MGM Records is stepping up its "grass roots" promotional activity and is scheduling personal appearances of its key artists at large shopping centers in order to kick off new releases, according to Sid Brandt, veep in charge of operations.

In a tie-in with Modell's Shoppers World in Lodi, New Jersey arrangements have been made for Tommy Edwards to appear at the record department on Monday, April 17 from 12 noon to 2 p.m. Modell's is advertising the event in local newspapers and on radio and TV as well as through use of store window displays, in-store displays and through continuous announcements over the public address system. Through this effort, MGM hopes to kick off the new Tommy Edwards single release of "That's The Way With Love." Artist will autograph free photos and will also affix his signature to every single and album sold of his recordings.

Arrangements call for Modell's to purchase a large quantity of the new Tommy Edwards single and current albums through MGM distributor, All-State New Jersey, Inc. as part of MGM's condition to produce the artist for personal appearance. Edwards will be transported to and from the Lodi store in a special limousine supplied by Modell's.

Meanwhile in a similar tie-in this week (April 12) with the E. J. Korvette stores MGM's top male vocalist, Conway Twitty was shuttled to Springfield and Philadelphia, Penna. for personal appearances at both Korvette stores on the same day. Twitty's appearance at the Springfield store was preceded by a motorcade all appropriately bannered hailing his arrival and his appearances at Korvette's. Full page ads in all Philadelphia papers in addition to radio and TV spot announcements was part of the promotional campaign.

Similar type promotions are currently underway for Connie Francis' new single, "Breakin' In A Brand New Broken Heart," The Wanderers' "For Your Love," Johnny Cymbal's "The Water Was Red" and Barry Darvel's "Fountain Of Love."

Sol Handwerger, director of publicity, promotion and exploitation for MGM, is arranging and coordinating the grass roots personal appearance program. He is issuing a special manual of instructions for distributors and field representatives outlining in detail steps, procedure and material necessary for carrying out this type of store exploitation.

NEW YORK—In a story last week that reported on Mercury Records new Denver distrib, Davis Sales, it was erroneously stated that Davis Sales was a division of Western Appliances. Actually, firms are independent of each other. In addition, the name of Don Thorn, Davis Sales' general manager, was incorrectly spelled in the same story.

LOS ANGELES—Dooto Records, this city, has increased its big comic roster with the signing of vet nitery-TV comic, Scatman Crothers. Prexy Dootsie Williams said that two albums were being recorded, the first, "Comedy Sweepstakes," being set for release next month.

The label, which has cut such Negro comedians as Red Foxx, George Kirby, Allen Drew, Sloppy Williams and others, last month signed comics Rudy Moore and Roscoe Holland, whose LP's "Below The Belt" and "For A Piece," respectively, are among the label's April releases.

The Regatta label will cover every aspect of recording activity—pop singles and classical, jazz and children's LP's. Minucci said that he has signed Bob Halley and Will Sanders and The Duprees to exclusive artist's contracts and is looking for additional talent, masters and indie production deals.

Trencher, who has already lined up a full roster of distributors, was in promotion and sales for Southern Music and Top Rank Records prior to joining Regatta. The diskery's first release "Summertime" b/w "I'm Movin' In" by Will Sanders and The Duprees, has already been shipped to deejays and distributors.

He will act as a liaison link between Nathan, Hal Neely, King's general manager, and segments of the publishing world.

ALL THAT JAZZ

Randy Weston joins the growing list of jazz composers who have drawn inspiration from the African freedom movement for an extended jazz work. Weston's "African Suite" has been recorded by Roulette and will be released this month as part of the "Uhuru Afrika" (Freedom Africa) album. The suite features lyrics by Langston Hughes, a spoken narration by Tuntemeke Sanga of Tanganyika, baritone vocal solos by Brock Peters and soprano solos by Martha Flowers. The arrangement is by Melba Liston, who also conducted the twenty-six piece ork on the date. The list of musicians who participated in the recording reads like a who's who of jazz: Max Roach, Olatunji, Candido, Armando Peraza and Charlie Persip form the percussion line; others featured include Kenny Burrell, Clark Terry, Benny Bailey, Richard Williams, Jerome Richardson, Gigi Gryce, Les Spann, Yusef Lateef, Slide Hampton, George Duvivier, Jimmy Cleveland, Cecil Payne and Freddie Hubbard.

The album also debuts a new Roulette "sound" series which will emphasize Afro-percussion.

Teddy Wilson's current engagement at New York's Embers is being used by the pianist to mark his thirtieth year in jazz. The thirty years dates from an engagement in April 1931 at Chicago's Gold Coast Club where Wilson played for six weeks as part of a dance sextet. Actually, Wilson's music career pre-dates 1931, but it was this year that started him on his way. For the next few years he gigged around Chicago with Louis Armstrong, Jimmy Noone, Erskine Tate and others. Then joined Benny Carter in New York in 1933. After playing with Willie Bryant's band in 1934-35 he made jazz history by recording with and touring as part of the Benny Goodman Trio—the swing era's first interracial act. International prominence with the Goodman groups firmly established Wilson as a top name. His precise, economical, gently swinging style proved an innovation on jazz piano and influenced countless other musicians. Today Wilson is considered one of the all-time greats of the instrument.

Charlie Mingus was guest of honor (even wore a tie and jacket) at a press party jointly hosted by Candid Records and the Copa City nitery at which the bassist introduced his "Rotary Perception" new jazz conception. The idea is one of complete individual improvisation within the group, with rhythm cycles determining the limits. (That's the way we understand it.) Appearing with Mingus were regulars Dannie Richmond, Eric Dolphy, Ted Curzon, Jimmy Knepper and Charlie McPherson, Britt Woodman, Lonnie Hilyer and Paul Bley. Max Roach showed up and proved the high point of the evening's activities when he and Mingus improvised several duets together. The party also celebrated the extension of Mingus' engagement at the club for an indefinite period. When Charlie finds a place he likes, he stays there!

Jordan Ramin, indie record producer, has produced for Argo Records a satirical LP on the old Norman Granz Jazz At The Philharmonic concerts. Released last week under the title "Morris Grants Presents J.U.N.K.," the album features imitative sounds of some of the top names in jazz represented by such new names as Morris Brewbeck, Sol Desman, Miles Morris with Can-E-Bal Naturally, Morris Garner, Ornette Morris and Thelonliest Plunk. The package is complete right down to the liner notes by Ira Morris ("America's Foremost Liner-Note Writer"). Obviously, not too much good taste was present when the LP was conceived and, obviously, Ramin has a fixation (or fetish?) on the name "Morris."

Noted without much comment: Disk jockey Jerry Dexter, KMPC-Los Angeles, presented a jazz concert featuring the Kingston Trio. Shades of Newport '59!!

Chris Connor is coordinating her April schedule of club and concert dates with a TV and personal appearance tour in behalf of her two new albums—reciprocal LP's with Maynard Ferguson with her Atlantic and his Roulette label. The packages, tagged "Double Exposure" (Atlantic) and "Two's Company" (Roulette), were simultaneously released April 10th by the two diskeries. Following her Racquet Club engagement in Dayton, April 6-10, she co-stars with comic Jonathan Winters at a U. of Maryland concert, April 22, then joins Maynard for a one-niter at Trinity College, Hartford, April 28, and follows with a solo concert at the U. of Tennessee's Dogwood Arts Festival in Knoxville, April 29. Already on tape is an ABC-TV "Circle" show to be telecast this month.

Golden Crest Records, a not-too-active firm on Long Island, debuted a new jazz line last week. The series is titled "Jazz Unlimited" and will retail at \$4.98. The initial four package release headlines the Carmen Leggio Group, the Sal Salvador Quartet, the Bobby Donaldson Group, and the John Glasel Brassset. The diskery promises a regular schedule of releases by both established artists and new names.

They're currently engaged at the Coronet Club in Brooklyn. . . . Del-Fi Records has inked pianist Paul Moer to a wax pact, released his first LP, "The Contemporary Classics of Paul Moer." . . . Congrats to Mr. & Mrs. Curtis Fuller on the birth of Gerald Arnett Fuller. . . . Cosnat of Cincinnati has been appointed distributor of Candid Records in that area. . . . Errol Garner's first Summer Tent Date this year has been set for the Tri-City Musical Tent, Albany, June 25. . . . Prestige recording act, the Jimmy Neeley Trio, pacted to a personal management deal by Stan Allan of the B and A Management office. . . . For the remainder of his European tour, Cannonball Adderley has augmented his regular group with bass violinist Ron Carter. The tour winds up April 23. . . . FCC Decision On FM Stereo Can Mean Rosier Radio Future

NEW YORK—Stereo radio may gain new significance (and sales vistas) in the near future, with the spark being ignited by an FCC decision, due this month, on standards for FM broadcasting.

Though stereo radio is not new, current methods are now employed using either AM-FM broadcasts, or an all-FM system called multiplex, several firms are competing for acceptance of a refined system of all-FM stereo.

Leading the race, insiders believe, are General Electric, and the Zenith Radio and Crosly-Teletronics, a firm much smaller than either G.E. or Zenith. The system that gets the FCC nod, the GE and Zenith systems are similar, will get royalties from radio manufacturers, equipment producers and stations which use it.

Looking happily at the strides of stereo phono sales—from 2,744,720 in 1959 to 3,334,547 in 1960—radio manufacturers hope that an adopted system of stereo radio will boost sales of FM radios. Growth, too, is expected of FM outlets themselves. There are currently 810 FM stations in the U.S.

Everest LP-Mag Tie-In

NEW YORK—Marty Weiss of Everest Records has announced that the diskery is planning a special tie-in promotion with Playboy Magazine on the Cy Coleman LP, "Playboy's Penthouse."

Album sales have steadily increased since the introduction and immediate acceptance of the Playboy Key Club in the Chicago, Los Angeles, Miami and New York markets, Weiss said.

Coleman is slated for a three week headline stint at the Chi's Key Club on May 9. He opened as the Top Bill at the Roundtable in New York on April 10.

London Ad Correction

NEW YORK—In a London Records ad on page 15 of last week's issue, both the artist and label number of "Dream Girl" were incorrectly stated. The correct artist is Mark Wynter and the label number is 45-1937.

On five LP's tied-in with the upcoming Academy Awards (April 17), dealer gets one free for every three he purchases. The albums are: "Great Motion Picture Themes," "Exodus," "Never On Sunday," "The Apartment" and "Tunes of Glory."

Mitch Miller To Get NARM Award

NEW YORK—Mitch Miller, Columbia Records artist-A&R exec, will receive a special award from the National Association of Record Merchandisers (NARM) for his best-selling sing-along albums. He will accept the award at a special banquet at the Eden Roc Hotel, Miami Beach, Fla., on April 27, during the NARM convention.

Elektra's Cumberpatch On Promo Trip

NEW YORK—Stan Cumberpatch, the Elektra label's sales director, left last week (12) for a promotion trip to Boston, Montreal, Cleveland and Detroit, returning to work with retailers in New York this week (20 & 21).

As part of the program of close cooperation between Elektra in New York and its distribs around the country, Stan will meet with promotion and sales staffs and will include visits to leading retail buyers and rack jobbers in each of the areas he visits.

Particular emphasis will be placed on the April promotion of Elektra's Limeliter release, now available at the special list price of \$3.69 with regular retailer and rack discounts applying.

These confabs, the label said, will give close scrutiny to the growing market for Elektra's folk recordings. How best to increase sales and promo efforts down the line from factory to consumer is one of the projects outlined for exchange of opinion on this and future trips.

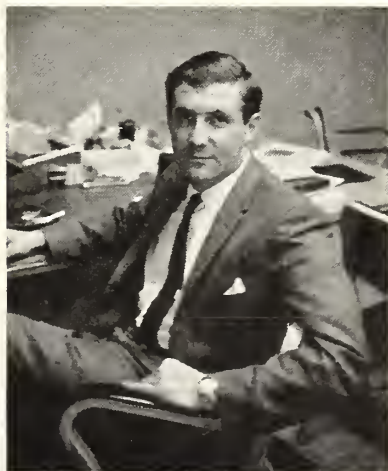
Scepter Execs To Europe For 3-Week Business Tour

To coincide with Munro's arrival in New York for The Ed Sullivan Show next month, A & R manager George Martin is preparing an LP for the American market. Morty Craft of Warwick Records reports terrific reaction for Matt's current single "My Kind of Girl" published by Essex.

Congratulations to The Allison's on their entry into The Cash Box Top 100 with their first disk, "Are You Sure," released in the States on London. Currently No. 2 in The Cash Box British charts the song is No. 1 in the Best Selling Sheet Music Lists. Another British entry into The Cash Box Top 100 is Johnny Dankworth with "African Waltz" on Roulette. Released here on Columbia, the number is a big seller.

Diane Todd just back from two years in America playing the lead in "My Fair Lady" called at The Cash Box office before starting rehearsals for a new British musical "Jane Eyre" based on the Charlotte Bronte novel. Book and lyrics by Hal Shaper of Robbins Music and music by Monty Stevens. The show opens out of town at Windsor before coming to the West End.

John Boyden, managing director of the newly formed Philharmonic Records Ltd., has concluded arrangements with Bernard Taylor, president of French Artec, for the release of the Philharmonic product in France and French territories. Announcements concerning other direct export and catalog licensing deals for Philharmonic Records throughout the world are expected shortly.

Way back in 1910, Wright, now 73 years old, was the first publisher to set up offices in Denmark Street, known throughout the world today as 'Tin Pan Alley.'

Jeannie Carson returns to the London stage in "Finian's Rainbow" opening on June 8 at The Saville Theatre—scene of her first triumph 8 years ago in "Love From Judy."

After appearing in her own TV show "An Evening With Ella Fitzgerald," the jazz star left London for a tour of Israel followed by recitals in Paris. Her latest release is "All Of You."

Betty Hutton's cabaret act at London's Pigalle Theatre-Restaurant to be televised by the BBC on April 22. The following night Lena Horne, currently appearing in cabaret at The Talk Of The Town, tops the bill of Val Parnall's "Sunday Night At The London Palladium" for ATV. Diana Dors just back from America has her own show for ATV on April 29.

Dick Howard of Mercury Music happy to publish "Coronation Street" recorded by Geoff Love on Columbia. The number was specially written by Eric Spear for the successful Granada TV series of the same title.

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FRANCE

The Easter lull is on and the music and record world is resting or vacationing before the post-Easter season takes over. Meanwhile, folks are wondering which editor in France will get the rights to "Poney Time." Ivan Mogull will be in Paris when the decision is made. Seems that H. Ythier has already been selected to do the French lyrics—but for whom?? What is sure is that Les Travellers, who has just signed with Pathe will record the tune. It's Pathe-Marconi's A&R man who had the duo come back specially from London to sign the contract and start recording. These are real talents who will take their place alongside Johnny Hallyday, Les Chaussettes Noires, etc. Still on Pathe, a new disk by Taillet including "T'iras Passer l'hiver où tu as Passe L'ete" and "Les criquets." Singer Billy Nencioli is expected back soon from Greece for a date with the mikes, which is no easy job to accomplish.

Two new MGM releases: "I'm in the Mood for Love" by Sam (The Man) Taylor and "Supersonic Guitar" by Billy Mure.

Nobody is talking about the tune "Fiancee d'Auvergne" which exists only in accordion versions by Vershuren and Cantournet, but it's among the best sellers at present much to the joy of Festival. On the same label is available "Le Pelerinage National des Gitans Evangelistes" recorded on the spot at Sainte-Marie de la Mer where the annual holy pilgrimage of the gypsies takes place.

Yvette Giraud has just waxed two new sides for Fontana including "Sous la neige" and "San Miguel" and is making preparations to leave for Madagascar. C. Mery will accompany her to Africa but only as far as Dakar.

New recruits for Philippe Weil—singer Silvana Blasi, who was with Bel-Air. Her first disk comprises 4 tunes from the new Folies Bergere show of which she is one of the stars. Never-before-recorded "Lettres d'Amour" penned by Sacha Guitry now on the market. Dario Morena's latest waxing is "Ze Marmita." And among the classics—a new version of Handel's "Messiah" by The Mormon Tabernacle Choir and Schumann's Symphony No. 1 conducted by Franz Konwitzchny.

Echos from the Vogue domain—Jacques Wolfson, A&R chief, is off to Geneva to arrange with orchestra leader Korafas the latter's next recording series. New Vogue singing hopeful Franca Dirienzo. The lady is of Italian-Swiss origin. Jacqueline Bouvier of Vogue's German office was in Paris for a few days to confer with Leon Cabat. Correction: for Johnny Hallyday's 18th birthday, Vogue will also celebrate not his 150,000th but his 1,500,000th record sold. Folks are talking about the first 7-inch 33-1/3 r.p.m. compact record which at present seems to have a limited market. The first of these will be a Hallyday and a Bechet on the Vogue ticket. The Bechet tune, the last one he wrote and which he liked very much, will also grace a 45 single. It's "Passeport Pour Paradis." Two other interesting issues—"I Pity a Fool" and "Cry Cry Cry" by Bobby Bland and A. Cortes' "Little Lonely Me," the famous "Santa Lucia" in modern dress.

Vogue Editions pleased with the success of "24,000 Baisers," are hard at work on "Suceu Suceu" to be waxed by Bob Azzam and his orchestra, Jackie Noguez, Los Merimberos, Jacques Helian and his orchestra, Cortes and Nina and Frederik on Pathé.

RCA's first 7-inch 33-1/3 rpm compact will be a classic release dating from 1941. It's Toscanini's conducting of the first act from Wagner's "Walkyrie" with singers Laurentz Melchior and Helen Traubel and "Die Gotterdammerung" by the same artists. Next "Soria" issue is slated for September; namely Strauss' "Ariane a Naxos." Little news in the pop field though Jo Chapman will wax the 4 San Remo hits and Paul Kramer will cut "Last Date."

Nino Nardini is back in the Decca fold with his orchestra. Nino has been the house orchestra for the Radio Circus in its travels throughout France. His latest disk features "Pepito" and "Calcutta." Also on the Decca tag—another EP by Frankie Jordan, "Marina Viva" by Mario Cavallero, Milva's interpretation of "Milord" in Italian and an Errol Parker 12-inch album, "Errol au Tabou."

Nicole Barclay back from Prague where she negotiated a deal for the distribution of Barclay and Bel-Air records in Czechoslovakia.

Les Chaussettes Noires cut "Poney Time" and "La Bamba Rock" at their most recent session for Barclay. Eddie Barclay's latest recruit is orchestra leader Marc Taynor, who left Arceco to join the Barclay crew. His first disk will comprise standard cowboy songs. You'll be hearing lots about a tune called "Kaputt" from the Belgian label "Fast Record." Barclay has big hopes for the success of this one.

The first juke boxes combining music and films (called Scopitone) have made their appearance in Paris cafes. With the first interest in the novelty dying out, it seems that their promotion will be difficult.

SCANDINAVIA

(Oslo). The Felsted recording of "Asia Minor" with Kokomo, as well as the Dot recording of the same song, will not be released in Norway. Sverre Dahl of A/S Proton, who handles the label London (which would release the Kokomo version here), declared that the recording was a "shock," since it is a modernized version of Edvard Grieg's "Piano Concerto No. 1, A Minor" played with a rock 'n' roll beat, and it is said that the performing and mechanical license bureaus all over Europe have been informed that the heirs of Grieg are expected to get this recording banned thru legal channels. Such a ban could possibly also include Radio Luxembourg, the commercial station at the European continent where "Asia Minor" is aired several times every day. Radio Luxembourg is very popular in Norway, and a record not played there has big difficulties appearing on the Norwegian Best Sellers.

Edvard Grieg's (1843-1907) music is still under copyright control. Normally, his compositions should have been free since 1957 (fifty years after his death), but since Norway was occupied five years during World War II, this period was prolonged another five years. These stipulations have been accepted by most governments in Europe, which will make actions against the recordings easier.

New among Best Sellers in Norway this week is The Blue Diamonds with "Ramona" on Fontana. The record has been on the Best Sellers in most European countries and in the U.S.

(Stockholm). Swedish label Jöns has introduced a new type of record. One side includes three songs recorded, with nothing on the flip side. Gunnel Sundgren, who debuted last year, is the first artist presented on this record. Singer Britt Damberg has signed a contract with RCA after a year with BFB. Her first RCA recording is expected soon.

Berndt Ost's Swedish EMI recording of "Pepe" will be released in South America by EMI in Argentina, reports Anders Holmstedt, head of EMI in Stockholm.

American label Request is now available at the Swedish market where AB Knäppupp has released the first four LPs during the week. The new Swedish label Jöns, which debuted in record biz last spring, might soon be represented in Finland. At least two Finnish recording companies are looking for the distribution contract, it is reported.

(Copenhagen). "West Side Story" will be the next American musical on Scandinavian stages, if the producer, Lars Schmidt, can find a cast. The opening, scheduled to take place at Falkoner Theatre in Copenhagen in November this year, might move to a theatre in Stockholm, since it seems impossible to find Danish artists for all the roles. Many artists who have been mentioned for some of the roles, are Swedish recording stars as Carli Tornehave (EMI) as Tony, Inger Berggren (Knäppupp) as Maria and Lill-Babs (Karusell) as Anita. It is understood that the Danes might not be too enthusiastic about a mixed Danish-Swedish cast, according to the language mixture it would mean. BELGIUM

New Belgian label Frankie Records bounces into the Best Sellers with a soft-rock version of television-theme "Bonanza," played by **Freddy and the Fender Boys**. Deck has been sold to C. N. R. Holland. "Little Joe," seen on "Bonanza," figured on three out of the five music magazines' covers. His popularity in Belgium is very big.

H.M.V. happy to report a top-ten entry in the Belgian Best Sellers with "Poema"/"Maria Magdalena" by **Los Amadores**. Other runners-up here are "Wheels" (different versions), "Green Leaves Of Summer" (**Brothers Four**), "Johanna" (**Bob Rocky**), "Al Di La" (**Betty Curtis**) and "Rubber Ball" (**Bobby Vee**). The **Jaye Brothers**, who had a hit some time ago with "Rag Mop," make it again on Fast Records with "Ain't Nobody Here But Us, Chickens," expected in the top-ten next month.

"Sucu Sucu" by **Ping Ping** passed the 600,000 mark in Europe and is climbing in the States (Kapp Records). In between two TV appearances in Germany and France, Ping Ping cut two new sides and made plans for an album to be recorded soon.

The Italian theme "Santa Lucia" is the beginning of a record-war in Belgium: **Los Ranadas** recorded first of all "Santa Lucia Cha Cha" (released on Frankie Records, in Holland on the Tivoli-label), **Peter Schilperoort** cut a Dixieland-version with his **Dutch Swing College Band** on Philips, **Alberto Cortez** made "Hello Lucia" for Moonglow, and Fast released the American recording by **The Jarmels**, "Little Lonely One." (Laurie).

HOLLAND

Sid Frey, president, and **George Demko**, comptroller of Audio Fidelity Inc., New York, will visit Benelux shortly.

On a press-conference in Hotel Americain, Amsterdam, the formation was announced of the new record company, named **Delta Record Company**. A number of most prominent personalities from record-, radio- and TV-business are interested in this new label. **Huub Jacobse** (former publicity manager of Bovema L.C.) conducted this press conference. Managing director of Delta is **Hans I. Kellerman**, who was a former director of Delahay/Top Rank. Delta's first release was the Dutch Eurovision Songfestival entry "Wat Een Dag," sung by **Eddy Doorenbos** and accompanied by the composer **Dick Schallies** with his Quartet. Next month, Delta starts with its own company in Belgium. On April 4, Delta officially started selling records to the retailers with a five salesmen force. Delta has already many contacts all over the world but is still very interested in all kind of American repertoire.

Mr. Brandsteder, director of Inelco L.C., representing RCA in Holland, off to America. He will stay in N.Y. for three weeks, and one week in Hollywood. Just before his departure, Brandsteder informed **The Cash Box** that on the first day of release 15,000 records of **Elvis Presley's** "Surrender" were sold, which means much more than the first day sales of "It's Now Or Never" and "Wooden Heart." No doubt "Surrender" will reach the top of Holland's Best Sellers.

One of the hottest sellers at this moment in Holland is "Are You Sure" by **The Allison's** on the Fontana label. (L. C. Phonogram). The record sells some hundreds of copies a day, and if this goes on that way, it's quite likely **The Allison's** will receive a golden record for 100,000 copies sold in Holland alone! "Clarence Williams recordings 1926-1930" is an album of up to now rare recordings, a delightful treat to lovers of traditional jazz. This Fontana LP was edited and narrated by **Dr. H. R. Rookmaker**. The latest French Fontana LP by **Les Trois Ménestrels** is put here. It just was awarded the 'Grand Prix du Disque' 1961 Académie Charles Cros.

"Walk Right Back," now #8 on the charts in Holland, and the splendid **Everly Brothers** album "A Date With The Everly Brothers" both got a successful start in the Dutch market. "Warner Bros., one year in Holland now, has definitely been recognized as a promising, dynamic label with supreme sound quality recordings," says **Mr. C. Pompe**, Bovema's Warner Bros. label manager. "This week, for instance, I lent a copy of **Paul Desmond's** album to an acquaintance of mine. His reaction when I asked for the record album? 'You'll never, never get it back, son! This record is terrific!'"

The **Fine Arts Quartet**, whose records are represented in Holland by Bovema's Imperial label, recently visited Gramophone House, and will also give concerts in Amsterdam, The Hague and a radio Hilversum-broadcast.

C. is expecting very much in Holland, for America's number one hit "Blue Moon" by **The Marcells** on the Colpix label. **The Selvera's**, one of Holland's foremost vocal groups, made another CNR-recording, "De Kleine Postiljon"; during the first three days after its release already 3,500 records were reportedly sold. A new CNR-recording of **The Spotlight Partners** promises to be a smash hit all over the world. Numbers are "Violetta" (Hör Mein Lied, Violetta) and "Karanina Mine" (Stenka Rasin), produced by **Jan Meeuwssen** and **Addy Kleyngeld**. Record will be released in Scandinavia by Sonet, in Germany by Ariola, in Belgium by the Frankie label. Negotiations are in progress for release in the U.S.

Initial orders on **The Jarmels'** "Little Lonely One," the Laurie master purchased by Artone for Benelux, are very promising, especially those from Belgium. Artone's hottest selling EP record is "Uw Rijsschool Thuis," offering helpful information for those who intend to get their drivers license.

The Brothers Four, very successful on Philips records (L. C. Phonogram) with their hit versions of "Greenfields" and "The Green Leaves Of Summer," have their first album out here: "Rally Round." A real collector's item for lovers of French chansons and of the great **Edith Piaf**, in particular, is a 25" LP of eight recordings she made during the years 1936-1944. Included are the original Piaf versions of "De l'Autre Côté De La Rue," "Mon Légionnaire" and "l'Accordeoniste" (Philips). Among new EP's are recordings of **The Three Jacksons**, **Rita Reys** with the **Pim Jacobs Trio**, the **Norman Luboff Choir**, **Catherine Sauvage** (sings **Léo Ferré**) and **Mitch Miller** and the **Brass, Piccolos and Drums**, all on Philips.

Pete Felleman of **Funckler Records**—a division of Artone—announced that plenty of action may be expected in the Aristocrat line in the coming weeks. Preparations are being made for a first summer-release of ten 12" LP's. Featured will be albums by **Kenny Burrell**, **Art Farmer**, **Johnny Griffin**, **Ahmad Jamal**, **James Moody**, **Max Roach**, **Sonny Stitt** and **The Jazztet**, led by **Art Farmer** and **Benny Golson**.



JAPAN

The 1961 Tokyo East-West Music Encounter featuring the Royal Ballet Group, New York Philharmonic Orchestra, with **Isaac Stern** and many others, will be launched on April 17 through May 6 in commemoration of 500 years after the foundation of Tokyo. **KBK** (Kokusi Bunka Kyokai—The Society For International Cultural Exchange; Tokyo) and **CCF** (The Congress for Cultural Freedom, Paris), are co-sponsors along with Tokyo Metropolitan Government. Supporters are the Ministry of Education of Japan, **NHK** (Nippon Hoso Kyokai—Japan Broadcasting Corporation) and **Japan Cultural Form**. The executive committee for 1961 Tokyo East West Music Encounter consists of representatives from supporting organizations, the parties concerned, the leading personalities from various circles.

Jack Conner, American Marimba performer, appeared on N.T.V., the nation's biggest TV network on March 30. Conner was once a member of the **Xavier Cugat Band**.

Another name was added last week to identify a 33 RPM record. Victor people call it a "Mini-LP." Label prefers its newly invented term "Mini-LP" to existing 33 single, and compact 33. Victor and Columbia will put their first 33 singles on the market very soon.

The **Clarence "Frogman" Henry** smash "But I Do," one of the hottest Argo items of the year, received a rush release treatment in Benelux, where the disk was issued by Artone on the **Funckler** label on March 31.



GERMANY

Don Pierce has always been a guiding force in the country field, and has also taken a vital interest in Europe as a market for his music. Starting with several visits to Germany and a distribution setup with his Starday label and Ariola here, Don has constantly tried to find ways to bring a greater public on this side of the ocean to his way of thinking, musically. His newest effort is to take country star Eddie Wilson, who spent time in Stuttgart with the Armed Forces and is now pickin' and singin' in Tennessee, bring him back to Germany and do a pair of hillbilly tunes in German and English/German. The first try is fairly successful with a good country feeling but just one failure that I would like to point out for all firms, singers, etc. who wish to make a big impact on this market in our native language. The lyrics must be modern German and they must be sung understandably. If the lyrics do not bring feelings and remembrance to the German teenager and if the public just can't understand what the singer sings, then the record will not be purchased. Our advice is to get a lyric written in German by one of the modern successful lyric writers here, and either produce the recording in Germany or have an extremely fine advisor on the date who knows the market and realizes what will sell and what will not sell here.

Peter Schaeffers is celebrating his 20th anniversary as a publisher with a bang. Right now his film firm has just turned out the new Freddy film "Nur Der Wind" (Only The Wind) and the title song is already out on a new Polydor record. His film firm has also turned out the new Heidi Bruhl film "One Prettier Than The Other" and the two top songs from the film are on Philips records with Heidi at present.

At present, a new musical film "Young People Need Love" is in the works in Vienna starring Bill Ramsey, Conny and Peter Weck. All three are Polydor artists. The English hit "Portrait Of My Love" has also been done here in German by Wolfgang Sauer for Electrola. Needless to say, "Pepe" has received 52 recordings and is No. 1 on the Best Sellers at present. It looks like a fine 20th year for Peter and his firm.

Progress Music under the direction of Johann Michel in Frankfurt is doing fine with film music. After the great success with "Never On Sunday," which sold over 1.5 million singles in the German language, the firm now has sewed up the rights to "The Misfits" starring Marilyn Monroe and Clark Gable, "The Magnificent Seven" with Horst Buchholz and Yul Brynner, "Town Without Pity" starring Christine Kaufmann and Kirk Douglas and "Once A Hero" starring John Mills and Alec Guinness.

Sid Frey, the president of Audio Fidelity, is traveling around Europe lining up distribution for his label. Al Schacht from Aberbach Music dropped by The Cash Box office to tell us of his latest hits.

Werner Mertin from Palette records reports top action on his Bobbyjaan recording of "Kili Watch," and the first recording in German by Belgium lass Janine Michel.

The dance craze called "The Pachanga" is moving strongly into Germany, reports Theodore Seeger of Peer Music. During the professional dancing contest held recently in Berlin, the pachanga was introduced for the first time here by the Keller Dancing School for the professionals and was well received. Also, speaking of the South American rhythms, for the first time, the cha-cha was recognized in the world competition for amateur and professional dancers. The Perez Prado tune "The Millionaire" was used for the competition.

Gunter Geyer from Pye-Vogue just called to tell us that Petula Clark has just recorded her first two songs in German. They are "St. Tropez" and "Du Bist Mein Anfang Und Mein Schluss" (You're My Beginning And End). The two lyrics were handled by Jean Nicolas, who is in real life Luxemburg deejay. Camillo Felgin and well known lyricist Kurt Schwabach. Petula introduced the songs in Berlin two weeks ago.

Here's a report on the Radio Luxemburg Hit Parade. The first 4 places were divided between Electrola and Teldec. First place went to Peggy Brown for "Denn Sie Fahren Hinaus Auf Das Meer" (Then They Go Out On The Sea) which we wrote about last week. Second place went to Cliff Richard for his first German recording, "Bin Verliebt," 3rd place went to Gerd Boettcher for "Poetry In Motion" in German, and 4th place was awarded to Rex Gildo for the old German evergreen "Zarina."

The Perry Como show which featured Caterina Valente was broadcast a week ago with a great reaction in the record shops. Caterina will soon make her second appearance with Perry in his show, and German TV will also broadcast it a few weeks later. Caterina, who is once again Germany's top female vocalist, is riding the top of the German Best Sellers with her "Pepe."

Another top German star will soon visit the U.S. Vico Torriani will soon leave for America and aside from his radio and TV appearances, he'll visit the German clubs in Chicago, Los Angeles and San Francisco. Perhaps it will be a break for this great personality who has yet to break through with a world hit. He's been a big star here for years. That's it for this week in Germany.

AUSTRALIA

May 1st is the date for the launching of the Pye "Golden Groove" series of 12" albums. Set to retail at 33/., this makes them the lowest priced 12" LP on the open market—dealer price is 21/., plus 25% Sales Tax. The aim of Pye Records is to market their "Golden Groove" (not to be confused with Pye's "Golden Guinea" range in England) line through all available outlets with special attention to self service and supermarket stores. The "Golden Groove" series carries a hundred per cent return allowance (in certain cases) on slow selling lines. This makes the first move by Pye in this country into the low-priced field—a field in which most other major labels have a keen interest. To add power to the appeal of their "Golden Groove" albums to supermarkets, Pye are preparing a series of display racks and window displays to promote the line.

From Moira Delray at the Lee Gordon office in Sydney comes news of the next Big Show tour of American artists planned for later this month. Moira gives the line-up as Connie Francis, Troy Donahue, Bobby Vee, Johnny Burnette and The Ventures. With a group such as this the show must be a success no matter where it plays. Miss Francis is without doubt the most popular female disk attraction in this country—she has a whole flock of hits to her credit, the current one being "Where The Boys Are." Donahue, while not known for anything in the music field here, is widely popular through the TV series "Surfside Six." Vee has a current click in "Rubber Ball" and looks like repeating the dose with "Stayin' In." Burnette had a great run with "You're Sixteen" and his "Little Boy Sad" is shaping like a real smash; in fact this record has all the essentials of a tremendous hit. The Ventures of course have been in the top bracket of disk attractions here for quite a while, their "Perfidia" did good business and now "Ram-Bunk-Shush" is starting to make some noise for them. At the time this column went to press, Moira said no plans had been finalized concerning Australian acts to appear on the show but that a definite decision would be made soon.

Roy Hamilton looks sure to dislodge Elvis from the top spot among our best-selling singles across the nation with his exciting performance of "You Can Have Her"; it is released in this country by Philips Records. Roy, who hasn't had a click here for a long time, is now established as a top disk attraction here and "You Can Have Her" is reported to be selling in "tremendous quantities."

Another single that looks set for the big time here is "Walk Right Back," the latest single release by The Everly Brothers—this disk backs "Ebony Eyes." The situation here with this disk is in reverse to that in the United States where "Ebony Eyes" is the bigger side of the two. "Walk Right Back" has been the big side in this country right from the word "go." The sad, sad story of "Ebony Eyes" is hardly doing anything saleswise and even less as far as airplay is concerned, but "Walk Right Back" is rapidly heading for a top position.

Helen O'Connell, popular American vocalist who performed for some time with major dance bands in the United States, made a rush visit to this country recently for TV appearances in the big national series "Revue '61"; American comedian Dick Curtis appeared on the same shows as Miss O'Connell. John Collins—production assistant to MCA's Peter McFarlane who handles "Revue '61" reports that many prominent American stars will appear on this series during the next few months. Vocalist Margaret Whiting is one of the artists due here shortly for "Revue '61" which is produced at the ATN-Channel 7 Studios in Sydney.

Jim Cuff of RCA reports that Elvis Presley is going great guns with his latest album to be released here—"His Hand In Mine." It is reported to be "selling like a single" which isn't surprising as Elvis is at the very peak of his disk popularity in Australia at the moment. He leads the field in singles, EPs and album sales and hasn't been out of the top ten so far this year in singles.

Popular Steve Lawrence is making plenty of headway via his EMI (London label) release "Portrait Of My Love," the big English hit. Also released by the EMI group is Del Shannon's "Runaway" on London; also on London is Lawrence Welk's latest, "Out Of A Clear Blue Sky" and theme from "My Three Sons," this follows Welk's currently popular single "Calcutta."

The "Sing Along With Mitch" (Miller) TV shows are now being screened in Australia. There is tremendous interest in the shows for two good reasons—one is that Mitch is very popular here through his long string of "Sing-Along" albums which are consistent sellers and the other is that Australia's own Diana Trask is featured in the shows.

MEXICO

At the recent Interamerican convention of A&R and sales managers of Dimsa records, agreements were reached between Rogerio Azcárraga, president of the label and their reps Tony Contreras in Puerto Rico, Luis Adell and Jerome Monfort in New York, Alfonso Hernández in Los Angeles, Stanley Steinhaus in Venezuela, Hugo Menioviach in Argentina, Felipe Cocarrubia in Guadalajara, Méx. and Fernando Covarrubias in Monterrey: there are new projects to open offices in Spain, Colombia and Chile, Augusto Patrón will be the sales manager of Orfeon Dimsa Records Corp. in Los Angeles. Don Roy is going to be the A&R man of the same label in Argentina and Rómulo Moran probably will go to Venezuela.

This convention began on March 27 and ended on the 30th. Besides the aforementioned people the convention was attended by Alejandro Siegrist, production general manager, Jorge Hastings administration general manager; Paco de la Barrera, Enrique Cantú and Willy Samperio, A&R of Orfeon, Dimsa and Maya records, respectively; Ignacio Zayas de la Garza, general sales manager, Bernardo Lestrade, chief of promotion and advertising and Gabriel Nuñez, in charge of Orfeon's TV programs.

Young singer Enrique Guzman began a new TV show and was a great success. His new LP is due soon. Enrique sings for Columbia records.

Rumors are flying that Los Locos del Ritmo wants to change labels. They work for Orfeon records but now they want to sign a new contract, perhaps with Gamma records.

George Marek, vice-president and general manager of RCA Victor, declared in his recent trip to México that we need to create more fan-clubs ala the United States.

On the 7th and 9th of April, Igor Stravinsky played at the Palace of Fine Arts in México under direction of Robert Craft. Another famous musician Henryk Szeryng is in México, too, to perform in some concerts. After a long tour through Brasil and some other South American countries, Bienvenido Granda returned to México for recording sessions.

Adilia Castillo, sensational South American folk singer who signed a new contract with Columbia Records, made her first LP for this label, "Por los caminos de Venezuela." Incidentally, the other day, when she was performing at a night club and when she began to dance, she fell down. Immediately, she said to the audience: "I fall down, but I fall down on good earth on Mexican earth!"

The Crazy Boys, popular teenage group, probably will break-up because the leader Vivi Hernandez wants to sing alone. The same thing may happen with Johnny Laboriel, leader of "Los rebeledes del rock," who wants to study next July in New York.

Colombia, Chile, Venezuela and Argentina will be visited next June by The Navarro Sisters, RCA artists, whose "24,000 Kisses" version is getting very popular.

Directly from Guatemala came popular singer Alicia Azurdia, who immediately will record an LP for Columbia Records. Juan Manuel Villareal, general manager of the same label, just returned from a trip to South America.

Juan Campo and Eduardo Baptista Jr., are preparing a homage in honor of Mr. Eduardo C. Baptista Sr., founder and president of Pan Americana de Discos, S.A., April 21. Juan and Baptista Jr., are vice-presidents of the same company.

On April 22, Los Panchos, the famous vocal group from México, will travel to Argentina, after performing in México with Frank Sinatra. From Argentina, they will go to Paraguay and later to France and the 21st of July, debut in Moscow, where they will stay 29 days. After Moscow, they travel to Bucharest, Rumania and then return to México on September 30. On October 4, they perform in México and on December 10 a new trip to Japan, Hong Kong and Manila.

Almost finished is the first percussion LP with voices made in México by Peerless Records. Debuting in this album is famous Mexican singer Toña La Negra. For the same label, Caterina Valente signed a contract to record, in December, Spanish songs.

The latest Chico O'Farrill single for Orfeon Records is "Matilda" and "24,000 Kisses." Chico is planning new jazz symphonies for his fans around the world.

ITALY

On his European trip, Mr. Baumberger, of RCA Victor Records, stopped in Milan for a day before reaching Rome for an official call on the RCA Italiana studios, offices, pressing factory and recording studios. Mr. Ornato, Italian director of RCA, Mr. Vigorelli of RCA's office in Milan, and Mr. de Micheli of The Cash Box welcomed him at the railroad station in Milan upon his arrival here from Basilea. Baumberger congratulated Ornato on the success of RCA Italiana and stated that this affiliate is one of the best they have in the world. After a visit to the most important record stores in Milan (Messaggerie Musicali, Ricordi and His Master's Voice), he left for Rome. Ornato has asked the rep of The Cash Box to visit in Rome this month, and Baumberger stated that the RCA studios in Rome now boasts of the greatest recording studio in the world.

We do not understand why an Italian artist such as Peppino Di Capri is practically unknown abroad. Anyone interested in obtaining promotional disks by Di Capri may write to Carisch, Via Fara 39, Milan, and the gentleman in charge of export is Mr. Mazzocchi. Di Capri had a smash with "Nessuno Al Mondo" (No Arms Can Ever Hold You) which sold more than 200,000 copies. The people in the Italian record industry appreciate him as the best modern performer of Neapolitan songs. He does not appear on the current chart, but all his records are selling very well. His latest Neapolitan recording is now being released titled, "Parlami D'Amore Mariu" (Speak To Me Of Love).

As a result of three days of top level discussion between Art Talmadge, Sydney Shemel, vice president and foreign operations manager of UA Records, respectively, and Giuseppe Giannini of CGD, UA will henceforth be represented in Italy by CGD. The records will be released under the "UA" label. With the acquisition of such an important label, CGD becomes stronger and stronger on the Italian market. Mr. Giannini is now studying a reorganization of CGD since all the labels represented by such company will be divided in two channels.

Paid a long visit to Melodicon, which is the Italian representative of Philips. Mr. Negro, who is the head of Philips distributors in Italy, gave me a detailed and clear picture of the current situation of their record lines. After one year of promotional efforts for Ray Conniff, firm announced that this foreign big name is becoming big here as well. His latest release in Italy, an LP titled "Say It With Music," is one of the best selling albums at the moment in our territory. It is the latest of 8 LP's (both monaural and stereo) published here in the past year by Conniff. Three LP's will follow this one. They are: "Memories Are Made of This," being launched this month; "S' Wonderful," next month; "Hi-Fi Companion," in June. In the same month that Elvis Presley's record, "Torna A Surriento" (Surrender) on RCA, was released here, the same tune comes out in the traditional version by Frank Sinatra in an LP titled "Come Back To Sorrento," sung in Italian on the Fontana label, distributed by Melodicon. Melodicon is also publishing the original sound track of "The Alamo" on an EP with good sales possibilities, although some other versions are already available on the market. Negro, who gave us the above news, is one of the most active record salesmen in our industry.

From Durium we learn that "Mule Skinner Blues" is still selling well, while a new Top Rank hit is coming up—"Little Lonely One" by The Jarmels. Firm announced that the brilliant career of Little Tony, our number two rock and roll performer, is going on successfully. He has waxed "Bella Pupa" and on another LP, "Bella Mary," the latter also being recorded in an English version.

The Smiling Irishman emerges from the "House of Blue Lovers" with a followup that promises another journey to hitsville. Tag James' soulful sentimental statements on "Down On The Corner Of Love" as his next hit stanza. A real pretty job of country ballad weeping. Another top notch ballad, "I'm Getting Nowhere Fast," also retains hit potential.

More Selling Action Needed!

There has never been a better time for your firm to call on the original sales thinking that established your company in the first place. We're talking about the creative selling that combined ideas with leg-work and resulted in sales. It is not too much in evidence today.

With reference to all levels of the coin machine industry, they each have a product to sell. A slowdown in sales has caused many coinmen to be more than a little impatient with customers who are not taking buying action now. But are they taking *selling* action now?

With the usual exceptions, most coin firms appear to have adapted a "wait and see" attitude. What they're waiting to "see" is obviously an increase in business but one of the facts of life is that business doesn't increase without a cause and effect process taking place. Unless the cause is provided there can be no effect, or no sales increase. The wait could prove to be a long one—with very little to see during that time.

It's inconceivable that your sales calls have covered even every good account, let alone the entire list. Check your list. How many accounts have been personally called on this past month? Don't count social calls. Don't count service calls. Don't count collection calls. Just count sales calls in the true sense of the word. The other calls are either a necessary adjunct of doing business or are a luxury to be enjoyed when the business is coming in via the telephone. Be honest with yourself and admit the last time you seriously discussed the merits of a new amusement game or phono, and also the last time you ran through your used equipment list, item by item, trying as best you can, to match up your machines with the needs of the operator.

When was the last time you decided that perhaps a special combination package deal with an attractive price would move more equipment than an item-by-item sale, with no other incentive to buy? The alert salesman will find very little to learn in this editorial. The points here are basic. Nothing more than creative selling in its simplest form. But it is not being practiced today by many firms suffering from lack of sales. Every company in business is a sales machine, in a sense. Every minute that machine doesn't function is quite costly. Procrastination is the thief of sales. We must take all possible selling action now. To wait for the next sale to walk through the door is a fool's accomplishment. The next sale isn't walking through any doors today. But he may be just around the corner. Why don't *you* start walking in *his* direction?

MOA Skeds 3-Day Post Convention Vacation Tour For Coinmen

CHICAGO—In a continued effort to make this year's MOA Convention the biggest attraction since the beginning of the juke box annual show, officials announced last week that a three-day vacation tour to follow the convention dates would take place covering Nassau and the vacationland in this area. Wylly's Tours, a travel agency located in Miami Beach, is arranging the post-convention tour for those attending the MOA show.

The plans call for a three day excursion to Nassau on May 18, 19 and 20. Costs for the three day tour will be nominal and will cover air transportation from Miami to Nassau and return, meals and beverages.

The excursion will leave Miami on the morning of May 18, via Cunard Eagle Airways. Upon arrival at Nassau, private limousines will convey the operators to the delightful British Colonial Hotel. After the evening meal, guests will get an escorted tour of Nassau's nightlife. They will enjoy the fascinating floorshows, bongo drums, fire dances and many other treats.

The following day's schedules call for tours of the city, "Old Nassau," Native quarters, Old Fort Charlotte and many other interesting sights. Dinner will be at the British Colonial Hotel followed by entertainment and dancing.

Top Swedish Ops Form Buying Organization

STOCKHOLM, SWEDEN—The largest pingame operators in Sweden have organized and will buy all machines on a cooperative basis it was learned last week. The name of the newly formed co-op buying group is Svenska Operaters Inkopsforening (Purchase Organization of Swedish Operators).

The Cash Box reporter here discussed the formation of the group with the officers of the buying board. They are O. Thalen, L. Thoren, Bo Anderson and S. Franzon. Franzon is liaison between the organization and the foreign selling outlets from whom they expect to purchase new amusement machines and phonographs.

The six-man group reportedly buys about 65% of all pingames and phonographs sold in Sweden.

An older association of operators formed here many years ago under the title of Sveriges Automatagares Riksforbund (Swedish Operators Association) but has nothing to do with the newly founded co-operative buying organization.

CMC Addresses Ops At Milwaukee Meet; Casola Outlines Need For PR; Hastings Appoints Committee

MILWAUKEE—The Milwaukee Coin Machine Operators' Association met in session Monday evening, April 10, at the Ambassador Hotel and embarked upon a serious discourse to deal with the recent rash of unfavorable publicity which has been aimed at the coin machine operators in this community in the pages of the Milwaukee Sentinel and Milwaukee Journal. Operators came into this city from other sections of Wisconsin for this meeting.

Coincidentally a committee from the national Coin Machine Council public relations organization—Louis Casola, president; John Bilotta, vice president; and Earl Finberg, co-ordinator for the Public Relations Board, Incorporated—attended this meeting to further acquaint the operators with CMC, its aims, accomplishments and needs to date; and to invite the Wisconsin operators into the membership fold.

The meeting was presided over by the association's president, Sam Hastings of Hastings Distributing Co. Other officers included James Stecher, Novelty Service Co. (vice president); and Jerome (Red) Jacomet, (secretary-treasurer), Red's Novelty Co. Hastings stated that due to the pressing need in the Wisconsin area for a strong public relations program to offset unfavorable PR conditions that all normal association business would be dispensed with. He then introduced Casola stating that CMC's prexy would address the membership without any further discussion.

Sites Need For Program

Casola at this time proceeded in a comfortable tone by acquainting the Wisconsin assemblage with the Coin Machine Council, coupling this with the problems existent in Milwaukee to stress the great need for the development of a better image in this area of operation.

"I don't have to tell you how sorely you Wisconsin operators want—and

need—friendly press relations here," Casola asserted. "What I do wish to impress upon you is the great need for a concerted public relations program which will, in part, very much enlighten your local press.

"This is primarily the reason," he continued, "that CMC distributed 400 Statement of Fact sheets about the coin machine industry to the nation's press, television facilities and radio stations, to better acquaint them with this great industry's place in our national economy. And to further acquaint these people with the kind of honest, sincere and industrious people make up the coin machine industry.

"Recently," he said, "there was a stirring story in The Cash Box trade magazine (April 8 issue) which related a fine, lengthy release sent out by United Press International (UPI) news service to its clients throughout the nation under the heading 'Coin Machines Gaining Stature, Better Credit'."

"I mention this only because it bears out the theory expounded by the Council's public relations agency, the Public Relations Board, Inc., that since the various communication mediums have only adverse material in their morgue files to acquaint them with our industry there is only one course for them to take. It is up to the coin machine industry to furnish them with the type of material which will eventually place this industry in its proper perspective in all medias.

"Gentlemen, it is an understatement of fact that you have your stake in this great effort, and it is certainly up to each and every one of you to meet your responsibility in this thing head on."

Question-Answer Period

Casola's comments were received with much interest. This resulted in a lively question and answer period which showed that the assemblage of operators were very much in accord with the program expounded by the

Coin Machine Council.

He concluded his discourse by advising that television stations are being offered coin machine amusement and music machines for use in their programming of shows. However, only if they are used to the good advantage of the industry.

He also stated that the efforts of the Coin Machine Council have interested European coin men to the resultant extent that they will shortly send a delegation to this country to acquire additional facts on public relations from CMC's executive board to aid them in establishing a similar program on the European continent.

Hastings Names Committee

Casola was followed to the podium by John Bilotta, MOA chairman Clint Pierce, and Lee Brooks of The Cash Box for further comment. Sam Hastings then took the floor and under the suggestion of the CMC aggregation created a committee designated with the authority to start a membership drive among the Wisconsin operators. Doug Opitz of Wisconsin Novelty Co., was appointed chairman of this group, which includes Nate Victor of S. L. London Dist. Co., Sam Cooper, Paster Dist. Co., Harry Jacobs, Jr., United Dist., Inc.; and Orville Carnitz, Badger Novelty Co. The group immediately gathered to formulate plans for their membership drive program.

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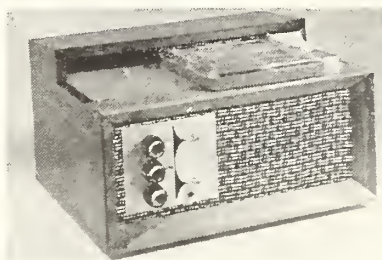
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Univ. Match Sees Pick-Up After Slow Two Months STOCKHOLDERS RE-ELECT BOARD

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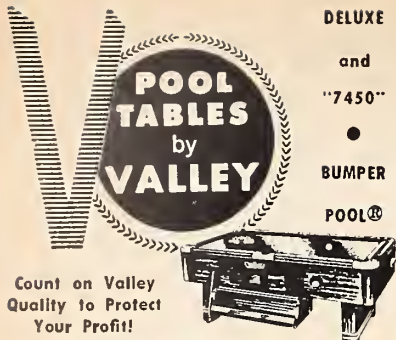
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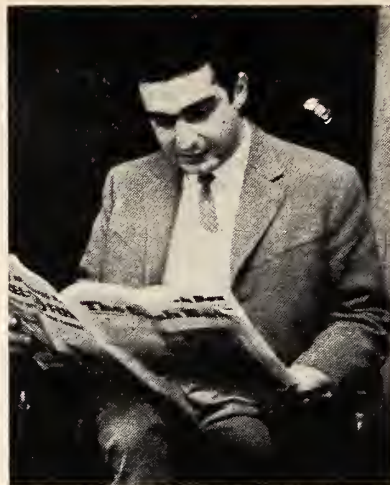
Argentine Firm's 4-Year Success Only The Beginning

NEW YORK—Pingames have popular appeal around the world and South America is no exception. At least as far as Argentina and Uruguay are concerned. Ask Jose Caion, sales manager of the Jet S.A. Amusement & Vending Coin Machine Company with offices in Buenos Aires and Montevideo.

His partner Vincenzo Spinelli is the other half of the firm and together Jet operates four large arcades in this South American metropolis. Each arcade features approximately 70 machines, most of which are pingames with the balance devoted to shuffles and arcade type machines. In addition to the firm's arcade business, Jet sells pingames to locations and presently has about two-hundred locations, most of which are taverns, paying for the equipment on a ten month arrangement, after paying 50% down. The cost of the machines permits the Jet coinmen a good profit after they pay six and seven times the USA price due to customs and tariffs. A pingame selling for \$100 here would eventually cost Jet about \$700. Therefore, the demand for four and five year old pins is great.

Search For Low-Price Pins

Which brings us to Jose Caion and the reason for his visit to the United States. "More pingames and a source of supply we can depend on," is the way Caion summed it up. During his visit to The Cash Box offices in New York, the coin firm exec stated that he will travel to key coin machine cities in search of sources of supply for specific pingames. On his itinerary of course, is Chicago, where the South American will meet with factory officials. A visit to New York, New Jersey and Baltimore will be made before traveling to the midwest where National Rejectors in St. Louis will be one of the stops made.

Direct Sale To Location

Jet Vending has been in business for four years and in that time their operating business has flourished. Jet operates on a direct sale to location basis and claims that the pingames average \$200 each month. On direct sales, six months free service is included. After the free service period ends, the firm charges a service fee but all service is handled by mechanics who are encouraged to form their own service firms. "We provide mechanics with service schools, regular classes, tools, knowledge and the necessary equipment to get started which includes a service truck. Because service is an area with a profit potential that we would rather not include in our set-up, we enable mechanics to buy parts for the machines from us, at a cost lower than locations must pay for them, and to pocket those charges for service calls which are not included free under our initial contract. A serviceman can therefore make as much money as he can call, charge as much or as little as he likes, and make a decent living just handling service, a profitable aspect of our business but one in which we

don't care to become involved. We keep our operating business in the area of operating. Service can become a costly item when you consider the size of our territory. Therefore we encourage all mechanics to enter the service business and we gladly supply them with all of our location leads."

Government Controls Gambling

The Jet operation includes taverns in Buenos Aires that cater to the metropolitan city's 6 million people. "No gambling is permitted in our area since all gambling must be sanctioned and operated by the Federal Government. Casinos are conducted under the supervision of the Government and it is done out in the open. Therefore, there is no gambling permitted in locations and there is no desire since it is permitted openly in modern casinos."

Afternoon Siestas Spur Play

South Americans, about 60% of them, work what is known as the 'English' week as opposed to the 'American' work week of 9 to 5. Work starts at 8:00 AM and ends at noon for lunch and rest. It resumes at 2:30 PM and continues until 7:00 PM. The 2½ hour noontime break stimulates tavern business and amusement machine play. Then evening hours take over and locations start to perk again.

Jet Amusement and Vending employs twenty-five people, most of whom perform the service function for locations on the service-guarantee arrangement. The firm has its main office at Tucuman 1682-6-D in Buenos Aires and expects to expand present quarters. Four years ago the shop was suitable, but with the popularity of pingames and the ambition of Jet and the Caion-Spinelli partnership, the need for additional space becomes more apparent with each new location.

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Legal Interpretation Of 'Private Gain' May Affect Fruits In UK AWAIT COURT RULING

Meanwhile Association Membership Grows

LONDON—As already established, under the new Betting and Gaming Act of 1961, fruit and similar machines may not be operated in clubs for private gain; but it had been thought that it would be perfectly legal provided that the profits from the machines went into the funds of the club for the benefit of the members in general. However, in view of a recent High Court ruling on the legal interpretation of 'private gain' in connection with another form of gambling at a club in the North of England, certain doubts have been raised in the minds of both the Government and the trade as to the exact meaning of 'private gain' and the circumstances under which fruit machines may be legally operated. An appeal has been lodged against the Court's decision but it is likely to be some time yet before the final result is known. In the meantime, however, fruit machine operators are continuing on the assumption that their interpretation of the law will be upheld.

The new law having been in operation for three months indications are that things are running pretty smoothly and that many of the malpractices that had been forecast by some of the more sensational newspapers have not, in fact, materialized. On the arcade side also, except for one or two isolated cases, there have been no troubles at all but, as most arcades in this country are closed during the winter and have only just opened up for the summer season, it is perhaps a little early to foresee what will happen on this side.

The A.C.A. and the A.T.E. both report that since the Act was passed last July there has been a substantial increase in membership which rather suggests that operators and members of the trade generally are preparing for possible future snags and therefore seeking the protection of their trade association to safeguard their interests should any unforeseen difficulties arise.

designed for the added satisfaction of operators throughout the country.

These improvements include a new, sturdy—all steel front door to afford additional protection to the cash box. And to prevent the necessity of replacing front doors in the event of damage done during attempts of pilferage.

Another improvement, which Huebsch believes will garner great popularity among operators, is the extension of the flat metal strip to completely cover the tops of both side rails, and also the complete top frontal area of the playfield.

Huebsch stated further that sales have continued to increase for "Old Plantation." The game, he said, is quite unique in so far as it combines Keeney's original "Panoscope" and conventional play field scoring in a Keeney original cabinet design.

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EASTERN FLASHES

The sweet smell of increased business is in the air as the spring season gets underway here. Operators polled this past week unanimously point to an increase in location action with much of the influx attributed to the return of the tavern trade after a Lenten denial. Collections show the increase and the cash is expected to find its way into distributor cash registers as much needed new equipment is bought. . . . The distrib finds himself with an optimistic outlook for the first time in months. Operator-traffic has picked up during the past two weeks and there is no doubt that a recovery is in the making. . . . Manufacturers have announced certain new games so all in all, expect a pick-up in business at every level of the coin biz in metropolitan New York and the surrounding area.

Other reasons for continued good business come about from signs pointing to extension of unemployment checks here in NY State. They will no doubt boost tavern sales. Auto sales are expected to pick-up especially after the Detroit call for increased production after a long layoff. Construction in this booming commercial area of New York has been hampered by exceptionally bad weather and low temperatures all winter long. Look for increased construction pay envelopes with overtime a necessary evil for management. Seasonally speaking, the job and employment situation should clear for the better if only for the summer. All bright signs of good business to come.

Operators along the avenue seemed to take heed of the signs pointing to good business with more coinmen along Tenth Avenue this past week than since before the holidays. . . . Ben Chicofsky admitting that collections are up and also that the "loan cancer is a growing one. . . ." No cure for this one either tho. . . . Sol Tabb reported along the avenue up from Miami to visit with old friends. . . . Roy Kraehmer, United's vice-president, in from Chi on business. . . . Operator Jim Sherry, a very satisfied young man with nothing but kind words for everyone, reports fine collections from his machine investments and other sources as well. . . . Dave Simon a visitor along coinrow stopping into United East Coast Corporation before continuing on about town with several business deals to be consummated.

Mac Pollay reported on the avenue buying equipment but we missed the horse lover (or is it just plain 'lover'). . . . Sandy Moore also pays his respects to friends before departing for the Brooklyn courts where he was expected to appeal the 3-year sentence announced the previous week for violation of the Bankruptcy Law. No news at press time, after judge reserved decision. . . . The ever popular Al "Senator" Bodkin, on the street working like all get-out for the UJA during its final weeks and selling up a storm of tix for the Irv Holzman testimonial dinner May 3rd at the Plaza. Bodkin seemed chipper as ever and according to the operator-diplomat, things are better than ever.

Lyn Durant and Herb Oettinger, United execs, in from Chi to visit with Irving Holzman, the top United distrib here, advising of plans for new equipment before departing on government contract business which was previously reported here some weeks ago. Holzman is busy shipping the current 'Dixie' and 'Line-Up' games and remarks that the new Deluxe model of 'Bowl-A-Rama' is worth taking a look. Several smart new innovations. . . . Joe Munves couldn't stay around more than one week. Not with the arcade biz steaming along as it is. Joe's off on the road again, this time with the south in mind. Just about every other part of the nation has been covered. Mike Munves minds the shop as the crew gets as much reconditioning done as is humanly possible before meeting as many orders as can be filled. That's the arcade business is in April (and May, June, July and Aug!). The new helicopter kiddie rides from Bert Lane and Miami's All-Tech have proven popular with arcade men. Good location pieces.

Rock-Ola phonos keep movin' from the Albert Simon showrooms as sales keep pace with increased collections and operator interest. Al D'Inzillo busy with several operators, not finding too much time for the paper work (who cares as long as the machines move!). Again, the season finds its effects on the arcade end of the business here with the ChiCoin 'Ray Gun' showing signs of continued success and the Auto-Photo machines holding to their expected good sales action. . . . Abe Lipsky, Libra Distribs, moving some reconditioned equipment out to make way for late model phonos which are already marked "sold." Harry Koeppel reminds us that the Westchester affair is Tues. and of course, we'll be there.

"Shugy" behind the desk at Runyon in NYC as Morris Rood and "Kempy" report on the sales and inventory situation. The Newark branch is booming with vending, kiddie rides, and export business combining for a strong parlay. Myron Sugerman tells us that Runyon was named distributor for "Western Trails" (Joe Ash has the Southland Engineering line in Philly) and the AMI phono line continues to attract on design alone. . . . Frank Mencuri traveling the seaboard appointing distribs for the "Western Trails" kiddie ride as part of his overall chores as veep with Southland. Frank phones from Philly to say that the ride "is going great guns and more than one dozen are out just this week or two in shopping centers." Claims the unit cleans up in the proper locations. It was introduced last year at Chicago's MOA.

Murray Kaye, Atlantic New York Corp., awaiting the new Williams 'Batting Champ' that has already stirred up some action even before its arrival. Nothing like a Williams baseball game to liven things up, according to Kaye. Meyer Parkoff arrives just as we are about to leave and he has some comments on the business. "If the operators would learn once and for all that they are selling primarily music, and worked in that direction, they would find the value in Seeburg's 'Artist of the Week' program, just as others have." Jack Gordon, Seeburg veep calls us from Chi and confirms not only the increased collections due to 33 single play but also the wide use of stereophones in locations to increase action. "Tac Amusement in New Orleans has from 2 to 14 sets of earphones in each location!" quotes Gordon.

News of France lifting restrictions on used equipment came as a pleasant surprise last week. Now there's another new market for exporters to fatten their sales figs with. . . . Standard Financial increased its authorized stock from 2,500,000 to 5 million shares outstanding. Claims the future demands confidence and signs point to increased business. . . . Irving Kaye has a free saw set for anyone offering constructive criticism of his machines. . . . MOA execs featuring a side trip tour of Nassau for those interested after MOA. . . . Willie Blatt doing a bang-up job for MOA in his Miami habitat. . . . Iz Edelman happy over the recent FM radio announcements concerning stereo music. Details later.
