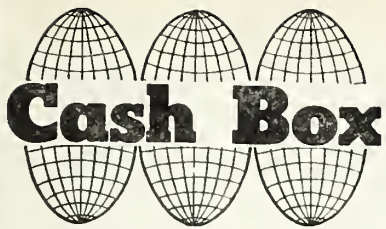

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4 BIG DAYS

What should be one of the most interesting four day periods of the 1963 record year falls between June 23rd and June 26th when two record industry conventions take the stage in Miami Beach, Fla.

The 23rd will be the starting date of the first ROSA (the one-stop association) Convention to be held at the Fountainbleau Hotel. This convention will segway into the Fifth Annual ARMADA (the distributor association) Convention which runs the 25th and 26th of June and is preceded by a number of manufacturer-distrib sales meetings.

Because of the two conventions running next door to one another in such a tight time span, all indications are that attendance from industry reps should by far overshadow any previous attendance mark.

But the timing element will certainly not be the only factor responsible for what is expected to be a powerhouse turnout. Even if ARMADA were the only convention during that period, attendance would probably be at an all time high.

The reason? The tremendous concern throughout the trade about what many seem to feel is a critical period for the record industry in the area of product distribution from manufacturer to the consumer.

There have been a great many changes in recent months and current rumors heard daily indicate

that we will see many more drastic changes in the distribution of disks before the year's over. Almost every week we hear word that another distributor in going into rack jobbing or the leased-outlet area. Or that Jobber X is buying out the Y Distributing operation in this or that city. Many distributors have long been in the one-stop field and there are continued rumors that distributors of major labels' merchandise will be going into the one-stop business in force shortly. There is also daily conversation about one or another hot disk manufacturer opening up a branch in some important market. And of course, we have seen a good deal of this already this year.

Then there is talk of a fourteen or fifteen "depot" type distribution set-up which will see shipping into smaller cities coming from a main warehouse in key cities.

Everyone's looking for the answer. The answer to "Where is the business headed?"

Although the conventions have planned excellent programs and interesting subjects for discussion you can bet that some of the most exciting "symposiums" will take place in the lobbies of the two hotels when a group of two manufacturers, a few distributors and a one-stop get together. Opinions and predictions will be thrown around by the barrel-full and it should be more interesting than ever this year.

NARAS Grammy Award Winners

NEW YORK—Columbia Records had the field in the presentations of Grammys by NARAS, the disk awards society, at simultaneous ceremonies last week (15) in New York, Hollywood and Chicago.

Columbia copped 12 Grammys, RCA Victor won 7, Capitol 3, two each for Warner Brothers, Cadence, Verve and Angel, and one each for Kapp, Mercury, Atco, Decca and ABC-Parade. Four composers awards for pop, jazz and classical compositions rounded out the 39 Grammy winners listed below:

Pickwick Int'l Acquires Tops

NEW YORK—Cy Leslie, president of Pickwick International, Inc., has announced the acquisition of Tops Records for an undisclosed amount of cash.

No stock was involved in the transaction, which did not include Tops' payables or receivables, or West Coast factory. Tops' gross sales in 1962 were well in excess of \$4 million; slightly less than half of this will probably be retained. For their latest fiscal year, ended April 30, 1963, (now being audited) Pickwick estimates sales were approximately \$5 million and earnings about 60 cents per share.

Pickwick will completely reorganize the Tops executive and sales staff and incorporate their clerical, billing and production procedures into Pickwick's headquarters in Long Island City and warehouses and offices in Los Angeles, California; Atlanta, Georgia and their European subsidiary, Pickwick International, Inc. (Great Britain) Ltd., in London, England.

Cy Leslie will act as president of the new affiliate which will be called The Kimberly Corporation.

Two years ago, Tops added the recordings of the late Eli Oberstein's estate. Fourteen lines of both firms will now be reduced to three selected from the "best selling and highest quality" material in the entire catalog.

Kimberly's sales will be under the aegis of Louis Capone and creative packaging will be supervised by Abbot Lutz, who will also continue as Product Director for Pickwick International. Both men will report directly to Leslie. A series of sales meetings, which will be attended by all Pickwick International executives, is being planned to discuss the new sales, advertising, marketing and promotional program and the releasing schedule for The Kimberly Corporation.

According to Leslie, "By streamlining the Tops operation, adding to it our depth of experienced personnel and eliminating sub-marginal sales we can retain a good portion of Tops' volume with a very small addition to overhead . . ."

Label Execs & Dealers Defend Columbia Club

NEW YORK—Further defense of the Columbia Record Club came from various label heads and dealers as hearings on the Federal Trade Commission's anti-monopoly suit against the Club continued last week. The week before, Columbia execs, including prexy Goddard Lieberman, Norman Adler, veep, and Cornelius Keating, head of Club, testified in behalf of the mail-order operation.

Don Pierce, prexy for Starday Records, testified that his company does a considerable amount of business via mail order (more than 20 percent) and that club distribution is necessary for small independent labels. When asked if he sought record club distribution, Pierce replied, "I think it represents plus business that a record manufacturer needs and I think that in the competitive field of obtaining artists and good material, it assumes importance. I think the particular type of product I make needs outlets other than the traditional record dealer."

The Starday exec also stated he is thinking of starting his own club and that Columbia is still considering distributing his label.

Decca Nat'l Sales Meet In New York This Week

NEW YORK—A national sales meet of all Decca Records' branch and division managers has been set for New York at the Hotel Astor this Fri. (24). In addition to receiving details of the label's June album promo, and future singles and album product, the managers will be introduced to the new line of Decca phonos for 1964.

Participating in the presentation from the national office will be Claude Brennan, Lou Sebok, Mike Ross and Howard Kaye. Upon completion of the national meeting, the managers will then return to their individual branches and hold meets with local sales and promo personnel prior to the introduction of the new product to dealers.

WB Bringing Distributions To Burbank In July

BURBANK, CALIF.—For the first time in five years, Warner Bros. Records will convene a meeting of all its distributors at its home offices in Burbank. Dates for the nation-wide sales convention have been set for July 21 and 22, headquarters at the Beverly Hilton Hotel. The two day convention will include meetings at WB studios, where new product and plans for the fall, and entertainment by top recording artists. The convention will also include meetings at WB studios, where distributors will meet with Warner's film and TV stars, tour the studio lot, and observe filming of new WB shows.

Hosting the convention in Burbank will be WB president John K. (Mike) Maitland and staff members Bob Summers, Joel Friedman, Joe Smith, Ed West, Lowell Frank and Jimmy Hilliard. Also participating in the presentations will be WB's east coast staff, Stan Applebaum and Monroe Glasberg, and Warner's four district sales managers, Hugh Hilliard, Arnie Thies, Dee Kilpatrick and Sid Schaffer.

Label plans to introduce several major new artists to the conventioners in July through live and filmed appearances at the sales meetings.

MATHIS TO MERCURY

NEW YORK—Johnny Mathis' new skyr affiliation is Mercury Records, according to an announcement from Helen Noga, the performer's manager. She told Cash Box that the deal, involving a long-term pact, was finalized last Wed. (15) between Irving Green, Mercury prexy, and Mort Farrer, attorney for Mathis.

The star's Mercury tie-in came as a surprise to tradesters, who saw a move by the performer to Warner Bros. Records. However, Mike Maitland, head of WB, issued a statement

late last week that the label had severed all contract negotiations, said to be at the inking stage, "as soon as it was learned that other recording companies were still being solicited."

Mathis is expected to begin cutting his first Mercury sessions sometime after July 1, the date his present pact with Columbia expires. An LP issue is planned for Sept. 1.

Additional details on the Mathis signing are due from Mercury this week.

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Dave Kapp To Keynote ARMADA Convention

NEW YORK—Dave Kapp, head of Kapp Records, will be the keynote speaker at the upcoming ARMADA convention, June 25-6, at the Eden Roc Hotel in Miami Beach, Fla.

Kapp will address the meet on "Modern Trends in the Record Business." He's also expected to touch on "pitfalls ahead" in the industry.

In another ARMADA meet development, the organization announced that a record-breaking array of label sales meets will be held in conjunction with the fifth annual distrib gathering. Most recent addition, the ninth, is Roulette, which will hold its confab on Fri. (21) morning. The other diskeries planning sales time-slots are Command (21,pm), ABC-Paramount and Jay-Gee (22), Colpix & VeeJay (23), United Artists & Atlantic (24); and Everest (27).

Plans for cocktail parties, lunches and dinners to tie-in with the sales meets are now being set by the above-named labels.

Henry To Replace Minnow At Top Post Of FCC

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Newton N. Minow is stepping down as chairman of the Federal Communications Commission on June 1, a post from which he has told the radio-TV industry a thing or two over the 28 months he has headed the agency.

Minow, who is resigning to join the Encyclopedia Britannica in Chicago, is being replaced by E. William Henry, an FCC commissioner for the past seven months, during which time he has shown himself to be a shadow, policy-wise, of Minow. Henry's vacancy will be filled by Lee Loevinger, now assistant attorney general in charge of the antitrust dept.

Minow's tenure was marked by his often expressed views that radio and TV broadcasters owed the public higher quality programming and lower quantity commercials. His censure of TV as a "vast wasteland" in a speech before the annual meet of the National Association of Broadcasters several years ago served as his sensational public introduction as head of the FCC.

Kapp To Buy Congress Assets

NEW YORK—Kapp Records will purchase all of the assets of the Congress Record Corporation as the result of an agreement effectuated under the guidance of Congress Records' legal representative Walter Hofer and the Kapp label.

The agreement calls for Kapp's purchase of all Congress master tapes, recording contracts, together with the furniture and fixtures located at Congress Record Corp., 101 West 55th St., New York City.

For the benefit of creditors, Hofer has proposed a method of liquidation that is expected to be satisfactory to all creditors concerned.

Neal Galligan, president and owner of Congress Records, and Hofer worked out the settlement plan for almost two months so that creditors could receive as large a settlement as possible.

Galligan had been a successful record executive for many years prior to his venture with Congress and during one span had as many as thirteen records on the charts in one year.

See Handelman Bid To Buy 2 Detroit Distribs

NEW YORK—The trade was rife with rumors last week that Dave Handelman, the giant Detroit rack-jobber, was making a move to buy-out two large Detroit distributorships, Arc Dist. and Jay-Kay Dist.

Both Henry Droz of Arc and John Kaplan of Jay-Kay told Cash Box at presstime last week that while negotiations had taken place, no final deal had been made. Kaplan noted that he had been approached by Handelman regarding the sale of the Arc operation about four months ago. Negotiations cooled-off, Kaplan said, but they recently resumed on a serious basis.

Handelman reactivated his Border City distrib setup several months ago, and got the MGM line in the Detroit area.

CMA Shows Off Country Sound To Sales Execs

NEW YORK—In order to help "sell" country music, the Country Music Association last week (14) presented an unusual program called "The Sound Of Country Music" before the New York Sales Executives Club at the Hotel Roosevelt, this city.

Some 1500 leaders in marketing, advertising, radio and TV attended the show which was written and produced by Joe Allison with Anita Kerr as associate producer. Gene Autry, CMA prexy, started the proceedings by delivering a speech in which he discussed in his own involvement in country music. The vet artist stated that country music is here to stay because it is an integral part of the American heritage. Autry also introduced Tex Ritter, who narrated the script and introduced the talent. The Madison Ave. execs were then treated to a first-rate Grand Ole Opry-styled show featuring appearances by Don Gibson, Sue Thompson, Leon McAuliff and the Cimarron Boys, Lester Flatt and Earl Scruggs and the Foggy Mountain Boys and the Anita Kerr Singers.

A recording of the show was made during the performance for an LP to be sent to those unable to attend. Additionally, copies of the album will be distributed by CMA to key talent buyers in radio and TV and ad agencies.

A Tennessee Walking Horse was presented as door prize to Robert Weait of the Manufacturers Box Company by Tom Fulton, prexy of the Tennessee Walking Horse Breeders Association, who contributed the prize. Weait, in turn, auctioned the horse off to Joseph D. Ardleigh, president of the SEC. Ardleigh won the horse with an undisclosed sealed bid.

Epic Names Jerry Kennedy A&R Producer In Nashville

NEW YORK—Epic Records has appointed Jerry Kennedy to the post of pop A&R producer, according to Dave Kapralik, director of pop A&R.

Kennedy moves over to Epic after two years as A&R topper for Mercury Records in Nashville, where he supervised the recordings of Rex Allen, Darryl McCall and others. In addition, he served as co-producer for diskings by Patti Page, Clyde McPhatter and Brook Benton. He has also appeared on disks as a guitarist, including dates with Elvis Presley, Ann-Margaret, Ray Stevens, Ted Taylor, Freddie Hart and Stonewall Jackson.

Kennedy will be responsible to Bob Morgan, exec producer, for the production of all country recordings for Epic. He will make his headquarters at the label's Nashville facilities and will supervise recordings by such artists as Jim & Jesse and The Virginia Boys, Jerry McCain, Bobby Helms and Shirley Ray.

Disk Sales Neared \$600 Mil In '62, Says RIAA In Annual Report

NEW YORK—Retail disk sales in 1962 were close to the \$600 million mark, an all-time high, in 1962—15% above the '61 total—the Record Industry Association of America (RIAA) has reported in its just-issued 11th annual report. Report came at the organization's annual meet last week (14) at the Plaza Hotel.

According to Henry Brief, executive secretary, exact figures will be available at the end of the month.

The RIAA cited a number of factors that led to the record-breaking sales year, including the sensational comedy LP sellers, "The First Family" by Vaughn Meader (Cadence) and Allen Sherman's "My Son the Folk Singer," and the resurgence of singles sales. The five singles certified for gold record awards by the RIAA in 1962 constituted the greatest number of singles awards since the inception of the certification program in 1958. The 42 awards total, including 37 albums, was also a new high for the association.

As for the RIAA itself, the report noted that '62 was one of the "most productive years in its history with particular stress in the legal and legislative areas, in public relations, in industry relations and in services to its members."

It was disclosed at the meet that an associate membership status had been created for manufacturer of phonos and other sound reproducing equipment. This was done, the RIAA said, to achieve closer liaison between labels and phono firms. It is felt that this meeting of the minds between the two industry groups would be more effective in the solving of engineering problems and the instituting of promo tie-ins.

The meet also ratified the standardization of annual board meets on the third Tues. in Jan. starting with 1964. This is in keeping with RIAA's fiscal policy, which is on a calendar year basis.

During '62, RIAA, the report notes, the exec committee initiated the following programs, among others: creation of a uniform RIAA gold disk award; start of quarterly sales statistics reports for pre-recorded tapes; participation with the National Federation of Music Clubs in a nationwide essay contest among school children; the re-publication of RIAA's brochure, "Your Wonderful World Of Records"; the publication of a new brochure, "This Is RIAA"; offering to members of group life and extended medical insurance programs; the authorization of an industry-wide profit and loss study; a series of regional membership conferences.

In legal and legislative activities, RIAA's efforts to combat disk counter-

feiting aided in the adoption of a Federal law, signed by President Kennedy last Oct., making it a crime to manufacture bogus disks and tapes. The organization also put in a strong protest against a proposal, never enacted, that would have imposed "a tremendous increase for our industry" in mailing costs under the fourth class educational postal rate, drafted a report dealing with anti-industry consequences resulting from the elimination of compulsory licensing, and started a full scale effort to eliminate the excise tax on disks, arguing that no tax is levied on books, newspapers, paintings, sheet music, sculpture or any of the other arts.

RIAA Committee To Look Into New AF Of M Pact

NEW YORK—The Record Industry Association of America (RIAA) is looking ahead to negotiations that will lead to a new contract between the disk industry and the American Federation of Musicians with the formation of an ad hoc committee of RIAA to review the history of past negotiations and to consider the appointment of task groups to examine procedures leading to future negotiations. Present pact between the musicians and labels expires Dec. 31.

Henry Brief, RIAA's exec secretary, told Cash Box, that the committee was the result of regional conferences by the association that suggested the initiation of procedures to ascertain what areas exist, if any, for collective discussion with the AF of M.

Brief emphasized that the task groups would be representative of all segments of the record industry, and would be open to non-RIAA members.

Wallichs Re-Elected RIAA Prexy

NEW YORK—Most of the board of directors and officers were returned to their posts in elections at last week's annual meet here of the Record Industry Association of America (RIAA) (see separate story on annual report). Glenn A. Wallichs of Capitol Records was re-elected president of the association.

The one change in the board of directors is the election of D. H. Toller-Bond of London Records, who replaces Lee Harstone, formerly of London, who left the label recently to enter the distrib field. Re-elected to the board were: Moses Asch, Irving B. Green, Goddard Lieberson, George R. Marek, Arnold Maxin, Glenn E. Wallichs, Randy Wood, and Archie Bleyer, who filled a vacancy created by the resignation of Paul Wexler.

In election of officers, Glenn E. Wallichs was re-elected president: Dave Kapp, senior veep & assistant treasurer; Sam Clark, veep; Ira Moss, veep; James Johnson, veep; John Stevenson, treasurer; Henry Brief, exec secretary; and Ernest S. Meyers, general counsel. New veep is Rose Rubin of Monitor Records, who replaces Jac Holzman, who decided not to run for office after serving for two years.

Cellar Bill Waits Subcommittee Action

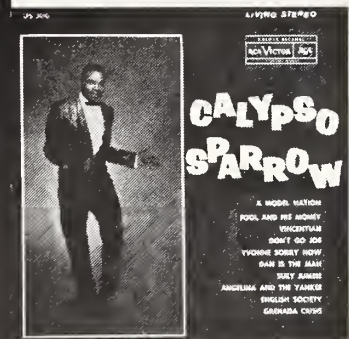
NEW YORK—As of presstime, no action had been taken by the House Subcommittee on Patents, Copyrights and Trademarks on whether to pass on to the Full Judiciary Committee the controversial Cellar Bill, which would amend the Copyright Law to fix a royalty fee on disks performed in jukeboxes. Subcommittee hearings on the Bill ended May 3, with a deadline last week for written testimony.

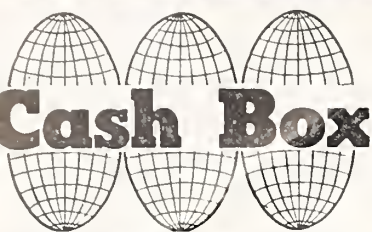

Those "Young Lovers, Paul & Paula, can have their third smasher in-a-row with this new Philips outing. It's a tale of their "First Quarrel" and it's a pretty, beat-ballad opus that's right up the teeners' alley. Excellent all-around performance on a deck that should break wide open in no time flat. Artists shuffle thru an inviting teen sentimental on the flip.

Top drawer thump-a-rhythm assist on both lids from Teacho Wiltshire.

It's a swingin', big band offering tagged "Banzai Pipeline"—which refers to a dangerous surfing beach in Hawaii. There's a beautiful moody-jazz interpretation of the Gershwin classic on the flip.

The other end, "Humpty Dumpty," sports a host of imitations (including Karloff and JFK) on a description of a new rock-a-rhythmic dance. It's a toss-up for chart honors.

Side, tagged "Tie Me Kangaroo Down, Sport," is another comical ditty that Harris previously scored with overseas. Fetching vocal-instrumental accompaniment from the Johnnie Spence crew. A 'wobble board' bubbly effect is featured in the backdrop. More amusing doings on the fast moving undercut.

"YEH-YEH!" (2:02) [Mingo BMI—Grant, Patrick]

MONGO SANTAMARIA (Battle 226)

Mongo Santamaria, who is currently riding the charts with "Watermelon Man," comes up with a potent, equally far-out jazz item in a follow-up stanza tagged "Yeh-Yeh!" The side, which is culled from the artist's click LP, is a swingin' Latin-flavored affair with a contagious, repeating riff. Tune also boasts some effective, appealing gimmick shouts. 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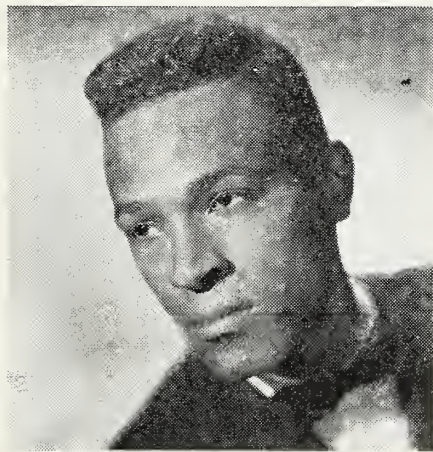

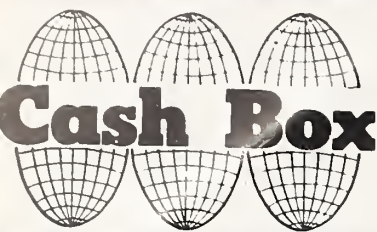

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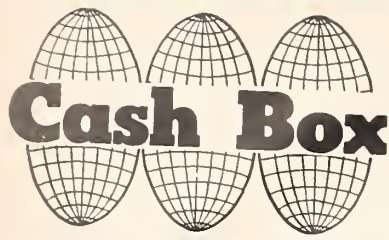

● "OUR DAY WILL COME" (2:28) [Rosewood ASCAP—Hilliard, Garson] Label's own vocal hit by Ruby & The Romantics gets the lush Bossa Nova ork treatment, which spotlights ivory artist Harnell, of "Fly Me to the Moon" BN fame. Not unlike the latter click, side could happen.

● "MY ONE & ONLY LOVE" (2:32) [Sherwin ASCAP—Mellin, Wood] Harnell & his backing dig farther into Tin Pan Alley's past for this BN outing. Also worth eyeing.

COZY COLE (Coral 65571)

● "INDIAN LOVE CALL" (Part 2) (2:21) [Harms ASCAP—Friml, Harbach, Hammerstein] The percussionist, who began the Parts 1, 2 singles craze a few years ago with his "Topsy, Part 2" hit, could have a very active entry with the second section of his infectious rock salute to the famed number from "Rose Marie." Besides Cole's drums, brass, organ and sax have a solid say.

(B) "INDIAN LOVE CALL" (Part 1) (2:20) [Harms ASCAP—Friml, Harbach, Hammerstein] Solo trumpet is spotlighted on this portion.

ROBERT FLORENCE ORCH. (Liberty 55582)

● "THEME FROM CLEOPATRA" (Antony & Cleopatra) [Robbins ASCAP—North] Main-title from the upcoming epic is very attractively styled by the string-loaded ork-chorus and solo keyboard. A fine good-music programming representation for what will surely be a strong disk item.

(B) "PAULA'S THEME" (2:32) [Leeds ASCAP—Cates] Wordless chorus heads this inviting moody from a flick called "Portrait Of A Murder."

FASINATIONS (ABC-Paramount 10443)

● "TEARS IN MY EYES" (2:07) [Curton BMI—Boswell] The Fasinations have scored in the past and they can do it again with new commercial outing. The tune is a medium-paced, shuffle-beat, pop-styled blues romancer with a contagious repeating riff. Plenty of air-play potential here.

● "YOU GONNA BE SORRY" (2:05) [Curton BMI—Mayfield] This time out the crew dishes up an interesting high-spirited, multi-dance lament with a infectious teen-angled beat. Eye it.

● "DANKE SCHOEN" (2:38) [Roosevelt BMI—Kaempfert, Allene] A softie with a smooth-sounding way. Appealing tune. Can also make chart news.

JOHNNY THUNDER (Diamond 137)

● "SCARLET O'HARA" (2:18) [Regent BMI—Lordan] The deft English combo is currently doing chart business in England with this speedy-beat stand, which has a number of original-sounding comments with American teen appeal, too. A wordless chorus is part of the excitement. Eye closely.
(B) "(Doing the) HULLY GULLY" (1:48) [Hill & Range BMI—Meehan, Rodgers] First-rate Hully Gully sound by way of England.

ALLEN REYNOLDS (RCA Victor 8190)

● "HERE COMES RAGGEDY ANN" (2:57) [Jack & Big Bopper BMI—Phipps] A well-done sad teen tale about a fella who dresses-up a raggedy Ann, but loses her to the good-life. Singer Reynolds touching stint is supported by a nice Nashville-oriented ork-chorus arrangement. Could get around.
(B) "SHE REALLY LIED" (2:31) [Jack & Big Bopper BMI—Reynolds, Lee] Good teen-drama ballad.

NICK NOBLE (Liberty 55576)

● "GEE LITTLE GIRL" (2:05) [Bourne ASCAP — Tobias, Carr] Noble has an extremely pretty, bossa nova-styled romantic offering that could make an important chart stand in the near future. Top notch assist from the Johnny Mann Singers and Ernie Freeman ork on this excellent dual-track entry.
(B) "A ROSE AND A STAR" (2:28) [Roncom ASCAP — Shuman, Bower] This end finds Nick in a tender ballad pose on a lovely item.

BILLY FRAZIER (Togo 601)

● "DID YOU EVER SEE A LASSIE?" (2:20) [Eden BMI—Williams, Stevenson] The Amy-subsid's in for a solid chart run if this thumper gets the teen-programming exposure it deserves. It's a bright jumper that Frazier and the combo-chorus carve out with lots of spirit.
(B+) "SHAKIN' IN EVERY STATE" (2:20) [Eden BMI—Stevenson] Billy (who has a Chubby Checker-like delivery) can also make news with this rockin' geographical stand.

THE TIARAS (Valiant 6030)

● "HEY SENOR" (2:31) [Sherman & DeVorzon BMI—Webber, Mitchell, Currie] Gals are an interesting vehicle for a distinctive light upbeat romantic ditty. Combo backdrop is simple, yet highly effective. Deck could step-out. Warner Bros. Records handles the label's distribution.
(B) "DON'T BELIEVE A WORD" (1:59) [Sherman & DeVorzon BMI—Chandler] A somewhat harder rock-ballad sound from the gals and their backing.

ARTHUR LEE & THE LAGS (Capitol 4980)

● "RUMBLE - STILL - SKIN" (2:22) [Beechwood BMI—Lee] Lee & his combo serve up a hard-hitting, organ-led all-instrumental offering that's chock-full of chart ingredients. Could bust thru.
● "THE NINTH WAVE" (2:42) [Beechwood BMI—Lee] Lee & Co. could make this surfin' middle beat thumper also sounds like it can make it to hitsville.

CLIFF RIVERS (Thanks! 1201)

● "MARSHA" (2:03) [Village BMI—Prosen, Rivers, Keays] Rivers could step up to the charts with his pro reading of an interesting plaintive name-song. His setting is a polished rock-a-cha affair, including femme chorus remarks. Should be eyed. Diskery is a N.Y.-based firm.
(B) "TRUE LIPS" (1:55) [Village BMI—Prosen, Rivers, Keays] Fast-moving rockin' that has Rivers doing a Presley-like vocal.

THE SURFARIS (Dot 16479)

● "WIPE OUT" (2:12) [Miraleste, Robin Hood BMI—Safaris] The Safaris, join in on the surfin' craze (naturally) with a fabulous extended drum roll instrumental pounder—that sports a comical one-line vocal opener. Strong side that can enjoy a chart berth.
● "SURFER JOE" (2:20) [Miraleste, Robin Hood BMI—Wilson] This one's a rock-a-cha-cha like novelty with lyrics that also has what it takes for stardom.

(B) "SAY WONDERFUL THINGS" (2:18) [Hill & Range BMI—Newell, Green] The oft-cut waltzer, a big English success, gets a breezy rendition from the songster and his combo-chorus back-up sound.
(B) "A WORLD OF OUR OWN" (2:39) [Music Productions ASCAP—Shanklin, Sherwood, Shane] A more intimate romantic expression from the artist.

FRANK REGA (Recall 501)

(B) "I'M SORRY" (2:36) [Robert Mellin BMI—Ram, Timpurin, White] It's good to have the old sentimental back, and Rega's fine legit reading has much appeal. Attractive full ork setting. Good-music jocks may pay lots of attention to the entry.
(B) "ALWAYS YOU (Mala Femmena)" (2:58) [Ding-Dong, Romance & Dorothy BMI—] Big-sounding Italian ballad turn.

SHEAN & JENKYNs (Crescendo 198)

(B) "DO THE COMMERCIAL" (2:20) [Neil BMI — Shean, Jenkyns] Side is a collection of bits of dialog from the most popular TV-radio commercials, which the duo offers against a sprightly teen-beat combo chore. Some laff disk value.
(B) "GOOFY-FOOTER HO-DAD" (2:15) [Neil BMI—Shean, Jenkyns] Good rock drivin' from the musicians with various vocal interjections.

RHYTHM PALS (Decca 31497)

(B) "BROKEN HEARTS & FADED DREAMS" (2:39) [Leeds ASCAP—Shaver] Fine countryish plaintive is done with a sympathetic Nashville-styled feel by the song crew, who have a smooth-voiced lead. Inviting, big-sounding country-pop entry.

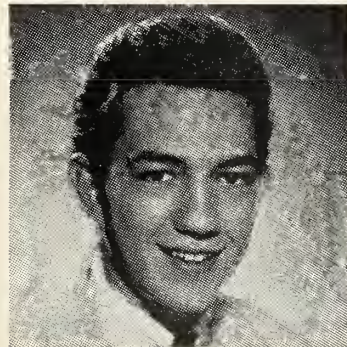

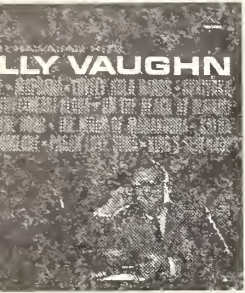

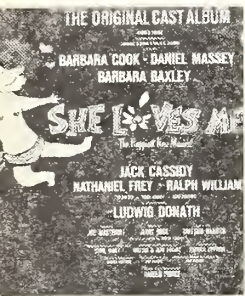

POPULAR PICKS OF THE WEEK



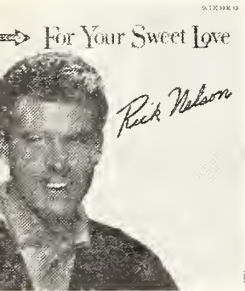
"SUKIYAKA & 11 HAWAIIAN HITS"—Billy Vaughn—Dot DLP3523

Billy Vaughn, constantly represented on the charts with his Dot LP's, should continue in the same fashion with this session tagged after a current single hit. With the addition of plenty of Hawaiian guitars, the orkster delivers a host of the most famous Island melodies in superb style. Slick sides here are "On The Beach At Waikiki," "The Moon Of Manakoora" and "Now Is The Hour."



"SHE LOVES ME"—Original Cast—MGM E 41180C-2

A sentimental confection with a Pre-War European locale is Broadway's latest musical hit. Since much of the plot development is an outgrowth of song, MGM has seen fit to cut the entire musical score in a specially-priced, 2-LP release, a move that will delight musical comedy buffs who always long for a complete musical cast LP. While there are now-and-then lapses in melody, the Sheldon Harnick-Jerry Bock score has many delightful entries, and the Harnick lyrics give the listener a charming verbal picture of the story. Standout cast, supported by choice orchestration, include Barbara Cook, Daniel Massey, Barbara Baxley, Jack Cassidy, Nathaniel Frey, Ralph Williams and Ludwig Donath.



"FOR YOUR SWEET LOVE"—Rick Nelson—Decca DL 74419

Rick Nelson tags this, his premiere Decca LP, after his recent label chart-rider of "For Your Sweet Love" and dishes up eleven other potent teen-oriented selections. The chanter's professional, wide-range voice and distinctive style carries him in good stead on winning readings of "Gypsy Woman," "One Boy Too Late" and "I Got A Woman." Disk seems sure to zoom up the hitsville path.



"RICKY NELSON MILLION SELLERS"—Imperial 9232

Here is a first-rate package of Rick Nelson-styled vocals on Imperial, all of which pulled plenty of coin when first released. The vocalist has phenomenal teenage appeal and these tunes will surely find rapid acceptance this second time around. Included here are "Travelin' Man," "I Wanna Be Loved," "Hello Mary Lou" and "You Are The Only One." Eye this one for rapid sales action.



"CALL ME IRRESPONSIBLE & THE JACK JONES HITS"—Kapp KL1328

Jack Jones, currently riding the Top 100 with his hit single, "Call Me Irresponsible," cashes in on the success of the biggie to tag this new Kapp LP outing. The songster also includes here his while-back blockbuster, "Lollipops And Roses" along with such melodic goodies as "Moonlight Becomes You" and "You Stepped Out Of A Dream." The crooner's warm, intimate delivery of these tunes should carry the LP to hitsville in short order.



"YOUNG AND IN LOVE"—Dick & DeeDee—Warner Brothers 1500

Dick and DeeDee, who recently scored with "Young And In Love," dub this WB album after the hit and include with it eleven other lyrical oldies and newies that aptly showcase their wide-range vocal talents. With a trio of hit singles to their credit, the duo could strike LP payday with this top-drawer session. Best bets here are "Guess Our Love Must Show" and "Days Of Wine And Roses." The pair's legion of fans will surely want this one.



"THEMES FOR YOUNG LOVERS"—Percy Faith—Columbia CL 2023

Percy Faith offers an impressive musical tribute to tastes of teens on this top-notch new Columbia outing boasting a bevy of current and recent chart-riders. The talented orkster has transformed the hits, via his own professional mixture of winds and horns, into a gratifying, adult experience. The band is superb form on "I Will Follow You," "The End Of The World" and "Up On The Roof." Fine fare for either dancing or listening enjoyment.



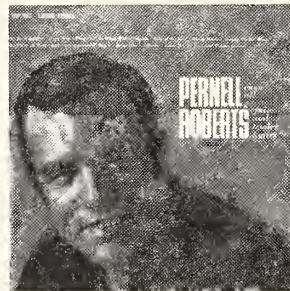
"COME ALONG WITH THE WAYFARERS"—RCA Victor LPM 2666

The Wayfarers are a new folk group which successfully couples the pop appeal of the Kingston Trio and the ethnic flavor of the Tarriers. The crew does not attempt to carbon-copy other folksingers but makes a series of distinctive, power-packed individual musical statements. The boys turn in top-flight jobs on a fine bevy of tunes including "Monday Morning," "All My Burdens" and "Take Me Out Of Pity." An impressive premiere entry.



"HITS! HITS! HITS!"—Don Costa—Columbia CL 2041

The multi-talented Don Costa successfully couples his talents for arranging and conducting on this top-drawer set of popular favorites. In addition to his ork and chorus, the musician has added the Shimmering Strings for the LP. There's plenty of exciting listening for both teens and oldsters alike as the crew offers "Can't Get Used To Losing You," "I Love Because" and "Days Of Wine And Roses."



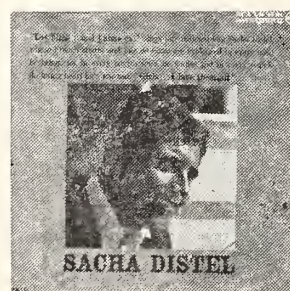
"COME ALL YE FAIR AND TENDER LADIES"—Pernel Roberts—RCA Victor LSP 2662

Thespian Pernel Roberts (he's regular on the "Bonanza" TV'er) spreads his wings as a solo chanter on this first-rate pop-folk session from Victor. Roberts has a rich, wide-range baritone voice and forceful, polished delivery aptly suited to the folk idiom. While backed by a fine chorus the artist dishes up winning readings of "The Bold Soldier," "Rake And Ramblin' Boy" and "Empty Pocket Blues."



"FLAMENCO FENOMENO"—Juan Serrano—Elektra EKL 235

Juan Serrano, who acquired quite an impressive reputation with his first Elektra LP, demonstrates the same eloquent spark on this second outing. The guitarist completely understands the flamenco idiom as he goes through his intricate musical paces with amazing virtuosity and style. Serrano shines on "Amina," "Rhumba" and "Farruca." A worthy follow-up stanza.



"SACHA DISTEL"—RCA Victor International FPM111

Sacha Distel makes a strong bid for fame on this side of the Atlantic with this Victor International set of romantic ballads. The French chanter has a sure-fire vocal charm and a sensitive delivery that should gain him plenty of acceptance here. The songster is at his very best on "Cetait plus fort que tout," "Caterina" and "Que c'est bon."



"FAVORITE YIDDISH SONGS"—Martha Schlamme—MGM E4122

Martha Schlamme sings fourteen traditional Yiddish folk songs on this new set from MGM. The Viennese thrush has a clear and lyrical soprano voice and a genuine feeling for the songs here. The folk idiom proves to be a natural for the songstress as she feelingly reads "Tumbalalaika," "An Alte Kashe" and "Schlaff, Schlaff, Schlaff." Folk fans will find plenty of enjoyable listening here.

"THIS LAND IS YOUR LAND"—The Raftsmen—RCA Camden CAL 757

Proof-positive of the international merits of folk music is this album spotlighting the talents of the Raftsmen, a Canadian group, reading a fine sampling of traditional American folk standards with feeling and verve. The trio which utilizes guitar, banjo and drum, turns in standout performances on "This Is Your Land," "Shenandoah," and "Last Night I Had The Strangest Dream." Loads of potential.

GURLY FOX TEXAS RUBY



HIGH FIDELITY

"CURLY FOX AND TEXAS RUBY"—Starday SLP 235

Curly Fox and his spouse, the late Texas Ruby, team up in fine fashion on this excellent Starday entry of traditional country songs. Both artists display their expected warm, ethnic folksy approach to all the bluegrass-styled items here. Among the best tracks here are "The Old Grey Mule," "The Front Door Key" and "I Don't Love Nobody."



"COME DANCE WITH ME"—Sammy Kaye—Decca DL 4357

In his never ending quest to come up with something fresh, Sammy Kaye has enlisted the talents of ace arranger Charles Albertine for this easy-going Decca entry. The traditional swing and sway approach is perfectly coupled with Albertine's polished, slick arrangements. Most of the selections here fall into an extremely danceable fox trot beat. All of the orkster's legion of fans should dig his first-rate readings of "Till There Was You," "I Left My Heart In San Francisco" and "This Can't Be Love."



"LLOYD ELLIOTT & HIS TROMBONE"—Ava A18

The West Coast trombonist comes up with a very danceable program of big band-styled pop tunes on Ava. The album features Elliott Lloyd playing 10 trombones, over-dubbed to create an ensemble sound. Geared especially for adult dancing and listening pleasure, the instrumentalist gives some very professional readings of such oldies as "The Trolley Song," "Anything Goes," "Steppin' Out With My Baby" and "The Continental."



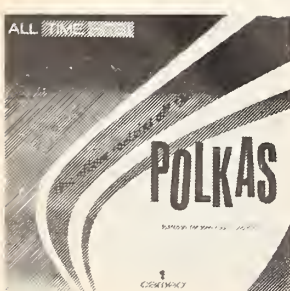
"FIESTA EN MEXICO"—Mariachi Miguel Dias—Audio Fidelity AFSD5816

The Mariachis (Mexico's roving minstrels) of Miguel Dias play fourteen of their native folk songs on this session from Audio Fidelity. The music is a aged blending of Indian, Aztec and Spanish with a bit of French at times. Dias plays some of the classics of the Mariachis which include "La Bamba," "Tres Dias," "El Rancho Grande" and "Las Mananitas."



"FOLK MUSIC & SONGS FROM THE MIDDLE EAST"—Philips PHS 600 063

It is often forgotten in today's competitive folk market that every country and area has its own rich folk heritage. This interesting, off-beat set is based on patterns of ancient Greece and Persia utilizing 500 scales. Although the songs here might sound a little strange to Western ears, the excitement generated by the native groups transcends geographical boundaries. Outstanding tracks include "Ya Hdein," "Abu Mash'al" and "Maria."



"POLKAS"—John Loleski—Cameo C1048

Polkas with a variety of international flavors are played with enthusiasm and authenticity by the orchestra of John Koleski on this set from Cameo. Polkas from the Ukraine, Poland, and America are delivered in a spritely manner by the band. Happy sides here are "Who Stoke The Keeshka," "Heel And Toe Polka," and the "Krakowska Polka." Lots of polka fun to be had here.

JAZZ PICKS OF THE WEEK



"GERRY MULLIGAN '63"—Verve V8515

Gerry Mulligan leads the Concert Jazz Band in this Verve session aimed at the listening pleasure of jazz buffs everywhere. Lots of musicianship here in a band that includes the names of some of the best in the business. Mulligan shines in the solo spotlight on the baritone sax, piano and clarinet. Some tasty tracks here are "Big City Blues," "My Kind Of Love" and "Bridgehampton Strut."



"A DIFFERENT JOURNEY"—Chico Hamilton Quintet—Reprise R 6078

Chico Hamilton has earned many laurels in the past for his distinctive musical stylings and this new Reprise outing ranks as one of his most impressive sets in recent years. On this session the drummer makes a departure from his previous impressionistic wailings and offers some top-flight lyrical, sensual sounds. Best tracks here include "Sun Yen Sen," "Voice In The Night" and "A Different Journey." All of the artist's many fans should come out in droves for the set.



"PONY'S EXPRESS"—Pony Poindexter—Epic LA 16035

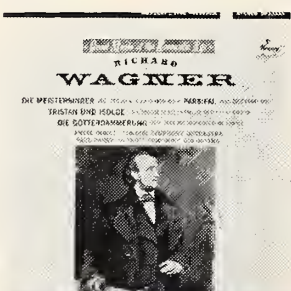
Alto saxist Pony Poindexter unleashes his potent, hard-driving musical talents full-blast on this, his first Epic album. The jazzman has a distinctive lyrical, soulful style and a swingin' delivery. While backed by a first-rate sax combo, Poindexter wails in the modern jazz idiom on "Salt Peanuts," "Blue" and "Basin Street Blues." Plenty of superior listening enjoyment here.



"KING PLEASURE—MR. JAZZ"—United Artist 15012

King Pleasure gives some jumping, jazz treatments to a bag of standards and originals on this new UA vocal romp. The chanter's delivery is highly stylized and the melody soon becomes lost in his own self-expression. Launching the session with the oldie, "I'm In The Mood For Love," the singer effectively essays "Mean To Me" and "It Might As Well Be Spring."

CLASSICAL PICK OF THE WEEK



WAGNER: Excerpts From Die Meistersinger, Parsifal, Tristan Und Isolde & Die Gotterdammerung—London Symphony & Detroit Symphony—Mercury SR90333

The London Symphony Orchestra with Antal Dorati conducting, and the Detroit Symphony with Paul Paray conducting perform excerpts from the operas of Richard Wagner. This excellent program includes the Prelude to Meistersinger, Good Friday Spell from Parsifal, Liebestod from Tristan and Dawn and Siegfried's Rhine Journey from Gotterdammerung. The LP is another in Mercury's Great Music of the Romantic Age series.



HAYDN: Symphonies 88 and 98, Berlin Philharmonic, Eugen Jochum-Conductor—Deutsche Grammophon SLP138 823

The two symphonies performed here by the Berlin Philharmonic with Eugen Jochum at the helm and Wolfgang Meyer at the harpsichord, represent the apex of the composer's art as a symphonic constructor. The 88th, lilting and frivolous, and the 98th more somber and contemplative are sensitively and expertly interpreted by the maestro. This DG set is a potent classical entry with strong appeal for classical devotees.

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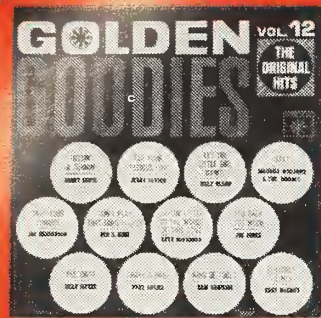
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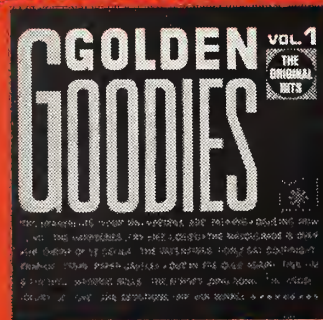
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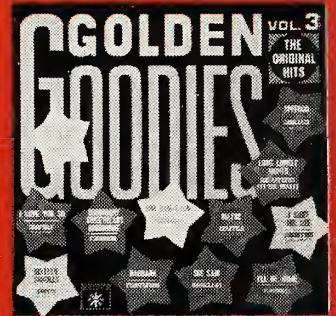
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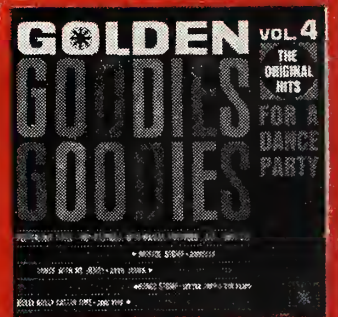

Tom Wilson To Col. In Pop A&R Slot



NEW YORK—Tom Wilson, jazz-folk-gospel producer, has been named a pop A&R producer a Columbia Records.

One of the first assignments for Wilson, formerly associated with the Dauntless label of Audio Fidelity Records, will be to act as producer for the recordings made at the hot gospel nitery in New York, "The Sweet Chariot," recordings at which are being made exclusively by Columbia (see story in last week's issue).

Most of Wilson's activities will be concentrated on the production of jazz, folk and gospel products and in the development of new artists in these areas.

Wilson has been developing and cutting jazz, folk and gospel artists since 1954, when he received his A.B. degree from Harvard Univ. At Transition Records, which he founded, he was responsible for sessions by Odetta, Cecil Taylor and Curtis Fuller; also he recorded such artists as John Coltrane and "Cannonball" Adderley. He has also been a producer for the United Artists and Savoy labels. For AF's Dauntless tag, he cut such performers as Teri Thornton, Sal Salvador and Walt Dickerson.

Epic Is Now U.S. Outlet For Cliff Richard Diskings

NEW YORK—Cliff Richard, stand-out disk attraction in England and the continent, will have his future singles and LP product released in the U.S. by Epic Records.

Under terms of an agreement between Epic and Electronic Music Industries, Inc. (EMI), the diskery will release all Richard diskings, as well as any he cuts in the U.S.

Product by the performer has been previously available in the U.S. from ABC-Paramount Records and Bigtop Records.

Richard has been awarded two gold disks for sales exceeding one million copies of each of two singles and 14 silver disks for sales exceeding 250,000 copies of singles. He has also won such awards as Top British Male Singer, Most Popular Film Star & TV Personality of the Year, among other show biz honors.

His fourth flick, "Summer Holiday," is a current success in England and Canada, and is due for release in the U.S. this fall.

Arrangements for the agreement were negotiated by Nat Shapiro, director of international A&R and creative services, attorney Paul Marshall, representing EMI and Ronald Rennie of EMI.

Inking of Richard is a further result of the label's drive to expose international artists to American audiences. Recent pacts in this area include Rolf Harris, and Helen Shapiro.

Atlantic & Atco's Charles-Darin Program Puts \$1/2 Million In Till

NEW YORK—The Atlantic & Atco labels did more than \$1/2 million business during its just-completed Ray Charles-Bobby Darin LP program, Neshui Ertogun, veep, reported last week.

Final tabulation was viewed as being particularly significant since the figure represents the attraction of only two performers, who built-up a large catalog for the labels before they left for other diskery affiliations.

During the term of the program, which ended May 10, an extension of an original April 28 termination date, distribs and dealers were offered one free LP for every two purchased.

In discussing the outcome of the program, Len Sachs, Director of Album Sales and Merchandising for Atlantic and Atco, attributed the success to the "tremendous" cooperation of distribs and retailers. Sachs stated, "Those dealers, racks, and discounters who put forth a strong promotional effort obtained excellent results with the program, despite generally poor business conditions that prevailed in the past five weeks. Intelligent use of radio and newspaper advertising and strong in-store promotions were key factors in attracting consumer attention to the Charles—Darin product on the Atlantic and Atco labels."

Various merchandising aids were made available to dealers as well as salesmen to back up the sales programs. Display units, divider cards, special order forms, etc., were all used extensively. Special ad mats were supplied to distribs and dealers and were subsequently used in many key newspapers throughout the country.

During the period of the Charles—Darin programs, all Atlantic and Atco LPs were offered to distributors at a 15% discount. The stronger selling albums from the two catalogs were: "Up On The Roof" by The Drifters, Hank Crawford's "From The Heart," "Do The Bossa Nova With Herbie Mann" and "Herbie Mann At The Village Gate," "The Comedy" and "Lonely Woman" by the Modern Jazz Quartet, which all appear on the Atlantic label. On Atco, the best-sellers were: "Alley Cat" by Bent Fabric, one of the nation's best-selling LPs and which still remains on the best-selling charts after 54 weeks. Mr. Acker Bilk's "Stranger On The Shore" and "Only You," as well as albums by The Coasters and Ben E. King also sold well, the label said.

Foley Pubbery Setup New Tenant In Brill Bldg.

NEW YORK—Norm Foley's recently-formed pubbery operations, Reliance Music & Stride Music, have moved into the Brill Building at 1619 Broadway, this city. Foley, who served as general professional manager of the Big 3 for 14 years, said he had concluded a deal involving a number of copyrights out of several Milton Kellem music firms, including "Gonna Get Along Without Ya Now," "Kissin' Time," "Lock Up Your Heart" and others.

Decca Deal On Grant LP's

NEW YORK—Decca Records has a special dealer incentive plan for Earl Grant from May 20 through May 31. Deal involves the artist's 12 LP's, including a new set tagged "Yes Sirree," named after his recent singles outing. Details on the program are available through local Decca branches.

Larry Stewart To New Creative Post At Victor

NEW YORK—Larry Stewart, a name and voice known to millions in the big band era of the late '40s, has joined RCA Victor Records as manager of creative planning—a new post—it was announced last week by Ben Rosner, manager of A&R.

Rosner stated that in his new position Stewart will be responsible for the conception and planning of new ideas for albums for Victor artists and that he will aid in the coordination of creative activities between RCA Victor offices in New York, Los Angeles and Nashville.

Stewart, who will office in New York and report to Rosner, brings a varied experience in the entertainment world to this newly instituted department at the label. He has had a long career as a singer, actor, writer-producer in TV and radio, and disk jockey. Primarily remembered as the vocalist who replaced Dick Haymes with the Tommy Dorsey band, Stewart has also sung and recorded with the big name orchestras of Ray Noble, Leo Reisman and Freddy Martin. As a solo performer, he has played engagements in most of the top nightclubs and theatres throughout the country, and, while under contract to both Republic and RKO studios, he appeared in several films as a singer and actor.

On Broadway, Stewart has been seen and heard playing leading roles in "Finian's Rainbow," "Lend An Ear" and "Gentlemen Prefer Blondes" among others. He has written, produced and starred on his own local TV show, worked as a disk jockey, written songs, sketches and special material for a host of acts and performers and served as associate producer on TV shows for Goodson and Todman and Don Feddersen Productions.

In recent years, Stewart has added to his administrative background by devoting much of his time to management consultant work.

2 LP's Give Argo Entry Into Pop-Folk Area

CHICAGO—Argo Records moves into the pop-folk field this month with the release of two packages.

They are: "I'm On My Way" with young Chicagoan Willie Wright, active on the Windy City folk scene for the past several years, and "The Campus Singers At The Fickle Pickle," featuring Ted Kistler and Jim Brignall, who were cut at a Chicago coffee house. Both LP's were produced by Argo A&R man Esmond Edwards.

Argo, a part of the Chess-Checker-Argo operation, is already a major jazz outlet.

NEW YORK—The personal triumph of Vivien Leigh in the musical "Tovarich" has gotten the musical a related original-cast label—Capitol records.

The musical opened on Broadway Mar. 18 to cool notices from the critics, who, however, had nothing but cheers for the flick star's initial appearance in a Broadway song-and-dancer (she won a Tony award as the best femme star in a musical).

Her performance has helped keep the show running at a lively box-office pace, with weekly grosses reportedly averaging from \$50,000-100,000.

In announcing the acquisition of the cast LP, Alan W. Livingston, executive, said:

"Despite the not-altogether-kind critical notices, 'Tovarich' has proved to be one of the top box-office attractions on Broadway, and record dealers throughout the East have received countless inquiries from the public about the availability of an original-cast album . . ."

The LP was set to be cut last Sun. (19) by Si Rudy, Capitol's eastern A&R executive, producing. Livingston said that the album would be issued "at the earliest possible date."

Musial Tells Kids Batting Art In Victor Premium LP



NEW YORK—Stan Musial, the baseball great, goes to bat on an RCA Victor premium LP with a how-to-hit slant for youngsters. Album, tagged "Stan-The Man's Hit Record," is being distributed through Phillips 66 service stations throughout the U. S. It's obtained by mailing a dollar in a coupon-envelope — available at all Phillips 66 service stations—to a special distribution center. Robert Clarkson, sales head of the label's premium dept., said that several hundred thousand copies have been pressed by Victor to date.

An accompanying brochure of instructions provides 22 action pictures of the star especially taken to be keyed to the record. Musial is aided on the disk by Joe Garagiola, former major league catcher and now a sports commentator.

Label Execs & Dealers Defend Columbia Club

David Kapp, president of Kapp records remarked that he refused offers by the Diner's Record Club and eventually went with the Columbia Club after the club agreed to give him complete catalog representation. Kapp testified that his association with the club has been very profitable and that the club reaches markets he could never hope to reach through normal channels. Club affiliation enabled the diskery to afford new projects, secure better artists and indulge in more esoteric activities.

Representing the dealers at last week's hearings were Milan Dunlap from Oklahoma City, Eliot Leonard of the Harvard Cooperative Society, George Prince of Doubleday Book Stores, and Benjamin Karol of King Karol on W. 42nd Street in NYC. All of these dealers admitted that their sales had increased over the past few years and that in many instances they reaped the benefits to be gained from the Columbia Record Club's extensive advertising campaigns which brought traffic into their shops.

Dunlap said he gained from impulse buying from club members who came into his store. Leonard said he got some business from former club members and that disks sold through the club sold just as well in the Harvard Coop. Prince remarked that if anything, the club had helped his business. Columbia's practice of advertising other labels side by side exposed a great deal of merchandise. Benjamin Karol said all of the artists distributed through the Columbia Club, regardless of label, sold excellently in his shop, and in some instances the club increased his sales.

Bertrand B. Iden, owner of Lowe's Record Stores in Chicago, said the club neither helped nor harmed his business and that he could compete with the club pricewise.

Csida Reactivates Show Biz Interests

NEW YORK — Joe Csida has announced the reactivation and expansion of his music-record-showbusiness activities following the sale of his music publishing enterprises to Bobby Darin last Feb.

Csida is reactivating his basic tripartite operation of music publishing, talent management and record production and expanding these in three major areas.

The first expansion area is that of facilities. For the first time in its operations, Csida's organization will represent a new, modern record pressing plant in the Eastern territories, notably, of course, in New York. Csida's first client in this phase of his operations is the Standard Record Pressing Company, Inc. of 415 Fourth Avenue South in Nashville. The plant, occupying 17,000 square feet of space, began operations last week (17), and will have an immediate capacity of between eight and ten million records per year. Studio president is J. D. Tyner, a Nashville businessman.

The second area of expansion in which Csida is moving is that of a specialized record service. He has organized a new firm called Record Representation, Inc. Its purpose is to represent personalities, producers, writers, and even other talent managers in the area of their record activities only. In this phase of his operations Csida is representing seven new clients, among whom are The Kingston Trio. Csida assists the Trio's long time manager, Frank Werber, in the recording areas only, and has no connection with any other phase of the Trio's activities. Record Representation, Inc. also represents comedian Phil Leeds, who had the feature part of William Morris in the Broadway musical, "Sophie"; writer Herb Hartig; folk singer and writer Mark Spoelstra.

The third area of expansion of the Csida operations embraces a service for accounts in foreign countries. Negotiations for the first of what will be a number of international representations are now in progress.

All the foregoing, of course, are in addition to Csida's basic music publishing, talent management and record producing operations. Csida's BMI firm (which he owns with Eddy Arnold), Davidson County Music, Inc., has hired Paul Wyatt as professional manager in Nashville. An ASCAP firm is being organized. The talent management operation continues to represent Eddy Arnold, and well known New York radio-tv personality Jim Lowe. And the record producing wing has sessions scheduled with several producers.

Csida has just signed a lease on the space at 101 West 55th Street, formerly occupied by his Trinity, Towne and other operations. The space is being vacated by the new Bobby Darin TM, Inc. firm, of which Csida's ex-partner is general manager. Csida said he's seeking key personnel for certain phases of his new operations.

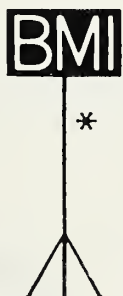

MRIA Elects New Prexy

NEW YORK—The new president of the Magnetic Recording Industry Association is W. G. Paradis, veep and general manager of the radio products division of Warwick Manufacturing Corp., Niles, Ill. He replaces Columbia Records' veep Bill Gallagher.

Active in the tape field for many years, Paradis joined Warwick, a private label manufacturer making tape recorders, radios and phonos primarily under the trade-name Silvertone, last year. He came to Warwick from Webcor, where he had been veep of engineering and manufacturing.

WB 2-LP Issue
In Europe Only

BURBANK, CALIF.—As part of a special experiment in foreign marketing, Warner Bros. Records will release through Teldec/West Germany, licensee of Warner Bros. Records, two LP's previously unreleased in the US and especially geared for the foreign market.

Teldec will issue two 12" LP's within the next four weeks; one featuring the combined artistry of pianist Buddy Cole with jazz violinist Sven Asmussen. They will be featured in a series of originals and standard songs especially suitable for the European market. The other spotlights John Buck, who has had success in Germany, Switzerland, and Austria in particular with his recordings of "Jalisco," "Chi Chi," "Egal-Okay," "Copenhagen Carousel," etc.

All WB distribus internationally will be able to draw on the Teldec supply for local release to test reaction before they press the identical records in their own territories.

"This is a special experiment that we are attempting so that we may sell more product by these artists, who are particularly strong overseas," said Robert Weiss, WB's international director.

NEW YORK—Riverside Records has launched a spring sales and promo campaign on exclusive artist Charlie Byrd which is scheduled to run through June 10.

Highlighting the 2 for 10 deal will be a new album by the hot selling guitarist titled, "Once More, Charlie Byrd's Bossa Nova." The LP, which follows up Byrd's hit single, "Meditation," and his album, "Bossa Nova, Pelos Passaros," features the Charlie Byrd Trio augmented by bossa nova rhythm section and strings.

Dealers and distributors will receive two free on every ten LP's ordered on this new release as well as eight other Byrd albums in the Riverside catalog. LP's being offered are: "Once More, Charlie Byrd's Bossa Nova," "Bossa Nova Pelos Passaros," "Blues Sonata," "Charlie Byrd At The Village Vanguard," "The Guitar Artistry Of Charlie Byrd," "Mr. Guitar," "Byrd In The Wind," "Byrd's Word," and "Latin Impressions." Six of these albums are being made available for the first time on the Riverside label.

Point of sale material being provided for dealers includes window streamers, easels and other displays, envelope stuffers and counter throw-aways. Salesmen will receive Charlie Byrd sales kits, slick books and illustrated order pads.

Riverside will also run a national window display contest in conjunction with the program. First prize of a \$100 savings bond will go to dealer with the best window nationally. The salesman servicing the winning account will also receive a \$100 bond. Second and third prizes of \$50 and \$25 bonds will go to runners-up and their salesmen.

The label has also timed the release of Byrd's new bossa nova single, "Softly," to hit the airwaves while the deal is running.

20th Century Fox Now

NEW YORK—20th-Fox Records has adopted the full name of its parent company and will hereafter be known as 20th Century-Fox Records.

Label topper Norm Weiser stated the name change was intended for "closer identification with 20th Century-Fox, which has the value of world-wide identity."

A new logo trademark, currently being designed, will first appear on the "Cleopatra" soundtrack album, which 20th Century-Fox Records will release world-wide on its own label.

The record firm moved last week to the home office of the parent company at 444 West 56th Street, New York from its former quarters at 1721 Broadway. This is designed to effect better liaison with the parent, and the broader use of the many facilities it offers.

More than 100,000 copies of the album have been pre-sold to distributors, for which the record company has received advance cash payment amounting to \$250,000.

Joy Inks 2 To Roster

NEW YORK—Joy Records has inked two artists to its roster, one of them a direct result of the label's big hit, "Band of Gold" by James Gilreath.

Label received various inquiries on the man behind the trumpet on the Gilreath date, leading to an inking of the performer, John Mahalic, who will appear on Joy's Select subsid. His initial sides are "Red Wing" and "Cottonfields."

Second artist, also signed to Select, is Bobby Woods, a singer-pianist-cleffer-arranger and combo head. His first singles offering is "I Still Hurt (Just the Same)" and "You're Gonna See."

London Singles Changes

NEW YORK—London Records has announced changes regarding two recent singles releases.

A Mantovani effort has been mislabeled "A Home in the Meadow (Theme from 'How the West Was Won')," adapted & arranged by Robert E. Dolan. Actually, contents of the cut is another arrangement of "Greensleeves," from which "Home" was taken. Diskery has scrapped all copies of the Ted Heath single, "Theme for Cleopatra" and "Mirage." Coupling is being withdrawn and a new version will be sent out shortly.

Crewe Bows Own Label

NEW YORK—Bob Crewe, major indie disk producer, has formed his own label, Vivid Records, which will be nationally distributed by Independent Producers Group, this city, recently formed by Sid Parnes.

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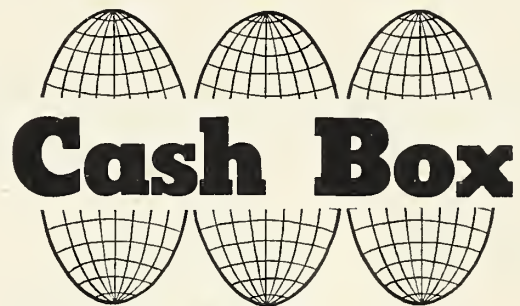

Freedom Will Ring On June LP From Colpix

NEW YORK—Colpix Records has scheduled a June release for "Let Freedom Ring!," an album which features Fredric March narrating the Declaration of Independence and identifying famous bells and carillons across the nation and Burgess Meredith reading the Bill of Rights. The disk was conceived as a result of the efforts of Eric Sloane and Eric Hatch to revive the pre-Civil War custom of ringing bells in celebration of Independence Day. Hatch is a meteorologist and an expert on early American barns, covered bridges and tools. Sloane is a writer.

Their activities in creating nationwide interest in ringing bells on the Fourth of July led to Connecticut's Senator Ribicoff's sponsoring a resolution in the senate that would have the congress declare that the anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence be observed each year by the ringing of bells throughout the United States. The bells would be rung at two P. M. (eastern daylight time), the hour that the Liberty Bell was rung in Philadelphia 187 years ago. The resolution also asks civic and community leaders to take steps to foster public participation in this observance.

There is much support for Ribicoff's resolution. Many governors and senators have pledged their support to join in a cross-country tolling of bells on the Fourth of July.

Jack Lewis, a&r director for Colpix and a team of audio engineers left New York last week to record bells of historical significance and other famous bells in several states. The trip will extend through May 28 and will cover over 7,000 miles. Lewis and his party will travel in a special station wagon which will carry a sign that reads, "Wherever this automobile goes, 'Let Freedom Ring!' is being recorded, commemorating the revival of an early American custom—the ringing of the bells and the reading of the Declaration of Independence on the Fourth of July, 1776-1963."

Among the bells to be recorded by Lewis are the Paul Revere Bell in King's Chapel, Boston; Ship's Bell on Old Ironsides in the Boston Navy Yard; a duplicate of the Williamsburgh Town Crier Bell in East Hampton, Connecticut; an exact duplicate of the Liberty Bell in Hartford, Connecticut; the West Point Chime of Bells; St. Patrick's Cathedral Chimes and the Riverside Church Chimes in New York City; the Liberty Bell and the Independence Hall Bell in Philadelphia; the U. S. Naval Academy Carillon in Annapolis; the Kirk-in-the-Hills, the Hills, largest Carillon in the world at Bloomfield Hills, Michigan; bells at St. Michael's Episcopal Church in Charleston, South Carolina and various bells at colleges and in civic buildings and churches across the country.

A parchment scroll will be left at each locale on the date that bells are recorded there. The scroll will be given to those who contribute their services in helping to have the sounds recorded. The certificate bears the signatures of Jack Lewis, director of the "Let Freedom Ring!" LP. Jerry Baker, general manager of Colpix, and Burgess Meredith who is producing the album. The scroll reads, "In a sincere gesture of appreciation for your contribution in the creation of this commemorative recording, titled 'Let Freedom Ring!,' commemorating the revival of an early American custom—the ringing of bells and the reading of the Declaration of Independence on the Fourth of July, 1776-1963."

Services of bell ringing ceremonies at Independence Hall in Philadelphia will be the focal point of this year's Fourth of July celebrations. The event will be televised and carried on radio. Many radio stations will play bell excerpts from the Colpix records precisely at two o'clock on Independence Day. Many national magazines are planning to do articles on the Colpix LP, and there have been requests from patriotic organizations and stores all over the country for copies of "Let Freedom Ring!"

Pye Fete Officially Debuts New Studios

LONDON—Pye Records held a celebration party over the weekend of May 11-12 to mark the official opening of its new recording studios at ATV House, Marble Arch, W.1. Built to Pye's own specifications the studios have been equipped with £20,000 worth of the most modern equipment available from Great Britain, the United States and Europe, all of which is exclusive in Britain to Pye Records.

Although just officially opened, the studios have been active since January, and American artist Bobby Rydell cut his first British titles here the first of which "Forget Him" has already been released by Pye on the Cameo-Parkway label. More recently, the voice of Sammy Davis Jr. has been heard reverberating round the studio walls cutting his first British LP "Sammy Davis Jr. Salutes The London Palladium," which Pye Records hopes to issue in June on Reprise.

The studios are also available for custom working and facilities offered include mobile recording, disc cutting, tape editing and dubbing, disc processing pressing etc.

Johnny Williams Up For Emmy As Cleffer

HOLLYWOOD — Johnny Williams, whose conducting and piano playing have been featured on Columbia albums and singles, is up for a TV Emmy nomination for his third talent: composing.

Williams is the first Columbia artist to be nominated for an Emmy Award and this is the second consecutive year he has received the nod for the Alcoa Presents Series.

The 31-year old musician is the youngest TV composer in Hollywood. He began writing for TV at 25 with his first assignment being M Squad for Revue, where he is currently the musical director.

During the past two years, Williams has composed 60 original scores for the Alcoa series, ranging from classical to jazz moods. His pen has written scores for "Bachelor Father," "Checkmate," "Playhouse 90," "Wells Fargo," "Wagon Train" and "GE Theater." His "Checkmate" score was released as a Columbia album.

Williams has been with Columbia three years during which time he has accompanied Mahalia Jackson, Frankie Laine, Vic Damone and is currently collaborating with Andre Previn on two albums.

He is currently represented with a single, "Augie's Great Piano" backed with "The Black Knight."

Walt Breeland types that great things are coming up for country music in the near future. Walt infers that the trade will love them "together." He states that the trials and tribulations of the aspiring country singer-writer have never been told so quickly and thoroughly as in Eddie Noack's Riviera release, "When I Get To Nashville." Deejays needing copies can have same by writing on their station letterheads to Breeland at 8618 Anacortes St., Houston 17, Texas.

Tunesmith Fred Zak, reports enthusiastic local response to his latest composition, "Should I Start Telling You," which is out on the Riccio label.

Just received word that Jolly Joyce has set an exclusive booking arrangement with Jim Denny Artists Bureau for the booking of all his artists outside the U. S.

Country stations have always claimed the most loyal of all radio audiences and that their listeners tune to no other stations. Last week, the first proof materialized in the form of a Pulse study in Texas commissioned by Jack Masla Company rep firm, KCUL-Dallas, for example, has 96 percent exclusive audience. The fall-1962 Pulse reports revealed that these listeners never tune in other outlets. The habit pattern is contrasted in the same market with non-country stations, one of which has an exclusivity factor of 38 percent,

another of 42 percent. Of the rough 60 percent of the latter's audience who do not listen elsewhere, significant only one percent tune in KCUL. Beyond the implication that advertisers in Texas have to buy more than one station in each market to reach maximum audience, the survey indicates that country stations like KCUL are a necessary element in agency schedule planning.

Rendezvous in May just left Germany, and a wonderful time was had by all. Rendezvous in May is the name of the first big international pop music tour to reach this country, and full houses in the 8 cities visited in Germany, Austria and Switzerland even with high admission prices showed that this country is ready and willing to pay good prices for a talent filled program.

The show opened in Munich with a press conference and performance that saw Robertino, the young teenager from Denmark who sings in Italian bring down the house with his fine voice and stage presence. Robertino is a top record seller here for the Austroton-Triola-Elite Special firm.

Second on the show was Nana Mouskouri, who sang in German and Greek and already has a million seller to her credit here. The third act was the Trio San Jose which has racked up top record sales with its Spanish songs and also enjoyed top popularity from the public on this tour. The first half closer was Helen Shapiro making her first German tour. She enchanted the audience with her top hits in German and English. The second half opened with comedian Heinz Erhardt, a top favorite for years here, and he was followed by Josephine Baker, who charmed the audience with a middle of the act costume change, French chansons and German popular melodies. She was followed by the rock and roll teenage group Jerry Williams and the Violents, a top Swedish group who gave a well timed performance, and the show closer was Pat Boone, who sang in English and German and also brought down the house.

After the show was over, we had dinner with Alan Paramor, Helen Shapiro and her mother. Helen has been to Germany before for TV shots and 2 record dates and she plans on doing more work here and more records. She enjoyed top sales on her first two releases here, and Electrola A&R chief Heinz Gietz has said that she is the most promising foreign performer with Electrola here.

Gus Backus is excited about the first MGM record of "Big Willie Broke Jail Tonight," which picked up a Cash Box Best Bet and is getting good reaction stateside. Gus is absolutely the top selling teenage artist here and he is anxious to make a success of his America singing records as well. Gus broke the million mark a few years back as the lead singer with the Del Vikings and "Come Go With Me" and also saw action with his "Wooden Heart" waxing, which was distributed in the U.S. by Smash Records. He flew to Nashville for his first MGM date, and A&R man Danny Davis sees a big career in the making for the young American who made good in "Old Germany."

Peter Rebhuhn of Rolf Budde Music reports that Jacqueline Boyer has recorded a new German composition from Fred Oldord called "Mon Cher Robert" for Electrola. The firm is also getting ready for the big push on the Oscar winning song "Days Of Wine And Roses" as the film starts here in June.

The publishing house is furthermore working on new German waxings by The Missouriis, The Key Brothers and Lale Anderson and "77 Sunset Strip" by Kid Burbank as well as American smash hits "Puff" from Peter, Paul And Mary, "You Don't Love Me Anymore" from Rick Nelson and the different English versions of "Days Of Wine And Roses."

Dieter Heck of Marbot Music is working hard on the German version of "Your Nose Is Gonna Grow" by Dorthie on Metronome.

Karl Breuer from Sikorski Music reports hard work on the new platter by Korean lass Li Li Fa on Metronome of the German tune "Say It With Flowers."

Ralph Maria Siegel reports that his Jupiter label is jumping with two top versions of the Eurovision winner "Danseuse" by Renee Franke and an instrumental version by Roy Etzel.

Pat Boone, who just finished his first German tour, has also recorded his first German record. He has waxed a German version of two oldies "Love Letters In The Sand" and "Don't Forbid Me" and plans to do more recordings in the near future in German.

Teldec is also planning recordings in German for Rita Pavone from Italy. The top brass from Ariola including the President of Bertelsmann Reinhard Mohn and Ariola Director Rudolf Engleder are flying to the East Asia for a look at the markets there. They will visit Bangkok, Hong Kong and Tokyo.

In Tokyo, Mr. Engleder will meet with Takao Yanai, the Managing Director of Ariola distributing firm, King Records for talks. King has done a fine job for the label which is also releasing a great deal of the classical material available under the new Eurodisc label. Japan has also shown great interest in the documentary production and is planning a Japanese version of the LP "Germany In The 2nd World War." Mr. Engleder will also be working on preparations for the appearance of Eurodisc artist Erika Koeth, who will appear on Japanese TV in October, and will follow with personal appearances.

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ITALY

Top news of the week concerns Renato Rascel. This actor, singer and composer (among the numerous songs he penned are "Arrivederci Roma" and "Romantica") left Italy for one year stay in London, where he will present his latest musical production "Enrico 61." The cast of this musical show is composed by English actors, excluding Rascel himself, who is the protagonist of the comedy. We received this news directly from the publishing group Messaggerie Musicali, being Renato's publishing firm now associated with this group.

Among the songs to be presented on the English stage, are ". . . E Non Addio" (. . . And not Farewell), "Dopo L'Inverno Viene Sempre Primavera" (After the Winter, It Is Always The Spring), "Vent'Anni" (Twenty years old) "Come Bello Volersi Bene" (How It's Wonderful to Love) and two new tunes just penned by Renato, for the English version of his musical comedy, intitled "Finito" (Ended) and "The Sound Of Rome."

All the songs are waxed by Renato on RCA, while the CGDs' talent Johnny Dorelli recorded ". . . E Non Addio."

A warm welcome has been given by the Italian public to the Brothers Four. The CBS group appeared on our TV screens during a special show devoted to them.

Among the songs they performed were their two well known hits "Greenfields" and "Green Leaves Of Summer" and two new tunes just released in Italy on CBS "55 Days In Peiking" and "All For The Love Of A Girl."

Another host of the program was a new "duo," Guido and Maurizio De Angelis, pacted by CBS, who have been presented for the first time to the public performing "La Goccia D'Acqua," a song penned by themselves. In their first disk, just appeared on the market, the tune "La Goccia D'Acqua" is backed with Vecchio Macinio, another song penned by the two brothers.

Since we are on new talents, let's talk about the new recruits of our music scene. Sacha Alexander is the name of a new singer pacted by Ricordi for the CBS label. He is a Russian boy, 23 years old. His first release includes "The Most Beautiful Girl Of The World," the song that Sacha himself presented for the first time to the Italian public during the first performance of the film of the same name.

A further name on the list of new artists is Laura Villa. This songstress has been pacted for the Polydor label. Laura has chosen to start her musical career with the song "Un Poncho Ed Un Sombrero" published by Messaggerie Musicali. Laura has just waxed the title in Italian, but it has been announced that she will be the interpreter of all the versions of the song in other languages, since the record will be subjected to a special promotion abroad, as in Italy.

Another new name for Phonogram's cast is Elsa Quarta, a female talent whose first recording "Esta Noche" published by Edizioni Esedra (the Phonogram's Publishing Firm) is appearing on the Philips label.

Passing to Durium's artists, we wish to stress the good success obtained by its new singer Giancarlo Silvi, recently pacted, whose first recording "Il Ballo Del Mattone" (published by Curci) sold, according to the information of Mintagian, Durium's prexy, more than 35,000 copies.

And concluding the subject of new singers, we mention Fabrizio, a new artist of the Karim label. Fabrizio was just presented on our TV screens during the Line Renaud show "Rendezvous," with a song penned by himself and entitled "Il Fannullone." At the same time, there just appeared on the market the first two singles grooved by him, including, besides the afore mentioned title "Carlo Martello" "La Ballata Del Miche" and "Il Testamento."

On the other hand, denying a piece of news reported by an Italian music trade paper, he reported that the top Italian female voice, Mina, has prolonged for further six months her contract with Italdisc. Therefore the actual pact between Mina and the Matalon's firm will end on May 1965. Matalon informed us about the new Mina production. Next releases include the following titles: "Dindy," "Que No Que No," "Vulcano," "Gigi" and "Stesso Mare Stessa Spiaggia" (Same Sea, Same Sand) which will be especially promoted for summer sales.

Another record on which strong reaction is expected during the summer is the new waxing of our top artist Peppino Di Capri, on Carisch: "Vita Difficile" b/w "Per Te Moriro." Both titles are published by Carisch.

A new LP series of classical releases has just been announced by EMI Italiana. The retail price of these albums will be Italian Liras 2.200 (about \$3.50). This represents another step in the campaign conducted by our record manufacturers to widen the classical market.

In regard to the classical release we point on the new album just released by EMI Italiana containing a marvelous performance of the violinist Yehudi Manhuin as interpreter of the Handel's music. The album is entitled "Yehudi Menhuin interprets Handel."

Passing to the pop releases of the week, the Italian recording of "Fly Me To The Moon" grooved by Connie Francis under the title "Portami Con Te" is out. A strong promotional campaign is expected on the number, published in Italy by Messaggerie Musicali.

Franco Crepax, general manager of CGD, informed Cash Box about another title, "Love Me Now," also published by Messaggerie Musicali, the Italian version of which, under the title "La Bella Cubana," has just been grooved by CGD's top female talent Betty Curtis.

Further news of the Fonit/Cetra group concerns its top female talent, Milva. "Mamaluk," her last grooving, seems obtaining strong reaction on the record market. Zanoletti, A/R Manager of Fonit/Cetra, also spoke about the good success that the firm's top star Claudio Villa is obtaining during the tour, organized by Rai, our broadcasting company, in Belgium.

In this regard, note that among the artists on the tour, there is also Phonocolor's female talent Vanna Scotti, who seems to be impressing the public. As soon as she returns from Belgium, she will debut on our TV screens on the show "Il Signore Di Mezz'Eta'."

Our pop artist Adriano Celentano is leaving for Paris, where he will be seen on the Olympia stage. It seems that the theatre is fully booked for all of the seven nights stay of Adriano. Adriano will also take part in the Musicorama radio program, and on a TV show, as star guest. Adriano has also announced that very soon he will leave for Spain, where he will be host of the most popular TV program of Barcelona, "Los Amigos Del Lunes" (The Monday Friends). The date has not yet been fixed, but his first appearance on Spanish territory will probably take place the first days of June.

And now let's conclude our column with some short news concerning the publishing group Cielo Girl: It is the sub-publishers of "Popsy," an original English tune, of which CBS has just released on our market the Ray Conniff's waxing. Another pop orchestra, Helmut Zacharias, has recorded, under the Polydor label, "Mulero Bossa Nova" and "Stella Nova," while EMI has just released the Line Renaud groovings "Un Jour Je Reverrais Paris" and "Amour D'ete." They have been just presented by the pop songstress on her show, "Rendezvous."



MEXICO

Angélica María, the most popular Mexican vocalist of the "new wave," recorded for Musart Records the songs "Canta" (Sing) and "Bésame" (Kiss Me), with the Jose Sabre Marroquin orchestra. Beside singing, Angélica is now a very popular actress and has acted in many pictures in the last twelve months. She is also very often seen on TV musical shows.

"Se Oye Una Voz" (A Voice Is Listen) is the name of the new LP recorded by Argentinian singer Daniel Riolobos at RCA. Two of the most beautiful songs included in this album are "Que Sabes Tu" (What Do You Know) and "Lluvia En La Tarde" (Rain At Noon). Daniel settled in México with his wife and children many years ago and he has a weekly TV show.

Mario Freidberg, Disco Importadora's manager, released several single recordings. Irving Field's "Society Twist" and "Irish Twist," The Champs' "Nik Nak" and "Shades" and "Cantina" with "Limbo Rock," and with Argentinian singer Juan Ramón "Limbo Rock" and "I Return Your Letter" on one 45 and on the other "I Like Madison" and "The Sunset Is Done." Mario will announce very soon representation contracts with several new foreign labels.

On May 10, "Mother's Day," a strong musical show was presented at the National Auditorium, sponsored by a Mexican newspaper, with the performances of several of the most popular artists in town: Manolo Muñoz, Alberto Vázquez, Angélica María, Gustavo Pimentel, Emilio Pericoli, Rafael de Córdoba and many others.

From Venezuela we received post card from the Mexican dancers, singer and comedians Los Yorsys, who are reporting a big success in that country. Musart released their latest recording, made in México.

Fabricio and Corinna, brother and sister, both of them popular singers of the "new wave," signed a contract to perform very soon in Peru. Their representative mother, well known singer Eva Garza.

The Carrión Brothers also will leave town for Venezuela, to fulfill a contract of two weeks. A new LP by them on CBS will appear soon.

Oscar Madrigal, the new young idol who is earning popularity very fast, introduced his most recent recording made at Gamma Records, the Spanish version of "Ruby Baby." Oscar is studying his part in his first film.

Rafael Vázquez, one of the most popular bolero-singers in Mexico, returned to records and cut at RCA the Spanish version of "I'm Walking Behind You" and a song of his own "Embrujado" (Bewitched), with very modern arrangements.

To the Derby Room of Montreal, Canada goes beautiful vedette Yolanda Castany, to fulfill a contract signed some time ago.

To Chicago: The Sonora Santanera and its vocalist Sonia López. This group is at the moment the most popular in the tropical field and its sales on CBS are still tops.

From Argentina we received the visit of the group named Latin Show, who is performing at theater and night clubs in Mexico. They already receive offers from some of our labels.

Elvira Quintana back from her performances in Texas and immediately began to study her part in a new musical picture. Elvira is also finishing a new LP on the CBS label.

To introduce the music folklore of Argentina, Bolivia, Paraguay and Chile Channel 2 had a big show with the assistance of popular foreign artists Roberto Arrieta, Gastón Vila, Los Comuneros and Sergio Cansino.

Andy Russell returned to Mexico after his short visit to Spain, where he performed on a special TV show and at the same time signed several contracts to work again in that country and some other European countries.

Javier Solis, the best folk music seller, will perform in June on the Ed Sullivan Show. Javier made a beautiful album dedicated to the United States some time ago, singing the most popular American songs with arrangements made by Chuck Anderson and his Mexican orchestra.

SCANDINAVIA

FINLAND

The sale of the UN record, "All Star Festival," is a record in Finland, it is learned. The sale passed 10,000 sometime ago, which in Finland would be considered a good sales result for a single or an EP. However, the UN LP is sold at only half the price for LP's, mk. 12. (around \$3.75) against mk. 24.—being the regular price on LP's.

Oy Finndisc Ab is a new record company, situated at Simonkatu 10B, operated by Rolf Kronqvist and Erik Lindström, formerly with Oy R E Westerlund Ab (HMV) in Finland. Their label is Safir, and so far they have their first three records on the market. Two more releases are scheduled before the summer arrives. Record sales are far from the normal over the summer months, but this year it seems as record sales and summer weather are not following each other. After the long strike in March, it seems that people have more money than before and some of it is spent on records. However, the record industry in Finland declares that it will take a long time to recover from losses because of the strike.

Jazz is coming here, said Henrik von Denffer, head of the record dept. at Siemens Sähkö Oy to Cash Box. This type of music is also getting more and more promotion on radio and TV, and it seems that the sale of jazz records might be something to count on in Finland for the future. Siemens handles such jazz labels as Jazzland, Riverside and Verve, along with Coral, Deutsche Grammophon, Polydor, Heliodor, United Artists and other labels. "It would be most valuable for us to get in touch with people in the United States who might be able to offer short films and taped interviews with jazz people, as well as tapes from jazz club discussions in United States for our own jazzclubs, this would do a lot to raise our sales figures for jazz records," von Denffer told Cash Box.

Scandia artist Vieno Kekkonen is getting her own regular TV show next autumn, Antti Einiö of the publicity dept. at Scandia-Musikki Oy told Cash Box. S. Piwovitch of Nor-Disc Oy said that May looks like a very good month as far as record sales are concerned, much better than in other years. The three companies, Nor-Disc, Scandia and Sonet, have been very successful this year, he said, and have had as many as eight out of the 20 records on the best selling charts. The three companies operate from the same office and with almost the same personnel.

Osmo Ruuskanen of Musik-Fazer was very happy about CBS in Finland. Eydie Gorme with "Blame It On The Bossa Nova" is coming up strong and might soon be the same top seller in Finland as in the other Scandinavian countries. Fazers' has just released the first records with the new dance Tamouré in Finland, Catarina Valente's "Java Tamouré" and Wyn Hoop's "Wini Wini."

Martti Piha, off for biz talks with EMI in Stockholm, told Cash Box that two local artists, Veikko Tuomi and Lill-Jörgen, have managed to be on the charts for two years with their last two recordings. Tuomi is very successful with local songs, while Jörgen and his trumpet has a wider international market since his recordings finds no language barriers. He started in 1961 with "Boulevard of Broken Dreams" for Columbia, which was on the charts for more than a year, and in 1962 it was followed by his "Manzanilla," still one of the top sellers in Finland.

Johan Vikstedt of Oy Discophon Ab (RCA Victor in Finland) said there is many new, so-called Shadows-orchestras blossoming up all over Finland nowadays. Every record company has one or more such groups, usually quartets or quintets with electric guitars as main instruments, under contract, and the latest habit is making 'modernized' versions of old Finnish folksongs. Discophon recently made a recording with the well-known band-leader Rauno Lehtinen, and looking for a name for the group, it decided on Rautalanka Oy (Wire, Inc.).

DENMARK
The year has been very successful so far, declares Kurt Hviid-Mikkelsen of SGA (Skandinavisk Gramophon A/S), the Danish EMI company. EMI records has been on the charts every week, sometimes as many as five out of ten records on the charts have been EMI products. Top sellers in Denmark are Britain's Cliff Richard and The Shadows, both on the Columbia label.

Maria Callas to Copenhagen for concerts on June 9. It will be her first Scandinavian concerts.

People coming and going: Robert B. Weiss, international director of Warner Bros. Records flew in from Sweden. . . . Michel Berson of Pathé-Marconi in Paris expected here for biz talks. . . . Anders Holmstedt of EMI-Sweden just leaving after a couple of days of business talks with the Danish company. Along with Holmstedt was Ivan Nordström, a & r man of the Swedish company. . . . Gitte, the EMI songstress, back from Germany where she has been recording for Electrola. . . . Jerry Raker and Herb Holmes of Colpix (New York) expected to Copenhagen during the European round trip. . . . Knud Mörk of Mörks Musikforlag back behind his desk after a business trip around Europe.

Pat Boone in Copenhagen on May 2 for a big charity show. After being welcomed by numerous fans at the Kastrup airport, he sang for more than 25,000 enthusiastic Danes, and, according to Knud Mörk of Mörks Musikforlag, who is handling Dot in Denmark, this was among the best promotion his records could get in Denmark. Mörks has just released "Days of Wine and Roses" in Denmark. Knud Mörk also told Cash Box that during his recent visit to Germany, Italy and Switzerland, among others, he saw the German and Italian publishers of the recent Danish Eurovision Song Festival winner "Dansevis," and also made a deal with Mr. Sugar in Milan about the Scandinavian distribution of the Italian labels Aquario, Derby and Juke Box.

GREAT BRITAIN

Following his highly successful one-man show on BBC TV recently, **Sammy Davis Jr.** has signed an exclusive three year contract with the corporation. The contract guarantees not less than six shows within the three year period, probably two a year, with the first one scheduled to take place within the next four months. Davis will not be restricted to musical entertainment but will star in a dramatic role if the opportunity occurs. Prior to its American release Pye Records has issued his latest Reprise single "Bee Bom"—a **Johnny Worth** composition originally featured in the **Anthony Newley "Gurney Slade"** TV series—published by Mills Music. As already reported in this column Sammy has cut an LP in Britain entitled "Sammy Davis Jnr. Salutes The London Palladium."

Robert Stigwood of Robert Stigwood Associates held a rush breakfast reception for **The Four Seasons** who had only a few hours in London before joining the **John Leyton** package show in Manchester. During their ten-day tour the group fulfilled many radio and TV dates including a "Thank Your Lucky Stars" for ABC TV. Although their visit this time will be brief Stigwood confirms that he has signed them for a full scale tour in the Autumn.

CBS Records—one year old this month—celebrated the visit of **Andy Williams** in London to attend the premiere of "55 Days At Peking" from which comes his latest single "So Little Time." Williams is currently enjoying a popularity wave in Britain through his CBS recording of "Can't Get Used To Losing You."

Following the release of their "BBC Scrapbook 1940" the first in its 'Scrapbook' series **Fontana Records** is organising a 'Best Window Display' competition for dealers. Four prizes of £50 will be awarded in four sections of the country. The 12" LP is composed of actuality recordings made by the BBC during the year 1940 and features excerpts of **Winston Churchill's** famous wartime speeches; first broadcast ever made by the present Queen (then **Princess Elizabeth**); **Earl Atlee**, **Neville Chamberlain**; the traitor **William Joyce** (Lord Haw Haw) together with the entertainers of the day—**Vera Lynn**, **Arthur Askey**, **George Formby** and **Jack Warner**.

The Beatles, who hit the No. 1 slot with their first disk "Please, Please Me" and again with their follow-up "From Me To You"—both their own compositions—have penned a number for 21 year old **Duffy Power** entitled "I Saw Her Standing There" on the Parlophone label. All Beatles compositions are published by their own publishing outlet **Northern Songs Ltd.** under the auspices of **Dick James Music**. In his turn **Duffy Power** has written a ballad for singer **Vince Hill** "As It Was Written" released on **Piccadilly** and published by **Mistletoe Music**.

Twenty-one year old guitarist **Heinz**, who left **The Tornados** to branch out on his own as a singer, has waxed his debut disk "Dreams Do Come True" (Decca) published by **Filmusic**, in French and German for release in those territories. The first Folkways single, "Walking Around Town" by Mark and The Two Timers, is showing up on numerous Canadian play sheets. Another single out of the Allied set-up that is creating something of a stir in pop circles is "He Was A Friend" by Dian James and The Greenbriar Boys. It's on Elektra.

An RCA Camden package by Ottawa's Bob King is finding favor with C&W jocks across Canada. The set is entitled "The Sound Of The Country." Bob has indicated his willingness to cut promo tracks for interested spinners. Contact him in care of CFRA, Ottawa.

Another Ottawa area favorite, Hank Lariviere, has his best record outing in many a moon with his new Rodeo single, "The Longest Day." Hank has been travelling across Ontario, playing one-niters and making deejay, guest appearances on behalf of his good Rodeo single.

The Harold Kudlets Agency has a new address. It is now located in suite 824-825, Sheraton-Connaught Hotel, in Hamilton, Ontario. One of the hottest acts associated with the Kudlets agency at the moment is Mercury (Smash) recording star Matt Lucas. Matt just completed a highly successful stand at the Brass Rail in London, moving on to the Ottawa House in Hull, Quebec. His record, "I'm Movin' On," is showing up on Canadian play sheets from coast to coast.

A sad note deals with the serious illness of Ray Hutchison of the Beau Marks. Ray is in the Wesley Hospital in Toronto suffering from infection following an appendectomy. Doctors say he'll be hospitalized for at least a month. Ray's illness has forced the group to postpone a number of bookings throughout Quebec. At least one deejay, CKOY—Ottawa's Dean Hagopian, is encouraging his listeners to send get-well notes to the ailing disk star. Ray's many fans in the Ottawa area seem more than happy to comply with Hagopian's request for cheer-up mail to be sent to Ray in care of the hospital.

CHUM, Toronto, devoted an entire broadcast day to the records of Steve Lawrence and Eydie Gorme during the Toronto P.A. of the talented duo. Also during their recent stay in Toronto the two stars taped a "Parade" show for the CBC's Fall schedule.

Official Canadian debut of the Dick Clark Radio Show will take place May 27, over Toronto's CHUM.

Sandy Selsie's most recent Columbia outing, "Come On In," is proving to be a solid seller and is appearing on more and more play sheets every week.

Frankie Laine set for a Windsor, Ontario P.A. (5/27). His "Don't Make My Baby Blue" is the hottest single by the artist in many a moon.

Bob Martin at Columbia's H.Q. in Toronto is clearing the decks for action-plenty on the new single outings by Steve Lawrence and Eydie Gorme. Respectively they are, "Poor Little Rich Girl" and "Don't Try To Fight It Baby." Both are off and running, being picked by leading jocks and stations right across the country. Another hit in the making for Bob and the Columbia folks is the great new Bobby Vinton entry on Epic, "Blue On Blue." Terrific plays and resulting excellent sales are reported in all areas on the new Johnny Cash single, "Ring Of Fire." It was an instantaneous C&W pick, and then with Ottawa leading the way, broke strongly in the pop columns. CKOY spinner Ted Daigle has been wearing out one copy right after another of the Cash outing on his shows in Ottawa.

Dimitri Tiomkin set for a Toronto appearance (5/27) at the Canadian premiere of "55 Days At Peking." Columbia has the sound track album from the flick. Moreover, the label is represented by The Brothers Four waxing of the title song. However, at this stage of the game it would seem to be the flip side of The Brothers Four single that is creating the greatest stir. It's the while-back Johnny Horton outing (flip side of "Battle Of New Orleans"), "All For The Love Of A Girl."

Paul White, Capitol's promotion manager for albums and singles, really stuck his neck out in promoting the tremendous Japanese sound, "Sukiyaka" by Kyu Sakamoto. Paul notified leading Canadian deejays that he would seriously consider Hari Kari if the Sakamoto release didn't make it in a big way. It now appears that the promo man's life is safe, as the disk is well up on station charts across the country, and gives every indication of becoming a top ten item in every market. Paul credits Vancouver's C-FUN with introducing the disk to hitsville and tips his hat to Red Robinson and Frosty Forst at the west coast outlet for saving him from Hari Kari. As a matter of fact, Capitol could ill afford to have Paul do himself in at the moment. They have one hit right after another breaking wide open in all Canadian markets. Nat Cole and Bobby Darin lead the way with their respective Summer season smashes, "Lazy Hazy Crazy Days Of Summer," and "18 Yellow Roses." These two follow on the tremendous sales success of the two Cliff Richard singles, "Bachelor Boy" and "Summer Holiday," plus great entries by Al Martino and The Kingston Trio. In the wings, and headed front and center in quick order are a couple more Capitol singles, "How Do You Do It" by Gerry and The Pacemakers, of British origin and a recent Cash Box "Pick Of The Week." Also set to be a smash is a new release by another extremely popular English star, Adam Faith.

Friday May 17, was observed by Decca Distributors across Canada as "Rick Nelson Day." It was the artist's twenty-third birthday, and to really celebrate the event, Decca rushed out Rick's brand new Decca album, his debut LP for the label, to leading Canadian deejays. Tremendous reaction to Rick's new single—both sides—is reported from all over Canada.

Hall Ross reports good Canadian action to the Dave Dudley single, "Six Days On The Road." It's out on Apex in Canada and is getting a lot of exposure, both country and pop in many important areas.

Long time Canadian favorites, The Rhythm Pals, Mike Mark and Jack, have been signed to a recording contract by Decca. They have just completed a Nashville recording session that produced their first Decca single, a tune written by Montrealese Jerry Hrynewych, entitled, "On A Gypsy Caravan." According to Hal Ross the side is the group at its smoothest. Outstanding early response has been noted to the new sound by the Everly Bros. on Warner Bros., "It's Been Nice," is creating the biggest stir at the moment reports Hal. Album wise, Hal reports strong early sales on the Vaughn Meader LP, "Volume Two Of The First Family."

Johnnie Ray appeared at an Ottawa area night spot for nine days (5/10).

Best new record featuring Canadian talent in a long time is the only way to describe a great outing on the new Tamarac label by Larry Lee. Entitled, "Stood Up" the side was done in Nashville and features many of the biggest "Music City" names in supporting roles for Larry. Stan Klees is topper of the new label and he indicated to Cash Box that Tamarac will produce quality, Canadian content records, not in quantity, but whenever the content warrants release. "Stood Up" by Larry Lee has already broken in the Ottawa area where the artist has appeared on several occasions. It is getting air exposure on teen segments and softer programming vehicles as well.

Another outstanding Canadian production is the most recent outing from Art Snider's Chateau label. It features a young Torontonians Rudy Veltri with a swinging rendition of "The Wondrous World Of The Lord." The sound is being well received by teen and adult listeners alike.

The Delltones had a strong national hit a while back with their Leedon label single of "Come A Little Bit Closer." Now they are out with a 12" package of "Moon River," "Gonna Raise A Rukus Tonight," "Cotton Fields" and many others. In view of the success The Delltones had with their recent single, it seems likely that this set will soon have cash registers jumpin' right across the nation.

Newcomer Lesley Gore looks sure to break through here with her huge American smash "It's My Party," which is released through the Philips organization.

Gene Pitney's "Mecca" is the fastest mover on our best-seller chart this issue. It has advanced five places in one week and should become a real threat to the top tune over the next couple of weeks. New this week is "Proud Of You" by local boy Jay Justin. It's shaping like a nationwide smash for Jay, who is one of the most popular artists in the business. "Proud Of You" is the first local production to appear on the chart for a few weeks. It's also first time in for "Tamoure" by Bill Justis; Philips Records has a tremendous promotion campaign going behind this record and it seems sure to pay dividends.

American entertainer Al Morgan has returned to Australia for his third visit. Morgan will be remembered for his long string of hits some years back headed by "Jealous Heart."

Many local record company executives are keen to see the introduction of a series of record awards for local products, based on the lines of the American industry awards. The subject has often been mentioned to Cash Box and there seems to be no real obstacle to prevent such a scheme. Record companies which are members of the Association of Australian Record Manufacturers could be given the opportunity to nominate records in the various categories and an independent panel could be appointed from within the trade (disk-jockeys, publishers, dealers etc.) to attend to the final judging. The local industry has developed to the stage where there are plenty of records worthy of nomination for such awards and it is hoped that the Association of Record Manufacturers will see fit to start action to enable a series of awards to be introduced for local records. Radio Station 6IX in Perth issues an annual award to the record industry in its "6IX Golden Microphone" series, which is a commendable move but there is still room for official "Best Record" awards organized by the record industry itself.

RCA out with a net set by The Limelighters entitled "Makin' A Joyful Noise." The Limelighters are scheduled to tour Australia later this year.

Noel Coward's show "Sail Away" will soon begin its Australian season and EMI has released the original Broadcast album of the show.

W & G Records doing some solid promotion on its release of "Hot Pastrami" by The Dartells. This record is currently one of the hottest singles in the United States.

Festival Records should do well with some of its hot new singles, especially "Losing You" by Brenda Lee; "Boney Moronie" by The Appalachians; "The Folk Singer" by Tommy Roe and some new local products—"Starlight Of Love" with Col Joye; "The Love Express" by Dig Richards and "Jezebel" featuring Rob E. G.

Three extremely commercial sides have Keith Ashdown over at London really on the move currently. They are: "These Arms Of Mine" by Otis Redding on Volt; "Don't Play Me A Love Song" by Shirley Jackson on London and "If You Need Me" by Wilson Pickett on Liberty. Another left-field-type entry from the London group that is finding favor with those who program smoother sounds is an item by Los Manakoora Group. An instrumental, it's entitled, "Bossanova Guitars," and is a great item for jocks who dig smooth sounds.

Bobby Vee is currently on tour across the Canadian west, with tremendous in-store, and on-air promotion being triggered by London's key distributors in leading western cities. Between May 15 and 20, Bobby played Winnipeg, Edmonton, Calgary, Saskatoon and Fort William. In all centers deejays went to bat for Bobby with numerous spins of his current hit single, "Charms."

Gilles Aubin is readying all of London's promotional guns for the Canadian tour of Mantovani. The world-famous Maestro begins his Canadian tour in Vancouver, June 9, and proceeds easterly across the country playing most leading cities through June 20, in Quebec City. He will make the tour with his complete English Orchestra. London is offering its entire Mantovani catalog to all of its Canadian distributors for the occasion, including two new additions, "Classical Encores" and "Latin Rendez-Vous."

New acquisitions by Quality include "Leading Lady" by Tommy Frontera on the Hi-Lite label. Hi-Lite topper, Del La Rose reports good action on the side in the Detroit area. George Struth has also lined up two other newbies for Canadian distribution by Quality. They are: "Shampoo" by Les McCann from Pacific Enterprises Inc., slated to be on Reo in Canada, and "Come On Back" by The Hatfields on Wye which will likely appear on the Quality label in Canada. Ed Houston, music director at Toronto's CKEY, reports that the Lonnie Mack side on Barry, "Memphis" is now making considerable progress on his station. He indicates it will shortly become a chart item at 'EY.

CKEY'er Duff Roman reports good response to spins on the new Oscar McLollie-Nancy Lamarr outing, "Love's A Funny Little Game." John Porteous, promotion director for Arc Sound Ltd., Toronto, is beating the drum on behalf of the new side released in Canada on Arc. The Canadian firm picked it up from the American label, Sahara, on the strength of strong regional action in western New York.

Calgarian Mel Shaw, a leading light in the music business in that city, reports that young singer Errol Lacroix has been outstanding in his numerous TV appearances in Calgary, and seems a sure bet for disk success.

Dave Lyman, CKY Winnipeg, recalls that "Tie Me Kangaroo Down Sport" by Rolf Harris was a CKY pick and a Canadian hit a couple of years ago. It is only now being discovered in the U.S. The Rolf Harris side seems destined for a chart ride all over again, following in the footsteps of "Sun Arise." At the time of its success in Canada, "Kangaroo" was on Barry from Quality. Subsequently, Harris material has been released in this country on Capitol. Barry's version of the Harris hit has been re-released. Dave Lyman recently spent some time in Danville, Va., where he chaired the annual get together of the North American Broadcasters' Idea Bank. He proposed that next year's convention be held in Winnipeg, this would mark the first time the event would be held in Canada.

New singles on Pathe from Messers. Dubord and Lapierre at Capitol in Montreal include sides by Gloria Lasso, Luis Mariano and Enrico Macias. Also released and reportedly doing very well is a new LP featuring Annie Cordy, and a second by Luis Mariano. Both artists are currently on tour throughout the Province of Quebec, including an Ottawa appearance (5/14) Excerpts from the artists' "Visa Pour L'Amour" operetta will be released shortly on a new Pathe single, reports Monique Leroux.



FRANCE

Let's start off our article this week by saying that the special at the Olympia Music Hall was an immense success and in particular Nancy Holloway and the Chaussettes Noires (with of course Eddy Mitchell). This could not be otherwise with stars like these. The Chaussettes' novelty songs were very much appreciated as well as one of the oldies "Jezabel." After the show personalities from the music biz attended a cocktail party at Golf Drouet to celebrate the success of Eddy Mitchell.

Let's continue with the personality people by announcing that Petula Clark is expecting a happy event any day now and that her hubby Claude Wolf is getting feverish day by day. Whilst on the Vogue subject, we must say that on the Olympia program there was a young Italian singer called Gianetto, only ten years of age, but he brought off a veritable triumph. The disks of this youngster are being put out on the French market by Vogue in record time. Mogul Georges Boujnah thinks that Gianetto will become popular with the teens and deejays alike.

Let's now talk about the song "Elle Etait Si Jolle" by Alain Barriere. One needs some time to appreciate this song. Perhaps this song is too pretty and this is not a jest or a pun, but it is imposing little by little on us, and this is certainly one of the prettiest songs we've heard for quite some time now. This tune also reminds us of "Cathy" by the same Alain Barriere. Pierard who is the publisher is very satisfied with the sheet music sales.

Let's get down to chatter on Sylvie Vartan, who is now classed as a confirmed star in France. Her latest grooved title "En Ecoutant La Pluie" seems to be a promising success and she is heading for a brilliant career. On the other hand the broadcast "Salut Les Copains," that has quite a big audience among the teenagers in France has given us Sylvie Vartan as being the much demanded on this program.

Let's now pass over to novelties, first of all a new series with Philips for everybody's purse at a reasonable price called Cercle Musical which offers us a 10" at 8,75 francs. These are classical recordings. . . . We continue with the kind of budget records and still with Philips, to point out this time on the Pergola label "La Vie De Frederic Chopin." In the normal series let's talk about Claude Francois. The press is talking about this singer, and with the announcement of a 10", his first one with all of his hits such as "Belle, Belle, Belle," "Dis Lui" and "Moi Je Voudrais Bien Me Marier." It's true and certain that he is going to become a future star on the male side, and is actually creeping up for a top place. His adaptation of "Bachelor Boy" is selling like hot cakes.

This week Francoise Hardy is effectuating a new series of recordings in Germany in German under the direction of Gisele Lehmann, who is at the same time the right hand of Wolfsihn in the Alpha Edition direction. Beside this Francoise is also preparing for next week another session, this time in French and the titles are not yet known. She is as well actually under the direction of Vadim turning out film entitled "Chateau de Suede" by Francoise Sagan. Must point out that in this film she will not sing. Alain Dumas newly discovered by Vogue has just canned "Tu Peu T'en Aller" and this has commenced to be demanded in big quantity.

Good news for the Sammy Davis fans. He will be in France and for the first time in his career he will be giving us a recital at the Olympia Music hall. The profits of this festival is destined for a childrens fund and we must say this is very touching in behalf of Sammy.

Novelty songs with Philips Luc Roman gives us "Adieu" and Sabrina sings "Nous Les Jeunes" while Gilda Gilles supplies us with "Si J'etais Garcon." Riverside releases a 12" of Nat Aderly and another of Junior Nance Trio. With Decca: Sophie has canned "Quand Un Air Vous Possede." Jet Harris and Tony Meehan has given us "Blue Mood." Caterina Valente has offered us a good bossa nova disk including "Dindi." Maurice Larcange a very good deck in "Javarama" and Frankie Jordan comes back a long, long way and sings "Hully Gully Baby."

In the special Copains series which is directed by Philipacchi, another grooving of Frankie Jordan with "Parc'que J'ai Revu Linda." We are led to believe that Ray Charles will appear at the Olympia Music Hall scheduled on May 22.

Latest recording of Dany Logan is "Dis Lui" and "Vous . . . Les Filles." With Pathe Marconi a new Frank Ifield with "Anytime" and another title which is actually No. 1 in England called "How Do You Do." On the Ducretet label the pianist Robert Valentino has given us some oldie successes "La Chapelle Au Clair De Lune" and "Ce N'est Que Votre Main Madame."

HOLLAND

A Bovema-delegation welcomed HMV-star Gloria Lasso at Schiphol-air recently. She visited this country to arrange a future TV-appearance. Bovema's His Master's Voice-label hits the Dutch market with a new set of 7" LP's subtitled "The Golden Voices" (Die Goldene Stimme), which contain recordings by stars of the past like Peter Anders, Walter Ludwig, Frida Leider. In the pop area Bovema's HMV-label released a new single popular Tante Leen: "Op die Oude Nieuwendijk," featuring her living-p in Amsterdam.

Bovema's Capitol-department told Cash Box that a special coupling for Bobby Darin's LP-album "You're the Reason I'M Living" has been launched. Titles chosen are "Oh Lonesome Me" and "Here I Am." The U.S. label started its new "New Wave" jazz series with recordings by George Shearing, Joe Bucci, June Christy and John Gray.

Following the current success on the German recordmarket of John Blum and his Blazers, Bovema's Warner Bros. also released their two big "Lola" and "Copenhagen Carousel" in Holland.

Bovema's Imperial-label rushed out the first recording of "De Onbekende Zanger" (The Unknown Singer). Titles are "Ik heb altijd gewandeld door rozen" (I Always Walked on Roses) and "Moeder, Neem Me Weer In Your Arms" (Mama, Take Me in Your Arms Once More).

Britain's famous singing star Vera Lynn, now recording for EMI's HM label, was in Holland on May 17 to receive Bovema's Golden Record-award for 100,000 sales of her sensational success "Land of Hope and Glory."

R. Klaassen, sales-manager of L.C. Phonogram, announced that his company will handle the distribution for Holland of the Cynus label. The catalogue is mainly compiled of recently recorded music by European masters from the 16th, 17th and early 18th centuries. The first three LP-releases are vocal music by Monteverdi, organ compositions by Bach's fore-runners and Concertos and Sonatas by Venetian composers, performed by the Lug Chamber Orchestra.

The famous pianist Gyorgy Cziffra has been contracted by Philips records. The Hungarian virtuoso who escaped from his native country in 1956, settled in France, from where he has built up a brilliant career as a solo pianist the free part of Europe, supported by a few best-selling LP-recordings. His first Philips release with Cziffra interpretations is entirely devoted to Chopin Polonaises, among them the Military and the Heroic.

The Dutch singer René Frank (22), working for Wim Kan's cabaret ensemble at the moment, signed a contract with Philips records. His first single-record is "Ik wil Je" (the Dutch version of "I Will Follow Him"). René Frank has been selected by producer René Sleswijk to take a major part in the Dutch Adaption of "The Sound of Music," which will be premiered in Amsterdam early 1964.

In view of the coming tourists' season, that brings some odd millions of foreigners to the Dutch sea-side resorts every year, Dutch Philips released a series of recordings by the well-known barrel-organ "De Arabier." Entitled "Street Organ Souvenirs," the 45 rpm. single series in special full color sleeves offers popular medleys of famous continental tunes. Especially designed for American tourists, moreover, is the LP "Where the Wind Mills Are" by De Arabier, which contains many photographs.

Three LP's of American Blues & Gospel artists were just introduced by L. C. Phonogram. First of all the newcomer on records, Billie Poole, latest discovery of Messrs. Grauer and Keepnews—with a fascinating Riverside-album "Sermonette." Jimmy Jones leads the orchestra. The second album is by Ruth Brown on Philips, entitled "Gospel Time." Ruth is known already in Holland, thanks to an earlier single release: "Mama, He Treat Your Daughter Mean." The third album is a fine collection of Brook Benton successes, a Mercury LP entitled "Singing the Blues."

Rocco Granata, the Italian singer who made Belgium as his second home country and who was a top-seller some years ago with "Marina," made a glorious come-back. In a few weeks time he hit the top spot on Cash Box Dutch Top Ten list with his C.N.R. recording of "Buona Notte Bambino." There's one dealer in the South of Holland who sold 1,500 copies!

C.N.R. is also making very good business with its artist Gert Timmerman whose "Blume von Tahiti" is number 2 on the Top 10 list. C.N.R. releases Timmerman's newest platter, "Ik heb Eerbied Voor Jouw Grijsz Haar." Hans van Zeeland of C.N.R. came back from a business-trip to the U.S. Although Van Zeeland could not give details, he characterized his tour "very successful."

Famous Berlin publisher Rolf "Calcutta" Budde paid a visit to Amsterdam to meet Wim van Vught—Editions Altona in order to discuss mutual interests. Altona handles now the Nat King Cole-title "All Over The World" and obtained an important local cover of this song by songstress Mien Telkamp. Translation was made by well known lyric-writer Stan Haag and the record will be on the market on the Philips-label. Rolf Budde has the continental rights on this title. Altona also reported good news on former Nat King Cole-titles, "Dear Lonely Hearts," which will be recorded soon on the Polydor-label.

"Danseuse," the Eurovision-title No. 1, was released by famous songstress Corrie Brokken on the Philips-label. Other records available on the Dutch market are: Grethe & Jorgen Ingmann on Metronome in both English and German versions; Belgian Television-star Jo Leemans on the Artone-CE label and a beautiful instrumental version of The Cousins on the Palet label. Pubbery Altona handles the rights.

With Eydie Gorme having become a big Hit with the local crowd as a result of her smash success "Blame It On the Bossa Nova," Artone releases Eydie's timeless rendering of current chart-item "Fly Me To The Moon" on the ABC-Paramount label. Reaction has been fruitful in the sense that the company has decided to re-release her former hit "You Need Hand" on the same label. Also from the ABC-Paramount catalog comes a new Ray Charles chart-rider, "Take These Chains From My Heart." Deck was premiered on VARA TV's Teen-panel "Top or Flop," resulting in plenty of action on the market. Available on EP as well as Single, Artone expects to hit the local charts with same, since there's a fair interest for Ray Charles concerts here this month.

Artone artists Jack Hammer and Angelo Biondi (currently on the chart with "Buona Notte Bambino") will appear on TV in the very near future in a program built exclusively around the singers.

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BRAZIL

In view of the great success obtained by two previous albums waxed in Brazil, RCA released a new LP with **The Ventures**. It's entitled "Twist With The Ventures," Volume Two. Among the musical numbers are "My Bonnie Lies Over The Ocean," "Twisted," "Besame Mucho," "Swanee River Twist," etc.

A strong chart rider here is Mexican songster **Miguel Aceves Mejia**. His LP's are second in sales among the best selling albums of RCA, the first place being occupied by **Nelson Gonçalves**. His new album cut by RCA is "Viejos Amigos" (Old Friends) gathering twelve songs in the personal style of Mejia. Should prove a hot item.

Another album waxed by RCA, the first one of this singer and composer, presents **Arquidemes Messina**. The title "Coração Solitario" (Lonely Heart) is named after one of the songs included in LP. Arquidemes sings in a romantic style, and has a small but very charming voice.

The Brazilian version of "Baby Elephant Walk" (O Passo Do Elefantinho) is going up very rapidly on our charts. Another hit of **Trio Esperança**—three kids who sing with heart and soul, and who recently had a smash hit, "Filme Triste," Brazilian version of "Sad Movies." Trio Esperança belongs to the Odeon label. **Waldir Azevedo** also cut the number for Continental Records.

"O Amor Mais Puro" (The Purest Love), written by **Palmeira (Diogo Mulero)** A & R Manager of Continental Records, is now number one among the best selling standards in Sao Paulo. The song was written for Mother's Day and is done very romantically by **Francisco Petronio**, another songster with a warm voice.

RCA released an album, "Mais Explosivo" (More Explosive), a collection of big hits, including "Cuando Calienta El Sol," "Sad Movies," "Indulto," "Contradizendo." All the songs appeared on our charts recently, and are presented by the artists who made them hits.

Continental Records released a special double-compact dedicated to the IV Pan-American Games, a colossal event in Sao Paulo some days ago, with enormous success. United States in first place and Brazil in second.

The record contains on the first side: "The Hymn Of The Pan-American Games" and on the other side: "Pan-American Samba" by the old Brazilian singer **Caco-Velho**. All the participants of Brazil, United States, Canada, Argentina, Chile, etc., received a copy of the record.

Odeon Records just put in our retail stores a big collection of new records, including 19 albums, six with Brazilian artists:

Pery E Todo Bossa with **Perry Ribeiro** singing 12 Bossa Nova numbers; **Sambas De Madrugada** (Sambas At Dawn) with **Isaura Garcia**; **Turbilhao De Tangos**, with **Patanè** and his **Tropical Orchestra**; **Romance Bossa Nova** (Bossa Nova Romance) with **Paulo Alencar** and his **Orchestra**; **Mil E Uma Vozes De Oscar Ferreira** (1001 Voices Of Oscar Ferreira); **Doze Sambas e 23 amigos** (Twelve Sambas And 23 Friends), various.

Six International albums: **Lucho En La Intimidad** with the famous Latin singer **Lucho Gatica**; **Fernando Farinha O Cantor De Portugal**, with **Fernando Farinha**; **O Piston Romantico De Billy Butterfield** (The Romantic Trumpet Of Billy Butterfield); **O Estranho Da Praia** (Stranger On The Shore) with **Mr. Acker Bilk**; **Sabah's** (Special class); **Quand L'Amour Est Mort** with **Gilbert Beaud**.

Three Capitol albums: **Linger Awhile** with **Vic Damone**; **Sensational** with **Les Baxter**; **Viva Bossa Nova Jazz Samba**, with **Laurindo De Almeida**.

BELGIUM

World famous trumpet player, **Chet Baker**, stopped over in Brussels for a day. His visit was related to the preparation of a Chet Baker broadcast for the weekly jazz program of **Roger Adams** at Flemish radio station and called "Jazz in Beligum." The program lasted a whole hour. It is interesting to note that three Belgium soloists participated: **Jack Pelzer**, alto, flute and soprano, **Benoit Quersin**, base, and **René Thomas**, guitar. Also on the program was American drummer **John Harris**, who played with **Horace Silver** at one time.

Top event recently in connection with SA Gramophone activity, was the appearance of a new **Helen Shapiro** record—a single. The side that has a special appeal is the one featuring "Woe Is Me." Helen went to Nashville, Tennessee, to record this and other tunes. Also on the market is a new **Cliff Richard** song (Columbia) called "Lucky Lips." A new name on the Capitol label as far as Belgium is concerned—is **Dick Dale**. **Mr. Kirsch**, general manager for SA Gramophone, had a business talk with **Mr. Rouzies**, general manager for **Pathé Marconi** records. There is a great demand for the newest **Adamo** single with "Amour perdu" as the battle-horse, the reverse side showing "J'aime une fleur." On the first day more than 10,000 disks went to the dealers. **Adamo** has been guest at the Olympia theater in Paris, together with **Cliff Richard** and **The Shadows**.

On her way to the film festival in Cannes, American movie star **Bette Davis**, accompanied by director **Robert Aldrich**, stopped over at Brussels National Airport for two hours. She talked with the press at a reception.

Ray Charles gave a concert at the Palais des Beaux Arts in Brussels. The Genius was loudly cheered by thousands of jazz fans who often interrupted his show by shouting and by rhythmic handclapping. Also on the stage were **The Raylettes** and the **Ray Charles** orchestra. The day after he performed in Antwerp. He granted interviews to Flemish TV, one for the weekly "Echo" program, presented by **Jan Bauwens** and the other to **Frans Romeyns** (of Cash Box), who introduces the record program called "Good Records, Good Friends" (Leuke Plaatjes, goede Maatjes).

News of **Palette** records (and World Music) is of a rather unusual nature: **André**, guitar soloist of **The Cousins** (hit: "Danseuse") had his guitar stolen out of his car. He discovered the loss just before leaving for Lille where the ensemble was supposed to perform for TV. Consequently, the group arrived two hours late and had to borrow a new guitar. They took the instrument back to its owner the same evening and from there proceeded to the police station to report the theft. A few minutes later the police officer was called: the thief had tried to sell the guitar in a local shop and was arrested. The instrument is now in the custody of the law. The Cousins meanwhile have turned out a French version EP, featuring "Marche Tout Droit" (Walk Right In). Their "Danseuse" gets top notes and apparently is one of the best renderings of the Eurovision success.

Although the **Leen Jongewaard** recording got a "contra" mark in the TV program "Pro and Contra," sales figures are excellent, which proves the quality of this program. . . . **Robert Cogoi** is reaping success with his French language version of the original Flemish number "Eenzaam Zonder Jou," which earned **Will Tura** a silver disk. French title "Je M'sens Très Seul." A new **Digno Garcia** (Palette) record will soon be on the market. It will be a single, "Noch," from his latest EP.

Bob Benny has done a Flemish version of "Blume von Tahiti" called "Parel van Tahiti" (Polydor). And last but not least, **Will Tura** himself has cut a German language version of his hit tune "Eenzaam Zonder Jou." New title: "Ich Bin So Einsam Ohne Dich." On the reverse: the German version of the **Robert Gogoi** number "Si Un Jour," now called "Wern, Ja Wenn." After his appearance with the Neatherlands TV, his record firm **Palette** has come on the market with "Hey, Hey" in the latter country.

The internationally known American publisher, **Buddy Kaye**, from New York, who was the owner of the No. 1 world hit "Speedy Gonzales," was in Brussels to discuss business with **Peter Plum**, director of **Peter Plum Productions**.

Ardmore and **Beechwood** obtained the rights for the following numbers (Editions Eco Music): "On N'peut Pas S'en Empecher," "Car Moi Je T'aime" and "J'ai Le Douceur De Vivre," by **Jean-Ives Gran** on **Ducretet-Thompson Records**.

Polygram-Belgium Reports: **Maya Casabianca**, French Philips artist, was in Brussels to do several TV and radio stands.

The first album by **Soeur Sourire** (Sister Smile) a sister of the Dominican order, which sold over 200,000 copies, also meets with lot of demands in Germany, so that Philips decided to launch a first EP in German. The songs are sung in this language by **Soeur Sourire** herself and results are most promising.

Great song- and filmstar **Yves Montand** (Philips) did a three-day show in Brussels at the Theatre National.

Corry Brokken, Dutch Philips songstress, recorded Eurovision 1963 winning song "Danseuse" and "T'en Vas Pas," the Swiss contribution to this contest. This record could mean a real comeback for **Corry**.

ARGENTINA

Josephine Baker will be here May 23. The well known lark is performing in Lima, where she premiered May 12. Josephine will appear at the Club 676, a bossa nova and modern tango night club, and probably will also take part in TV programs, although the channel hasn't been specified yet.

Danny Chilean in Buenos Aires to appear on TV and dance parties organized by Escala Musical, the radio and TV program created by Carlos Ballor ten years ago. Escala is preparing a special program on TV Channel 13 featuring several artists that have been working for Escala during the last years.

Rocky Pontoni has already waxed his first single for his new label, Music Hall. The titles are "Amor" (Love) and "Cariñosa." "Amor" is the Spanish version of the new Paul Anka hit, which has entered the charts in a big way. Pontoni was recently inked by Music Hall after two years with RCA.

A few words about Ray Charles, who, according to sales reports furnished by Ariel Records, ABC Paramount representative, is steadily turning into a big star in Argentina. Although the first record by Charles was released many months ago, it was only with "I Can't Stop Loving You" that Ray caught the attention of Argentine record buyers. Now, his second album "Big Hits by Ray Charles," is moving very fast, and seems that it will reach a high sales mark. Ray will visit Brazil next July, and this should mean that he may come to Argentina too, although there is no information at all about such a visit. Some "live" performances in Buenos Aires should help his records a lot, and may put Ray Charles among the permanent records sellers in this country.

Fermata Publishers working on a new tango penned by local composer Leopoldo Diaz Velez, and titled "A Bailar El Tango." The same publisher has the rights to "Ruby Baby," a very interesting chart rider, and "Blame it on the Bossa Nova," which is considered potentially a very big hit. CBS has recently released the single by Eydie Gorme, and has also included the tune in the "Brindis Musical" promotional album; this should mean a lot of air play for the tune, and may bring nice results. Marty Cosens, RCA artist, has cut "La Terza Luna," the Sedaka hit, in Spanish, and "Remember Diana," belonging to Anka, also in Spanish.

Philips releases: "No te Alejes de Mi" by Transito Cocomarola, regional music artist; "Limando La Chapa" by folk star Chango Rodriguez; "Tropicalandia," a stereo album cut by local artist Tito Alberti; "Hits USA" (Mercury label) featuring tunes by Patti Page, Johnny Preston, Merv Griffin and The Platters; "Mia" by Los Cantores de Quilla Huasi and a new LP by Chango Rodriguez. Under the Archiv label, there is a new album with 17th Century music by Italian artists.

Gigi Gallo of Fortissimo Americana publishers is working on "Non Costa Niente," and Italian tune which is considered a hit-to-be. There are already two versions made by Sonia on Philips and by Los Santos on the Music Hall label.

Roberto Lambertucci of Neumann Publishers reports about new versions of "Frente al Mar," the latest Mariano Mores production. The song has been cut by Siro San Roman (Music Hall), Hugo del Carril (Serenata) Anibal Troilo (RCA) and Jose Basso, also for Music Hall. Lambertucci hopes to arrange several more versions on these days.

CBS releases: a new album by Ray Conniff, titled "Alegria en Ritmo" another one ("Atraccion Mundial") by Los Cinco Latinos, including "Baion Japonese," "Et Maintenant," "Yira Yira" and "Por la Vuelta"; the stereo version of "Tropical Only Tropical," already put to sale on mono some time ago; "Norte" a single by folk music group Los Niños Riojanos. CBS' artist Jackie is planning his first international tour, that should include Chile, Peru, Colombia, Venezuela and probably Mexico, where there is a big market for the type of tunes he sings. CBS Records' best selling lists on these days are topped by "Puente Pexoa" (this week's top seller), "Lo Se" by Enrique Guzman, "Ruby Baby" by Dion, "Pretty Blue Eyes" by Los Teen Agers and "Runaround Sue" by Jackie.

Microfon is releasing five new albums under the Audio Fidelity label: "Mandolino Italiano," "Bossa Nova" by Lalo Schifrin, "Spain Sings" and two LP's by Lionel Hampton. There is also a new album by Fausto Pappetti, a very good Italian seller, a single by Cholo Aguirre, "Rio Manso" (a tune with very nice possibilities) and another one by Los Marcellos Ferial: "Las Campanas." Microfon has also put to sale a record produced by Antonio Prieto and featuring himself: "Palabras Nuevas" and "Caperucita y Yo." This may also become a very consistent seller.

RCA news: "La Bamba" by The Tokens; "Puente Pexoa" by Miguel Codaglio; "El Partitito di Pallone" by Rita Pavone; several re-editions of old Carlos Gardel hits, like "Cuesta Abajo," "Madreselva" and others; "De Corte Criollo," LP cut by Angel D'Agostino and Angel Vargas, and "Agitando Pañuelos" LP by Los Hermanos Abalos.

Ricardo Castelblanco of Edami reports that he is working on the promotion of "El Mate," a Chico Novarro—Jose Finkel local product. There are already three versions: Chico Novarro (RCA), Carlinhos (Odeon) and Finkel cut for H y R, the Maluf Brothers label. Other Edami items are "Jacqueline and Caroline," the new Perez Prado tune, and "Ay Cariño," the Federico Baena product, cut by Siro San Roman for Music Hall.

Deejay Maximo Jorge has started a new series of programs for Radio Programas Internacionales and Uruguayan radio CX14 El Espectador. For this outlet, Jorge prepares pre-recorded parts to be joined to others recorded by Alberto Maravi and Nolo Mainero, two well known disk jockeys living in Montevideo.

Music Hall is recording "Acordeorama," a stereo selection of light classical music played by the Hohner Orchestra, and recorded originally by Vanguard, and a new version of Tchaikovsky's Sixth Symphony by the Wien Orchestra, directed by Vladimir Goldschman. King Records of Japan will release in that country several new waxings made by Feliciano Brunelli, Hector Varela, Jose Basso, Julio Molina Cabral and others. Music Hall has already sent the tapes to that country. Siro San Roman, one of the label's most important artists, has been inked by Channel 11 for a series of appearances in the "Saturday Show" program.

Rodriguez Luque of Disc Jockey reports about new releases by his label: "Matadora" and "Cuatro Paredes" by Victor Hugo and Los Caminantes; "Anda" by The Cousins; an LP by Brazilian artist Wilson Miranda, whose "Maria" has been running very well; "Route 66" by Don Nobody (Horacio Malvicino), "Dumpy" by Waldir Acevedo and "Tiki Tiki Puka" a Tamouretune by Los Waikikis.

Time To Promote

As long as our economy remains free we can expect all kinds of stiff competition within every field of endeavor. If you have chosen the field of coin machines for a profession from which you intend to garner a living or even a fortune, then naturally you won't have to look far to see the competition bearing down on you. The biggest mistake you can make, from where we sit, is to literally mind your own business. The fact is, unless you are working full time at getting the customers to pay mind to your business then that same competition we speak of might take over the whole kit and kaboodle. So get busy and promote.

Some pretty fair examples of what is being done to promote the respective causes these days might be cited here for the digestion of coinmen who operate almost under a veil of secrecy. We're speaking of the operator who goes to great lengths to keep his function in a community a deep, dark secret. He'd rather let the local citizenry believe that the machines are owned by the location or perhaps operated by an unknown organization with unclear lines of purpose—except to collect the cash each week and perhaps make a change or two in the music machine or the game on location. In too many instances, because of this attitude, the machine's identification becomes shrouded and loses money that could otherwise be promoted from closed pocketbooks.

Last week the country-western music people wanted to get some national publicity concerning their product and so told 1000 guests at the Roosevelt Hotel in New York all about it, how it's recorded, how it sounds, and what the people all over the country think of it—and how much money it makes. Each of the listeners was a decision-maker at corporate level and it was the hopes of the Country Music Association that the execs would decide in favor of country music the next time the need for a sales promotion idea cropped up.

The owner of a new nitery in New York City risked whatever it costs these days to open on the strength of a new sound in commercial music—gospel music molded for the cabaret crowds. He hands out tambourines to the customers as they enter and then calls every newspaper in town to report on how well the message is being received. The idea looks like it has explosive potential at this writing. But the point is, even if it dies, it won't be for lack of promotion.

Two weeks ago one of the most promotin' coinmen in the business literally spread his new equipment across the vacation-resort areas of New York State. The biggest hotel in the Catskills played host to a new golf machine, a new cigarette vendor, and his 1963 juke box will be introduced in four more top resorts before the month is out. In the meantime, lest there be any dull, circular, and ball pens with human interest guess games are distributed, especially to the hotel staffs. This makes for lots of conversation and in his case, sales. Here's a promoter at work. If the equipment doesn't go over—and there is no reason to expect it won't judging from the interest perked up—then it won't take long before the distributor knows it and makes the necessary changes. How refreshing when placed alongside the sad recipient of new product who waits, and sometimes dies with his latest offering. A distributor we know waited five days before even unpacking a new model last month. Visitors to the place saw only the unopened carton.

It is no secret that juke box sales haven't been what they once were several years ago. Why anyone is surprised at this revelation comes as a surprise in itself. There is a semi-saturation point in any business and when you compare the half-million or so juke boxes on location with the sprinkling of a few hundred thousand just ten years ago, it is understandable that new sales must slow down. But one manufacturer has taken a completely new tack in marketing new coin-operated phonographs by utilizing a mobile van which trucks the equipment right into the location owner's neighborhood, complete with factory salesmen, pat sales presentations and colorful demonstrations. Good, bad, right or wrong, only time will tell. We aren't familiar with the results of these sales techniques. However, who can knock the purpose when the goal will mean greater income for all concerned.

The coin machine operator in the community is just as important as the operator of the local movie house or the restaurant owner around the corner. He may very well have more invested and therefore more to lose than the retail record store, the sporting goods outlet, or the neighborhood ice cream or liquor dealers. But they all have one thing in common—entertainment in various forms—but the only one of the bunch who doesn't seem to want to promote his business is the coin machine operator.

The liquor firm tells the citizens what to order when they're in the bar, the radio blares the name of the ice cream for the sale at the malt shop, the record stores have the disk jockeys spinning the latest records backed up with newspaper advertising which seems to grow in size with each passing week. Is there a soul on the street who doesn't know what's playing at the Bijou movie house? And who would challenge the local eatery's fine reputation for the delicious blue ribbon special after all these years of his saying so, over and over again?

But what of our operator and his stereo music, his hi-fi sounds, his vast catalog of the same music they're buying at the record shop and listening to over the radio? What about his new game which features innumerable ways to score, and his brand new pool table. These are entertainment and amusement machines. But in too many cases it appears as though the operator believes that the sales promotion of this machine is also automatic, but it is not. Too many machines, and the operators who own them, are in the shadows of this highly competitive community we speak of. And the pleasure seekers head directly to the bar, off to the movie house, into the innumerable other outlets in search of entertainment, oblivious of the equipment which offers the very same amusement they seek. They just don't know it's there. It's high time it was pointed out to them.

MOA Convention Picture Continues To Brighten; Forums Will Cover Records, Routes, Legislation; 3 More Associations Send Money

California Donates \$1600 To MOA

OAKLAND, CALIF.—George A. Miller, President of the California Music Merchants Association, has advised that the west coast coin machine trade group has donated \$1600 to the Music Operators of America. Miller stated that the funds could be used to support the fight against the current copyright legislation (CB May 18) and that the gesture might establish a precedent for all other associations in the nation to follow suit.

N.Y. State Guild Sends MOA \$200 All Members Join

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y. — The New York State Operators Guild voted here last week to donate \$200 to the Music Operators of America for use in its program of rebuilding the national organization and in defending the country's operators against unfair legislation. NYS has twenty-eight members, all of whom unanimously agreed to join MOA. All MOA financial and membership activities will be channeled through the New York State Coin Machine Association, according to Guild president Mike Mulqueen. The NYS Association, led by Millie McCarthy, earlier announced its allegiance to MOA.

\$500 For MOA From Wisconsin

MILWAUKEE—Sam Hastings and Clint Pierce, president of the Milwaukee Coin Machine Association and the Wisconsin Music Merchants Association respectively, jointly announced following a meeting last week (separate story elsewhere) that a check for \$500 will be donated to MOA to help defray the costs of the Celler Bill fight. The coinmen discussed the Bill during a meeting which was addressed by MOA managing director, Bob Blundred.

No Word On Celler Bill Hearings

NEW YORK—The only word regarding the outcome of Celler Bill (HR 5174) hearings which were terminated here May 3 was unofficial, and both sides had the outcome in their favor. Unfortunately anything available at press time last week had to be classified as rumor.

Written testimony was submitted by the juke box industry and the performance rights societies last week and a decision was expected "shortly" from the subcommittee on Patents, Copyrights and Trademarks. Earlier testimony pertaining to the proposal, which if passed will remove the copyright exemption from juke box op-

UJA-Coin Drive In N.Y.C. For County D.A. Sees Goal In Reach Expect 500 At Americana

NEW YORK—The annual UJA-Coin Machine Division drive began to resemble the successful fund raising program conducted here for the last ten years following a committee meeting at MONY headquarters last Tuesday evening, May 14, when Chairman Irving Holzman announced that approximately 500 guests would attend the affair, based on ticket reservations recorded as of the meeting. The June 4 Victory Dinner honoring Nassau District Attorney William Cahn will also culminate a drive which, based on records of cash on hand Tuesday, should reach the expected \$30,000 usually raised each year.

The Americana Hotel may resemble a political dinner more so than a coin machine affair but industry leaders here are not unhappy about it. Because of the position of the Guest of Honor, and the Guest Speaker, N.Y.S. Attorney General Louis J. Lefkowitz, coinmen at the banquet will be joined by close to forty district and assistant district attorneys from all over New York State and various other civic and political dignitaries. It appears that all the officials have been waiting for all these years was the invitation. Now that one of their colleagues is being honored, officials from every county in the State have responded

erators, called for a \$5 annual fee per machine from the composer side of the argument, and a suggestion from the juke box industry that mechanical royalties included in the selling price of records be increased from the present two cents per disk. Observers expected the decision to be in favor of the performance rights societies thereby sending the Celler Bill before the full judiciary committee and possibly on to the House for vote. However the outcome was far from certain as Chairman Edwin Willis (D.La.) and his committee studied the testimony.

CHICAGO—"The forums at the 1963 MOA Convention will emphasize practical solutions to problems operators face in conducting their day to day business affairs,"—so reported Ted Nichols, Kyes-Nichols Music Co., Fremont, Nebr., Chairman of the Association's Convention Committee in charge of arranging the forums. "These forums have been planned in order not to compete with the hours the exhibits will be open for visiting," Nichols continued. "It has been decided that the booths will be open during the afternoon hours of the Convention. We plan to hold the forums in the mornings and on one evening during the Convention. They will be held at different times during the September 4, 5, and 6 convention days at the Morrison Hotel in Chicago." Nichols is assisted on committee by Harry Snodgrass, Norman Gefke, and Henry Leyser.

There will be three general and one special forum during the Convention. The three forums open to all convention registrants will deal with the Programming Of Music, Route Administration and Federal-State-Local Government Developments.

The Programming conclave will open with a keynote address by a well known music company personality. He will outline his views and suggestions on what the operator should practice in order to do the best possible job in merchandising the music on his machines. After this presentation operators, one-stop retailers and representatives of other industry segments will talk on their recommendations to help the operator do a better job. The operator speakers will be asked how they select records and the methods they use in placing or classifying the records on the juke boxes. A question and answer period will conclude the forum.

The Route Administration forum will be opened by an experienced vending operator telling about his successful business methods in running a route, and also describing certain techniques that have not been successful. This speaker will draw the parallels between the two industries, pointing out the things music operators should do in order to be as efficient as possible. The other speakers at this forum will be music operators explaining the techniques they use in maintaining relations with the locations, how to handle route men, the importance of service, and the use of bookkeeping information to keep equipment on the best possible rotation basis.

The third general forum will comprise presentations by various personalities on governmental developments that have affected our industry during the past year. Talks will be given on how locations have reacted to the filing of 1099 forms, how the new depreciation of equipment schedule has been administered by operators, and local government attitudes toward game machines since the passage of the latest amendment to the Johnson Act.

The one special forum will be for the officers and staffs of state and local associations. This forum will be chaired by Joe Silverman, Business Mgr., Philadelphia Amusement Association. The speakers will include people from associations who have dealt with these problems.

"Let's face it," Nichols concluded, "we can all read about solutions to business problems but there is no substitute for having fellow operators and others directly involved in our business present their suggestions to our day-to-day problems. The forums of the 1963 MOA Convention have been designed with this objective in mind."

Milwaukee Challenges \$250 Tax Stamp Charge On Conversion Games

CHICAGO—The Milwaukee Coin Machine Operators' Association and the Wisconsin State Music Merchants Association held a joint general meeting last Monday evening, May 13, in the Amber Room of the Ambassador Hotel in this city, during which certain local legislative, as well as national problems were discussed.

The Milwaukee Association earlier decided to go to court against the Federal Government as a result of Federal agents confiscating certain machines. The games are converted bingo machines with single dime play in place of the multiple coin mechanism which requires a \$250 tax stamp. Pinball machines, which is what the conversion machines are called by the trade here, are legal and each of the machines confiscated was licensed by the City. The individual machines, according to Sam Hastings, were approved by the license department. Milwaukee association leaders advised that the coinmen discussed the legal move with responsible civic officials and were advised to test the issue in court and to expect favorable outcome. Court date is pending.

The Milwaukee group is headed by president Sam Hastings, owner of Hastings Distributing Company. The state organization's delegation is led by Clinton S. Pierce, W.S.M.-M.A.'s President. He is also MOA's board chairman.

Hastings opened the proceedings promptly at 8:30 p.m. by introducing the following speakers: Robert H. (Bob) Blundred, managing director of MOA; Pierce, who discussed the up-to-date status in the Congressional Subcommittee on Patents, Copyrights and Trademarks in Washington relating to the new Celler's Bill (H.R. 5174). He was aided by Edward Dowe, the Wisconsin association's secretary-treasurer, and Lee Brooks, of Cash Box, who was guest speaker for the evening. The much publicized discussion of the pinball ban here in Milwaukee didn't materialize because of the situation concerning this problem at the present time. Actually, the industry here is in the process of informing the local authorities on the intricacies of the amusement machine business in the hope that officials understand the machine, the operator and the industry in general, before supporting any such move.

A highlight of this meeting, however, was the unanimous approval from the entire Wisconsin operator group in attendance to present MOA, through Pierce and Blundred, with a \$500 check to help defray the costs in the fight against the Celler Bill.

Blundred opened his address with a sincere greeting from the entire MOA aggregation. He gave a detailed report on the acceleration in the development of the national music oper-

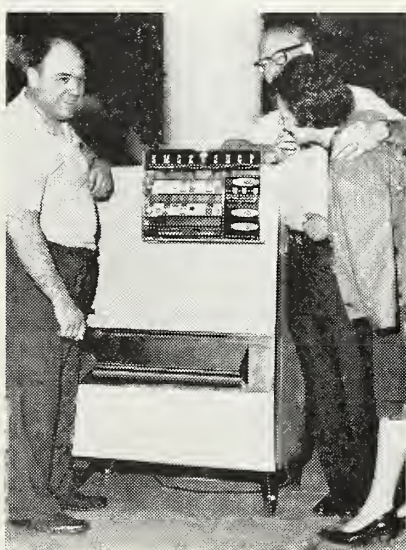

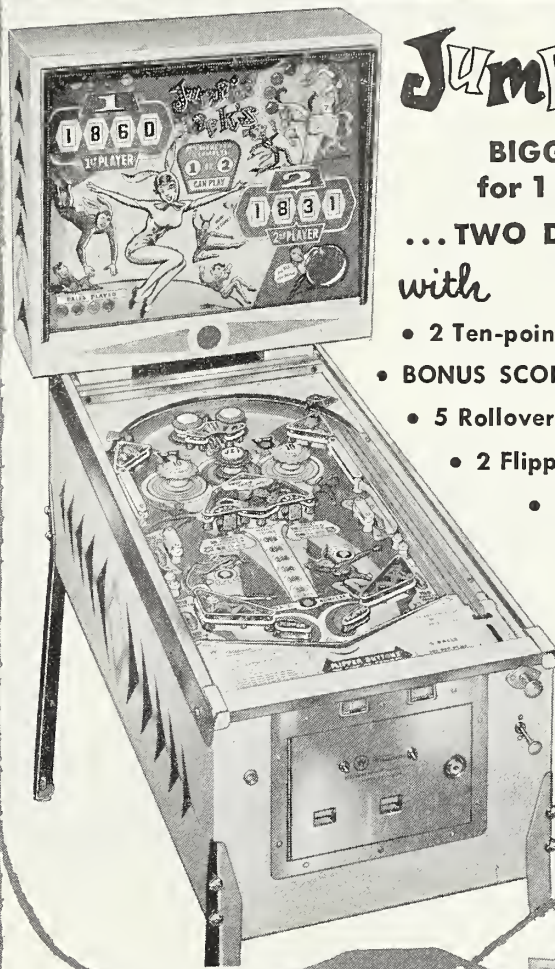

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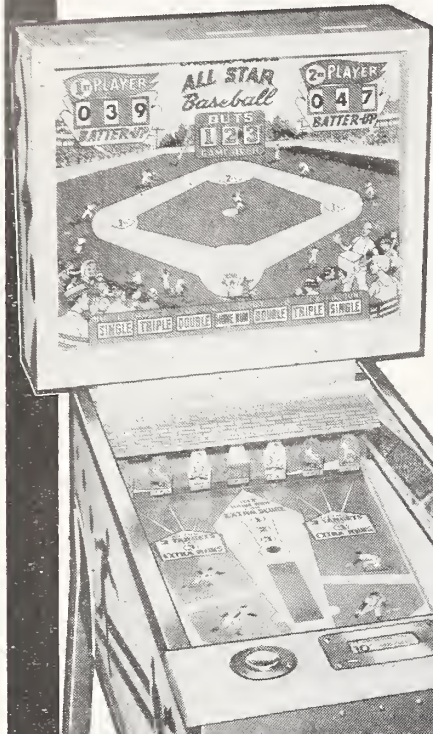


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Eastern Flashes

Look for Mike Mulqueen to be re-elected president of the NYS Guild next month. He's done a great job leading the upstate group and the support has been wonderful.

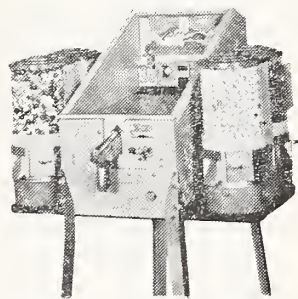

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Keeney Ships 'Go Cart' Pingame, Single Player Features Extra Ball

CHICAGO—Roy McGinnis, President, J. H. Keeney & Company, Inc., announced a new single-player pinball amusement machine — "Go Cart" — with scoring features patterned after karting, the popular sport of racing home-built motorized carts on small raceways.

"Go Cart" is a three or five ball (adjustable) pin game, which uses one re-playable ball. An automatic ball lift mechanism puts the ball back into action immediately after it has completed one play.

Housed in an attractive, long-wear cabinet, the game has an all-steel front door with slug rejectors, plus the new playboard lock release and front molding locking bar unit — eliminating screws and molding bolts permitting quick servicing.

Built with an extra long-life hardwood game board surface, the easy-to-maintain cabinet has polished chrome sides, side rails and front rail.

The electrically lighted and tallied machine has "abundant flipper action" to extend play of the suspense filled, single player game, according to the manufacturer.

Replays are available under two methods of scoring: lighting up all seven "Go Cart" models on the machine's back glass by lighting the corresponding bumper and then going through the channels just below the No. 5 and No. 7 targets. This logs up one replay each time a ball passes through this route.

The second way to win replays is by having a player score 100 points over the pre-adjusted winning score. The winning score can be set at 1,100, 1,200, 1,300, 1,400 or 1,500 points. One replay is given for each additional score of 100 or 200 (adjustable) over the winning total.
