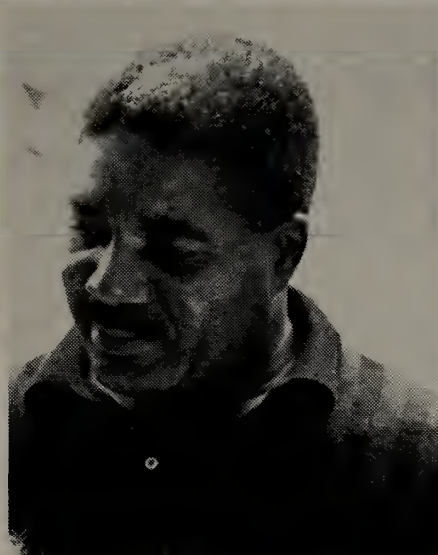
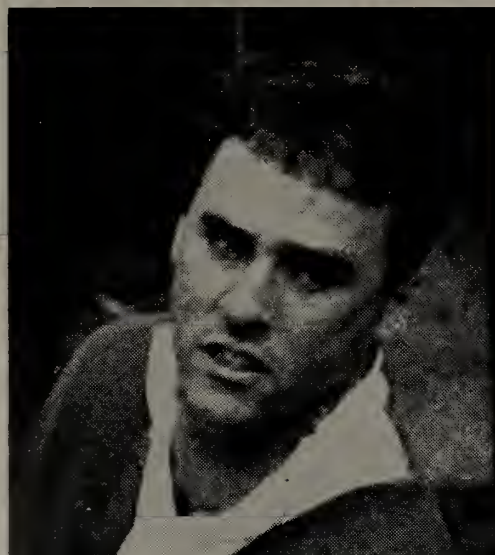

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THE SINGLES LP

As 1964 came to a close, the disk business extended even further a newer concept it had put into force earlier in the year.

Cash Box, in an earlier editorial, had taken note of the blossoming out of the "singles LP." The editorial referred to those LP's released immediately following and bearing the name of a singles hit that had begun to fall from its sales peak. This thinking enabled a company to market an album containing the hit—with the song as its title—and not cut significantly into the single's final sales total.

But as the year went on, it became apparent that labels with major singles artists were eager to market their albums **before** the sales steam of a single's hit had run out.

For example, Columbia was out with Robert Goulet's "My Love Forgive Me," Kapp with Jack Jones' "Dear Heart" and Capitol with "Beatles '65" which wasn't named after a hit, but nevertheless contained two current Beatles' smashes, "I Feel Fine" and "She's A Woman."

Obviously, labels have come to the conclusion that any loss in sales of the single hit will be more than off-set by the gains of getting to market an LP that has the big merchandising advantage of containing a still climbing Top 100 item. And when you've got artists who are already established album acts, decisions of

this sort make even more sense.

But, whether labels are dealing with strong album artists or not, it looks as though this formula is going to continue and, from this corner, develop into a major merchandising concept.

It should be emphasized that the industry is by no means writing-off the singles market. Labels are still firm in their belief that a singles hit is the rapid-fire route to popularity. All disk artists in many musical areas still want that **hit** single. It virtually assures good album success for most artists and can lead to the creation of a continually saleable album act.

Manufacturers are applying correct reasoning when they look the disk field over and conclude that more than ever before they have little time to waste in the marketing of an album follow-up to a singles hit.

This concept demands that labels be fully prepared to act on making the "Single LP" available with due haste. It presents more complex thinking when a company feels or has it confirmed that a single is destined to make it. The follow-up LP must come immediately into play and with it, of course, the recording of 10 or 12 new cuts.

What this all means, in fact, is that the singles-only company of a few years ago is just about extinct. A more well-rounded and fast moving operation is the order of the day.

LABELS HEAD INTO '65 WITH NEW LP RELEASE

Columbia Releases 27 January Albums

NEW YORK—Columbia Records will release 27 albums in Jan. Featured are 13 pop recordings, among which are debut LP's by new French vocalist Jean-Paul Vignon and pianist Neil Wolfe, and 8 Masterworks LP's, including Vladimir Horowitz's first recorded recital of an all-Scarlatti Sonata program. The release also offers 3 albums in the Latin American EX series, and 3 new LP's on the special low-priced Harmony label.

The label's pop release includes: "Because I Love You" by Jean-Paul Vignon, Neil Wolfe's "Piano My Way," "Jazz Impressions Of New York" by Dave Brubeck, "The Clancy Brothers And Tommy Makem in Ireland," "Standing Ovation" by Jerry Vale, Percy Faith's "Latin Themes For Young Lovers," "The New Christy Minstrels Sing And Play Cowboys And Indians," Ray Price's "Burning Memories," "That New Gang Of Mine" by Jerry Murad's Harmonicats, "Fairwell Hawaii" by the Kilima Hawaiians, "Marion Worth Sings Marty Robbins," and "The Rhythms Of Broadway" by Johnny Mathis.

The classical albums, in addition to the above-mentioned Horowitz Scarlatti disk, are: Mendelssohn's E Major and A-Flat Major Concerto performed by duo-pianists Arthur Gold and Robert Fildale, a selection of Mozart Piano Quartets played by members of the Budapest String Quartet, "Richard Tucker Sings Arias From Ten Verdi Operas," "Bern-

"A Record Year" Theme For New Mercury LP's

CHICAGO—Mercury Records opened the new year with an announcement of its new sales theme, "Make Yours A Record Year . . . Every Day." The novel pitch, which will introduce a Jan. product of 23 new albums, was described at a series of regional sales meetings in New York, Chicago, Atlanta, and Los Angeles.

The pop releases are highlighted by: "Typical American Boys" by the Mitchell Trio; Johnny Mathis' "Love is Everything," "Julie Rogers," "The Hondells," "The Queen and Quincy," with Dinah Washington and Quincy Jones; "The New Soul of the Platters Campus Style," The Red Ryders platter, "Looking Good, Soundin' Good," "Whiskey A Go-Go Presents Billy Lee Riley," "Discover The Bitter End Singers," Ronnie Dobson's "For the Love of Him," "Heartaches and Tears" by George Jones, "Bravo Jankowski" by the Horst Jankowski Orchestra and Chorus; and "The Searchers Meet the Rattlers." Two other pop releases directed at the teens caught up in the model building fad are "The Wierd-Ohs," and "The Silly Surfers."

The first theatrical recordings, "I Had a Ball," and Arthur Miller's "After the Fall," are included in the new package.

The new classical product includes: a collection of pieces by Stravinsky performed by the London Symphony Orchestra; "Tchaikovsky Waltzes" by the same artists; "Hayden Chamber Concertos" played by the Vienna Symphony Orchestra; Vol. 3 of "The Music of Leroy Anderson" by Fred-

"Love" Theme Of Six New Capitol Albums

HOLLYWOOD—Six new albums, including Nancy Wilson's first on-stage LP and another instrumental package of hits by The Hollyridge Strings, comprise Capitol's pop-album release for January.

The deluxe Nancy Wilson LP was recorded during the singer's recent record-breaking booking at the Coconut Grove in Los Angeles.

The Hollyridge album, the fourth by the group (and arranger-conductor Stu Phillips), consists of instrumental versions of songs made famous by Elvis Presley. The three other Hollyridge LP's featured songs of the Beatles, Beach Boys and Four Seasons. To date, the three packages have sold close to 400,000 albums.

Other albums slated for release Monday are Al Martino's "We Could," a follow-up to the single of the same name, and Nat King Cole's "L-O-V-E." Also featured are Charlie Louvin's first solo album for Capitol, "Less And Less/I Don't Love You Anymore" and "You're The Only World I Know," by Sonny James.

The six LP's will be given a full-scale promotion/merchandising/advertising campaign with a "Love" theme.

Dealers will be mailed special "Love Promotion Kits" (each kit contains large heart-shaped, three dimensional center piece which holds Nat King Cole's "L-O-V-E" LP; three easel-back small hearts to hold the new Hollyridge Strings, Nancy Wilson and Al Martino albums, and a small Whitman's chocolate sampler).

Heart-shaped "Love" window dis-

MGM/Verve Bows New LP's At Distrib Meets

NEW YORK—MGM/Verve unveiled its 18 album Jan. release at the three regional meetings recently conducted in New York, Chicago, and San Francisco. Arnold Maxin, label prexy, and his director of marketing, Morrie Price, chaired the three meetings, which had 100 per cent distributor and distributor salesmen attendance. In addition to the exposure of new product, Maxin reported on the successful year his firm enjoyed in '64.

MGM releases include: "Great Country Favorites" by Connie Francis and Hank Williams, Jr.; Harve Presnell's "New Echoes Of The Old West;" Harry James' "In A Relaxed Mood;" "The Other Side Of Ray Peterson;" "The Animals On Tour;" "Introducing Herman's Hermits;" Joe Quijano's "Fiddler On The Roof Goes Latin;" "Ello Stanley" by Holloway; and Joni James' "Bossa Nova Style."

New Verve product presented for Jan. release includes: "Ella Fitzgerald at Juan Les Pins;" "Soft Samba" by Gary McFarland;" "One Shining Hour" by Sammy Davis and Count Basie;" the Oscar Peterson Trio's "We Get Requests;" "The Astrud Gilberto Album;" "Up With Donald Byrd;" "Movin' Wes" with Wes Montgomery; Caj Tjader's "Soul Sauce;" and "If The Shoe Fits . . ." by Vaughn Meader.

Another significant part of the meeting was the introduction of a new low priced line under the Metro label with Irv Stimler in charge of sales and repertoire. He will also be involved in the creation of album art

Philips LP's Bow With Slogan "3 For The Money—4th To Go"

CHICAGO—"3 For The Money—4th To Go" is the theme of the January program introduced to Philips distributors, salesmen and promotion men in a series of formal meetings recently held on a regional basis around the country.

Lou Simon, the label's national sales chief, and his entire staff conducted each of the meetings, which were held Dec. 27 in New York, Dec. 28 in Atlanta, Dec. 29 in Chicago and in Los Angeles on the 30th.

The plan, which lists 13 albums, offers a 10% discount on all new January releases and the entire LP catalog. It will remain in effect from Jan. 1 through Feb. 28 and will also cover any additional LP's released during that period.

The albums included in the program are "Anyone For Mozart?" by the Swingles Singers (the French jazz singers who just concluded a successful U.S. tour), "Zizi," the original cast'er of Zizi Jeanmarie review which has been doing excellent business in New York since its Fall opening, "Goldfinger, Dear Heart" and "Other Great Movie Songs" by Teresa Brewer. "A Portrait Of Johnny" by English arranger-conductor Robert Farnon & his ork (interpreting the Johnny Mathis hits), Lester Lanin's Broadway hit, "I Had A Ball," the Swiss composer-arranger George Gruntz Quintet in a jazz LP—"Bach Humbug"—which swings the Baroque composers — excluding Bach and "Jonathon, David and Elbert," a package that bears the names of three young new pop-folk singers.

Issued in the Philips' Connoisseur Collection series are the original soundtrack recordings of "The Umbrellas Of Cherbourg" (Les Parapluis de Cherbourg), the Michel Legrand composed and conducted score of the pic awarded the "Gold Palm" at the 1964 Cannes Film Festival and "The

Epic's New Year Issue Features 9 New LP's

NEW YORK—Epic Records is releasing nine albums and one tape for Jan. Featured are three popular LP's, highlighted by Damita Jo's premiere Epic album, "This Is Damita Jo." Also included are four classical recordings, two LP's in the label's international series and one classical tape.

The Damita Jo debut disk offering features the vet pop-r&b vocalist reading a bevy of evergreens. The other pop releases are "New Beat On Broadway!" by the Village Stompers and Buddy Greco's "Modern Sounds Of Hank Williams."

The label's two releases in the international series include "Mariachi! The Soul Of Mexico," which features a collection of chestnuts played by an authentic Mexican band, and "The Romantic Mandolins Of Naples"/"O Sole Mio" conducted by Iller Pattacini.

The release is rounded out by 4 classical LP's and one classical tape: Beethoven's Symphony No. 1 and No. 2 conducted by George Szell and the Cleveland Orchestra (a 4-track stereo tape will be released simultaneously with this album); an album of Italian flute concertos by Vivaldi, Pergolesi, etc. featuring Jean-Pierre Rampel; Niccolò Paganini's twenty-four Caprices, Op. 1 performed on the viola by Emanuel Vardi and "The Soul Of Naples," which spotlights Italian tenor Giuseppe Di Stefano singing a collection of standards.

Five New Command LP's

NEW YORK—Five new albums will be issued in January by Command, it was announced last week by Enoch Light, managing director. Among them will be Carol Channing's first album for the label. The others will be albums featuring Tony Mattola, Dick Hyman, Lee Evans and a Cole Porter Medley by Enoch Light and his Light Brigade.

Vee Jay Offers 26 LP's; Feather's Jazz Line Bows

HOLLYWOOD—The Vee Jay label, driving for further penetration into the LP market, starts 1965 with a January release of 26 albums announced last week by the label's topper, Randy Wood. The albums cover a broad span of music from pop to jazz to gospel.

Seven pop packages include albums from Vee Jay's best-selling artists, Hoyt Axton, Jerry Butler, Betty Everett, the Four Seasons and Little Richard, as well as albums from two new pactees, organist Billy Preston and Bandleader Russ Morgan.

Long a leader in the gospel field, Vee Jay's January release for this field features 6 new LP's. Artists include the Caravans, the Harmonizing Four, Maceo Woods, the Highway QCs, the Reverend Blair, and a memorial album on Archie Brownlee.

Four albums are included in the new "Great Moments Preserved" series with special quality packaging, and the new jazz series under the direction of consultant Leonard Feather (see other story) accounts for another five albums in the January release.

Rounding out the 26 total is a group of four albums being recorded in Italy by the Castaway Strings: "The Elvis Presley Song Book" and "The Andy Williams Song Book" feature arrangements by Bill Finnegan, and "Song Book" albums on Peter, Paul and Mary tunes and on Bobby Vinton were arranged by Bill Marx.

The extensive release, however, does not account for entire January schedule, Wood pointed out. At least six other albums are now being cut with plans for their release before the end of the month.

Meanwhile, company is allowing no let-up in steady release of singles from such major artists as Terry Black, Sam Fletcher, Hoyt Axton,

New Starday Program Ties-In With Stamp Promo

NASHVILLE—Chuck Chellman, vice president of sales for Starday Records, announced recently that the label had initiated a tie-in with the Top Value Trading Stamp Co. to highlight Starday's fourth annual country music sales plan.

Each regular series album in the plan will contain a "Country Music Bonanza Coupon" encased in the skin-tight overwrap and clearly visible to consumer, which is redeemable by the customer for 50 Top Value stamps and good for merchandise at the firm's redemption centers, which are located throughout the U.S.

Phase 1 of the plan, which kicked off Jan. 1, offers six new regular series Starday albums by Roger Miller, Pete Drake, Cowboy Copas, Carl Story, Joe Maphis and an instrumental LP with Boots Randolph and Hank Garland. These will all contain the Top Value coupon. Also in phase 1 of the plan is a new "Wonderful World Of Country Music" sampler-type LP by top label artists and three economy series Nashville albums by Tommy Hill, the Lonesome Pine Fiddlers and a set by various c&w artists.

Phase 2 of the program starts Feb. 15, and offers an additional six new regular series albums—"Doin' My Time," an all-star disk of prison songs; "Country Girl Hall Of Fame," featuring staff stars as Dottie West, Jonie Mosby, Patsy Cline, Betty Amos, etc.; "Golden Guitar" by Joe Maphis; "The Gospel Hall Of Fame," featuring such names as George Jones, the Lewis Family, Cowboy Copas; a newly-recorded album of truck driver songs by the Willis Brothers; and "Town And Country Guitar" by Arthur "Guitar Boogie" Smith.

In discussing the program, Starday president Don Pierce pointed out that the use of trading stamps direct to the consumer with the purchase of an album is a "first" for the record

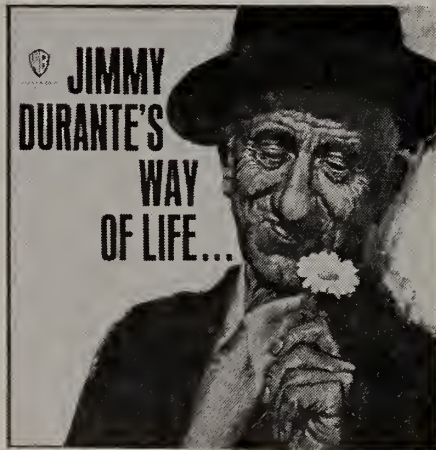
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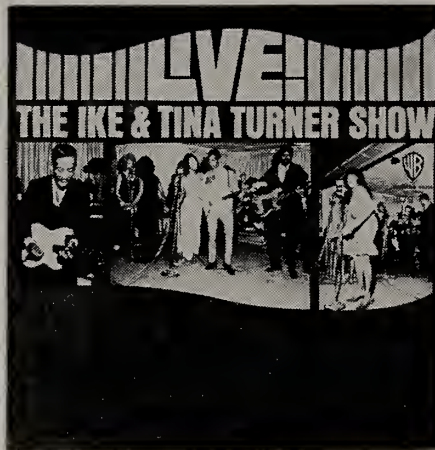
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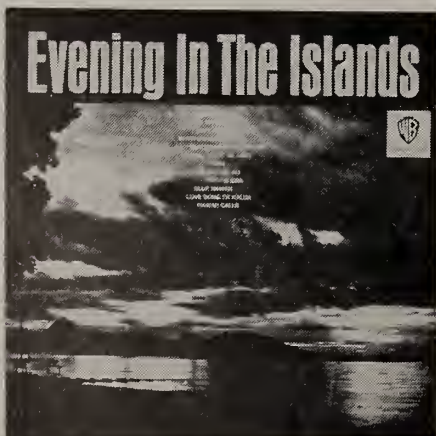
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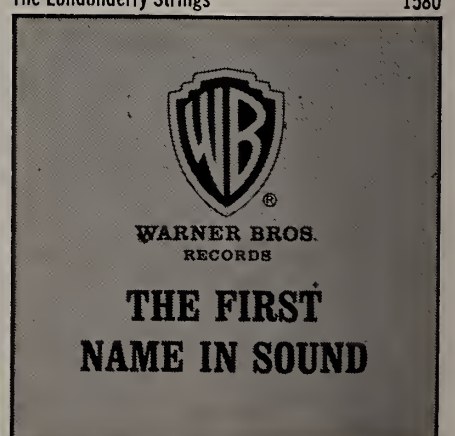
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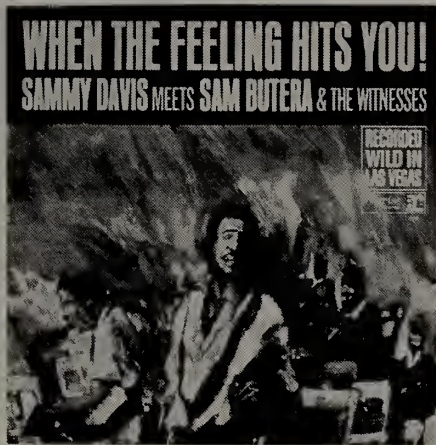
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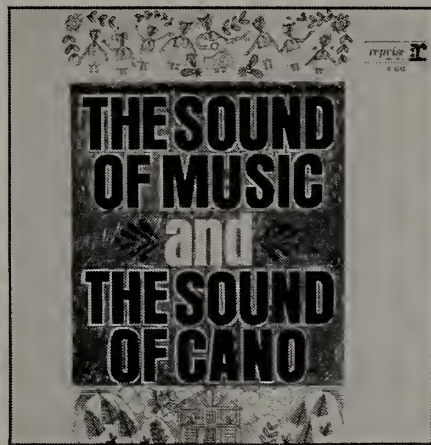
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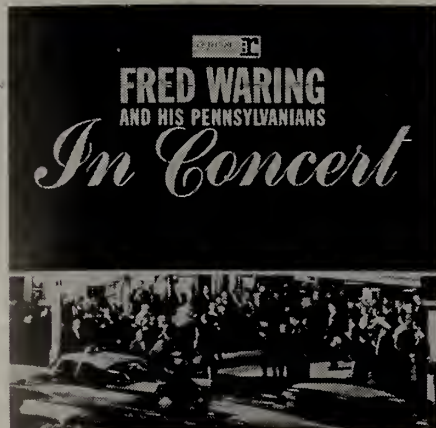
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1964 Scepter's Best Year To Date

NEW YORK—Although all too many indie labels experienced severe losses last year in the wake of the British invasion, Scepter Records kept rolling along to happy tune of \$2,189,332 in billings, a hefty increase of \$485,899 over the previous year's figures.

Throughout the year, Scepter and its affiliated firms have been consistently represented on the best-seller charts. "Louie, Louie" by the Kingmen and Dionne Warwick's "Walk On By" were but a few of the label's records reaching high positions on the Top 100 during 1964.

An interesting aspect of the firm's growth is the fact that the operation has moved from a once singles-oriented set-up into a significant album line. A major part of the firm's grosses now come from the sales of LP's.

Philips Introduces New "Double Hit" Singles

CHICAGO—Philips Records last week announced the first release in its new "Double Hit" series, a special series of past single hits, featuring two hits on each record.

Thirty-two hit songs—sixteen records—qualify for inclusion in the first release, based on their sales history and chart record.

The artists represented in the first Double Hit release are diversified and the material offers the broadest possible range.

The series is being made available initially through a pre-pack which contains seventy-two records. The self-contained Pre-Pack sets up in half a minute. The browser box has room for additional records and will hold up to one hundred at a time. It is being offered at a 10 per cent discount as long as the quantity lasts. A single record in the "Double Hit" series, other than in Pre-Pack form, is priced as a regular Philips' single.

Some of the "Double Hit" singles included in the first release feature the 4 Seasons with "Dawn" b/w "Rag Doll"; Woody Herman—"Days of Wine and Roses" b/w "A Taste of Honey"; The Serendipity Singers—"Crooked Little Man" b/w "Beans in My Ears"; Nina Simone—"I Loves You, Porgy" b/w "See-Line Woman"; Paul and Paula with "Hey Paula" b/w "Something Old, Something New"; The Springfielders—"Silver Threads and Golden Needles" b/w "Island of Dreams"; and Teresa Brewer's "Ricochet" b/w "Music! Music! Music!"

Utilities & Industries Names Warren Ling To Exec Post

NEW YORK—Richard L. Rosenthal, president of Utilities and Industries, the huge corporate complex which recently acquired Mills Music, announced last week that Warren Ling had become associated with the firm. He will assume consulting and advisory responsibilities for all leisure time and entertainment interests in which U & I has or may have significant commitments, including particularly the business of Mills.

Ling, a veteran of the music biz, was employed by RCA Victor between 1946 and 1960 in various capacities, including as manager of the label's artist and copyright contracts department. From 1960 through 1963 he was vice president of Belafonte Enterprises, through which various publishing and recording activities of Harry Belafonte are conducted. For the year 1964, he served as vice-president and general manager of Kapp Records.

During 1964 Scepter also launched itself into a position of prominence in the international field through affiliations with important record companies.

Outstanding in this field has been the French recording giant, Vogue Productions Internationales Phonographiques and its affiliated European companies who have promoted and publicized Dionne Warwick through the continent. Also contributing to the Scepter success has been the activity of Pye Records, the British representative and the Philips group in Scandinavia, Italy, the Middle East and the Far East.

Late in 1964 Scepter launched a new, highly specialized label called Mace with an initial release of six albums featuring selected recordings in the folk and classical field from European sources. It is now an established part of the Scepter program to release a minimum of twenty-four selected LP's each year on the Mace label featuring international recordings.

Savoy Releases Five New Gospel Albums

NEW YORK — Savoy Records, the gospel-oriented indie, is kicking off the new year with five new additions to its already extensive album catalog. The new LP's are: "Rev. Cleophus Robinson," "The Mighty Gospel Giants," "Banks Bros. Back Home Choir," "James Cleveland And The Cleveland Singers" and "The Famous Angelic Choir."

6 Debut LP's Launch New Limelight Label

CHICAGO—Limelight Records, Mercury's new jazz division, announced its premiere release of six albums. The debut package includes: "Baby Breeze" by Chet Baker, "S Make It" by Art Blakey and the Jazz Messengers, Gerry Mulligan's "Butterfly With Hiccups," and "El Nutto" by Terry Gibbs. Also included in the release are Quincy Jones, Dizzy Gillespie, Art Blakey, The Oscar Peterson Trio, Milt Jackson and Chet Baker combined in "I/We Had a Ball," which features original renditions of the numbers from the Broadway musical "I Had a Ball." Rounding out the list of entries is a two-pocket collection of the best efforts of "The Immortal Clifford Brown."

The label's album assemblage is highlighted by use of textured papers for the double-fold covers, and unusual coloration themes for each package. In addition to the standard double-cover inner liner notes, Limelight will follow the presentation of the Philips PCC Connoisseur Series, which includes informative as well as graphic inserts.

Colpix Into Major Drive On TV Star John Davidson

HOLLYWOOD—The first major drive by newly-organized Colpix Records will be on John Davidson, singing star of the CBS-TV network program, "The Entertainers." The big promo was announced by the label's topper, v.p. and gen. mgr., Bob Yorke in conjunction with the release of Davidson's first album, "The Young, Warm Sound of John Davidson."

The overall promotion campaign includes an advertising schedule in the trade press, a full scale publicity buildup and national mailings to disk jockeys, retailers, one-stops and rack jobbers. In addition to personal contact with disk jockeys and press by Colpix staffers and distributors, the services of two outside public relations firms have been enlisted to kick off the campaign. Davidson will make personal appearances to plug the album whenever his schedule permits, although his continuing TV commitments will limit his travels to Eastern states.

Colpix-Dimension Bows New Price Policies

HOLLYWOOD—Bob Yorke, head of Colpix and Dimension Records, has announced a reduction at distributor price levels in connection with a major revision of sales policies. Pricing changes were only one of several elements in the new program aimed at clearing away obstacles in the distributor-record company relationship. New policies include: replacement of free-goods bonuses, and of assorted discounts and allowances, by a consistently maintained reduced price for both albums and singles; complete elimination of allocations and guaranteed sales; and an increased return privilege on singles. There is also recognition of distributors' special needs concerning quantity album sales to rack jobbers and one-stops, which provides for a 10 per cent discount on all such sales.

Under the new Colpix-Dimension plan, distributors' costs on 45's were cut by 6 cents; and album prices have also been lowered by varying amounts, ranging from nine cents on kiddie albums to 27 cents on top-listed stereo LP's. Within this span, reductions of 18 and 22 cents per unit have been effected on the "400" and "500" series, respectively.

The program aims at getting away from the prevailing practice of basing virtually all sales programs on free goods. Yorke voiced disapproval of this policy for several reasons; confusing disparities in policy by different companies, inconsistencies in the "deals" by a single firm, and the tendency to change terms on even a single item were the major points.

By offering this reduction in price, rather than free goods with the purchase of a quantity, the dealers should

benefit by obtaining the same profit margin while stocking 10 per cent less merchandise. This cuts the staggering load which the dealer has had to maintain, cuts inventory costs, and increases turnover, thereby benefiting both the distributor and dealer.

The only exception (aside from promotional disks, which are not affected) regards an allowance based on proven rack jobber sales. "This is a matter of meeting an issue that can't be avoided today," Yorke points out. "Every label is doing something about it; our plan is the most liberal I know of. And since we'll merely be replacing a portion of merchandise quantities already sold by the distributor, this can't be considered as contributing to the inventory-inflation problem we're so interested in fighting."

All changes have already been made known to the labels' distributors, many of whom quickly voiced strong approval. Details were disclosed via a "1965 Sales Policies" booklet sent out by newly-named general sales manager, Ben Hurwitz. They were finalized during a series of meetings held in mid-December as Yorke's recently formed executive team, spearheaded by Hurwitz and Merchandising Manager Orrin Keepnews, assembled at their new Hollywood offices. According to Yorke, all concerned felt the need for "a realistic and mature approach to basic trade problems, particularly in terms of changing some standardized practices that have lost their original validity and become mere sales habits."

"Revision of sales policies seemed a necessary first step," the labels' chief noted. "It will be followed by other in promotion, a & r, and elsewhere."

'Cotton Candy' Marks Hirt's 2nd RIAA Gold-LP In '64

New York—Al Hirt shortly will receive a Gold Record award signifying sales in excess of \$1,000,000 for his RCA Victor album "Cotton Candy," making it two such awards in 1964 for the famed trumpeter.

The RIAA has certified "Cotton Candy" for the award and as of last week it's been reported that more than half a million copies of the album had been sold. The album was produced in RCA Victor's Nashville studios by Chet Atkins.

Atkins also produced "Honey in the Horn," the first Hirt album to win a Gold Record in 1964. Released in August, 1963 as part of RCA Victor's "Best Buy" program, "Honey in the Horn" was certified last April.

Both albums, as well as two other Hirt albums, are currently riding the best selling charts. The others are "Sugar Lips" and "Pops Goes the Trumpet." The latter features Al as star soloist with the Boston Pops Orchestra conducted by Arthur Fiedler.

This week, RCA Victor released "The Best of Al Hirt," an album incorporating some of Al's most successful performances.

8 New Jan. Prestige LP's

New York—Prestige Records has announced the release of eight new albums for January. 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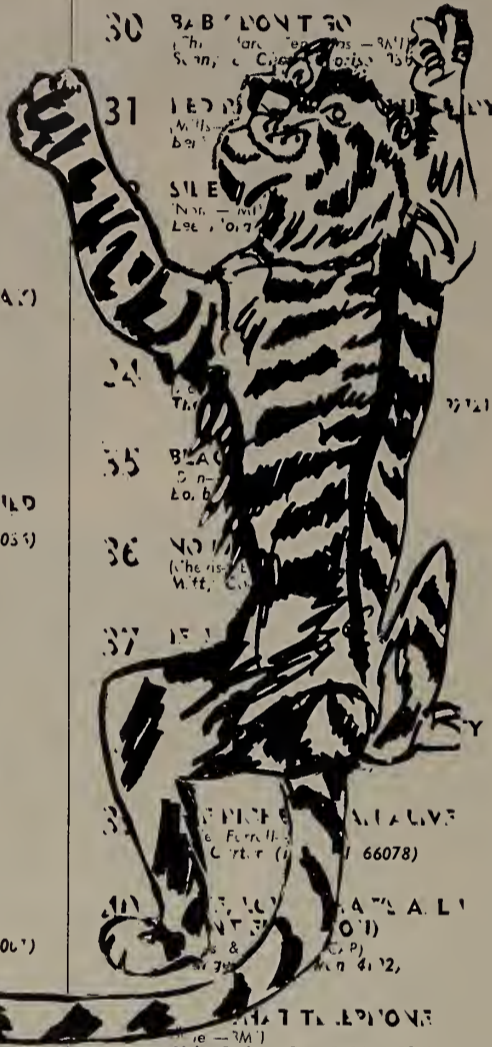

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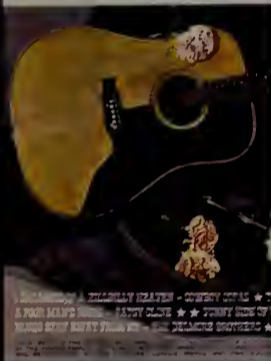

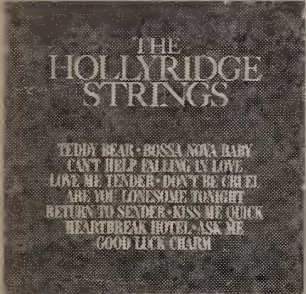
ALBUM REVIEWS

POP PICKS



THE RETURN OF ROGER MILLER—Smash MGS 27061/SRS 67061

Roger Miller, who is currently scoring in both the pop and country departments with "Do-Waka-Do" (included on this set), comes up with his second Smash program of mostly self-penned items. The songster pulls out all the stops as he dishes-up top-flight renditions of "Atta Boy Girl," "That's The Way It's Always Been" and "Love Is Not For Me." Disk should reach the charts in no time flat.



THE HOLLYRIDGE STRINGS PLAY HITS MADE FAMOUS BY ELVIS PRESLEY—Capitol T/ST 2221

The Hollyridge Strings, arranged and conducted by Stu Phillips, who have had tremendous chart acceptance with their three previous albums featuring tunes by the Beatles, the Beach Boys, and the Four Seasons, present another LP in that vein with lush string arrangements of Elvis hits. The teen hits done up in smooth style should sell this album to both the teens and adults. Watch this for quick chart reaction.



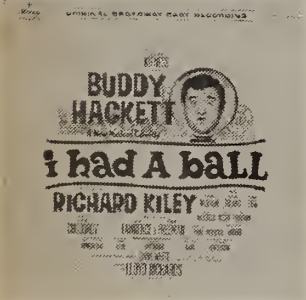
STANDING OVATION!—Jerry Vale—Columbia CL 2273/CS 9073

This is the first "live" recording of a Jerry Vale performance, taped live at Carnegie Hall, and the songster displays a presence of style seldom captured in a studio session. The crooner's versatility comes through in a series of ballads, bouncers, and Italian favorites. Shining cuts include: "Granada," "I'm Always Chasing Rainbows," and an Italian medley with Vale's hit "Mala Femina." This platter has much definitely airworthy material, and should be well received by his adult and teen audience. Certain hitsville disk.



THE BEST OF AL HIRT—LPM/LSP 3309

RCA Victor has gone back through Hirt's big albums, extracted 12 of the best selections and put them together in a striking LP in which Hirt's brilliant style shines. Some of the attention getters are "Java," "Cotton Candy," "Sugar Lips," "Stranger In Paradise," and "Holiday For Trumpet," which indeed provides a holiday for listeners. Almost sure to pull coin.



I HAD A BALL—Original Cast—Mercury OCM 2210

One of the new season's most successful main stem musicals, "I Had A Ball" boasts a spankingly well-integrated Jack Lawrence-Stan Freeman score. Although the music will not drive theatre buffs into euphoric fits of fancy, a bevy of fine songs (e. g. "I've Got Everything I Want," "Think Beautiful," "Almost," etc.) perfectly delineates the romantic fairy tale shenanigans of the principals: Buddy Hackett, Richard Kiley, Karen Morrow, Steve Roland and Luba Lisa. A significant addition to any collector's cast shelf.



SOMETHING BORROWED, SOMETHING BLUE—Annette BV 3328/STER 3328

Annette, who was married last week, themes this first-rate Vista package to the traditional nuptials adage and includes a warm sampling of old, new, borrowed and blue tunes. The lark's familiar bouncy, wide-range voice is showcased on excellent renditions of "How Will I Know My Love," "All My Lovin'" and "Blue On Blue." Album should do real well sales-wise.



TOBACCO ROAD—Nashville Teens—London LL 3407/PS 407

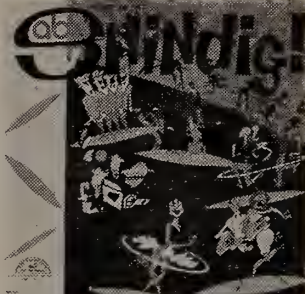
The Nashville Teens, who have been tremendously successful on both sides of the foam with their inventive pop-r&b vocal and instrumental style, tag this initial LP after their reputation-establishing single of "Tobacco Road" and include eleven other hard-driving rhythmic numbers. The lads swing up a storm on "Mona," "Need You" and "How Deep Is The Ocean." All of the artists' many admirers should come out in droves for the set.

POP BEST BETS



TWANGIN' THE GOLDEN HITS—Duane Eddy—RCA Victor LPM/LSP 2993

The twangy guitar man could come back to chartdom with this LP of all instrumental hits. Like all of this instrumentalist's tunes, a haunting, infectious feeling comes through, making this collection of golden goodies a powerful LP. Some of the stand out cuts are "More," "Swingin' Shepherd Blues," Eddy's old hit "Rebel Rouser," and the granddaddy of all r&r beats "Honky Tonk." Eye this package closely.



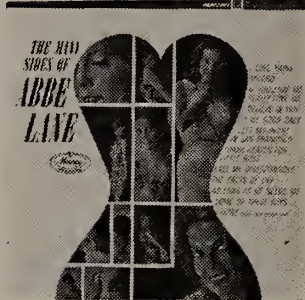
SHINDIG!—Various Artists—ABC-Paramount ABC/ABCS 504

ABC-Paramount has put together a disk featuring many of its big name artists (the Impressions, Tommy Roe, Fats Domino, etc.) wailin' such hot numbers as "Love Is A Mystery" & "Let The Good Times Roll." Here's a powerful platter tying r&b into one of the nation's hottest TV shows "Shindig." Playing a number of instrumentals throughout the disk is a group called the Shin-Diggers. Merchandising idea could spark sales.



HEY, LOOK AT ME NOW!—Linda Scott—KL 1424/KS 3424

Linda Scott demonstrates in a clear-cut fashion her vocal coming of age on this delightful session of legitish ballads. While backed by Ray Ellis' big ork, the chirp effectively utilizes her wide-range lyrical voice on top-drawer versions of "If I Love Again," "I Fall In Love Too Easily" and "I'll See You In My Dreams." Linda's teen fans as well as their folks should dig this sparkling album.



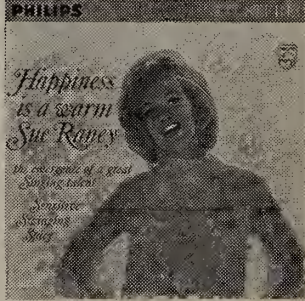
THE MANY SIDES OF ABBE LANE—MG 20930/SR 60930

Abbe Lane, who has earned many laurels over the years with her stylized vocal approach, offers some delightful samples of her singing ability on this new package of sturdies and recent vintage pop favorites. The lark's sensual, wide-range voice is spotlighted on full ork-backed versions of "Some Of These Days," "I Love Paris" and "Do Me Good Baby." Fine fare for either dancing or listening pleasure.



EVERYTHING I'VE GOT—Honor Blackman—London LL 3408/PS 408

Honor Blackman, the English thespian who plays "Pussy Galore" in the new 007 epic, "Goldfinger," showcases a sultry voice on this London program of mostly romantic evergreens. As a singer she interestingly juxtaposes good humor with soaring lyricalism on "Men Will So Deceive You," "To Keep My Love Alive" and "I Want A Fair And Square Man." A talent to watch.



HAPPINESS IS A WARM SUE RANEY—Philips PHM 200-160/PHS 600-160

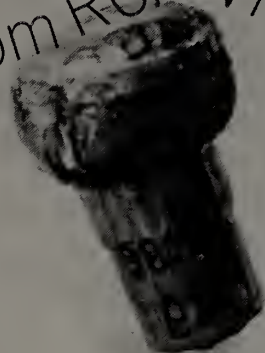
Although Sue Raney's distinctive liquid jazzy singing really cannot be categorized, she can certainly be appreciated by a wide variety of record buyers on this, her premiere LP outing for Philips. 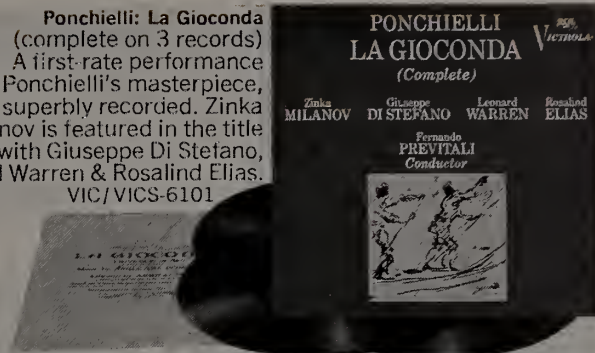
FRAN JEFFRIES SINGS OF SEX AND THE SINGLE GIRL—MGM E/SE 4268

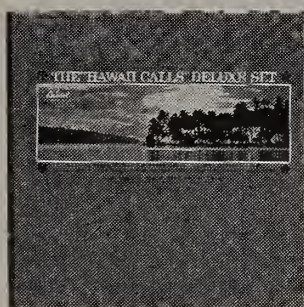
THE HANK WILLIAMS STORY—MGM E-4267-4
Although Hank Williams has been dead for a number of years, his memory is preserved for his fans, who are legion, via excellent packages like this limited edition deluxe 4-disk set from MGM. The rich Williams musical legacy is as plaintive and meaningful today as when the songs were first written. Among the famous evergreens included here are "Your Cheatin' Heart," "There'll Be No Teardrops Tonight" and "Cold, Cold Heart." A real collector's item.



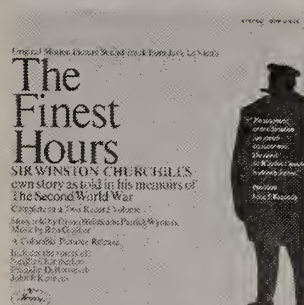
FREDDY MARTIN PLAYS THE HITS—VOL. 2—Capitol T/ST 2163
Freddy Martin is back again with another program saluting the smooth, easy-going bands of the 30's and 40's. The concept here was for the Martin aggregation to re-create the orchestral moods and settings of such vet orksters as Lawrence Welk, Russ Morgan, Hal Kemp, etc. The maestro superbly helms his men in top-rung versions of "Does Your Heart Beat For Me," "Ambrose" and "Boo Hoo." Interesting change-of-pace programming fare.



RUSTY DRAPER PLAYS GUITAR—Monument MLP 8026/SLP 18026
Rusty Draper pulls an inventive switch and comes up with entire disk on which he shelves singing for some fancy guitar playing. As an instrumentalist Draper has a distinctive, unpretentious rhythmic countryish approach which is aptly suited to this collection (e.g. "Little Bitty Tear," "Yellow Bird," "Corine Cornia," etc.) of chestnuts. Superior listening throughout.



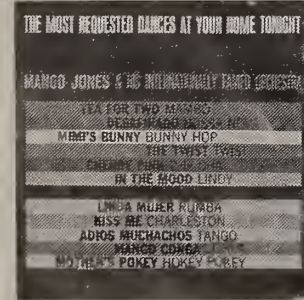
HAWAII CALLS DELUXE SET—Various Artists—Capitol SCL/STCL-2182
Each phase of island music is considered in this three record set featuring vocal and instrumental versions of many Hawaiian favorites. The "Favorite Instrumentals of the Islands" presents dreamy renditions of "Sweet Leilani" and "Blue Hawaii" among other standards; and the other disks spotlight vocalist Alfred Apaka as recorded on the Hawaii Calls show, and a chorus glittering on cuts of "Song of the Islands" and the "Hawaiian Wedding Song." Plenty of programmable material here.



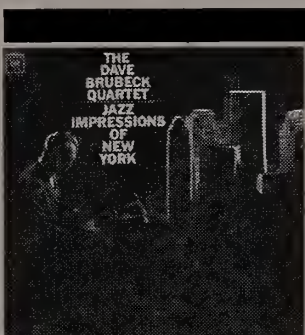
THE FINEST HOURS—Orson Welles and Patrick Wymark—Mercury MGP 6-604/SRP 2-604
Mercury's two record biography of Winston Churchill is a wonderful tribute to the great historical figure. The recording is taken from the sound track of Columbia's new movie "The Finest Hours," and the material is based primarily upon Churchill's memoirs, "The Second World War." To recommend the album is an excellent reading by Orson Welles, and fine musical backing by Ron Grainer. The package, which includes dozens of photos, makes a fine gift; and the film's exposure should draw much attention to this set.



MONSTER DANCE PARTY—Don Hinson and the Rigamorticians—Capitol T/ST 2219
The latest fads in dancing are coupled with the monster appeal in this Capitol outing, "Monster Dance Party." Don Hinson and the Rigamorticians drive through a series of extremely danceable numbers featuring the rhythms of the jerk, watusi, and swim among others. In addition to the ghoulish vocal numbers, there are a pair of instrumental tunes with appropriate sound effects. Tracks include "Monster Mash," "Werewolf Watusi," and "That Little Old Graverobber Me."



THE MOST REQUESTED DANCES AT YOUR HOME TONIGHT—Mango Jones Orchestra—Vee Jay VJ/VJS 1106
Vee Jay could have a steady seller in this package of favorite dances featuring everything from the Cha-Cha to the Hokey Pokey. Good rhythm and a strong beat are important things to a dancer and both are to be found in quantity here, and are prominent in "Cherry Pink" (Cha-Cha) and "Tea For Two" (Mambo). Other beats available are the Bossa Nova, Rumba, Tango, Lindy, Foxtrot, Twist, Bunny Hop, Charleston, and Conga.



JAZZ PICKS

JAZZ IMPRESSIONS OF NEW YORK—Dave Brubeck Quartet—Columbia CL 2275/CS 9075
Dave Brubeck should have no difficulty in jumping into the winner's circle with this imaginative set of selections from last season's "Mr. Broadway" TV'er all rendered in the pianist's highly-personal jazz style. The Brubeck crew blends their diverse talents together into a cohesive fabric of artistic expression. Highlights here include "Something To Sing About," "Winter Ballad" and "Upstage Rumba." Loads of sales potential.

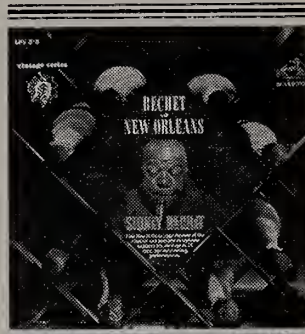


SONG FOR MY FATHER—Horace Silver Quintet—Blue 4185
Vet jazz 88'er Horace Silver offers a moving musical tribute to his father (the gentleman pictured on this album's cover) with this varied program of midstream bluesers and rollicking, high-spirited items. Silver's distinctive funky keyboard stylings are underlined by some fine support work by the crew on "Song For My Father," "The Natives Are Restless Tonight" and "The Kicker." One of the best LP's that Silver has cut in quite a while.

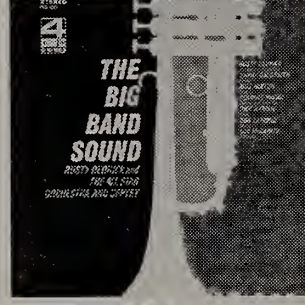


SHAKESPEARE AND ALL THAT JAZZ—Cleo Laine and John Dankworth—Fontana MGF 67531/SRF 27531
Here is an interesting package of Shakespeare's works set to jazz. Johnny Dankworth has provided the musical backing for a baker's dozen of the Bard's speeches, and a reading of a list of the complete works. Vocals are by the orkster's wife, Cleo Laine, who sounds a great deal like Sarah Vaughn with a smattering of the Annie Ross flavor. Among the off-beat and very catchy cuts are "Dunsinane Blues," a multi-track "Duet of Sonnets," and a beautiful bluesy ballad rendition of "My Love is as a Fever." Unusual set which could catch on.

JAZZ BEST BETS



BECHET OF NEW ORLEANS—Sidney Bechet—RCA Victor LPV-510
The latest release in the Victor Vintage series features the sound of Sidney Bechet in his prime, with cuts from 1932 to '41. These antique tracks have long been unavailable and should be a welcome addition to the collection of anyone who relishes the sound of the New Orleans jazz band. Bechet, the soprano sax-clarinet soloist, heads a bevy of way back stars through such classics as "12th Street Rag," "Muskrat Ramble," and "I Ain't Gonna Give Nobody None Of My Jelly Roll."

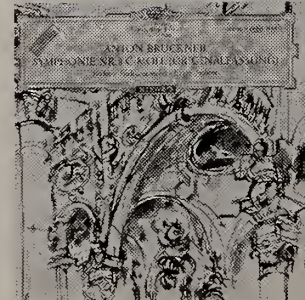


THE BIG BAND SOUND—Rusty Dedrick—4 Corners FCL/FCS 4207
Rusty Dedrick heads the All Star Orchestra and Septet through a set in tribute to late jazzman Isham Jones. The brassy big band sound grooves through a dozen of the orkster's classics, sampling swingers like "Swingin' Down the Lane," and "It Had To Be You," as well as several ballads, i.e., "I'll See You In My Dreams." The stress here is on reproducing the tone of the Jones band, and the final product should provide some fine tracks for the deejays.



CLASSICAL PICKS

BIZET: CARMEN—Maria Callas—Angel CLX/SCLX 3650
Begin with one of the world's most popular operas, "Carmen," cast the widely renowned Maria Callas in the title role, and the result is a top-drawer catalog item that should draw plenty of attention. The prima donna fits beautifully into the fiery role; while Nicolai Gedda (Don Jose) and Robert Massard (Escamillo) and the Orchestre du Theatre National de L'Opera provide superb support. The entire opera, sung in French, is included in this three-disk set, which comes boxed with a libretto, pictorial essay of the recording session, and a copy of the novella upon which the opera is based.



BRUCKNER: Symphony No. 8; Eugen Jochum conducting the Berlin Philharmoniker-Deutsche Grammophon SLP 138918
Anton Bruckner's famed eight "Moll" symphony is given a masterful reading by Eugen Jochum and the Berliner Philharmoniker on this top-notch classical import from DDG. From the climactic chromatic developments of the first movement to the compelling structural changes in the fourth, Jochum injects all of the required bridges into the longish romantic work. A standout classical offering.

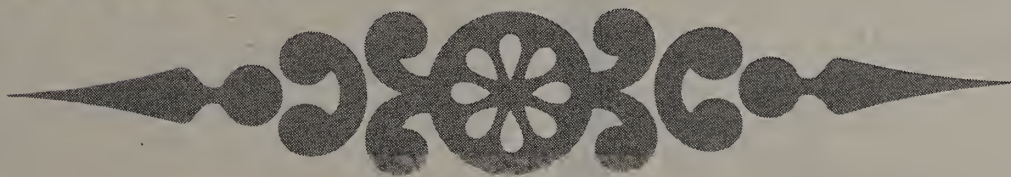

The Kingsmen, who are currently clicking with "Jolly Green Giant" on Wand consist of five young men from Portland, Oregon: Lynn Easton (vocalist and sax player), Gary Abbott (drums), Don Gallucci (organ), Mike Mitchell (lead guitar) and Norm Sundholm (guitar and bass).

The band was organized seven years ago by Lynn Easton when he was then a freshman in a Portland high school. Lynn quickly attracted some of his friends to his musical fold and the boys began to develop a distinctive, hard-driving bluesy instrumental style.

Through the years the group developed an impressive reputation in the Northwest having done a wide range of p.a.'s, fashion shows, TV commercials, dances and one-nighters. The group first achieved national recognition in '63 with their runaway best-selling hit of "Louie, Louie." They also had their own float in the annual Portland Rose Festival parade.

Righteous Brothers

Bobby was born in Beaver Dam, Wisconsin on August 10, 1940. He appeared in high school musicals, was emcee and sang in school talent shows, and because of the encouraging reaction he got, decided to enter show business.

Prior to their Philes affiliation, the lads hit about a year and a half ago with "Little Latin Lupe Lu" on the Moonglow label.

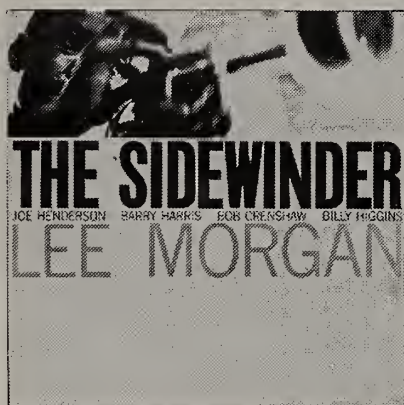

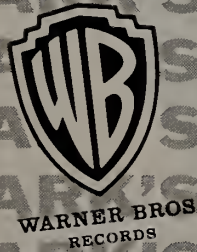

The Soviet "Lady" opened in Moscow last week, generating an immediate complaint by CBS, to the Soviet Ministry of Culture, that the production was made without "reference to us."

CBS means that there had been no contact between the Russians and the giant broadcasting firm to discuss the production of the show in the Soviet Union, which, like other Iron Curtain countries, does not recognize international copyright agreements. However, such Communist countries as Poland and Czechoslovakia, did negotiate with CBS for "Lady" presentations in their lands.

Beatles Find U.S. Very Taxing

LONDON—A spokesman for the Beatles last week confirmed that the group could not consider any more visits to the United States due to a tax dispute with the American government.

British newspapers reported that during their tour of the U.S. and Canada the quartet had earned \$2.8 million, but that the money earned in the United States was being blocked off by treasury officials. The spokesman added that negotiations are now going on with the American government about these earnings.

Pickwick Int'l To Supply Disks For GE's "Show 'n Tell"



NEW YORK—Pickwick International has announced the signing of a long-term agreement to create, produce and supply the color programs shown and heard on General Electric's phono-viewer "Show 'n Tell."

The device, which sells for \$29.95, shows color pictures in time to words and music and is designed for mopets in the four to twelve age group. The "Show 'n Tell" phono-viewer is a four speed phonograph that can play any size recording and has a screen on which color shots appear in perfect synchronization with the sound.

It is the "Picture-Sound" package of film strip and recording, specially designed for "Show 'n Tell," which is being supplied by Pickwick International. The programs have a suggested retail list price of \$1 each.

There are currently seven basic categories of "Picture-Sound" programs available: Fairy Tale & Cartoons, Children's Classics I and II, History, Science & Space, The World We Live In and Steps To Knowledge. Each group contains five titles for a total library of 35 "Picture-Sound" programs. Cy Leslie, president of Pickwick International, said that recording director Joe Abend is currently supervising the production of 25 more "Picture-Sound" programs for release this month and has prepared a schedule of 25 new packages monthly with an ultimate goal of 350 programs envisioned by 1966.

The film strip, which is an integral part of the package, is timed to the 7", 33 1/3 r.p.m. record so that 15 slides are shown in synchronization with the disk. Prior to signing their long-term contract, Pickwick worked on the project for over one year, during which programming, story lines, art and overall approaches were tested, researched and surveyed by a battery of educators, marketing experts and psychologists.

Peppino Di Capri Quintet To Play Carnegie Date

NEW YORK—The Italian Quintet Peppino Di Capri will arrive in the U. S. this week for a two-week concert tour climaxed by a Carnegie Hall performance on Jan. 16. This is the vet combo's second American tour, having made their debut in 1963.

The Carnegie program is divided into two parts, the first featuring Didi Van Eyck, Tony Galante and the Teardrops, a musical comedy act. The Peppino Di Capri Quintet will star after the intermission. Emberto Landi is the producer.

CMA Holds 1st Qtr. Meet

NEW ORLEANS—The board of directors and officers of the Country Music Association held their first quarterly meeting last week (7 and 8) at the Royal Orleans Hotel, this city.

Some of the main areas covered were the Country Music Hall of Fame and Museum Building, a c&w broadcasters' project, a special country music presentation to a sales and marketing group in Chicago next June, a country premium album, special insurance proposals, and a kick-off drive for membership in the Country Music Foundation. Other areas were explored for the expansion of country music.

Some 30 CMA officials attended this meeting in the Crescent City.

"His untimely death has deprived us in the Society of an able counselor and administrator, and the world of music of a wise and loyal friend."

"We extend our deepest sympathy to his family and the staff of the Music Publishers Holding Corporation."

As the head of one of the leading music publishing concerns in the world, Mr. Starr was responsible for the publication of the works of many distinguished contemporary American composers.

He was a member of the Old Oaks Country Club, Purchase, New York; City Athletic Club, New York City; Cinema Lodge; B'nai B'rith; and the Motion Pictures Pioneers and Foundation.

Starr is survived by his wife, the former Jeanne Geller, and their two daughters, Mrs. Marilyn S. Weiss and Mrs. Carol S. Walden, six grandchildren, one sister and three brothers.

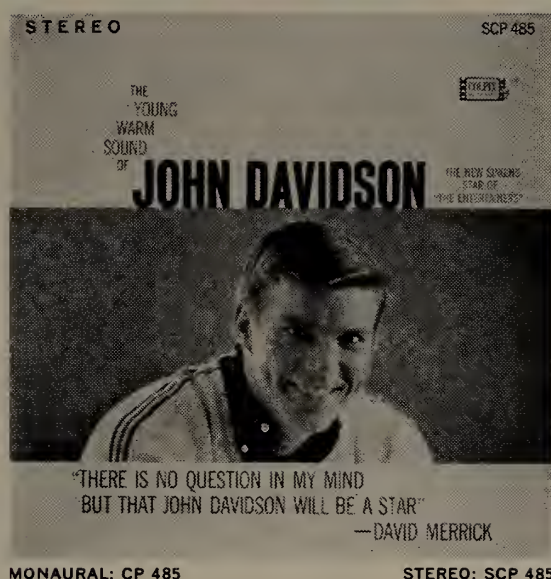

Richard Hayman: Jack Of Almost All Trades



NEW YORK—Although the logic of diversification has parlayed the mutual fund corporations into huge financial institutions, few individuals ever spread their creative wings of endeavor into more than a few areas of expression. Vet maestro Richard Hayman is a glaring exception to the rule. This multi-talented musician wears so many hats, well, that he could easily open a retail outlet.

In the midst of his busiest season, Hayman conducted and arranged the recently-released Richard Burton deck of "Married Man" from "Baker Street," recorded several instrumental sides from that show for MGM as well as his own "Regency Waltz," played harmonica on Shirley MacLaine's 20th Century-Fox record of "John Goldfarb Please Come Home," composed and performed a TV commercial, in quick succession completed album arranging assignments for the Boston Pops Orchestra, Jean-Paul Vignon, Vivian Della Chiesa, canned a Muzak segment which included four originals, flew to Miami Beach to direct a Gordon and Sheila MacRae ABC-TV spectacular to be shown Feb. 7, and completed a symphonic band arrangement of "Trumpet Fiesta" for his publisher, Mills Music.

Hayman further extended the mantle of his arranging reputation via his recent spoof of the Beatles' "I Want To Hold Your Hand," which was recorded by Arthur Fiedler and the Boston Pops Orchestra. He's also been responsible for the best-selling Victor disk "Pops Goes The Trumpet" (with Al Hirt) and the current Victor release, "More Music From Million Dollar Movies."

This hectic schedule would probably make a lesser man suffer an attack of nervous exhaustion, but Hayman apparently re-generates his creative batteries with lack of sleep. Among his chores set for Feb. are directing the Bobby Vinton Show at the Florida State Fair in Tampa and performing a similar function at the Colorado Garden and Home Show in Denver.

Lenny Lewis In Miami For Distributor Huddles

NEW YORK—Lenny Lewis, national sales manager for 20th Century Fox Records, is in Miami this week to meet with distributors assembled at various conventions there, and to show the January LP releases. Included in the new product is Mary Wells' first outing on 20th; the soundtrack from the motion picture "Zorba The Greek;" "Al Martino Sings;" the Harry Simeone Chorale's "Climb Every Mountain;" "Joya Sherrill Sings Duke Ellington;" and "The Best Of Shirley Temple."

Current singles doing well for the label are Mary Wells' "Use Your Head," and Magica Brown's "A Whole Lotta Lovin'." Another artist, Milan, is being given all-out backing for his release "Runnin' Wild."

School Choruses Dig Swingle's Bach Jazz So B. F. Wood Issues More

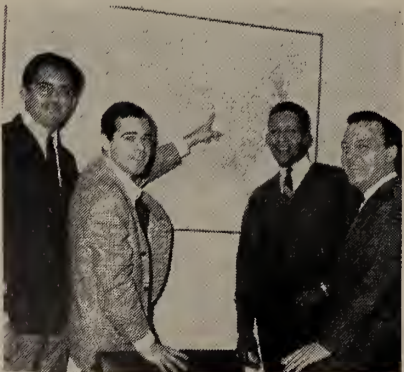

Peter will be the youngest orchestra leader ever to have played at a Presidential Inauguration Ball. His late father, the famed Eddy Duchin, played at the Inaugural Ball for President Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1937.

A solid album seller, Peter has a new album, his seventh for Decca, scheduled for release next month.

\$1.98 Classics From Stereo Tapes

NEW YORK—Stereo Tape Corp. has announced plans to add a low-priced Classics Series to its Encore tape line. The new series will be added to Encore's existing Broadway and Pop series and will be available at the same \$4.95 list. This is said to be first line of low-priced classics to be released on tape.

The first five releases, scheduled for this month, are "American In Paris" and "Rhapsody In Blue," "Petrouchka," "Scheherazade," "Bolero, & Carmen Suite" and "Gaieté Parisienne."

Philips Extends Promo Staff In Growth Move

CHICAGO—Philips will have a dual national promotion manager team, with individual specializations in singles and in album promotion, it was announced last week by label chief Lou Simon.

Fully responsible for singles promo and research and development in the singles area will be Bill O'Brien, who retains his post of Philips national promotion manager with specialization in one area.

O'Brien, who has been with Philips for over a year, will concentrate on the promotion of singles with obvious hit potential.

National LP promotion manager will be Connie Hechter, who will be in charge of promotion of all Philips LP product.

Hechter will also be responsible for developing the college market, as well as directing artist liaison in the field.

For the past year, Hechter has been publicity and sales promotion director of KDWB in Minneapolis. Prior to that, he had a successful career in record promotion in Minneapolis, and as national promotion manager for Motown in Detroit. A graduate of the University of Minnesota, he majored in journalism and advertising. Hechter will headquarter in Philips' Chicago office.

Simon also announced the appointment of Joe Cerami as Philips' mid-west regional sales manager. Cerami replaces Sheldon Tirk, who has become branch manager of Merrec Dist. Inc., the new Mercury Record Corp. branch in Cleveland.

Headquartered in Cleveland, Cerami will assume full field responsibility in the market that includes Cleveland, Detroit, Cincinnati, Chicago, St. Louis, Milwaukee, Minneapolis, and Des Moines.

Cerami, a well-known figure in the recording world, has a broad background in the industry. During the past 12 years, he has held positions including district manager for Capitol, national sales manager for Kapp Records and Riverside Records, and immediately prior to joining Philips, was manager of American Dist. Co. in Cleveland.

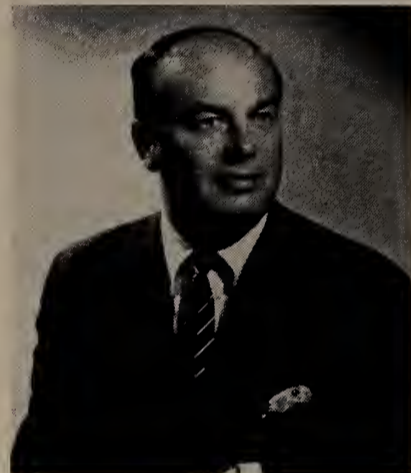

The company was also among the first to set up world-wide affiliated corporations.

Mr. Myers has now turned to motion picture production, in association with Norman Benson. The pair's first effort, "The Block," is now in national distribution through American Films. Their next work will begin when Myers returns from his trip around the world, during which he is establishing international connections, and securing additional product and stories for future movies.

Pete Myers Returns To WNEW; Gertie Katzman Named Outlet's New MD

NEW YORK—Harvey L. Glascock, recently appointed v.p. and gen. mgr. of New York's WNEW radio station, last week made two major moves that will give the Metromedia chain's flagship station a new look.

Pete Myers, veteran dee jay who had been with the station some years ago, will return to the outlet February 1.

The other move brings Gertie Katzman into the station as its new Music Director, effective immediately due to the retirement of Al Trilling, the station's former MD.

Myers comes back to WNEW after serving a stint at WINS. He will now helm the 8 to midnight spot on WNEW on Monday thru Friday and will cover the 4 PM to 8 PM spot on Sundays.

Mrs. Katzman, a 25-year veteran of radio broadcast music, comes to WNEW from Metromedia's Philadelphia radio station, WIP.

Glascock also announced that Wally King will serve as week-end anchor man with five shows a week. He will replace Fred Robbins.

In making the announcements, Harvey Glascock stated: "We will endeavor to maintain the same popular WNEW sound of entertainment 24 hours a day, taking care not to feature specialized music programs. We feel the recent additions will enhance even more the famous WNEW programming enjoyed by the vast listening audience, aged 18 to 45, in the Greater Northeast area.

Myers will not perform as Mad Daddy in his new WNEW role, but it appears that the station will be programming more to the "middle of the road" than was the case in the past.

Morty Craft & Ed Rudy To Head New Record Firm

NEW YORK—Director of operations for Lloyds E.R.M.C., Sir Percival Courtney, has just announced the formation of an American record production and manufacturing company with offices in Miami and Hollywood. Temporary headquarters have been set up at 218 West 47th St. in New York (CI 5-9923).

Heading the new firm will be Morty Craft and Ed Rudy. Craft was formerly A&R head for MGM Records, president of Seven Arts Productions (Warwick Records), and, until recently, vice president of 20th Century Fox Record Division. Rudy previously headed Transphonic Hollywood Productions, Star Records, INS Radio News Documentary Productions, and was responsible for the production, personal management, and publishing of many hit recordings (i.e. "Who's That Knocking," "Rocking in the Jungle," "Babalu's Wedding Day"). Rudy also handled the late chart maker of the Beatles' American tour.

A number of British groups (The London Beats, Peter and the Wolves, The Liverpool Lads, and The English Muffins) have already been signed for release on the Lloyds E.R.M.C. label, and American promo tours are being arranged. An interview album, similar to the above mentioned Beatles disk, is being worked out with the Kinks.

Although the first releases will be of the British groups, Craft and Rudy have begun auditioning American artists for future sessions. They have also obtained a number of masters from indie producers for local and British distribution.

Bobby Weiss Joins Rogers & Cowan

NEW YORK—Robert B. (Bobby) Weiss will join Rogers & Cowan as vice-president in charge of international operations of the entertainment division, it was announced last week by Warren Cowan, president of the public relations firm.

Weiss is headquartered in the company's Beverly Hills office and assumed his new post last week. In February he will visit Rogers & Cowan offices in London, Paris, Madrid, Rome and Tokyo with a specific eye to expanding the foreign chain of operation by eventually opening bureaus in other areas.

Weiss, a show business veteran, has for the past twelve years headquartered abroad, maintaining his residence in Paris. While there, he was European director of Capitol Records for five years; international manager of the Edwin H. Morris music publishing companies for two years; and from 1958 to 1963 been International Director of Warner Brothers Records. During the past year he had been an international rep for varied parties. Prior to going overseas, Weiss headed his own public relations company in Hollywood.

In addition to supervising international operations, Weiss also will supervise special promotional activities for Rogers & Cowan clients in the music and recording field.

Look Picks 9 "Enduring" Songs Of The 20th Century

NEW YORK—In taking a general glance at the 20th Century, the current issue of Look magazine includes a collection of nine songs which the editorial staff of the publication has dubbed the top "enduring" songs of the century.

The tunes are "In the Shade of the Old Apple Tree," "Over There," "Oh, You Beautiful Doll," "Baby Face," "Night and Day," "How Deep is the Ocean," "Summertime," "September Song" and "Oh, What a Beautiful Morning."

The oldest song selected is "In the Shade of the Old Apple Tree," penned in 1905, now in the Public Domain, and the most recent is "Oh, What a Beautiful Morning," written in 1943 for "Oklahoma!"

Russ Miller Joins Crewe Pubberies; Firms Switch From ASCAP To BMI

NEW YORK—Bob Crewe has announced the appointment of Russ Miller as general professional manager of his Bob Crewe Productions and Genius Inc. firms. Miller, formerly of Bourne-Rank Music, has been acquired in an effort to direct the company into areas previously not exploited by the Crewe Saturday and Tomorrow's Tunes publishing companies.

Effective immediately Miller will initiate a program designed to obtain and develop TV, Broadway and film scores, as well as seek out new writers and artists, supervise all demo dates and activate the company's foreign affiliation.

The move coincides with the Crewe pubberies' switchover from ASCAP to BMI affiliation which became effective Jan. 1. Staff writers Charlie Calello, Denny Randell, Sandy Linzer, Buddy Rehak, Eddie Ramebeau and Larry Santos have made the ASCAP to BMI switch also.

Decca Adds 8 To Phono Line

NEW YORK—Decca Records last week announced the addition of eight new phono models to its '65 line of popular priced units. The entire new line is now in stock at the Decca branches and ready for immediate delivery to the trade.

Among the new additions to the 1965 line is the Monitor 1 (DP 615), a deluxe full stereo automatic solid state component system with separate speaker enclosures. The unit contains a deluxe four speed Garrard changer with two removable spindles providing manual or automatic play. Suggested list price is \$159.95.

Another fully transistorized Decca unit for 1965 is The Graham 1 (DPS 41). This unit features a turnover cartridge with constant four speed motor and an unbreakable plastic cabinet. It is offered at a suggested list of \$22.50. The Dawson 11 (DP 481) is a four speed, solid state manual portable phono with two front mounted speakers. With a suggested list of \$29.95, The Dawson 11 is available in a choice of gold with black or gray with black.

A first in the Decca line is The Randolph 1 (DP 493), a solid state battery and AC phonograph. This four speed automatic mono unit has the added feature of a molded luggage type carrying case for easy portability. With a removable line cord for battery operation, The Randolph 1 carries a suggested list of \$59.95.

The Seaford IX (DP 597) features attache case styling and is available in gray, blue or gold. This four speed manual portable carries a low suggested list of \$24.95. Another new Decca phono model is The Conway II (DP 562), a four speed automatic portable unit. Carrying a suggested list price of \$39.95, this budget priced automatic features a typewriter type case which can be played with the lid closed.

Rounding out the new additions to the 1965 line of Decca phonos are the Palm Beach IX (DPS 19), a four speed manual unit, carrying a suggested list price of \$19.95 and available in a choice of Silver, Gold or Blue. And, The Chandler I (DPS 40), a four speed manual portable phono with an unbreakable plastic cabinet. This model has been introduced with an open list price and is available in a bright blue finish with a contrasting motor board.

Kruger Back In U.S. For Three-Week Tour

NEW YORK—Jeff Kruger, President of Ember Records, returned to the United States on Thursday, January 7th, to continue the business trip interrupted last December by the death in Toronto of his father, Sam Kruger, senior director of Kruger Enterprises Ltd.

Kruger leaves New York on Tuesday, January 12th, for Memphis and from there flies to Miami for the United Artists Records' distributor meeting. He will be in Hollywood, California, January 19 through the 26th when he returns to England.

While in New York, Kruger will huddle with UA execs to discuss their promotion and publicity program on his new artists; Ray Singer, Marcus Tro and the team of Sheila and Jenny. At the same time, Kruger will be in negotiation with a U.S. diskery for the acquisition of his A&R man and recording artists John Barry and will meet with executives from World Artist records to discuss the future of Chad & Jeremy, now on the charts with "Willow Weep For Me."

During his last visit to this country, Kruger wrapped up a deal with UA Records for that label to distribute Ember recordings in the United States. On this present trek the English music business executive will continue to negotiate for representation deals with diskeries and music publishing companies in this country to represent their product overseas via his publishing combine and record company. Kruger now represents a flock of indie U.S. labels on some of their current hits.

Darin & Wess To Score Flick

HOLLYWOOD — Bobby Darin and Richard Wess have been signed by producer Harry Keller to compose and score all music for Universal's "That Funny Feeling," romantic-comedy which Darin recently completed, starring Sandra Dee. Signing marks Darin's second complete scoring assignment for a motion picture and the first for Wess, latter having been Darin's arranger for past five years including arranger-conductor of Darin's current Capitol album, "From Hello Dolly to Goodbye Charlie."

Darin's first film scoring assignment was Universal's "The Lively Set," now in release with Jimmy Darren, Pamela Tiffin and Joanie Sommers starred, from which a soundtrack album has now been released on the Decca label. Previous Darin film song credits include "Multiplication," plus title-song and "True, True Love" for "If A Man Answers," in which he starred with Sandra Dee.

Darin and Wess report to Universal this week for huddles with studio music topper Joseph Gershenson re their "Funny" assignment.

David Croninger Named Veep Of WIP-Philadelphia

NEW YORK—Vet broadcasting executive David C. Croninger has been named vice-president and general manager of WIP-Philadelphia, replacing Harvey Glascock who recently exited the outlet to assume a similar post on Metromedia's sister station in New York, WNEW.

Croninger, former administrator of Metromedia's KMBC-Kansas City, joined the radio chain in April, 1961 as the first Detroit sales manager of WNEW. In Aug. 1961 Metromedia acquired KMBC, and Croninger was named vice-president and general manager. Over the past dozen years Croninger held various executive, sales and on-the-air posts in Kansas City, Miami and Chicago.

The other lid, "(My Friends Are Gonna Be) Strangers," has already been cut by several artists but Smith gives this tender lament an especially moving reading. Eye 'em both.

The attractive coupler, "Travelin'," is a pretty, medium-paced, melodic sans-vocal item geared for middle-of-the-road programming.

On "Big Ache Of The Year" the chanter dishes-up a pleasing rhythmic traditional hillbilly weeper in a mighty impressive emotion-packed, soulful style.

(B+) VIRGINIA (2:45) [Al Gallico, BMI — Kilgore] Slim Whitman can get back in his money-making ways with this top-notch slow-moving pledge of romantic devotion. Side boasts a lush melodic backing and some real pretty lyrics. Eye it.

(B+) EMOTIONS (2:50) [Tunecrafters, BMI — Mills] Gene Mills might very well grab some fast spins with this tender, slow-shufflin' chorus-backed lament about an unfortunate guy who was given the gate by his girlfriend. Plenty of potential here.

(B+) LOVE SONG OF THE WATERFALL (2:30) [American Valley, BMI — Nolan, Barnes, Winge] More fine country sounds. This one's a lyrical medium-paced romancer sold with conviction by Whitman.

Two of the numbers, "I Could Easily Fall" by Cliff Richard and "Genie With The Light Brown Lamp" by the Shadows are in the Best Selling Charts as is the LP "Aladdin & His Wonderful Lamp," all issued on E.M.I.'s Columbia label. 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GREAT BRITAIN

Jeff Kruger of Ember Records Ltd. recently signed a five-year agreement with Mike Stewart and Murray Deutsch of United Artists Corporation under which the Ember product will get major exposure in the U.S.A., Canada, Mexico and throughout South America on the U.A. label. Releases by Ember artistes Ray Singer, Marcus Tro and Sheila and Jenny will be backed by a special promotional campaign to be operated from Kruger's recently opened New York office at 33 Court Street, New York. Ember's American interests will be handled by Robert I. Weiswasser and Benjamin Starr and Richard Gersh Associates in conjunction with their English P.R. consultants Gordon Thomas Associates who will be handling Ember's publicity in the United States and Canada.

Kruger is now in America for further negotiations and arrangements have been completed for Singer to fly out to promote "It's Gotta Be" (penned by Tom Springfield and Mike Hurst) coupled with his own composition "Tell Me Now"—the first release under the new agreement.

Manufacturers' sales of gramophone records in October 1964 valued at £2,101,000 were one-fifth lower than the exceptionally high figure recorded in October 1963. Compared with a year earlier home sales were one quarter lower but export sales increased by six per cent. Production of 33 1/3rd r.p.m. records rose by one-fifth but output of 45 r.p.m. records was 8 per cent lower than in October 1963. Output of 78 r.p.m. records continued well below the level of a year earlier.

Pye Records currently hitting hard in the transatlantic charts. In America The Searchers, after four Top 100 entries in 1964, start the New Year with their biggest success to date "Love Potion No: 9" on Kapp which may well take them to the No: 1 slot. Another Pye artiste climbing high in the American charts is Petula Clark with "Down Town" on Warner Bros. The number penned by her a & r Manager Tony Hatch has taken her to the No: 2 position in Britain. Pye are also represented in the American hit parade with Sandie Shaw's single "Always Something There To Remind Me" and in the British hit parade with her follow up "Girl Don't Come"—both published by Freddie Poser Music.

With the list of artistes scheduled to take part in this year's San Remo festival still incomplete two British singers are hoping to be there—Dusty Springfield and Petula Clark.

It's a busy year for Italy as far as song contests are concerned. As winners of last year's Eurovision Contest they will host this year's event in Naples on March 20th. As last year the BBC has commissioned six of this country's top song writers to supply the numbers which will be sung in the preliminary heats by Kathy Kirby who will represent the United Kingdom at Naples. Composers chosen are Tony Hatch (who wrote last year's "I Love The Little Things" with which Matt Monro took second place); Leslie Bricusse, Peter Lee Stirling, Chris Andrews, Tom Springfield and Les Reed. Whereas in former years the songs have been judged by selected panels of judges this year, in an effort to get a much wider cross section of opinion, the BBC will base their decision on the votes of the viewing public. Kathy Kirby will sing all six songs in her BBC series "The Kathy Kirby Show" on January 22nd and the winning song plus two followups will be heard on February 12th.

A warm welcome to the Top Ten for r & b exponent Georgie Fame with "Yeah Yeah" on Columbia. A good start to the New Year in which many people predict that Georgie's fame will be world wide. He first caught the attention of the public way back in 1962 when he was the resident band at the Flamingo Club in London's West End. A recording contract followed and after two LP's and four singles he has at last hit the jackpot.

It is with deep regret that we report the death following a heart attack of Roy Parker (45) editor and Managing Director of Record Retailer. Parker, who founded his publication five years ago, was a first class journalist greatly respected by his colleagues. Many friends and associates from all branches of the industry attended his funeral at St. Marylebone crematorium.

Gathering plenty of national publicity at the moment is 17 year old Twinkle. Under the guiding hand of agent/manager Philip Solomon, Twinkle's debut disk "Terry" (which she penned herself), is climbing high in the British charts on Decca. She is currently making her first nation wide tour in the company of The Rolling Stones.

Chuck Berry, whose pre-Xmas tour was called off at the last minute, has been signed by Robert Stigwood for a nation wide tour commencing January 8th thru January 31st. A new film production division has been added to the Stigwood group of companies namely Robert Stigwood International and the first project will be "Three Boys In A Boat" starring John Leyton and Mike Sarne. Shooting will commence as soon as Leyton finishes work on his current Hollywood movie "Von Ryan's Express."

Hopes are high for James Tamlin's first disk, "Is There Time," produced independently by Amon-meric Productions and released on Columbia. Recording manager Roy Pitt tells us that the disk is getting tremendous airplay and Tamlin is promoting the number via TV exposure. Composed by Tamlin the number is published by Baton Music.

SCANDINAVIA

NORWAY

The strike among musicians in some Norwegian cities is growing worse. The Actor's Union has advised its members to join the musicians in their fight by refusing jobs at restaurants, cafés, and hotels in Oslo, Bergen, Stavanger, Trondheim, Kristiansand, and Drammen. Reports from the involved cities say that the strike was most effective on the New Year's Eve. From Bergen it is reported that an Italian orchestra playing at one of the cafés was stopped by the immigration authorities as they had no working permit. Norwegian Radio, TV, the Opera, the Symphony Orchestra, and orchestras playing at theatres are not involved in the conflict. As far as record biz is concerned, organized musicians have been involved in a strike for more than 12 months; this conflict, however, not involving the unaffiliated teenage groups who by now are getting their big breaks on records.

LP Best Seller lists in Norway during December were topped by "Beatles For Sale" with The Beatles on Parlophone, "A Hard Day's Night" with the same artists was at the second spot. "Twelve Songs For Christmas" with Jim Reeves on RCA Victor ran third, same artist also at seventh spot with "Moonlight And Roses," eighth with "The Best Of Jim Reeves," ninth with "Gentleman Jim," and 16th spot with "International Jim Reeves." Fourth were The Rolling Stones on Decca with "Rolling Stones," fifth was Frank Sinatra on Reprise with "It Might As Well Be Swing," sixth Dean Martin on same label with "Everybody Loves Somebody." In the 10th spot was the soundtrack version of "Robin And The Seven Hoods" on Reprise.

Best selling artist in Norway, on LP's during 1964, was the late Jim Reeves on RCA Victor; his album, "International Jim Reeves," was on the LP charts for 12 months and another album, "Gentleman Jim" has been there for 11 months. Individually, "With The Beatles" on Parlophone topped the list as most popular LP of the year.

Local lark Wenche Myhre has done it again. For the sixth time she has a record on the charts. This time it is her Norwegian version of "Royal Telephone," here titled "Jeg Marsjerer Ved Din Side." It's on the charts for the second week now. Also for the second week on the charts here is the Swedish group Sven-Ingvars on Philips with the Swedish copyright "Fröken Fräken Från Fryken," a Gold Disk Seller in Sweden. Coming on very strong here is "I Could Easily Fall" by Cliff Richard on Columbia.

Christmas sales in Norway were better than expected, it is reported. Particularly in Oslo, where record buyers had difficulties buying records by their idols, such as The Beatles and The Rolling Stones, since they were completely sold out all over Oslo. From Heger Plastics, the EMI pressing plant in Oslo, some 100,000 records by The Beatles were pressed and delivered during December; in addition, a lot of records were pressed at other plants or imported from abroad.

SWEDEN

The Honeycombs, British Pye recording group, arrived in Stockholm the day before New Year's Eve, and contracted for appearances here at the New Year celebrations. Their Scandinavian visit also includes p.a.'s in Denmark and Finland.

Bo Löfberg, head of Philips-Sonora AB, looks very happy about the success of Sven-Ingvars and their "Fröken Fräken," the first record in years that has passed the 100,000 mark, which means a Gold Disk here. When 1964 ended the record had sold 120,000, Löfberg told Cash Box, "and it still continues giving us and the pressing plants a full-time job" he said. Löfberg was also happy that the Stockholm evening paper, Expressen, took up the idea for giving away Gold Disks. This means there will be an official control of the sales figures; and furthermore, there must be something wrong if we, the record manufacturers, are giving awards to ourselves, which in fact is what we do when we award a Gold Disk. Löfberg said that the Gold Disk award will be presented to Sven-Ingvars during the week starting January 10th.

STIM, the Swedish Performing Rights Society, distributed a letter to all its members which said "... there are no agreements between record manufacturers belonging to the Federation in Sweden after Dec. 31, 1964." This means that the record industry after Jan. 1, 1965, is not legally allowed to make any new recordings, or import any records, tapes, etc. provided that the songs are protected by NCB, and also provided that the imported records, etc.,

Compared with the past few years, the streets in Tokyo were calm during the Christmas and year-end weeks, as most of the boys and girls spent the nights in their homes, and the expectations by retailers to sell the season's records was proved astraying—while a dealer told Cash Box the prospects for '65, Beatles and other 'Liverpool Sound' will continue selling a good amount of Japanese records market in popular songs section, and Italian Canzone will further gain the share, at the same time coming out of new rhythms strongly expected. The hit songs in the top charts will be replaced quickly by others, so that we will have more hits—with less enthusiasm, and the ones by choral groups will also take a big share of the highly rated songs.

Due to the recent report by Toho Geino production, Oswald Pugliese, Argentine's outstanding tango orch., will pay the first visit to Japan in the early summer of '65. The orch., consisting of thirteen members—including two singers, are expected to introduce their favorite tunes during their five months stay here in Japan. Their records are scheduled to be placed on market by Toshiba Records, to honor their visit.

Nippon Victor is issuing LP's "Roustabout," by Elvis Presley, from the movie sound-track, "Belafonte's American Gospel Hits Collection", "Golden Hits In Stereo (Volume 2)" including "Mambo No. 5," "River Of No Return", "Bamble Boogie", "American Patrol", and other big hits by Glen Miller Orch., Perez Prado Orch., and others.

Teichiku Records' new year releases in singles are: "The Lively Set" b/w "Boss Barracuda" by James Darren, "If You Love Him" b/w "Casey Wake Up," by Joanie Sommers, "The Green Door" b/w "Yeah, She's Evil," by Bill Haley And His Comets, and in 7 inch stereo LP's, "Kilimanjaro" (including "Kilimanjaro" "Charade Pts. 162"), "Movie Rhapsodies Vol. 2" (including "The Executioner Theme") by Perry Botkin, "The Call Of The Far-Way-Hills" by Victor Young and "Terry's Theme From Limelight" by Victor Young.

Toshiba Record's new year pushes in the popular section are: in 12 inch stereo LP's "The Best Of Jo Stafford", "From Russia With Love", "The Best Of Joanie Sommers," "Ventures' Popular Hits," "Great Bands Latin Style" and "Cliff And Shadows," etc.

have been recorded in their country of origin after Jan. 1, 1965. . . . What is said above includes only Swedish members of the IFPI, responsible for the major record production in Sweden, while companies outside this Federation who still have valid agreements with NCB can continue as before. The letter was signed by Dr. Sven Wilson of STIM. STIM points out that the record industry is against paying a nine per cent royalty for the secondary use of its products (in motion pictures, tapes, etc. and for use in Radio and TV). The official view from the Federation will be given in this column next week.

GERMANY

Continuing with our wrap-up of business in Germany in 1964 here is a firm to firm report on business last year. Ariola Records reported their best year sales wise since the firm was formed. The main reason for the sales success was the Xmas LP with Rudolf Schock, which was the absolute best seller for Ariola's Eurodisc label. Pop-wise, 1964 was big due to the LP's of Trini Lopez, the LP's from the Star Club, standard pop LP's with Peter Kreuder, Franz Grothe and Michael Jary and several documentary LP's. Singles wise, Ariola had a big year due to Trini Lopez, Ernest Neger, Carmela Corren, Renate & Werner Leismann and Peter Hinnen. CBS finished their second year in business in Germany as a separate firm with a 280% sales increase. The big LP for the firm was the original film music from "My Fair Lady," which was just released and of course the huge single successes of Bernd Spier, Marika Kilius, Hans Jurgen Baumler and Jurgen Herbst. The tremendous U.S. Columbia catalogue provided plenty of LP standard sales on artists such as Ray Conniff and the strong "Detroit Sound" from Tamla-Motown records which provided CBS with The Supremes and top sales here. Deutsche Grammophon Gesellschaft reported that their classical sales were up 15% over last year putting D.G.G. in absolute first place classical music saleswise. The Herbert Von Karajan recordings topped sales with a fantastic world sales figure of 1.5 million LP's. Singles sales were led by Freddy Quinn with his newest top 10 hit, "Vergangen, vergessen, vorueber" selling 1/4 million records in the first few weeks of release. Other top sellers, single-wise, include Peter Alexander, Connie Francis, Sacha Distel, and Martin Lauer with new artists Wencke Myhre, Claudio, Rik & Roger, Uwe Spier, Liane, Roy Black, Heidi Bachert and Sonnie showing great promise for '65". Polydor LP's and operetta records continued to be strong factors for the firm, and the great Verve catalogue gave the firm great jazz sales. Deutsche Vogue had their best year to date in Germany with the strong Dot label contributing sales from Pat Boone, Billy Vaughn, Lawrence Welk and Jimmy Rodgers while the firm also did well with their new labels Red Bird and Kapp. The LP list was led off by two giant sellers from Helen Vita which kept Vogue in the LP best seller list. Singles wise the firm had two top sellers in Suzie and Udo Jurgens. Electrola reports that this last year was also their best year since the war as they held their sales in singles and increased LP sales by 69% over last year. Leading sales were the sensational Beatles who alone accounted for over 2 million LP's and singles sales. Other top foreign artists especially The Swinging Blue Jeans, and Cliff Richard accounted for top sales as did local artists Ralf Bendix, Conny Froboess, Gitte, Rex Gildo, Paul Kuhn, Grete Kauffeld and Rocco Granata. Operetta sales along with their top classical catalogue also accounted for considerable sales as did the "Hoer Zu" series in combination with the magazine of the same name. The Elite Special-Triola group reported a good year as The Rackets led off sales with 3 smash singles and a great LP. The firm opened a press department in Hamburg and a new distribution office in the same city. LP wise the firm did top business in the documentary line and with LP's about Hamburg and Frankfurt doing top regional business. Xmas business was also better than ever. Foreign groups such as The Danish Sharks and Robertino also accounted for the sales increase of the firm in 1964. Metro-nome Records celebrated their 10th year in business in Germany with their best year to date led off by the strong Siw Malmkvist success with "Liebeskummer Loht Sich Nicht" which was the best selling single for 1964. Other top sellers included "Non Ho L'Eta" by Gigliola Cinquetti, "Drina Marsch" by Jorgen Ingmann, and "Das Kommt Vom Rudern" by Peter Lauch all of which went way over the 100,000 mark in sales. LP sales also picked up for the firm.

Philips-Ton Records also reported a very successful year especially in the LP field led off by the German stage version of "My Fair Lady" which passed the 500,000 sales mark to earn a diamond record. Classical records turned in top business and the strong "Bach's Greatest Hits" from the Swingle Singers was the top selling jazz LP. Singles wise the firm had "Dominique" by Soeur Sourire leading sales and the strong new Star Club label featuring beat sounds gave the year a great close for the firm. Teldec Records also reported a great year with great classical sales and strong increase in LP business due to "Play Bach" series their pop LP releases, The Rolling Stones, Werner Muller, Hildegard Knef and Caterina Valente. The "Hoer Zu" production continued to make for great business and top singles business with artists such as Ronny, Vico Torriani, Will Glahe, Manuela, Draf Deutscher, Billy Mo, Manfred Schnelldorfer, Roy Orbison, Peggy March, Paul Anka, Rita Pavone and others gave the firm a great singles year.

Next week, we'll have the results of several other polls for 1964 to wrap up our accounting of the last year. That's it for this week in Germany.

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ITALY

The San Remo Festival is again the pre-eminent subject of our report on the Italian music world. 1965 seems to have started with evil omens for the San Remo Organizers; in fact, after the withdrawal from the Festival of our leading record company RCA Italiana, a second bomb exploded on the scene of this 15th edition of the top contest.

As we reported in our column earlier, organizers of the contest had a lot of problems meeting the needs of both record and publishing firms. This year, as a result of the list of 24 songs admitted, it seems that organizers have found the way to solve their problems, giving the best chances to the publishers. In fact, all top publishing firms will be well represented on the stage of the next Festival.

This is the reason that our leading record company RCA Italiana, decided to withdraw its participation from the contest; and this is also the reason why, after the withdrawal of RCA, the above mentioned second bomb exploded on the Festival scene: EMI Italiana, Decca Italiana, Phonogram (Philips—DGG) and Durium also taking part in the contest, addressed a letter to the General Manager of our Radio & TV Company expressing a fully negative opinion of the contest at San Remo. They asked for a reduction of time to be devoted to the broadcasting and televising of this panorama.

These firms, including many leaders in the Italian music industry, expressed their disapproval for the following reasons: "The final selection of the 24 songs and relative selection of the artists who will perform them on the San Remo stage at the end of January, have clearly demonstrated that organizers have taken into consideration only the interests of publishing groups and their associated record firms without examining and acting according to the real situation in the Italian music market and the prominent interest of the public."

"ATA (San Remo Organizers) seems not to take into consideration the leading role played by the record industry on the Italian market. When the contest was open to all the industry, and when all top music producers were well represented in accordance with their position in the market, all industries accepted with enthusiasm to participate in the Festival. Also if only a few fortunate music companies can derive final advantages from it; and these advantages don't compensate for the efforts of four months. But now that the contest, presenting itself under the label "Festival Of The Italian Song," represents only the interests of a small part of the Italian music industry, the damage will be too heavy to be supported by the industry itself, it will be obliged to act against the manifestation so organized, also acknowledging that this Festival shall be considered the strongest promotional media for the Italian product."

We can't say if such opinions are right or not, but we think that there must be something wrong, on the part of the organizers, if some leading firms are obliged to express their negative opinion in such a harsh manner.

On the other hand we must say that the entire Italian industry, publishers and record companies, shall pay great attention to this, since San Remo Festival involves their greatest interests and is fully supported by the industry itself. Therefore it's necessary to be sure that organizers will act in accordance with the whole industry's interest and not only with a part of it.

Four months per year of the Italian music life are devoted to the San Remo Festival; and its organizers should be aware of their big responsibility, and act in order to have all the music producers playing the proper role in this contest, which, being called "Festival Of The Italian Song," should be considered an open window for the best of the Italian musical product.

In the meantime, the first foreign artists are arriving to record the songs that will be presented on the stage of San Remo. For instance: Petula Clark (Saar) arrived in Milan not long ago in order to record "Invece No" (Publisher-Leonardi) which the French star will perform this year, debuting on the San Remo Festival stage.

French artist, Sacha Distel, was also Italy's guest last week when he came to take part in a TV show produced by EMI Italiana. Distel presented the first two songs that he recorded in Italian. The titles chosen for his debut on the EMI label in our market (formerly he recorded for RCA Victor) were "Non So Più Che Santo Pregare" and "Una Come Te."

In this same show, EMI Italiana also presented its newly pacted star, Marisa Solinas. She performed a new song entitled "Devi Imparare" (Publisher RCA Italiana), which was culled from her latest film "Le Conseguenze," which is now being shown on all Italian screens. This song was especially arranged for Marisa Solinas by a new discovery on our record scene, Lawrence Whiffin. Another EMI artist, Vasso Ovale, took part in the firm's big TV production. This young pop singer presented his latest recording "Io Che Piango Per Te" (Publisher EMI Italiana).

And now we wish to give a look into the classical field, stressing a particular initiative on the part of the Phonogram disc company. In January 1964 they began a special promotional campaign called "The Record Of The Month," which allows fans of classical music to acquire their catalogue of high level recordings at an exceptionally low price. In fact, the prospective disc buyer was enabled to acquire the "Disc Of The Month" for 1,950 Italian Lira (\$3.30) instead of the usual price. 30 days from its issue date, at the beginning of each month, the disc returns to the normal price of 3,900 (\$6.50) Italian Lira.

An important factor of these "Discs Of The Month" is that they do not form part of the usual classical repertoire, as for instance in February 1964 "Lo Frate Innamorato" by G. B. Pergolesi executed by the Orchestra Da Camera Di Milano was being offered; in March Borodin's "2nd Symphony In B Minor" and Rimsky Korsakov's "2nd Symphony Opus 9," and so forth. Their last record issued in December 1964 was entitled "Italian Flutists in London" which includes some rare compositions of Gioseffo San Martino, Felice Giardini, Godfried Fingel, Giovanni Battista Bononcini, Wilhelm Cramer, Baldassarre Galuppi. Compositions by these rather remotely known musicians are played for this record by the well known ensemble Ars Et Musica which specializes in performing works of the Baroque period.

Apart from these "Discs Of The Month" recordings which, as we noted above, represent rare works, Phonogram also releases classical records of the more popular variety at popular prices, i.e., the "Collectors' Series" released under the Fontana label and ticketed for 1,980 Lira (\$3.30) in the record shops. Some of the performers on this series are conductors like Van Kempen, Van Oterloo, Paul Sacher, Karl Ansel, Rudolf Moralt, Francesco Molinari Prandelli, and Antal Dorati.

A special promotional campaign was started by Decca Italiana for the successful English group "The Rolling Stones" during this Xmas period. The Italian fans of the famous international group had the surprise of seeing on their home market a special record released by Decca including the group's 4 great successes: "Carol," "Tell Me," "I Just Wait," and "Route 66." This disc is being sold at the same price as a single 45.

Tony Renis, one of the top Italian singers, who suddenly reached popularity thanks to his San Remo hit "Quando Quando Quando," has recently left EMI Italiana, the label which first introduced his talent. He signed a new pact with an unknown new company called CID. This company seems to be internationally represented by Philips, since the Holland branch informed Cash



HOLLAND

Bovema had a special publicity stand at the receiving-centre of Haarlem's successfully organized Hartewens-Festival and invited Festival guests to one-hour excursions through Gramophonehouse offices and studios.

The Shepherds, folk song trio rapidly rising to fame through recent H.M.V.-recordings, and TV- and radio-gigs, have just been signed for next year's program of René Sleswijk's Revue, a milestone for every young artist's career.

Bovema's Calitol-label marked the year's end with several strong EP items by such artists as Dean Martin, Wanda Jackson, The Beach Boys, and Nancy Wilson. Laurindo Almeida's "Guitar From Ipanema" and Jean Shepard's "Lighthearted And Blue" also hit the market this week.

Further new arrivals in the recording field are Imperial's set featuring the promising classical singer Anke Attema, and a bunch of very interesting Ember-LP's by Vic Lewis (live at Beaulieu Festival), and disks by Duke Ellington, Earl Bostic, former LHR-singer Annie Ross, and Jack Teagarden (playing Blues and Dixie).

Atlantic this week unveiled its first 1965 release with new swinging albums by Herbie Mann and The Bill Evans Trio, ("Nirvana"), "The Two Sides of Jack Wilson," and the drum meeting of top percussionists Philly Joe Jones and Elvin Jones in "Together."

Before long, CBS Gramofoonplaten is going to release the fourth album by Barbra Streisand, entitled "People," according to CBS' Sales Manager Hemmy J. S. Wapperom. On account of the recent premiere of the movie "Send Me No Flowers," CBS will release a new single by Doris Day: "Send Me No Flowers" b/w "Rainbow's End."

All Dutch Radio and TV Stations have been paying lots of attention to "My Fair Lady." This is due to the premiere of the widely acclaimed film and the "My Fair Lady" records on CBS, featuring Andy Williams, Andre Previn, Percy Faith, and last but not least, the CBS Sound Track recording. The first Andy Williams Show was shown over local KRO-TV-network on Dec. 27 last. Dutch VPRO-TV has aired the Dinah Shore Show, featuring Barbra Streisand, on Dec. 29. Barbra was seen and heard in outstanding readings of "Happy Days Are Here Again," and "Cry Me A River." Recently Dutch TV showed a CBS Musical-Short, in which Goddard Lieberson appeared with Andre Previn.

At the moment, CBS Gramofoonplaten is making preparations for the arrival of The New Christy Minstrels on Jan. 4th. On the same day, The Minstrels will perform at the Expo-Hall in Hilversum, and they will give a concert at the Rai-Building in Amsterdam, the next day, broadcast live on local Vara-TV. They are expected to become real show toppers in this territory, and CBS is taking great pride in presenting the New Christies in Holland.

CBS Local Jazz-Giant Louis Van Dyke played at the "Heart's Desire" on Dec. 29th. CBS Holland has proudly announced the fact that a Johnny Cash fan club has been established in Holland. The Local Dion Di Muci fan club has resumed their activities, recruiting new members, etc.

Thelonious Monk will appear in concert, in Amsterdam, during March 1965. Ed. Essex Holland is happy to announce that they got the publishing rights of The Rolling Stones catalogue. Their last hit "Time Is On My Side" is climbing to the top of the Dutch hit parade, owing to the strong promotion campaign. Connelly-Basart will publish the evergreen "Just An Old Fashioned Girl," which song became known by the performance of Eartha Kitt. Leeds Holland signed for the rights to the new smash hit by Petula Clark, "Down Town," which is now in the British top ten. Brigitte Bardot brought out a new success "Moi Je Joue," the rights of which are with Basart N.V. The Dutch singer Conny van Bergen recorded the song "Come A Little Bit Closer" (rights with Connelly-Basart). German skater-singer Hans Jürgen Bäumlner recorded a new success "Aber Mein Herz Ist Allein," (Basart).

Basart can look back on 1964 with much pleasure, it being the most successful year in the history of this publisher. Basart acquired the rights to many world hits, i.e. "All My Loving," "Blue Winter," "Can't Buy Me Love," "Drei Musketiere," "Glad All Over," "Gold Und Geld," "The House Of The Rising Sun," "A Hard Day's Night," "Hold Me," "Have I The Right," "It's All Over Now," "I Want To Hold Your Hand," "I Love The Little Things," "I Should Have Known Better," "It's For You," "I Feel Fine," "Jailer Bring Me Water," "Louie, Louie," "Le Sais-Tu," "Memphis Tennessee," "On The Beach," "Roll Over Beethoven," and still many many other songs.

Box of the Renis' first release, a single containing 2 Italian songs: "Cara Fatina" (Published by Bideri) and "Lettera A Pinocchio" (Published by Sugarmusic). An interesting detail is that these songs were arranged and conducted by the world famous Quincy Jones.

The little Italian song queen, Rita Pavone, returns to the Italian record scene with her latest release. The first song of her new single is a funny tune derived from a TV show called "Il Giornalino Di Gian Burrasca" in which Pavone also debuts as an actress. Title of the song is "Viva La Pappa Col Pomodoro" while the flipside is "Se La Mia Mamma." Both numbers are published by RCA Italiana.

In the film music production area, we wish to mention the soundtrack of the film "I Malamondo" produced by Campi (C.A.M.) and written by Ennio Morricone. In particular we must specify two songs from this film, "Penso A Te," and "Questi Vent'Anni Miei." Marks is the sub-publisher, and in Great Britain, where the song is sub-published along with the entire background music, by Ardmore & Beechwood.

We would also like to take advantage of this occasion to point out that Ennio Morricone is the first among Italian composers who are trying to write commercial music for film backgrounds; and while "Funny World" is definitively confirming the success of his initiative, the sound-track composed for the film "Un Pugno Di Dollari" also written by him, is also obtaining a great success in Italy where the disk containing the harmonious composition "Per Un Pugno Di Dollari" is now listed among the best sellers. The publisher is RCA Italiana.

There are another 2 songs published by RCA Italiana included in different films which are receiving good reaction from the market. We are referring to "Oggi E' Domenica Per Noi" as interpreted by Sergio Endrigo for the film called "La Costanza Della Ragione" starring Catherine Deneuve and Sammy Frey. The other song is "La Notte Che Son Partito" sung by Jimmy Fontana for the film "Il Magnifico Cornuto" starring Caludia Cardinale and Ugo Tognazzi.

CGD Internazionale has informed Cash Box that it has obtained the distribution rights for Warner Bros. Records in Italy. Warner Bros. Records was formerly represented in our country by Saar.

The English hit "The House Of The Rising Sun" originally published by Peter Maurice, and sub-published by Sugarmusic is now starting its career in Italy. The original recording by The Animals was released some weeks ago by EMI Italiana, and it seems that the group will also wax an Italian version of the song.



MEXICO

Before anything else, a Happy New Year 1965 to every one of you and may this year be the best of all.

RCA will release five recordings made by Italian singer Rita Pavone, in Spanish. The songs are: "No Es Fácil Tener 18 Años," "Que Me Importa El Mundo," "San Francisco De Asis," "Corazón," and "A Mi Edad." These are the first recordings made by Rita in Spanish and it is probable that she will finish an LP in this language.

Los Hermanos Carrión, the best Mexican romantic group, released the songs "Triste Muy Triste" (Blue And Blue) and "Niñas, Niñas" (Girls, Girls) for Orfeon Records. Ricardo, Lalo and Héctor Carrión are starting their first picture, a biographical movie.

Enrique Guzmán made his debut at the "Terrazza Cassino" night club with Spanish songstress Salomé, who has not decided to sign yet with any of the Mexican recording companies. Enrique will leave town shortly to perform in Argentina and is probable that in two weeks more new recordings will appear at CBS.

Pily Gaos, one of the best RCA sellers in 1964, released a new single, "El Amor," (The Love), written by RCA A&R Rubén Fuentes, with a special music background made in Italy.

Thanks for the beautiful Christmas cards sent by American singers Bobby Rydell, Connie Francis and Pat Boone. And talking about Connie, DUSA announced a new series of recordings made by her in Spanish which will be released through the MGM label.

AS is a new label that appeared in the Mexican music market. Among its other recordings is a long play sung by beautiful Soledad Acosta, featuring different rhythms like Rock-ballad, rancheras, waltzes, boleros and others.

Frederico Valdés, a promising youngster at Orfeon records, already finished his first long play for this label, which will be released early this month.

We received a post card from New York signed by Gabriel Pardo, manager of the Mexican rock and roll group, Los Loud Jets (Mexican Jumpin' Beans).

Enjoying the Mexican life are Santo and Johnny, who extended their night club, theater and TV contracts for two more weeks. The main reason is their smash hit, "And I Love Her," which is included in their latest LP where they play Beatles' themes.

The DUSA record company announced in its catalogue that it will handle the distribution of Vee Jay's records from now on. DUSA also distributes MGM, Verve, Mercury, DGG, Polydor and Philips in Mexico.

Gamma Records took over the distribution, in Mexico and other Latin American countries, of Everest Records, which will appear in Mexico with covers of high quality.

It is said that El Patio, a night club that used to present international shows, will change its policy, and in the future will present exclusively Mexican shows for tourists with performances of the best Mexican folk artists.

CBS released a single sung in Spanish by Italian singer Vilma Coich. The songs are "Todo Lo Que Se" and "He Sabido Que Te Amaba." These recordings were made originally at Ricordi Dischi, the label that is distributed in Mexico by CBS.

Silvia Gil is the name of a new singer who signed with Musart Records and released the songs "Sobrecito Azul" and "Que Problemón." Silvia was born in the U.S. and hardly speaks Spanish, but in the record she exhibits a very nice style.

Los Cinco Latinos, who are actually recording now at the Polydor label, released the themes "Cuando Me Abrazas" and "El Surf Del Disfraz." These two songs belong to an album also recorded by them, which will be released in Mexico very soon by Polydor.

Miguel Angel, who signed as A&R of Musart Records, recorded a single with the songs "Ruperto" and "Beatriz" with accompaniment by Jorge Ortega and his combo.

CBS Records cut a single by Steve Lawrence of "Hello Dolly" and "The Girl From Ipanema." We are still awaiting a new recording by Steve and Eydie Gormé singing in Spanish. Their last recording "I Want To Stay Here" was a smash hit in town and registered wonderful sellings.

"Think About Me" will be the hottest thing on wax in Canada in less time than it takes to say Canadian Content. Hervey was a guest (2) on CFCF-TV-Montreal, and the Like Young show, hosted by Jim McKenna. While in Montreal, the talented and beautiful young thrush guested with Bob Gilles and Joan Fitzgerald on their CKGM, "Bob and Joan" telephone-air segment. From the reaction of Montreal youngsters to the duo's airing of the Hervey record, it'll be a giant on the city's sales scene in short order. By all indications most Canadian markets are following suit. '65 is off to a flying start in so far as good Canadian sounds are concerned.

A word of thanks to the entire trade in Canada for naming yours truly, John Murphy, as "industry man of the year" in R.P.M.'s year end poll. The weekly space in Cash Box is at the disposal of Canadian traders across the Country. If indeed I have been of service to the music industry in Canada through my efforts in Cash Box, this is as it should be, and I trust that this space will continue to be at the service of the rapidly growing and developing Canadian music industry. 1965 will be Canada's year in the music biz spotlight, and hats off to Walter Grealis, Whitey Haines, and men of their calibre in this country who are making not only the whole world aware of Canadian music developments, but also are making Canadians aware of this development, and the latter activity is by far the tougher of the two tasks. . . . Jack Dalton, P.D. at CJCH-Halifax, long distanced all the way from the East Coast metropolis to voice his enthusiasm over some new Epic wax by Kenny Chandler. Jack came by a dub of the master on the new Chandler session and figures it to be a real smash, fast. . . . "Jolly Green Giant," meanwhile is off and running for Frank Cameron and his gang at CHNS-Halifax. . . . The Kingsmen's outing on Reo debuted on the 'NS "Super 50" (9). Another biggie in the realm of Canadian talent on the east coast is the Jack London Capitol side, "If You Don't Want My Love." . . . Dean Ragopian has changed his plans and will not exit his spin 'em post at CKOY-Ottawa to relocate on Montreal's CKGM. . . . New P.D. at CKOC-Hamilton is Doug Anderson from CKCK in Regina. . . . The RCA Victor outing, "New Flag For Canada," is also happening on Canada's east coast with CHNS-Halifax again leading the way with those all important chart listings that have RCA's Mike Doyle just as happy as he can be. The record incidentally scored something of a broadcast first as it was, in part, included in one of Tom Cherrington's CKGM editorials.

"Splish Splash" by the Strato Tones on Hawk shows up on the CHSJ-Saint John Smart Chart (9). . . . Good Music programmers making heavy use of LP's could do well by contacting M.D. Jack Morse at WHEN-Syracuse, N.Y., asking to be added to his mailing list for his weekly LP play list. It is just about the most complete detailed resumé of album material available to broadcasters. . . . Petula Clark was feted at a reception/news conference in Montreal (4). Her record, "Downtown," is a chart topper from coast to coast in Canada. . . . One of the best new adult oriented singles in recent memory has to be the newbie on Tamla by Tony Martin. The "Old Butterscotch Baritone," is in fine voice with a very commercial outing, entitled, "Talking To Your Picture." It is very much in the hit vein of recent releases by such great vets as Dean Martin, Frank Sinatra and Jerry Vale. If you happened to miss it the first time 'round, give it another listen, it's a beauty. . . . Al Boliska's good air gimmick, "World's Oldest And Corniest Jokes," is now syndicated. It's available for all markets at a nominal fee. Contact Al at CKEY, 247 Davenport Road, Toronto. . . . Hottest new singles for Barry Paine, Al Mair, and their associates across Canada are the U.A. monster by Jay And The Americans, "Let's Lock The Door," and the great new Decca waxing by Brenda Lee, "Thanks A Lot." . . . More and more Canadian jocks are on the "Watusi '64" side by Jay Bentley and the Jet Set on GNP. Credit John Bernier at Kresge's Record Bar in Montreal for getting air action started on the side in that City, and Bryan Olney, at Kingston, for starting the Ontario section on the side. Rockin' Robbert at CHSJ-St. John led the way in Eastern Canada.

Now that New Year's has come and gone, and interest still mounts daily on this good commercial outing, I wonder if they will retitle it "Watusi '65". . . . How's this for Canadian talent breaking through? The CKYL-Peace River chart has Joe Popiel's Quality waxing of "Can't Live Without You" in the number one spot on its new edition (9). I rather enjoy the underlining of Canadian produced records on the CKYL list. They are indicated by an asterisk with the following explanation at the bottom of the list, "TALENT." . . . Good to see pretty Jo Ann Campbell and hubby Troy Seals riding high on the charts in Canada with their great bluesy outing on Atlantic, "I Found A Love." . . . Another big blues item for Hal Ross that is headed for the top on practically every Canadian chart is "Lovin' Feelin'" by the Righteous Brothers.

Keith Rich has returned to the Canadian broadcast scene and a regular on-air post at CKEY-Toronto. This follows a lengthy stay at WNBC-New York. . . . Jack London, currently scoring all across the Country with his Capitol outing, "If You Don't Want My Love," is hosting a three hour deejay session on CHIC-Brampton. The Toronto area outlet has stolen a march on some of its big city rivals with the debut of this budding star of the wax world on the air waves. . . . The new Shirley Ellis side, "The Name Game" is fast becoming a top ten item everywhere in Canada. . . . "Give Him A Great Big Kiss" by The Shangri Las is bound to be a chart topper very shortly. . . . "Heart Of Stone" will very probably keep the Rolling Stones in the chart limelight for some time to come in Canada. Another good side from England with that blues sound that seems to be so very much in vogue in ol' Blighty of late is a waxing by The Moody Blues, entitled, "Go Now." It'll be on London in Canada and could be a real winner.

Editorial

Glamour — A Part Of The Business

Point of purchase advertising—the advertising of a particular product at the actual place of sale—is considered by most experienced businessmen to be an extremely effective promotional technique. This can be achieved several ways—through display advertising at the scene, through scores of colorful merchandising aids and through the actual packaging of the product itself. On this last note, many successful firms have been organized whose chief service is to suggest designs for the packaging of products, based on scientific psychological data. In short, they tell the manufacturer how to dress his wares to attract the customer and his money.

The basic rules don't change very much for the operator of music, amusement and vending machines. Every operator, especially those of music and games, knows all too well the importance of attracting potential customers by offering clean, colorful, good looking—in a word, 'glamorous' equipment. In effect, point of purchase advertising. The question here is this—how many operators take *full advantage* of the steps to create the kind of glamorous appeal which compels the customer to drop in his coin.

Most coinmen recognize the need for maintaining modern equipment. A co-owner of a certain Brooklyn arcade chain once appraised the condition of his amusement machines with the concise comment—"We operate amusement centers, not *museums*." Another coinman, a Manhattan phonograph distributor, recently observed—"If the machine isn't worth a dime to you (the operator), it won't be worth a dime to them (the customers)." Both comments, and dozens more like it heard everyday, underscore that one central fact—nobody wants to play a dirty, old machine!

Knowing how important it is to keep that route in the best condition possible to attract the most sales, just how does the good businessman achieve this? One way is to continually update your route by purchasing and placing new machines on your better locations. It is common knowledge that a shiny new piece of equipment is a terrific attraction and sales almost automatically climb whenever a new machine is unveiled on a location. Another method is through the reconditioning of your present equipment or the purchase of other rebuilt pieces from qualified distributors.

Still another way is through the simple and conscientious maintenance of your present equipment through such tools as furniture wax, chrome cleaner and shiner, glass cleaner, etc. Other, more creative merchandising aids can be utilized by operators, for instance, special lighting and other decorative aids at the location (much like college students dress up their rooms with the familiar travel posters). In the last analysis, dressing up that location is an individual thing, as individual as programming a particular phonograph, and requires individual thought.

At this time, when almost every machine manufacturer is offering new, colorful and exciting models, isn't it an excellent opportunity to take stock of the condition of your route and see whether or not a little time and money spent in the right direction can't dress up the business and attract those extra sales? Glamour is a mighty important part of this business—play it for all it's worth.

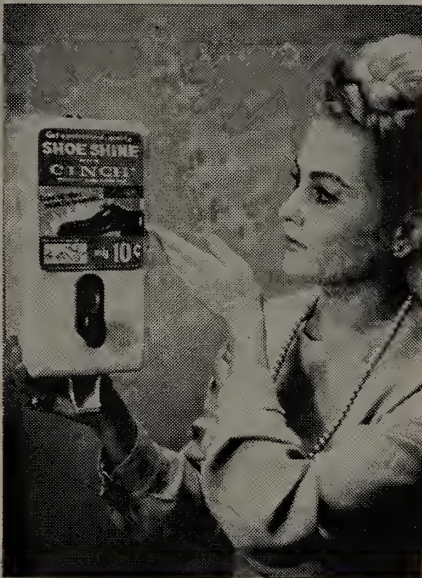
Urban To Ship V-900 Film System In Spring

One interesting point Jack dropped during the course of his conversation was that one of the phonos on his route, located in a bus terminal, is averaging over 1,000 plays a week on a nickle-per-play basis. The location is frequented by teenagers and Jack believes the kids have been dropping their loose nickles into the phono, much more readily than other kids on other locations have with their dimes.

Max Guldin, Musical Distributors exec, announced that he and Harold Kaufman are preparing for the big event from Wurlitzer and will shortly reveal promotional plans to their operators. Commenting on a lack of qualified machine mechanics here in the East, Max stated that it is the close proximity of the distrib to the operator which inclines the op to call on the phono outlet for service instead of performing more of it himself as is done out West where the operator is separated from the distrib by hundreds of miles. . . .
