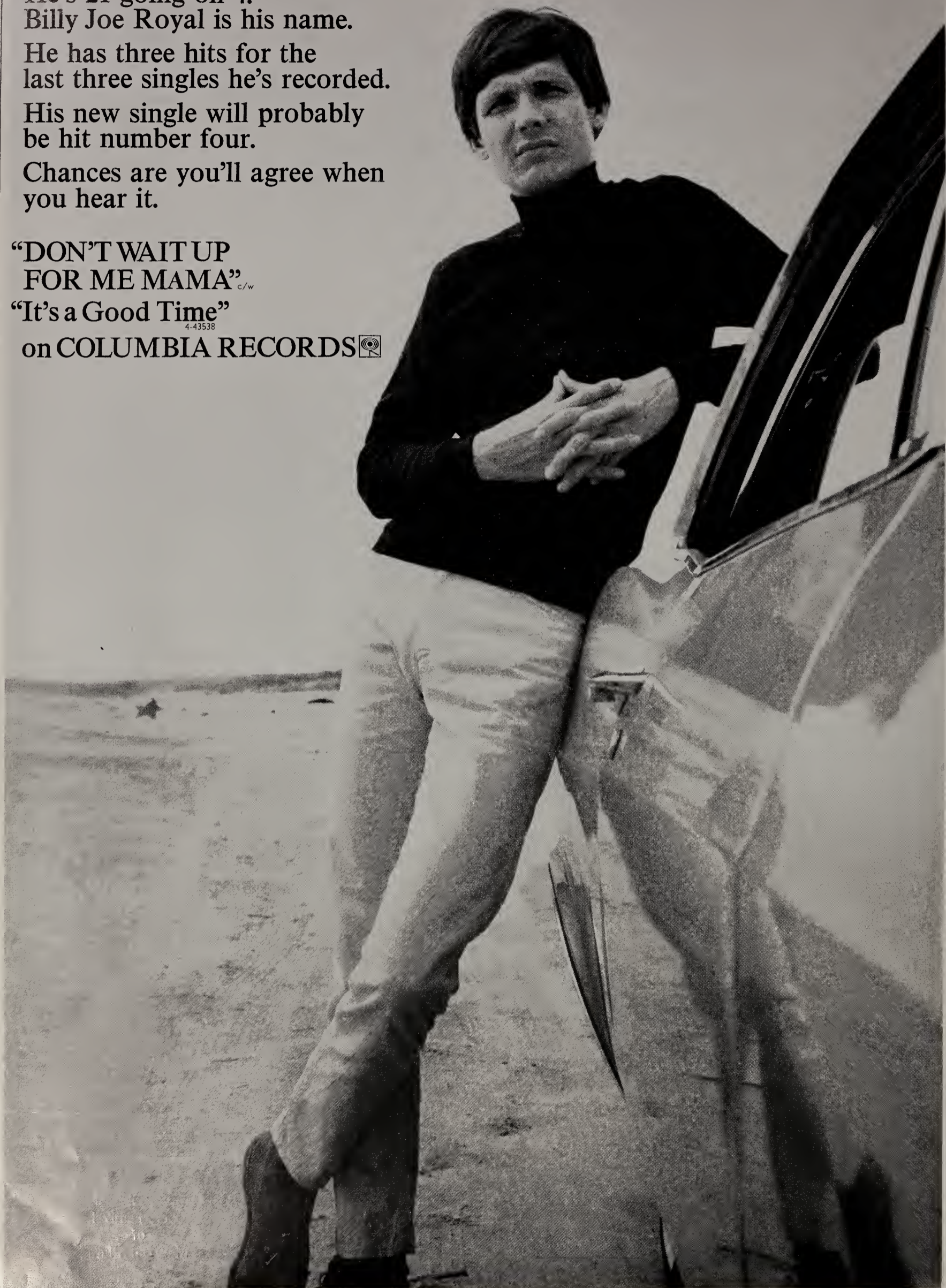

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Way Out West

The record business has long been a part of the great show-business complex of the west coast. It does not pre-date the film industry, but is sandwiched between the migration of movie-makers from the east to the more reliable climate of California and the death of "live" TV about a decade ago, making the area the mecca for the production of TV shows.

Over the years, the west coast end of the record business, while a consistent contributor to the overall growth of the industry, has somehow seemed, often with great justification, an adjunct of motion picture and, more recently, TV enterprises. Many executives and their roster of artists have identified themselves, both in a business and social way, with the film-TV colony. If anything, the Hollywood Sound reflected the indigenous tastes (often high, one must state) of the executive and creative forces in Hollywood.

Recently, this feature of the west coast record business has been complimented by a new and exciting factor. This has been the hit productivity of bright young record men, administrators and creative talent, who are adding a dynamic atmosphere to the record business out there. These people have looked behind the bright lights of the movie-TV world and have come up

with fresh new talent, artists who, like their mentors, are completely record oriented. The new executives and artists now form an army which continually relies on record success for much of their bread-and-butter and artistic satisfaction.

The rewards of this remarkable vitality on the west coast have been enjoyed by companies which are no strangers on the west coast and new indie label set-ups, some of which have already established talent known on a global scale.

For those labels content to remain headquartered in other parts of the country, the west coast is not being by-passed. For many firms—including a number of publishing outfits—have in recent months established strong representation in Los Angeles and some of the other active areas. Rather than being regarded as an area producing a particular sound, the west coast has become a fertile section for general recording activity, and wise is the company that makes it a point to attempt to harvest its riches.

The emergence of the west coast as a highly productive recording center is bound to increase the percentage of recording successes and uncover new acts that are waiting in the wings for discovery and eventual placement in the limelight of recording fame.

Sid Schaffer To Kapp: Top Sales Post & Among Chief Policy Makers

NEW YORK—Sid Schaffer has been named vice president in charge of sales for Kapp Records, according to an announcement by Dave Kapp. Schaffer's new post is the highest ever accorded a sales exec within the Kapp organization and will give him complete control over all sales functions of both Kapp and its subsidiary labels, Congress and Four Corners. In addition, Schaffer, coming from a four year stint as WB-Reprise eastern sales head, is expected to function in the area of basic company policy decisions, along with Dave Kapp; executive vice president Mickey Kapp; and treasurer Nat March. The new executive officially takes over his post Monday (21). Commenting on the appointment, Dave Kapp said: "Sid Schaffer has made a number of important contributions over the years to the business of

selling records. His experience includes a most effective performance in sales at both distributor and manufacturer levels of the business and his accomplishments in building the success of Warner Brothers and Reprise Records are well known."

Schaffer entered the record business with Capitol Records in 1947, serving first as a sales manager in Newark and later as assistant sales manager in the firm's New York office. Eight years later, he joined Mercury Records where he worked first as a member of the sales staff and later as New York branch manager.

Mercury Creates Posts, Realigns Promo Men

NEW YORK—Mercury Records has created two new posts and realigned several field promo personnel. Moves are designed to achieve a more effective program of hunting down new talent and masters and keeping a "corporate finger on the pulsebeat of developing trends within the business," an announcement said.

New Posts In NY, LA

From New York, A&R vice president Shelby Singleton announced the appointment of Joe Baltzell to the newly created position of promotion scout for the east coast. Baltzell will travel in search of new talent for the label via out-of-town record hops, deejay recommendations, auditions and visits to discotheques and Go-Go clubs in various areas. Baltzell will contact stations, promoting current releases in addition to his talent research functions. Prior to this assignment he was with Merrec Distributors of Philadelphia since its inception as Mercury's distrib in that area in October 1964. Maltzell's experience in the record industry extends over the past four years via his association with various Philadelphia area independent distributors.

At the same time, West Coast A&R chief, Doug Moody has tapped Frank Leffel to work in association with him. Leffel will oversee promotion while working with the A&R personnel on their product. He will continue to maintain close rapport with the many TV producers headquartered in Hollywood and will serve as publicity liaison to the West Coast for the label.

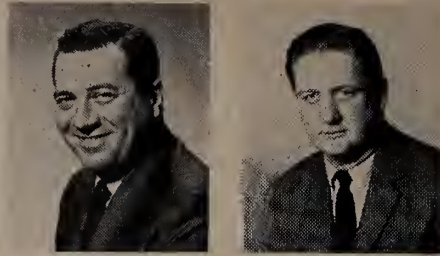
Replacements have been named for both Baltzell and Leffel who formerly handled Philips, Smash and Fontana promotion in their respective local areas. In Philadelphia, Joe Campellone, former sales and promotion representative for Raymond Rosen Co., distributors, will assume Baltzell's former role. Rudy Butterfield, last with Columbia Records will now handle promotion for the three Mercury affiliate labels in Los Angeles.

Victor Promotes Sal Peruggi, Allan Clark

NEW YORK—RCA Victor Records has promoted Sal Peruggi to the position of manager of planning and merchandising, and Allan Clark, formerly field sales representative in Philadelphia, to fill the position being vacated by Peruggi, that of manager of field sales & commercial records. The announcement was made by H. E. Jenkins, vice president of marketing, who said the appointments are effective immediately.

Peruggi, who will report to Jen-

kins, replaces Irwin Tarr who recently was appointed manager of the new recorded tape marketing. He had held his previous position eight years. Prior to that, he had served as a field salesman in Atlanta and New York and was for a time district manager of field sales for New York and New England. He joined Victor in 1948 in production control, recording studios and subsequently moved to Sales Planning before going into the field.

Clark, who will report to J. Y. Burgess, Jr., vice president of commercial sales, joined RCA in 1953 as a salesman with the RCA Victor Distributing Corp. in Detroit, he then joined the RCA Victor record division operating in the midwest and later was active in record merchandiser sales in the Atlanta and San Francisco markets prior to being named national promotion manager in New York. For the past two and a half years, he has been field sales rep in Philadelphia and adjacent markets.

London Imports Brings Pop Sound To Telefunken

NEW YORK—The Telefunken division of London Records' "Imports" line has marketed its first pop catalog, Leo B. Hofberg, manager of the special production dept. of London, has announced. Previous material from Telefunken has been confined almost entirely to classical music recorded in Germany.

In what amounts to an "instant" catalog, the pop series is being unveiled via 90 albums, regarded as a "true cross section of the finest in pop music from Germany," Hofberg noted.

Among the packages are three volumes of "Music Memories of Germany," especially produced for the Army Post Exchanges in Germany and available here for the first time. Each volume, Hofberg said, has sold over 200,000 per title in PA's.

The 90 albums include the sounds of music of folk, pop, operettas, yodeling, comedy, children's choirs, etc.

Among the German talent presented are: Will Glahe, the Oberkrainer, the Egerlander, Heinz Hoppe, the Oberkirchen Children's Choir, Rudi Bohn, Hilde Gueden, Village Bands, German Police and Army Bands, the Golgovsky Quartet, Anton Karas and others.

Dealer Program

As with all "Imports" lines, Telefunken is marketed by London direct-to-the-dealer. To kick-off the line, there are special dealer terms, with mono LP's available at \$2.58 and stereo at \$2.95. Regular list prices are \$4.79 for mono, \$5.79 for stereo. Also, 10% of purchases are exchangeable quarterly, Jan., April, July, Oct. and all purchases accrue 5% in a cumulative ad authorization. Two thousand dealers are receiving a catalog, which includes the titles and the dealer program.

Musicor Sets March LP Release Program

NEW YORK—In line with Musicor Records' recently announced stepped-up release schedule, which calls for new groups of product four times a year, the company has set seven LPs for its March album release program. The March series, which is the second group of packages to be issued by the firm this year, features Gene Pitney, the Bitter End Singers, the Platters, Steve Rossi, Marie Knight, and Paul Tripp.

Following the success of his first standard ballad album, "Looking Through the Eyes of Love," Gene Pitney will be represented with his second LP in this series, while the Bitter End Singers will be featured on their first Musicor LP, "Let Me In or Keep Me Out."

The Platters have rejoined Talmage under their new Musicor contract, and their initial album will be titled "The Platters Old and New." Steve Rossi, who in addition to singing is a member of the comedy team of Allen and Rossi, will be heard on his first Musicor album. Rossi, his comedy teammate Marty Allen, and Nancy

Bob Summers Named To Head Monument Sales

NEW YORK—Bob Summers, former national sales manager for the Warner Bros. and Reprise labels, has been appointed vice-president and director of marketing of Monument Records.

Summers, an 18 year veteran in the industry, began his career in a retail shop at age 17. After graduating from the University of Minnesota he became a Columbia salesman out of Minneapolis. He was then the record and phono buyer for Dayton's. Summers was picked by Warner Bros. as its first divisional sales manager when the label was formed, and operated out of Minneapolis, Chicago, Boston and Cleveland. In March 1962 he was elevated to national sales manager, a post he held until August 1965. It was during this period that Warner

TJB Vs. TJB For Top LP Honors

NEW YORK—"Whipped Cream & Other Delights" by Herb Alpert & the Tijuana Brass is no longer the number 1 album seller in the country, but "Going Places" by Herb Alpert & the Tijuana Brass is.

Pointing up the fantastic success of the A&M label attraction, the TJB replaces the TJB at the number 1 spot on this week's chart.

While the albums play musical chairs at the top spot, two other TJB sets are among the nation's Top 15 packages. These are "South of the Border" (number 14) and, right behind it, "Lonely Bull," the first in the group's LP series.

Further down the chart, "Tijuana Brass Vol. 2" is number 67, which means that every TJB set released so far is a current chart seller. "Zorba the Greek" is TJB's current singles hit.

The A&M label can boast of yet another chart stand. It's "For Animals Only" by the Baja Marimba Band, number 56 this week.

Recognition for the TJB extends to the Grammy awards area, where the team is up for six Grammy awards this year.

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Barry Sadler: A G.I. Ties Record For Gold Disks

NEW YORK — Over a one month span, RCA Victor Records has come up with a gold record artist in both the singles and LP fields. This remarkable feat has been achieved by a veteran of Vietnam, whose hit song, "Ballad of the Green Berets," concerns the conflict in that area.

For the second time since it began making gold record awards, the Record Industry Association of America (RIAA) has made simultaneous certification of a single and LP by the same attraction. The Beatles did it with their single of "Help!" and the soundtrack LP of the same name.

Sadler's LP is called "Ballads of the Green Berets."

Sadler's single was released on Jan. 11, followed by the LP on Jan. 19. RIAA's gold record certifications came last Thursday (17).

Victor also claimed that the LP was selling 50% faster than its track LP of "Sound of Music," an RIAA-audited gold disk, did during its initial sales period. The single is number 2 on this week's Top 100, while the LP moves from number 73 to number 31.

Sadler, a member of the Green Berets, is currently stationed at Ft. Bragg, N.C.

N.Y. HEARING HIGHLIGHTS

Legislation has been introduced in the New York Legislature to make deceptive packaging of LP product a misdemeanor. This was a highlight development of last Friday's (18) hearings on the record business under the sponsorship of Attorney General Louis J. Lefkowitz. The hearing, being conducted at presstime, also heard of the MGM label's new policy of clearly defining re-packaging of old LP product.

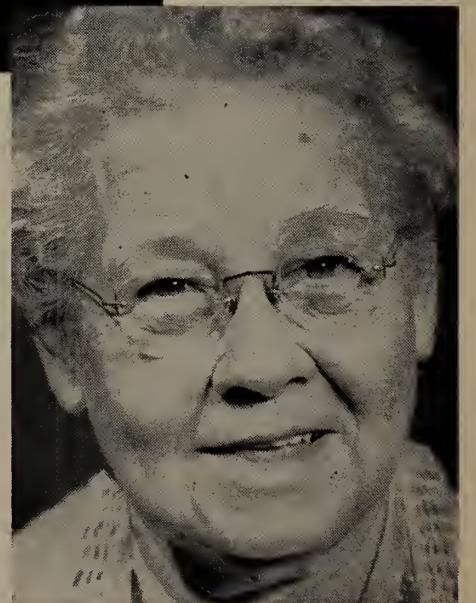

SAN FRANCISCO—Radio personality Bill Gavin has announced that he will present a Radio Program Conference to be held in Chicago at the Sheraton Chicago Hotel on Mar. 26 and 27. The conference, for radio people only, will cover the four major fields of radio programming: non-rock (middle of the road), R&B, C&W, and pop format (Top 40). Among the program directors taking part will be Don Keyes, McLendon stations, Dick Carr, WIP-Philadelphia, Ed Wright, WABQ-Cleveland, Lucky Cordell, WVON-Chicago, Chris Lane, WJJD-Chicago, Al Newman, KKSFO-San Francisco, Glenn K. Born 23 years ago in Baltimore, Md., Bob began playing the guitar when he was 11 years old. After graduating from high school, he attended college, majoring in theatre arts, but after three years he decided to discontinue his formal education and concentrate on writing songs.

His first job in the music field consisted of a one-and-a-half-year stint at the Analyst Coffee House owned by Al Chapman. This proved to be the chanter's lucky break, as Chapman sent a tape of Bob's voice to Dick Bock, head man at World Pacific Records. Less than one week later the songster was in Hollywood with a recording contract in addition to a pact with Metric Music Publishing as a songwriter. Bob's first LP, dubbed after his self-penned chart riding single, will be released shortly.

Bobby Fuller Four



As a tribute to their popularity, the Bobby Fuller Four, who are currently riding the Top 100 with their Mustang outing of "I Fought The Law," were invited to play for the President of the United States when he made a stop at the airport in El Paso, Tex.

The lads were formed by their leader, El Paso born Bobby Fuller. It was in that city that Bobby, a guitarist, pianist, drummer, composer, arranger and singer, built his own recording studio and developed the group's sound and style.

For the past year the foursome have appeared at P.J.'s nitery in Hollywood. The lads have also filmed a motion picture, "Bikini Party In A Haunted House," and have appeared on many TV's. They recently completed their latest LP which includes their current hit. In the future the group will be touring the U. S. and Europe.

Because of the school drop out problem, WABC-New York deejay Bruce Morrow "dropped in" to a New York area high school. The air personality was there to introduce several of the school's music acts as part of the premiere of "Drop In," a new series of special programs originating from high schools throughout the New York metropolitan area. The idea for "Drop In" was thought of by Dick Hutchinson, a producer at the station. In seeking a new approach to the drop out problem, Hutchinson thought it might be a good idea for one of the station's air personalities, "whom the kids know and respect, to drop in on high schools in the New York area—meet the teenagers on their own ground and point up the entertaining side of their school life."

When KGBS-Los Angeles air personality Joe Nixon boasted that he was the world's greatest zeppelin commander, but that his zeppelin was not in flying condition, the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company called his bluff. The firm offered Nixon and the station the services of its blimp, "The Columbia," for one hour's use. Needing a crew, the deejay requested listeners to write in, telling him why they would like to become a member of his crew. After one week's promotion and several hundred entries, five official crew members were selected. They received, in addition to an hour ride over Los Angeles, an eight and a half by eleven framed certificate, certifying that they had successfully completed a one hour training mission. Levine To Supervise MGM's Copyright Dept.



HOWARD LEVINE

NEW YORK—Howard Levine has been appointed supervisor of MGM Records' copyright dept., reports Mort Nasatir, president. He will report directly to Tom White, director of administration.

He comes to his newly acquired position quite naturally. A record collector for nearly a quarter of a century, Levine was making a guest appearance on Joe Franklin's radio program over station WNEW one Sunday afternoon in November-1945 when he received a message to phone the late Jack Kapp. Kapp, the founder and first president of Decca Records was, as he put it "lying in bed listening to the radio" and Levine's obvious enthusiasm for his huge Bing Crosby record collection caught his fancy. Kapp invited the young collector to his office, introduced him to the files so he could obtain recording data, and promised him a personal introduction to Bing Crosby which he later fulfilled.

During the years that followed, Levine alternated his time between classes at New York University and visits to Decca. In 1949, Levine graduated from NYU and shortly thereafter Jack Kapp passed away. Although Levine worked for several years in the engineering field as a draftsman, his interest in records never waned and when, in 1953 an opportunity presented itself, he went to work in Decca's copyright dept.

Several years later, he entered Decca's recording dept., where he worked as a research specialist for a decade.

Col's Hebrew 'Oliver!'

NEW YORK—Columbia Records, continuing to broaden its foreign language original cast LP catalog, plans to cut the cast LP of the Israel National Theater ("Habimah") production of "Oliver!" The musical, a success in England and the U.S., features Rivka Raz and Shraga Friedman in its run in Israel. Columbia has previously released Hebrew versions of "My Fair Lady" and "Fiddler on the Roof."



Mills Names Reno, Howden To Posts

NEW YORK—Mills Music has just filled two posts. Stanley Mills, general professional manager of the company, has named Bob Reno a professional manager. He'll work with the standard catalog as well as with new songs, reporting directly to Stanley Mills. He comes to the company from George Paxton Music, where he held the post of general professional manager and promo manager for Coed Records, an affiliate of Paxton.

In another move, Bernard Kalban has named Bruce Howden an editor. Kalban, manager of the printed products dept., said that Howden would be working with the classical, educational and pop departments. Reporting directly to Kalban, Howden was previously a music editor at G. Schirmer. He has also taught theory and instrumental music at Temple Univ.

This will be his first trip to the Continent since taking over as foreign sales director on Jan. 1.

Wexler Asks NARAS To Give R&B Its Due

NEW YORK—The ink had hardly dried on last week's official list of NARAS Grammy nominees before Jerry Wexler, executive v.p. and general manager of Atlantic Records, injected a provocative note of controversy. Wexler, contended in a letter to F. M. Scott, national president of NARAS, that the Academy did not give R&B product the proper credit it deserves in terms of today's business. His point was underscored by the fact that Atlantic's Wilson Pickett received a nomination in the "Best R&B Recording" category for "In The Midnight Hour."

The following is the text of the Wexler letter:

"There is a glaring disproportion in your categories this year:

"You have six categories for Country & Western, and only one for Rhythm & Blues.

"The rationale escapes me.

"I yield to no one in my admiration for Country & Western music. It has inestimable value, both commercial and aesthetic and its place in the American cultural scene is beyond measure.

"The same certainly can be said of Rhythm & Blues. It is not my notion to set up a dichotomy and to pit the worth of Rhythm & Blues against that of Country & Western music. However, a Rhythm & Blues hit is known to sell in the hundreds of thousands. The influence of Rhythm & Blues in the pop music scene is not to be denied. Rhythm & Blues is basic, and is certainly the strongest precursor of Rock & Roll and contemporary Top 40 music of all the influences in our business today.

"However, industry slighting of Rhythm & Blues is not new. It is relegated to a back page in some of our trade papers. While buildings and monuments reach skyward to honor Country & Western music, we know of no such edifice nor any attempt to erect one in the Rhythm & Blues world.

MGM Budget Lines Name Picone (Sales), Spargo (A&R)

NEW YORK—A sales manager and A&R director have been named for MGM Records' budget-priced labels.

Heading sales is Phil Picone, reporting directly to Sol Greenberg, director of album sales. Pete Spargo will be chief of recording activities for the lines. He will also assist Tom Wilson, pop A&R head, in the pop and folk music areas.

MGM's budget lines consist of Metro, VSP (jazz), Heliodor (classical) and Leo the Lion (kiddie), the last three of which were recently unveiled (see last week's story).

Peter Dellheim, Red Seal A&R producer, handled the recording for RCA and said that as Capote read about each character, he managed to assume the identity of each, adding somber realism to the album.

London Enters Tape Cartridge Field

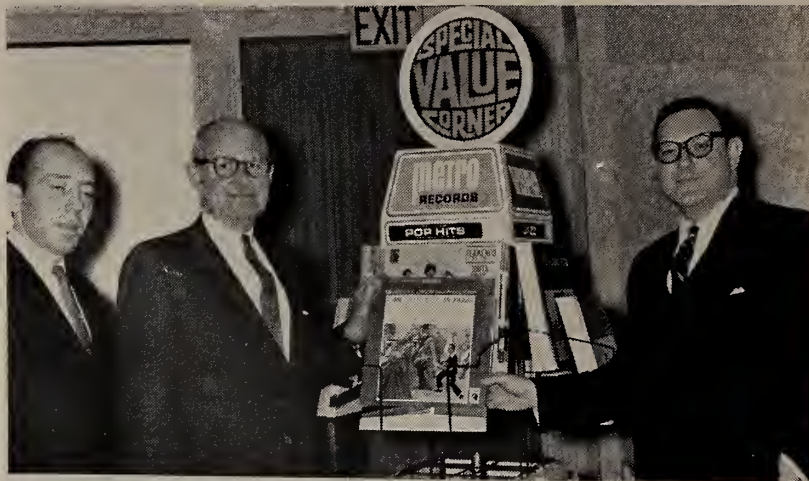

Wargo said that London has watched the developments in the cartridge field for a number of months. The decision to enter the eight-track market now, he noted, is primarily due to recent decisions by the leading auto manufacturers to adopt the eight-track approach in their auto units.

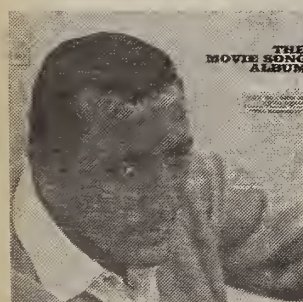
I'LL REMEMBER YOU—Roger Williams—Kapp KS-3470

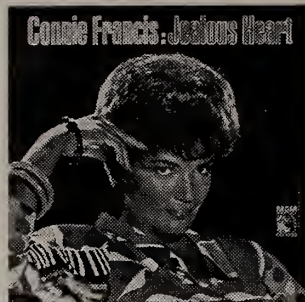

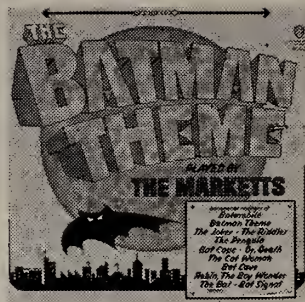

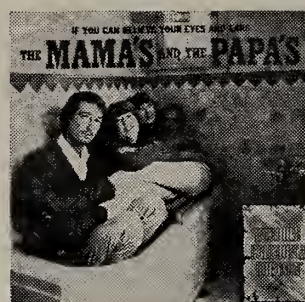
THE BATMAN THEME—Marketts—Warner Bros. 1642

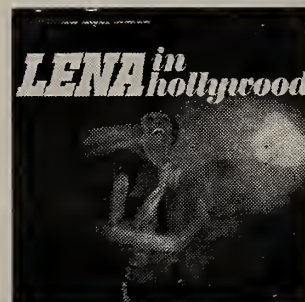

Supported by either brassy or blissful Ray Ellis arrangements, Lena picks some songs from the past (e.g. "A Fine Romance," "Singing In The Rain"), most from the present (e.g. "Moon River," "All The Way," "Wives & Lovers"). Familiar melodies that become something special when Lena encounters them.



FEVER!—Doc Severinsen—Command RS 893SD

Trumpet work high in the artistry one expects of Severinsen is the meat of the package. Performer ranges from blues, to folk to pop ballads, maintaining a persuasive level of rhythmic and sentimental feeling throughout. The tunes are varied, as the approach would indicate. 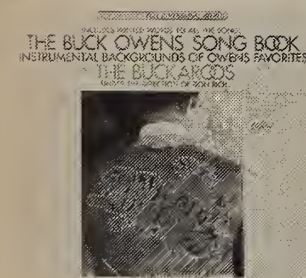
QUIET NIGHTS & BRAZILIAN GUITARS—Guitars Unlimited—Capitol T/ST 2451

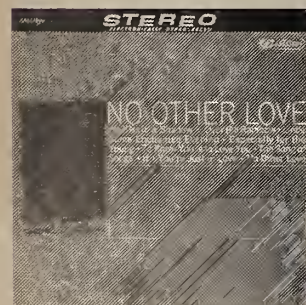

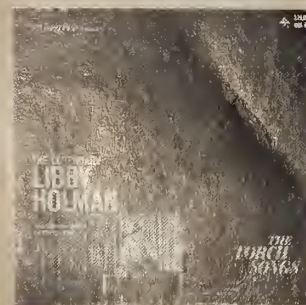

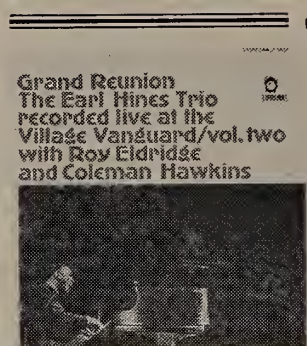
TODAY!—Herbie Mann —Atlantic SD 1454

Herbie Mann has a pretty addition to his growing LP catalog with this set of sounds that he labels "Today." The title represents both the currency of the tunes that he does on the disk as well as the fact that this is Mann's sound of the moment. From the medium paced ingratiating title track, which was co-penned by Mann and the LP's arranger and conductor Oliver Nelson, to the flutist's inspired interpretation of "Yesterday," the album speaks of the now and not of what is the past.



ARTHUR PRYSOCK/COUNT BASIE —Verve V/V6-8646

It was a lucky day for many jazz buffs, blues devotees and just plain music lovers when the beautiful voice of Arthur Prysock was matched to the superb sound of the Count Basie Band. Listening to such blue ribbon efforts as "I Could Write A Book," "Come Rain Or Shine," "Don't Go To Strangers" or any of the eight other delights, should convince anyone that the Count might go on forever and Prysock along with him.



JAZZ BEST BETS

GRAND REUNION, Vol. 2—Earl Hines Trio—Limelight LS 86028

This second volume to be offered as the result of an afternoon session with the Earl Hines Trio plus Roy Eldridge and Coleman Hawkins, recorded live at New York's Village Vanguard, is a well made match to its powerful predecessor. 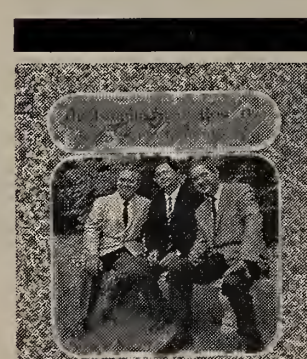
MUSTY RUSTY—Lou Donaldson—Argo 759

LATIN SHADOWS — Shirley Scott — Impulse A-93

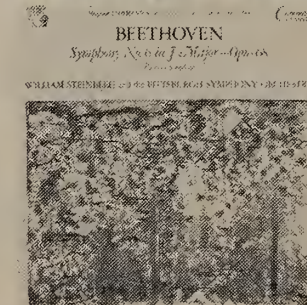

NEW YORK—In an unusual move, Ray Charles has joined the talent roster of his Tangerine Records company, yet will continue to be released on ABC-Paramount Records, which markets Tangerine product on a global basis.

In effect, ABC-Par will be leasing Charles' services from Tangerine.

An announcement by Larry Newton, ABC-Par president, and Charles himself disclosed the deal. Charles further explained that he felt that the value of his name in the disk field would give a boost to the roster of Tangerine artists, including Percy Mayfield, Louis Jordan, Bill & Sherrie, among others. Despite his appearance on ABC-Par disks, he will be billed as a Tangerine performer.

It was also announced that Tangerine has opened new offices in the ABC Building at 1330 Avenue of the Americas, with Miss Micki McMullan, formerly head of Tangerine's west coast offices, to be in charge of New York activities.

Tangerine was formed by Charles in 1962, and has been handled by ABC-Par since that time. That same year, Charles began a "new" career by cutting his classic LP, "Modern Sounds in Country and Western Music." He has won a total of six Grammys.

Currently enjoying a big singles hit, "Cryin' Time," Charles, after spending several months in Los Angeles concentrating on business activities, will resume his p.a. schedule with an opening at the Latin Casino in Camden, N.J. on Mar. 28.

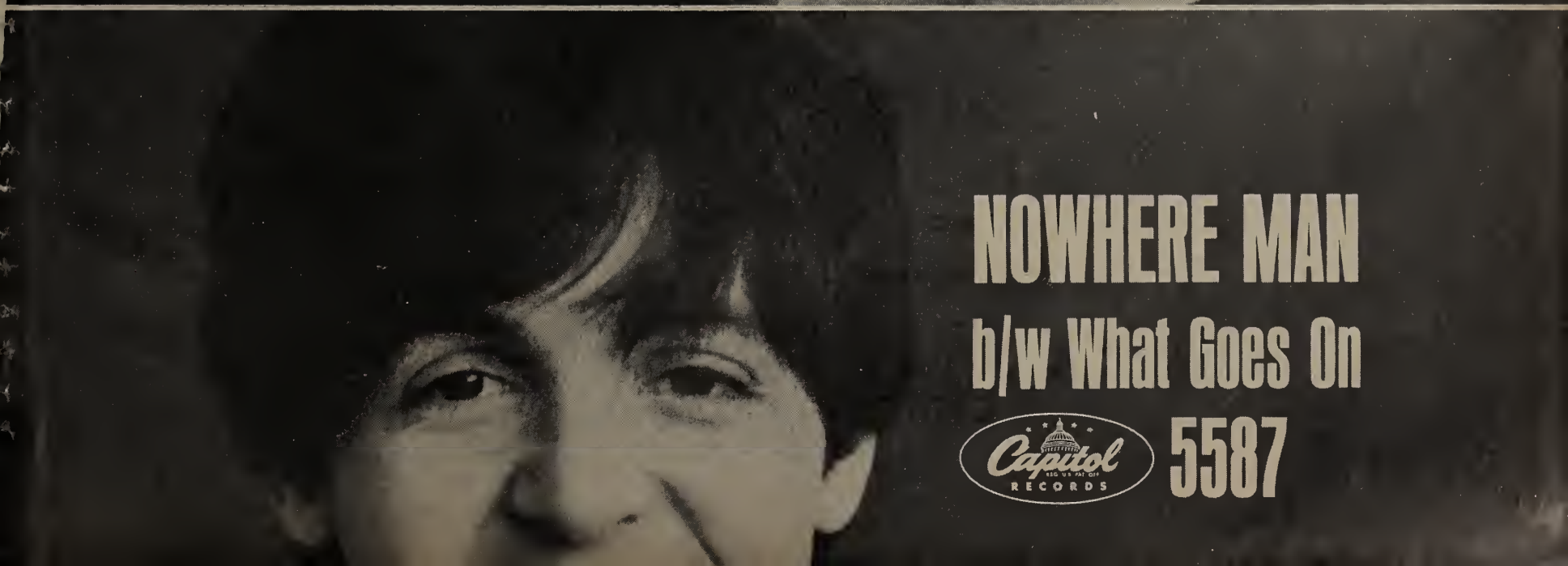
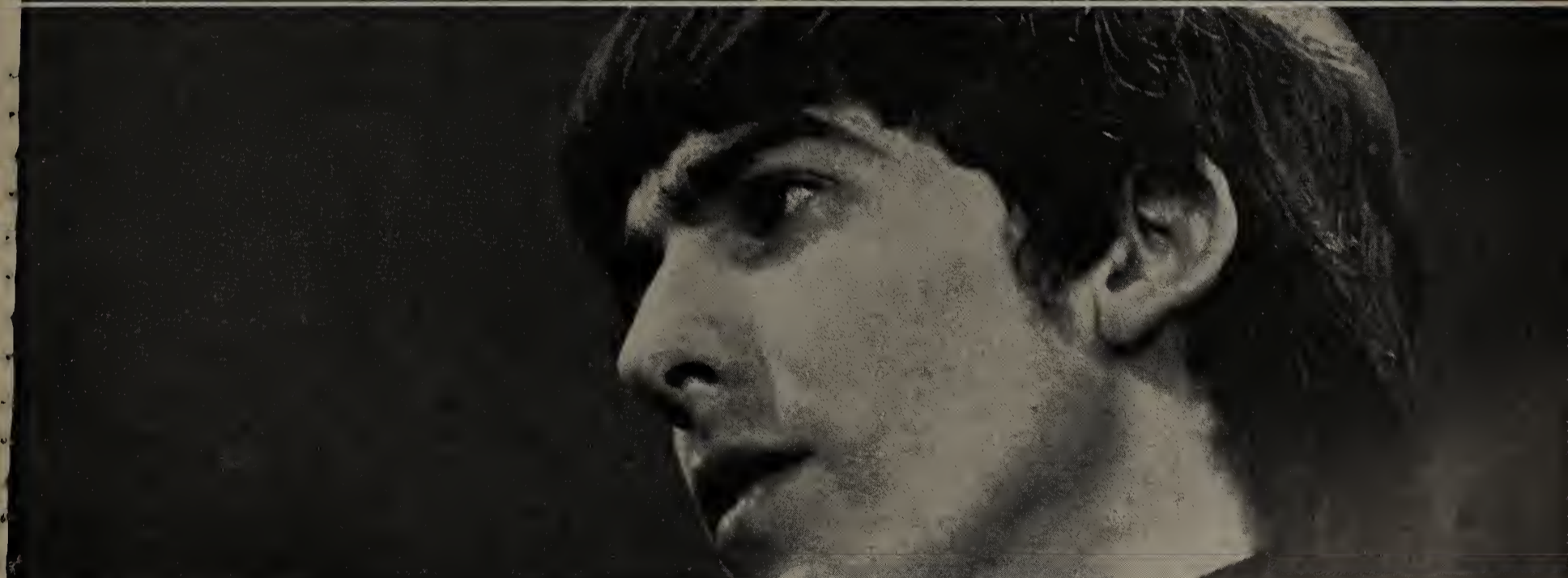

Consumer Electronics Industry To Exhibit Yearly Starting In '67

SAN FRANCISCO—The booming electronic home entertainment industry will hold its first annual national exhibition for the trade in 1967. Sponsor is the consumer products division of the Electronic Industries Association.

The show will occupy the entire exhibit space of the New York Hilton and Americana Hotels in New York, and will occur in late June, the exact dates to be determined.

The electronic consumer products show will be the first of such exhibitions held under industry sponsorship since the Radio Manufacturers Association, predecessor of EIA, held annual radio shows in New York and Chicago during the early days of radio.

Armin E. Allen, who is chairman of the consumer products division of EIA and vice president and general manager of the consumer electronics division of the Philco Corp., said the New York show will be designed to provide a single annual exhibit for all dealers, distributors, and major retail buyers, as well as domestic and foreign manufacturers and importers of electronic consumer products. The exhibition will not be open to the general public.

Allen pointed out that factory sales of electronic consumer products totaled \$3.3 billion last year and are expected to reach \$4.4 billion in 1970. The recent upsurge in business, he said, has been led by the skyrocketing sales of color television receivers but also bolstered by a variety of new radios and phonographs and new consumer products such as electronic organs and magnetic tape equipment.

The EIA noted that a record number of 6.5 million phonos were sold last year. The association also noted that the wholesale price index of the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics indicates that radio-TV-phono prices have actually declined, while those of competing consumer products have risen. Prices of all three products last year were below the 100 index figure for 1957-59.

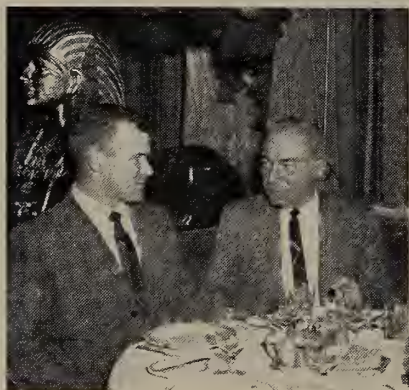

Industry Committee To Probe Grammy Promo Lift

NEW YORK—Drawing attention to this year's Grammy Awards and, at the same time, to the artistic achievements of the entire recording industry is one of the chief aims of a new industry committee. With the awards now firmly established within the industry itself, new methods of bringing the Grammy Awards to the attention of the general public will be probed by the committee of ten.

Serving in a voluntary capacity are Bob Altschuler of Columbia Records, Marty Ostrow of Cash Box, Bob Austin of Record World, Christie Barter of Capitol Records, Sol Handwerker of MGM Records, Herb Helman of RCA Victor Records, Lloyd Leipzig of United Artists Records, Bob Rolontz of Atlantic Records, Herm Schoenfeld of Variety and Billboard's Lee Zhito, organizer and head of the committee.

At the group's initial meeting it probed the possibility of disk jockeys conducting their own Grammy nominations straw pulls, with prizes being awarded to those listeners who come closest to the actual final results. These will be announced on March 15.

Another suggestion consisted of record companies preparing two kinds of album stickers: one indicating that the album had been picked as a Grammy nominee, and the other that it had actually been awarded a Grammy. Sol Handwerker noted that MGM-Verve had done this before and that the results had been notably gratifying.

The importance of obtaining outstanding press coverage from the dailies and the weekly magazines was also stressed. Here executive director George Simon noted the increased coverage in recent years. Last year, Time Magazine ran two separate stories on the result of the awards, while Life gave Roger Miller and his five Grammys a full-page picture blow-up. Several company members suggested that contacts with press and radio outlets could be made through companies as well as through the Academy in order to lend an even greater push to the promotion which NARAS, on its own, has been giving the Grammys. Also noted was the importance of publicizing not only the actual awards presentations on March 15, but also the Academy's annual, all-important television spectacular, "The Best On Record," to be telecast this year on May 16 over the NBC network.

Finally, it was recommended that all radio stations be encouraged to contact their nearest NARAS office to coordinate any promotions or to discuss plans regarding them with Academy officials.

Lollipop Acquires Foreign Fest Winner

NEW YORK—Ed Miller of Lollipop Music returned from Spain recently after securing the American and Canadian publishing rights to "Min Les Tipota," the winner of the Mediterranean Song Festival. "Min Les Tipota" was written by Franzeska Iakovidou and Andre Oeconomou. It was presented at the festival by Greek artists Zoi Kurukli and Niki Camba, who were judged best female vocalists. Singers and composers from several countries, including Spain, France, Italy and Greece, were participants.

"Min Les Tipota" was declared the winning tune in a vote which was taken at 3 A. M. by a panel of international judges after it had been tied previously with another song written by Pino Dinaggio and Sciamia Maria.

Miller also snared the rights to "Mine," another Greek entry, which was among the songs in the final balloting, and "Iassou Opa Opa Iassou," which was not in contention. The rights to the above songs were acquired from Canciones Del Mundo, a leading Madrid publishing house. Miller will assign various staff writers the task of fitting English lyrics to the songs.

The MGM songster will be in Hollywood filming the MGM movie until his departure for a European p.a. swing on May 30.

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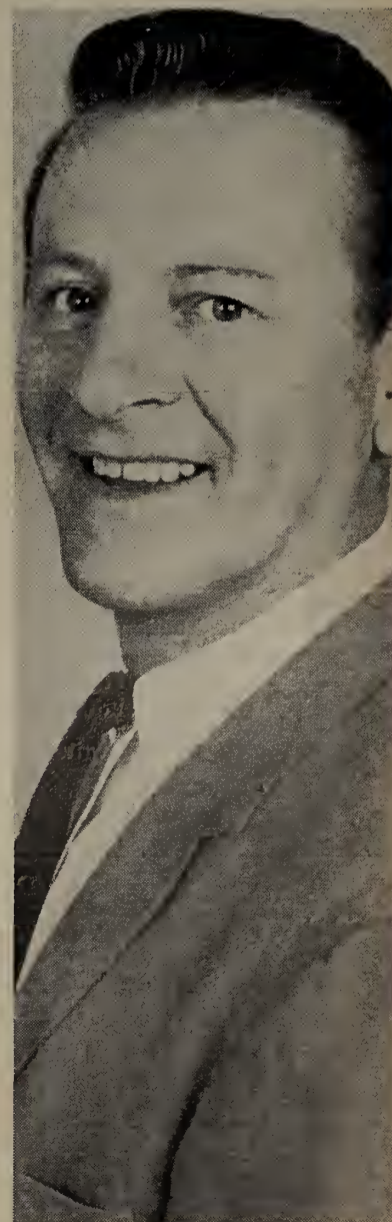

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GREAT BRITAIN

E.M.I. the world's largest record group—producing one out of every four records sold—has announced its sales and profits figures for the first half of the financial year July to December 1965. Sales are up by £3,950,000 to £55.59 million and pre-tax profits have risen from £6.5 million to £7.3 million. The directors emphasize that the increases are entirely due to the higher profits earned by their various overseas companies. EMI's chairman, Joseph Lockwood, announcing a second interim payment of 7½ per cent making a total of 15 per cent—the same as last year—warned that this must not be taken as an indication that any further dividend payments will be made for the year to June 30th 1966. In his review for last year, he told members that it is impossible to forecast the seasonal pattern of the business for any one year—in fact a major share of the profits is normally earned in the first six months. Altogether, EMI is riding on the crest of the wave as sales and profits continue to boom. It seems certain that by the end of the current year (June) the company will have between £13 and £14 million in cash and assets.

The stage is being set and recordings are being lined up for Britain's latest musical "The Match Girls," due to open at the Globe Theatre on March 1st. The show, which garnered rave reviews when it was first presented out of town recently, stars Vivienne Martin, Gerard Hely and Marion Grimaldi with music by Tony Russell and books and lyrics by Bill Owen. Score is handled by Match Music, a subsidiary of Leeds Music. An original cast album will be issued on Pye with cover LPs by EMI for their "Music for Pleasure" series and by Philips. Singles from the show have already been cut by Pat Boone—"Something About You" (Dot); "I Long To See The Day" by Harry Secombe (Philips); and the Sounds Orchestra have waxed an instrumental "The Hopping Dance" for Pye. It is reported that three major American film companies are bidding for the screen rights.

The Essex Music group of companies has moved into new offices in London's Oxford Street. The new premises consist of 24 sound proof units including music and conference rooms with facilities for staging and rehearsal. The offices are also equipped with electronic machinery for accountancy, filing etc. Current Essex copyrights include the Animals first single for Decca, "Inside Looking Out," and "Isn't She Sweet" by Peter Cook and Dudley Moore.

CBS classical pianist Rudolf Serkin arrives in Europe early in April for a concert tour which takes in Portugal, Italy, Switzerland, Germany, Austria, France and finally Great Britain for appearances at the City of London Festival in July. CBS will release a new Serkin album in March of Mendelssohn Concertos No. 1 & 2 with The Columbia Symphony Orchestra conducted by Eugene Ormandy. Other CBS classical releases for March in the Masterworks series include works by Poulenc, Beethoven and Debussy performed by virtuosos such as E. Power Biggs (Organ), Zino Francescatti (Violin), Robert Casadesu (Piano) and Leonard Bernstein, etc. For opera enthusiasts, there is "The Art of Bel Canto," featuring Italian songs of the 17th, 18th and 19th century, by Richard Tucker.

Decca Records hosted a party for Len Barry—the 1-2-3 man—who topped the transatlantic charts at the end of last year. The singer, on his first visit to Britain, was accompanied by his writers and producers John Madara and David White and personal manager Henry Colt. Barry made a two-week British tour fulfilling a host of radio and TV engagements to promote his current charter "Like A Baby," published by Leeds Music.

Board of Trade figures for November 1965 reveal that sales of Gramophone records for the month, valued at £2,916,000, were more than one sixth higher than in November 1964. Home sales were up by one sixth and export sales by about on third compared with the same month a year earlier. Production of singles and LPs was also up—LPs by as much as two fifths.

After seven years as a sound engineer at EMI studios, Norman Smith has been appointed A & R manager for the company. He will, however, continue to act as sound engineer for all Beatles recordings. As a songwriter, Smith has had titles recorded by Billy J. Kramer, the Shadows, Freddie and the Dreamers, Kenny Lynch and George Martin.

Plenty of activity in the Nems camp these days. Cilla Black, enjoying her greatest chart success with "Love's Just A Broken Heart" (Parlophone) topped the bill of "Sunday Night at the London Palladium." Also on the show were Gerry and the Pacemakers to plug their new single "La La La" (Columbia). Another Nems group with a new single is Billy J. Kramer and the Dakotas—"We're Doing Fine."

Ken Glancy, managing director of CBS Records, recently signed celebrated French composer conductor Pierre Boulez to an exclusive long term contract. In addition to his compositions, CBS will record him conducting works by traditional and 20th century composers. Boulez's first recording under the contract will be a complete "Wozzeck" to be cut in Paris and to be based on the 1963 production at the Paris Opera with Walter Berry in the title role.

Czechoslovakia is to have its own international festival of pop songs from June 23rd to 27th in Bratislava. Representatives from Czechoslovakia including Ludovit Duris, Malesek Jiri, Dvorak Vladimar and Sivacek Jan recently visited the San Remo song festival.

Quickies: Just back from behind the iron curtain and a seven-week tour of Rumania, British singer Bobby Shafto is all set to promote latest EMI disk "The Same Old Room". . . Deejays and record reviewers found a can of Flowers' beer on their desks—a promotional gimmick by the Noel Gay organization for Adam, Mike & Tim's debut disk on Columbia "Flowers On The Wall". . . British group the Sages picked up a Cash Box Best Bet with their first U.S. release "In The Beginning" on RCA—to be issued here on the same label in March. The disk is produced by Lionel Segal of Millwick Music. . . The Honeycombs just back from Rome have a string of radio and TV dates lined up to promote their latest single "Who Is Sylvia" arranged by Ken Howard and Alan Blaikley and released on Pye. . . British group the Action launched their latest Parlophone single "I'll Keep Holding On" with a party at London's teenage 'in' place, the Marquee. . . Dr. Hans Hickmann, artistic director of Polydor's Archive Productions, Hamburg, to Britain in March for lecture tour. . . The Byrds have new single on CBS "Set You Free This Time". . . Managers Peter Eden and Geoff Stephens signed TV personality Barry Fantoni to recording contract.

Besides Nancy Sinatra's "These Boots Are Made For Walking" on Reprise, the company is also riding high on their own label with "Michelle" by the Overlanders; "Spanish Flea" by Herb Alpert; "My Love" by Petula Clark and "Tomorrow" by Sandie Shaw. Next week's charts could give the company 50 per cent of the Top Ten.

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ITALY

On February 11th, the Brazilian Embassy held a cocktail party in honour of the well known Brazilian singer composer Juca Chaves, at the Intra Club in Milan. This meeting, during which Juca presented his latest L.P., was attended by some personalities of the Italian record and publishing world.

Juca Chaves, one of the most popular artists of Brazil, recently returned (after a long absence) to Brazil, where he was heartily welcomed by his fans. There he took part in several TV shows. In one he presented his fine tune "Piccola Marcia Per Un Grande Amore." Soon he will appear on Italian TV on the "Juca Show," which was taped in Brazil. On the show he will present some new Brazilian singers to the Italian public in a series of films. At present Juca Chaves is singing in Milan at the Intra Club, and in Rome at the Bagalino. During the short stay of Juca in Brazil, the singer founded a new record company called "Menestrel."

Sergio Endrigo has taped the "Anna Moffo Show," a new TV show dedicated to the well known soprano. It will be broadcast soon in Italy. His latest hits "Teresa" and "Adesso Si," the latter very popular at the San Remo Festival, are doing very well on the Italian market. On Sunday February 13th, Sergio Endrigo appeared on the TV show "Mezze Luci." On the show he sang another of his latest compositions "Dimmi La Verita." Milva on February 9th was in Munich where she taped "Nessuni Di Voi," the fine song by Kramer that she presented at the San Remo Festival. The tape will be used for a German TV Show. This German version will also be recorded.

Iva Zanicchi will interpret in French "La Notte Dell'Addio" and "Io Ti Daro' Di Piu'," which will be presented in a TV show conducted by Jaque Garnier on the 22nd and 23rd of February in Paris. These two songs coupled with "Accarezzami Amore" and "Caro Mio" will also be waxed in Spanish and presented on Madrid TV on March 2nd and 3rd.

Claudio Villa recorded on February 3rd for a new Enzo Trapani TV show "Aria Condizionata," "Una Csa In Cima Al Mondo," the song he performed at the San Remo contest. Giorgio Gaber, who recently was successful at the Italian Song Festival, "Mai, Mai, Mai Valentina," which is also one of the best sellers this week, will sing it for the Spanish public on the 22nd and 23rd of March.

Vic Dana, the Italo-American boy already well known by the American public both as dancer and as singer and by the Italian public for his two records "Pericolo"—"La Porta D'Oreo" and "Tutti Han Bisogno D'Amore"—"Le Cose Che Tu Vuoi," was successful at the San Remo Festival singing "La Notte Dell'Addio" with Iva Zanicchi. At present he is in Milan to wax all his hits in Italian.

Bobby Solo will be touring Argentina and Brazil at the end of February. He has been invited for some TV shows and a series of concerts. Bobby, who is one of the top Italian singers, is very popular in Latin America, where his hits—such as "Una Lacrima Sul Viso," "Se Piang I, Se Ridi," which gained him the San Remo winning prize in 1965 and "La Casa Del Signore"—have appeared on the charts.

Wilma Goich, together with Bobby Solo, are back from a very successful tournee in Spain. Both artists appeared on a popular TV show called "La Noche Del Sabado" (Saturday night). They also recorded a few songs, including some from San Remo in Spanish. Young Wilma Goich was very successful at the San Remo Festival with "In Un Fiore" (In A Flower). The song competed with Modugno's "Dio Come Ti Amo" right down to the wire. Wilma's "In Un Fiore" holds the third position on the Italian chart.

Ornella Vanoni was one of the most admired singers at San Remo both for her unique talent and her elegance. "Io Ti Daro' Di Piu'," the song she presented at the Festival was very successful. It has been requested by many countries. So, Ornella Vanoni has a very busy period ahead. She is flying to Barcellona at the beginning of March to record "Io Ti Daro' Di Piu'," in Spanish, and she will appear on TV. Immediately afterwards she will have to go to Paris to take part in two important TV shows as guest of honour and she will record the song in French.

The Equipe '84, the most popular "beat" vocal and instrumental group in Italy, composed of 4 boys, has recently joined Ricordi. Their first single on the Ricordi label will be released shortly.

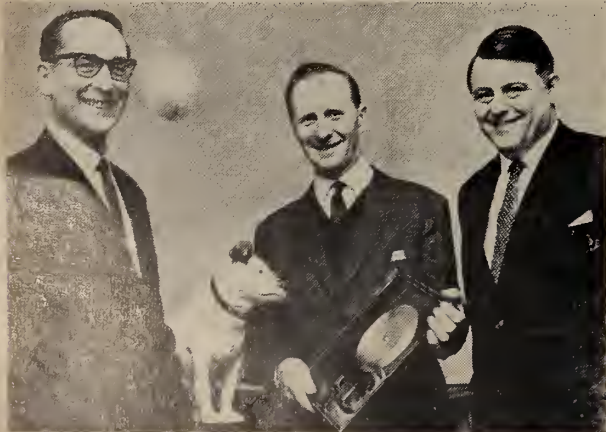
Fred Bongusto, one of the most famous Italian singers, has recently waxed on the Fonit label a tune composed by Pino Calvi arranged by Sauro Sili. It is entitled "Quella Cosa Che . . ." The record is coupled with a song by Pallavicini-Rotter-Erwin, "Stupendamente Giovana."

The Dave Clark Five have recently recorded their latest hit "Over and Over" on Columbia label. This song was placed first in the "Bandiera Gialle." Phonocolor's artist Leo Sardo will take a part in a new Italian show, "Sette Voci," presented by Pippo Baudo, in which he will sing "Tale E Quale."

Archibald and Tim, the two pianists who have already recorded several hits such as "Il Mondo," "Thunderball" and so on, recently waxed a new version of "Nessuno Mi Puo' Giudicare." The tune placed second at the San Remo Festival.

Achiev Production has presented a new record entitled "La Grandiosa Musica Del Barocco" (The grand music of Baroque). This LP includes information about the music world of the past. It will appear on the record market at the end of May, and it will contain a pamphlet of four pages illustrating the Achiev Production. It will be on sale in the languages of every European country.

This is a testimony of Baroque music and offers information about Achiev Production—the structure of its repertory, its interpretation adherent to the spirit of the epoch, to the serene character of Baroque music and of its composers. The repertory begins at the Gregorian period and finishes at the transition period of Maunhein School and at the first classical Viennese period.

ARGENTINA

Official figures are being calculated at press time from the audience of the First Festival of The Song in Mar del Plata, which took place February 11 in Argentina's main summer resort. The event was aired by Channel 8 of Mar del Plata and Channel 9 of Buenos Aires, the two local radio stations, and a network covering the whole country. Artists included Jimmy Fontana and Rita Monico from Italy, Peggy March, Jose Feliciano and Benny Thomas, Brazilian teen star Ronnie Cord and local artists Palito Ortega and Juan Ramon, among others. In next week's issue we will report all the details regarding this event along with photographs.

A few days after this new Argentine Festival, the Seventh edition of the Viña del Mar Song Festival was started in Chile. The festival has produced during the past years several top Latin American hits, including current chart rider in Argentina "El Corralero." Seeking to always bring the best information to record companies and music publishers interested in the International scene, Cash Box will also be present at this event, and will publish a complete report about the winning tunes, artists and publishers.

Big news comes from Louis Calvo of Sicaamericana in Buenos Aires: the company has acquired the rights to release the old TK Records catalog, which belonged to a diskery bankrupted some time ago. This catalog will be distributed under the Difusion Musical banner, priced at 475 pesos (about \$2.40); that is about 40% below regular LP prices and includes early recordings by several top name artists like Anibal Troilo, Eduardo Falu, Los Fronterizos, Los Quilla Huasi, Edmundo Rivero and Los Andariegos. The waxings have been revamped electronically and reportedly sound like new. Calvo expects very good results from these releases.

Santos Lipesker of Phonogram infos that his diskery is releasing an EP by Herve Vilard singing several of his hits in Spanish, along with an album devoted by songstress Mina and one by folk songstress Mercedes Sosa, who cut titles like "Zamba del Zafrero," "Zamba para no Morir," "Tonadas de Manuel Rodriguez" and "Zamba Azul." The diskery has been obtaining good results from Orieta Berti's version of "Tu Sei Quello," currently on the charts. There is also another LP by Horacio Guarany, and a version of "El Corralero."

The Press Department of Odeon reports that tango maestro Hector Varela has been invited by the Latin American Institute of Beverly Hills, Calif., to take part in the Third Festival of Latin American Music, located in Los Angeles. There are several new releases from this company, including a new single by visiting Spanish group Duo Dinamico, with titles "Amor Misterioso" and "Lamentos de Guitarra." Odeon is also preparing a big promotion campaign in behalf of Brazilian chanter Altamar Dutra, who will arrive in Buenos Aires next April.

Felix Lipesker of Juilo Korn Publishers reports the start of Latino Records, a new record label to be sold and distributed through one of the major companies. First inkings are folk artist Jaime Davalos and composer-musician and arranger Abel Montes, well known because of his "litoraleas." The initial production is being planned for the near future. Lipesker expects to increase the promotion of the pubbery through this new way.

Tango lark Paula Gales has been inked by Channel 13 for a series of appearances in the "Casino" and "Sabados Circulares" programs; at the same time she is performing on Radio El Mundo, and has started the shooting of another film under the direction of Fernando Ayala. In a few days she'll travel to Chile, to head a show in the Viña del Mar Casino.

Fermata Publishers informs that Monica Lander has recorded for Music Hall a version of Billy Vaughn's hit "Michele," coupled with current hit "Se Tu Non Fossi Bella Come Sei." The Producciones Fermata Dept. reports a new waxing by Gilbert, for the Ferbra label, with "La Cinta Verde" and "Esta Noche."

Several new LP's will be released by H y R, the company directed by brothers Maluf. Los Meridianos have recorded an album with cumbias, penned by Marfil; Trio Taragui has an album devoted to standard titles of the eastern part of the country, while Amy Paterson recorded an LP with kiddie songs. All these records are sold at a "promotional" price: 650 pesos (vs 850).

Mario Kaminski of Microfon infos that he will start operating a publishing house of his own, since many of the artists recording for his label are also composers. First moves will take place in March. Microfon's latest release is an album recorded by Horacio Malvicino and instrumental group the Strangers, with a selection of evergreens aimed to please several foreign markets, in addition to the local one.

CBS is promoting the new recording by Nancy Li, "Playboy" and "Noche de Verano," while her first effort, "La Plage," is still selling well. Nancy was presented on Channel 13 by "Escala Musical," and has been also appearing on "Cancionisima," the promotional program aired by Channel 11 with the label's artists. Latest releases are "Hang On Sloopy" by the Johnny Jets, "Pachito E Che" by the Cuarteto Imperial, "En el Rio" by Ramon Ropain and "Cancion del Jacaranda" by Las Ardillitas.

Modugno Is Italy's Eurovision Artist

MILAN—Domenic Modugno, winner—as a performer and writer—of this year's San Remo Festival—has been selected by Italian Radio Television to represent Italy at Luxembourg on March 5 at the Grand Prix Eurovision '66 song contest. Modugno's first prize San Remo song is "Dio, Come Ti Amo."



JAPAN

To honor Frank Sinatra's 25th anniversary since his start in show biz, Nippon Victor will hold a "Sinatra Fair" Feb. 21-Apr. 20 while the firm releases an anniversary two-set album titled "The History of Frank Sinatra." The package will include his famous hit tunes when he was associated with RCA Victor, Columbia and Capitol.

The Philips sales department of Nippon Victor puts "No, No Boy/Little Robby" in overseas markets through the firm's international sales network. The tune was recorded by the Spiders, who have been quite popular in Japan.

Foreign artists scheduled to perform here in Apr. include Jimmy Smith and His Trio, Herbie Mann, Marcell Amon, and Percy Faith. To honor his performance, Nippon Columbia released "The Girl From Ipanema" LP as a Feb. new issue, which is doing well with Latin music lovers. In May, Duke Ellington will come to Japan.

Nippon Gramnaphone decided to release imported tapes in Mar. with a concert of America Ampex Co., with which German Gramophone has a contract. Labels on the imported tapes include Verve, MGM and Archive. Though unnecessary to add, labels releasing imported tapes in Japan are Nippon Victor, Toshiba and King Records.

Among the Feb. new releases from Teichiku Records are "I Love Jazz" by Louis Armstrong, and the All Stars on Decca which includes "I Love Jazz," "Twelfth Street Rag," "Skokiaan" and nine others. Besides the above record, the firm is also pushing "Walk Away" by Brenda Lee, "California Girls" by The Surfaris, "Dynamic Tangos" by The Castilians, "Flamenco Songs And Dances" by Carmen Ameya and "Apaches Beat Hits" by the Fabulous Jokers.

Toshiba Records is releasing the following recordings: "Twilight Time" by Roger Williams. "Animals" on Odeon includes fourteen tunes in which "Hallelujah, I Love Her So" are good enough to show their originality. "The Ventures A Go-Go" includes "Ten Seconds To Heaven," "Satisfaction," "Go-Go Guitar" and nine others. "Cliff On Stage" includes "Apron Strings," "My Baby," "More It" and nine others. "Looking Back" by Nat Cole boasts "Time and The River," "Send For Me," and nine others. "Beach Boys' Party" is an anniversary release to honor their coming to Japan. The disk includes "Tell Me Why," "I Get Around" and eleven other tunes.

Nippon Gramnaphone releases Connie Francis' "International Hits." "All About Oscar Peterson Vols. I and II" is an anniversary release to honor Peterson's performance here. The set includes "Debut," "But Not For Me," "How High The Moon," "Summer Time" and twelve others. In addition the label has "Top Tangos For You Vol. 2" in which Alfred House and Ricardo Santos are included together. "Have Fun With Les Players" includes "I Feel Fine," "You Never Can Tell," "She's A Woman," "After Dark," "The House of the Rising Sun" and twelve others.

GERMANY

The biggest festival in Europe is about to take place on the pop scene with the "Eurovision-Grand Prix," which will take place on March 5th in Luxembourg. Eurovision is the European wide TV network millions of viewers can be reached by this festival. Every country has their own rules and ways for picking the entries to the festival. Of course, Italy's famous San Remo bash picks the entry for Italy, which seems the logical way to get a top tune, but on the other side of the picture, Austria has commissioned Udo Jurgens to write and perform a tune for the past 3 years, and will do the same this year. Udo has finished high in the voting every year.

Germany, who failed to pick up a single point in the voting last year, had a contest in which 82 songs were presented to a 9 man jury consisting of 4 journalists, 3 TV personalities, 1 disc jockey and a record sales girl. The winning tune was "Die Zeiger Der Uhr" (The Hands of the Clock), which will be sung by Margot Eskens in the finals. 18 countries will be represented in the finals and Germany starts off the show with the first number.

Siggi Loch of Philips is pushing "Why Can't It Be Me" by Ian & The Zodiacs, who did the record especially for the German market, but are getting response from the U.S. on the new disc.

Larry Yaskiel of Vogue tells us that the firm is set for a record breaking year with Chris Andrews already over the 1/2 million mark with his "Yesterday Man" and "To Whom It Concerns," the new record also racking up terrific sales figures.

August Seith of Chappell/Seith Music has one big star who is really tearing up sales records. Newcomer Roy Black has his second smash hit in a row (see charts) with "Ganz In Weiss" (All In White); the record has moved in a short time to the number 1 post in the charts. Composer Josef Niessen had a good idea with his new waxing of "Jolie Jacqueline" by Erik Schumann on Philips. The composer rushed to Gstaad to give the record personally to Jacky Kennedy whom the song was written for. Those are the two highly promoted items in the Chappell/Seith list, but "The Carnival Is Over" by the Seekers and the German waxing of "Crying In The Chapel," which also made the top Music" and "Mary Poppins" are also top plug items.

Polydor's Alfred Hause, known as the "King of the Tango," was awarded the "Silver Fujiyama" for sales in Japan! Over 300,000 LPs by the orchestra have been sold in the far east.

Rudi Von Der Dovenmuhle of Minerva Music has picked up publishing here on the English entry for the "Grand Prix-Eurovision" festival. "A Man Without Love" looks like a smash and is picked by experts to finish high in the festival.

Hans Gerig had a field day at San Remo where he not only picked up the winner "Dio, Come Ti Amo" from Domenico Modugno for his publishing firm, but also two other final entries.

On February 17th, the Radio-TV premiere of Paul Siegel's live broadcasts direct from the Europa Center in Berlin took place. Paul started the series with taped interviews with Billy Vaughan and the Overlanders from England. Paul, who used to be a deejay on WMCA in New York and WTVJ in Miami, has now been an air personality here for 6 years along with his publishing activities.

The Beat Club, which is the only show featuring beat music in German TV, has captured the teen public here. The show, which originates from Bremen, one of Germany's smallest TV stations, has a monthly schedule and last week, featured films of the Beatles performing "We Can Work It Out" and "Day Tripper."

FRANCE

The war begins between records manufacturers? Responsible for this is Georges Meyerstein, Philips' prexy, who announced last week that his firm will, from now on sell all LP's at the rate of 19,95F. There have been a lot of records sold at this price and even cheaper, but every company's LP's, recorded by lead artists, cost 26,50F. Actually, the other manufacturers have not yet decided to follow Philips in this policy of low price, but they say they are not very happy with the move.

Georges Meyerstein tells us that he took this position after an important Market investigation. "We discovered," he said, "that when you present an LP to somebody in the street and you ask him for the price, he generally answers 30,00F. For this reason we believe that a psychological operation, like this should make us sell more LP's."

This week we receive news from: CBS: Barbra Streisand has spent a week in Paris. She will be back at the end of March for two gala appearances in Paris and Monte-Carlo. Her last EP in French has met with a very good reception from radio producers. CBS Canadian Artist is now making a film with Claude Chabrol in French "La Ligne De Démarcation." CBS also released a new Jazz collection "Aimez Vous Le Jazz?", which has reissues or not well known tracks by Art Tatum, Sydney Béchét, Duke Ellington, Louis Armstrong and Charlie Christian.

PHILIPS: Michèle Torr, who will represent Luxembourg at the Eurovision song contest, recorded her Eurovision song "Ce Soir Je T'Attendais" in French and in English. France Gall's new record is just out. Main title is "Baby Pop" a song by Serge Gainsbourg who also wrote, last year, for France Gall "Poupée De Cire Poupée De Son." Rika Zarai has been out of France for two weeks to do several radio and TV shows in Germany, Belgium and Spain. Hervé Vilard, who has recorded Italian and Spanish treatments of his first success "Capri C'Est Fini" just recorded a German version.

VOGUE: Antoine, the French Bob Dylan who had a big success with its song "La Guerre" ("The War"), just finished recording an LP for immediate release. Both author and composer, his songs are published by Vogue-International. He is currently on tour with the Kinks, and he will do another one in March with Chuck Berry and the Rolling Stones. Les Problèmes, new French rhythm and blues group, will spend a week in Portugal to play during the Lisbon festival. Vogue-International is producing a new Bernard Laferaud record with "L'insomnie."

TUTTI: Alain Barrière just released a new EP with four titles: "Les Guinguettes," "Les Matins Bleus," "Mon Pauvre Amour" and "Je Regrette Ce Temps." Barrière is also the lead of the Bobino Music Hall program. There's a new girl on Philips' team. Her name is Chantal Kelly. She is 15½ years old. She already has a hit: "Caribou." Dalida, through Barclay, just recorded a new song by Jacques Chaumelle and Bernard Kessler called: "Et, Et." Jean Piérard and Claude Pascal brought back; "Adesso Si," "Io Ti Daro Di Piu," "Quando Vado Sulla Riva," "La Notte Dell 'Adio?" They tell us Frank Pourcel and Hervé Vilard are already recording "Io Ti Daro Di Piu."

CHAPPELL: Claude François recorded a French treatment of the Walker Brothers' top hit "Make It Easy On Your Self." French title is: "Mais N'Essaie Pas De Ma Mentir." Shawn Elliott, through the Roulette label (Vogue distributing), recorded a French adaptation of "Josephine, Please No Lean On The Bell." French lyrics are by Gerard Bourgeois and Jean-Max Rivière. Good start for the new Dalida song: "Manuel Benitez El Cordobes." Orchestra recordings have been done by Frank Pourcel (Pathé), Claude Ciari (Pathé), Aimable (Vogue), Raymond Boiserie (Trianon), Georges Jouvin (Pathé) Yvette Horner (Pathé) André Verchuren (Festival), Pierre Sellin (Fontana), Claude Chevalier (Barclay). Dalida will record the song in English, German, Italian and Spanish.

LABRADOR: Agnes Loti, through the AZ label, just released a new EP with "Tant Pis Si Je Pleure." A French treatment of "Lonely, Lonely, Lonely."

SCANDINAVIA

DENMARK

Denmark's local Song Festival for 1966 took place on Danish TV on Sunday night, February 6th, with six songs. Some 250 songs by 250 tunesmiths had arrived for this competition, and the six presented were those considered best by DBC-TV.

The winner was song number six, "Stop Mens Legen Er Go" (Stop In Time!) with words and music by Erik Kaare, It was sung by Ulla Pia, an EMI artist, who also will present the tune at the Eurovision Song Contest in Luxembourg, March 5th. The jury of 7 gave the song a total of 27 points.

Second was "Mon Coeur" with 16 points. It was song number three in the competition; the words and music were by Kurt Ard and it was sung by Sussie Faber.

Two songs ended at third spot with nine points each. It was song number two, "Melodien Kan Findes" (The Song Might Be There), written and composed by Vilfred Kjaer and presented by Anette, and song number five, "Lille Veninde" (Little Girlfriend), with words by Annelise Bredsdorff and music by Aksel V. Rasmussen. It was presented by Ib Hansen.

At fourth spot with one point each came song number one, "Salami," with words and music by G. M. Pedersen and sung by Anette Faaborg, and "Hjerte For Hierte" (Heart For Heart), words by Susanne Palsbo and music by Georg Lemke. It was sung by Dario Campeotto.

Comments in local dailies weren't too enthusiastic after the competition. The Copenhagen morning paper Politiken wrote that the lyrics of "Salami" were something for a psychiatrist to study.

The same paper commented on the spectacle with the following words: "Whom is such a competition done for? What would have happened if someone placed a modern guitar group on the scene with one of their typical teenage songs? At least the teenagers would have been able to show a little interest in it—something impossible with these songs, modern in their "style" some ten years ago or more. Or the folk-singers, who are so very popular these days, where were they when this competition was announced?"

FINLAND

Finland's local Song Festival was the first one arranged in Scandinavia this year; it took place on Finnish TV on January 22nd.

A total of nine songs had been chosen from around 200 sent to the TV station when the competition was announced.

Winning the competition and representing Finland in Luxembourg, March 5th, was (as previously mentioned in this column) "Playboy," with words by Esko Linnavalli and music by Ossi Runne. It was presented by Ann Christine, Scandia recording artist who also will sing the song in Luxembourg.

Second came Laila Kinnunen with "Muistojen Bulevardi" (The Boulevard Of Memories), and third was Victor Klimenko with "Vierras Rakkastettuni" (My Unknown Darling).

NORWAY

Norway arranged its local Song Grand Prix the same day that Denmark did (Feb. 6th). NRK-TV had received around 330 songs, and picked out five for the finals.

Composer-singer Arne Bendiksen had contributed to the competition with three songs, and for some reason, all three were among the five picked out for the competition. The result was that Bendiksen ended at first, second and fifth spot in the competition.

The winner that will represent Norway in Luxembourg, March 5th, is "Intet Er Nytt Under Solen" (There's Nothing New Under The Sun), with words and music by Arne Bendiksen. Ase Kleveland presented the song, and will also represent Norway at Luxembourg.

Second came "Gi Meg Fri" (Give Me Free), also by Bendiksen, which got 11 points. At the third spot came "Ung Og Forelsket" (Young And In Love) by Jolly Kramer-Johansen and Juul Hansen. It got seven points.

At fourth spot with six points came "Lördagstripp" (The Saturday Walk) by Ivar Børsum and Bjørn Hornmoen, and finally at fifth spot with four points was Bendiksen's "Vims."

Local morning paper Arbeiderbladet was a little disappointed for the choice of the jury. The paper said that the song ending at second spot was the best and most original.

Arne Bendiksen, who is his own music publisher and also runs a record company (Arne Bendiksen A/S), told Cash Box that at least the winning song seems to have good chances long before it appears in Luxembourg. So far Scandinavia and Germany have showed interest in it, according to Bendiksen.

SWEDEN

Sweden's Song Festival has been described in this column the last two weeks, including the noise always following after those Swedish competitions. Below is the result of Sweden's Song Festival, which took place on Swedish TV Jan. 29th.

The winner was "Ny Gammalvals" (Newfashioned Waltz) with 26 points. Words were by Björn Lindroth and music by Bengt-Arne Wallin. It was presented as a duet by Lill Lindfors and Svante Thuresson.

Second with 19 points was "Monte Carlo" also composed by Wallin, with lyrics by Carl Gyllenberg. It was sung by Carli Tornehave.

Third with 14 points came "Vinterrosor" (Winter Roses) by Britt Lindborg, sung by Gunnar Wiklund.

Fourth with nine points was "En Ballad För Längesen" (A Ballade From Long Ago), composed by Robert Meyer, lyrics by Gösta Rybrant. Singer was Ann-Louise Hansson.

Fifth with eight points and sung by opera-singer Gunilla af Malmberg was "Var Finns Du?" (Where Are You?), composed by Ulf Björilin with lyrics by Lars Forsell.

Sixth with eight points came "Härliga Söndag" (Lovely Sunday) composed by Bo Göran Edling, with lyrics by Peter Himmelstrand and sung by Carli Tornehave.

Seventh with six points was "Hej Systrar, Hej Bröder" (Hello Sisters, Hello Brothers) by Ake Gerhard and sung by Svante Thuresson.

Eighth with five points came "En Röd Vals" (A Red Waltz), composed by Kerstin Bergström, with lyrics by Jan Hansson and presented by Monica Nielsen.

At ninth spot with four points came "Vårens Vindar" (Winds Of Spring) by Torbjörn and Maud Lundquist, and sung by Gunwer Bergquist.

Finally, at 10th spot was "Vad Har Jag Kvar?" (What Do I Have Left?) by Berndt Ost, presented by Gunnar Wiklund.

There has not yet been any official announcement if Lill Lindfors and Svante Thuresson, who sang the winner here, also will sing the song in Luxembourg, March 5th. It is known that SBC-TV would prefer to have them representing Sweden in the Eurovision competition.

HOLLAND

Many reporters and friends attended the recent reception of the marriage of CBS local Jazz-pianist/organist Louis van Dyke. Local CBS Dixieland Band the Down Town Jazzband, will commemorate their fifteenth anniversary on April 16, 1966. Some time ago, CBS released an album by this group entitled: "Dixieland Festival," which proved to be very successful on the local market as well as abroad.

CBS also released two important singles from the recently held San Remo Festival. Bobby Solo with "Questa Volta" c/w "In Un Mattino Senza Sole" and Gene Pitney's "Nessuno Mi Piu' Guidicare" c/w "A Nome Mio." Further recent CBS releases in the single field include Bob Dylan's "Can You Please Crawl Out Your Window" b/w "Highway 61 Revisited" and a new single by world-famous chanter Andy Williams, "Quiet Nights Of Quiet Stars" (Covocodo) b/w "I'll Remember You," as well as a single by Bobby Solo, sung in German, "Du Has Ja Tränen In Den Augen" b/w "Ich Weiss, Wo Die Sonne Scheint." New CBS additions to the Extended Play recording field include a wonderful EP by Johnny (Southern) McCauley, entitled "From Ireland-Cowboy Style," with a.o. "Beg Your Pardon, Please Excuse Me," an EP entitled "Castanuelas Y Zapateado" as well as one by French singer Colette Magny. A new CBS addition to the classical LP field includes an album entitled "Imperishable Melodies," played by the Orchestra of the Vienna State Opera conducted by Hans Hagen. It features Liszt's "Lieberstraum," Grieg's "Eroica," Kreisler's "Caprice Viennois" as well as favorite melodies by Wolf-Ferrari, Anton Rubenstein, Rachmaninoff, Brahms, Schumann, Chopin and Mascagni.

As a special attraction to Dutch Operetta lovers, CBS also released an album containing excerpts from Kalman's "Gräfin Mariza" and an album entitled "Rendez-Vous with Jacques Offenbach," containing various arias as well as orchestral music from Offenbach's Operettas.

Decca recording artist Dave Berry from Sheffield, England, is the most popular male singer in Holland, with five singles in the top twenty: "Can I Get It From You," "Little Things," "I'm Gonna Take You There," "This Strange Effect" (Golden Record), and his latest success "If You Wait For Love." His tremendous popularity drew the attention of a famous circus-owner in Western-Europe, Tony Boltini. Boltini has cooperated with popular teenage stars before, among them Johnny Lion, and the success of this venture (Lion and his rock-group did a 20 minute musical show twice a day in the circus-ring last summer) made Boltini decide to contract Dave Berry for a week end in the first week of February when Berry celebrated his 25th birthday. To create as much publicity as possible, Berry's recording company in Holland, Phonogram, decided to do another stunt with the popular star. A special constructed lion's cage was put in the middle of Amsterdam, in which Dave Berry was driven around amidst thousands of cheering fans, but unfortunately they stormed the wagon and ruined the cage in order to get autographs. It was also planned that Berry would release half a dozen pigeons which he had caught himself the previous day in London's Trafalgar Square; boys with nets and other devices climbed trees in order to catch (in vain) one of the feathered messengers. Dave Berry was promptly interviewed on TV newsreels about his stunt. His personal appearance with a selection from his dozen popular songs was a tremendous success, much to the pleasure of Boltini, who had paid 5,000 dollars for the occasion. Berry was also approached by film-producers, but results are unknown.

The "Ameriachi"—sound of Herb Alpert's Tijuana Brass has also reached Holland and has begun to develop into a craze. Singles like "Taste Of Honey," "Whipped Cream" and "Tijuana Taxi" have opened the market here, and public reaction is very favorable. Latest single release, John Ros of Phonogram reported is "Zorba the Greek," catchy Ameriachi arrangement of the gay Sirtaki dance. "This single in particular has our high hopes as the Sirtaki-music is extremely popular in Holland," Ros said. The Tijuana recordings appear in this country via the London label.

Ian & The Zodiacs, Fontana-artists, will do a TV performance in Holland on Feb. 22nd. Their recording of "So Much In Love With You" b/w old rocker "Good Mornin' Little Schoolgirl" was tipped by leading deejays as a hit to come. Also on Fontana is the magnificent Spencer David Group. They will appear in person in Holland on the 25th of February. The bluesy Spencer Davis LP (their first) with the cooperation of Millie, is getting a lot of publicity.

English group the Fortunes have a glorious 1966 before them. They have struck again with "This Golden Ring" on Decca. The recording jumped to the top in Holland right after release.

Riverside's famous "Classic Jazz Masters" series, produced by Philips' Phonographic Industries, Baarn, Holland, has revived captivating and highly interesting authentic jazz-recordings from the Roaring Twenties in America: they are albums called "Tub Jug Washboard Bands 1928-1932" and "Lovie Austin and her Blues Serenaders, 1924-1926."

The Brunswick label, now handled by Phonogram in Holland, introduced two classical productions of great value on the Dutch market: the complete recording of Haydn's "Creation," a two LP box, and a new recital by master guitarist Andres Segovia, entitled "Granada" after the featured composition by Albéniz. In the popular field, Phonogram released such Brunswick & Coral-albums like "The Buddy Holly Story" Patsy Cline's "Sentimentally Yours," Rick Nelson's "Love And Kisses," Brenda Lee's superb "To Many Rivers" and singles by Len Barry, the Spokesmen and the Who.

Though their respective selected songs have not been chosen for the forthcoming Eurovision Songfestival in Luxembourg, both Helen Shepherd and the Luckberries, who reached 2nd place, did very well during the final TV rounds broadcast on Feb. 5. Bovema's HMV and Imperial labels immediately hit the market with attractive rush releases of their festival contributions and completed for EP release, Helen's beautiful rendition of "Loneliness" and the Luckberries' extra "The Most Beautiful Day." Retailers throughout the country were duly informed by special mail, and have been sent eye catching window displays.

Liberty vocal star Vic Dana arrived in Holland on Thursday February 10th with Liberty's director of overseas operations, Ron Kass. Bovema organized a press meeting in the American Hotel-Amsterdam, preceding Saturday's TV taping the Vic Dana Show by AVRO-TV in the Bellevue Theatre. Dana demonstrated his great talent in such hits as "Bring A Little Sunshine," "Crystal Chandelier" and "Red Roses." Strong musical and professional support was given him by the Skymasters Orchestra and the Mat Matthews combo. The broadcast will take place on February 26th. The label released 2 new Dana recordings for the occasion.

Bovema's Parlophone label reports that its top beat group the Hollies was featured on the February 7th "Hullabaloo" TV'er. On the show they sang their latest hits.

Imperial released a new LP by the late organist Cor Steyn entitled "Romance And Rhythm," featuring a great number of Steyn's Hammond organ successes. U. S. labels Stateside and Capitol in Gramophonehouse hit the charts with several fast climbing pop items such as Shawn Elliott's "Love Is A Four Letter Word," the Strangeloves' "Night Tune" and the Beach Boys' latest "Barbara Ann" single, which hit the nation's Top 40 within a week after release in this market.

Bovema's Atlantic label launched Wilson Pickett's "That's A Man's Way," and introduced the Young Rascals' "I Ain't Gonna Eat Out My Heart Anymore" together with fresh new items by Otis Redding and Janie Jones.

The latest disc by the Motions, Holland's number one beat group has been rush released. With their previous record "Wasted Words" they hit the number 2 spot on the Dutch hit parade. The latest double sided hit "There's No Place To Hide" and "Everything That's Mine," has been recorded in England last week in the London Pye Studios. It is expected to reach the number one spot in a few weeks.

Great expectations for the enormous American hit "These Boots Are Made For Walking" by Frank Sinatra's daughter Nancy. This record originally started happening in the states. About a fortnight after release in England, it arrived right on top of the charts. The deejay response here in Holland has been wonderful and we repeat: It will be a big hit over here too. An LP with the same title is coming our way soon.

Recently the popular VARA TV show "Fan Club" featured a strong line of our artists. Special attraction was England's number one folk singer Donovan, who came over to tape his appearance and to record a special show. Promising Negram beat groups the Clifters and the Selfkick also did their recent recordings on "Fan Club." This show was aired on February 11th.

Another new but great Dutch group calls itself the Demons. Their initial release "Big Bamboo" has a lot of international possibilities, as it is right in the groove of the big success "Shame and Scandal In The Family." The boys come from Lieden, Holland.

Negram is very proud to release two international best sellers by Petula Clark. "My Love" is the big English hit and "Les Incorruptibles" has been a continental best seller. Besides that, the lark always has some great LP's on the market.

The Dutch contribution to the finale of the Annual "Eurovision Song Contest," this season at Luxembourg, will be featured by Milly Scott, artist of the C.R.N. label, who is well known by virtue of her frequent performances on the Dutch TV networks. Milly Scott will sing at Luxembourg a brand new song called "Fernando En Filippo." It has a gay, witty melody with a funny ("Tong-ti-ki-tong"-sung) interlude. It was written by Ger den Braber who wrote "Caterine," "Sophietje," "Spiegelbeeld" and other big local successes, was composed by Kees Bruyn, arranged by Fand, A & R man at C.N.R.'s, and published by Belinda of Amsterdam. N.V. are sole distributors of Mix Music, who own the original copyright. "Fernando en Filippo" shows signs of becoming a tremendous success. On both pre-elections on Dutch TV it received 70-80% of all the votes and on the record's first release day, Rood reported nearly 1,000 copies sold.

BELGIUM

CBS has already done considerable promotion for their star Claude Leveillé and the results have really been remarkable. Many a record, whether EP or single has found its way into private collections. At the prompting of Mimi Smith, he, as well as many other CBS-stars got considerable plugging on radio and TV. Danny Fisher recorded a new disk and he will sing the songs on the TV-program "Tienerklanken" (Teenager sounds).

Barclay has launched the promotion for a girl, who is gradually becoming known, not only in France (she is of French descent), but elsewhere in Europe, as the "new Piaf," the young songstress is Mireille Mathieu. She is appearing in a Brussels music-hall and will, while here, also make a TV-performance on the Flemish network. The Belgian papers are headlining her more and more. Current Barclay-successes are: "La Bohème" (The Gipsy) by Aznavour; "Potemkine" by Jean Ferrat; "Ces Gens-Là" (Those people) by Brel and other songs by Aufray, the McCoy's, and Dalida. "The Monkiss" by the Airdales and the Strangeloves is enjoying a lasting success. This dance is widely known and popular.

Vogue is actively engaged in the promotion of the tour of Belgium from March 12 to 20 by the Kinks, a tour organized by Unidans Productions of Jean Vanloo. Across the whole country large posters are appearing on many walls and the promotion in the papers is being actively pursued. The Pat Boone single "Mai Mai Mai" (Valentina), a big success in San Remo, is to be put on sale by Vogue with a special promotion effort.

A new star in the Ranch-skies is Jean-Marie Bernard, a talented young man, who hails from Luxembourg and has just recorded his first disk. Both songs are published by Bens Music. "Pas De Filles" (No girls) could well turn out to be a bestseller. Benoit Philippe has a second recording "Quand Tu Es Dans Mes Bras" (When you're in my arms), likely to hit it off better than his first try "Lisette". In France, Philippe received a special promotion from Polydor, which also distributes all Ranch-records in Belgium. There certainly is no lack of promotion. Both singers together during a popular TV-program.

Intervox-Eurovox prexy L. J. Van Rijmenant returned from Hamburg, where he met Gunter Gayer of Sikorski Music, Gunter Ilgner of Polydor, record manufacturer Max Kunath and Messrs. Seeger and Bokler, of the Peer Group. Positive deals were made for the first German recording by Flemish thrush Mary-Ann, newest television discovery of "Discover the Star," who will record top-title "1-2-3-4-5-6-7". Bizz-talks also included negotiation for the Eurovox background music line and tape library, as well as scheduled German recordings with folk group "The Dockx Brothers" and Ann Soetaert.

New Eurovox-productions this month include a stereo single by the Fabulous Jokers "Brazil" b/w "Perfidia" (on Arcade records, nationally distributed by Cardinal Records), "A Worried Man" b/w "Cottonfields" by The Dockx Brothers, "1-2-3-4-5-6-7" b/w "Di Di O Day" by Mary-Ann and "Humpty Dumpty" b/w "Tantie Jane" by Mel Turner, all on Eurovox's own Dino-label, handled by Candle Records. On Jan. 25th, Marc Dex and the Ruby's introduced their new Dino-outing "Vaarwey Jenny" on Frans Romeyns' teen-television program "Tienerklanken."

New outing on Funckler Johnny Nash's "Let's Move and Groove (Together)" b/w "Understanding" and "For Your Love" by Sam and Bill is now starting. Epic introduced, this week, three new records "Mr. Lonely" by Bobby Vinton b/w "There I've Said It Again" and a new group of folk-singers (three girls and four young men) The Back Porch Majority with "A Song Of Hope" b/w "Mighty Mississippi." The third record on Epic: The Glenn Miller Orchestra, under the direction of Ray McKinley with "Red Roses For A Blue Lady" b/w "Everybody Loves Somebody". On Hickory a new record is the Newbeats "Little Child." Also on Hickory "Love Worked A Miracle" b/w "I Love You Because" by Bob Luman. Colpix introduces a new LP of Nina Simone "Nina Simone at the Village Gate" including several sensational titles "House Of The Rising Sun," "Bye Bye Black Bird," "Just In Time," and "Brown Baby." The original soundtrack of "Thunderball" on United Artists (The latest James Bond successfilm) is already one of the biggest LP's. Festival introduces Christian Arabian, an author, composer, interpreter of his own songs with his LP "Chansons Vertes Et Grises" including "Do Do Do," "Le Bal Des Affreux," "Guerrologie" and "Les Mages".

Also on Festival, Les Barbécues (seven young men) playing in New Orleans Style. They play "Julie Crevecoeur," "La Bague Au Doigt," two songs by Marie Laforet, "Aline", a smash hit of this summer and a composition of J. R. Morton "Milemberg Joy." Also on Festival Colette Chevrot comes out with his third record, including a hit "L'Elephant Rose." This title is gaining prominence due to the company's continued radio promotion. Other titles of C. Chevrot are "L'eau Et La Pierre" and "Ce N'Est Pas Avec Des Mots."

On the classical side, Polygram reports to us, that an important number of new albums were released: "Brahms/Klavierkonzert nr 2-B dur op. 83" with Alexander Uninsky (Klaiver Klavier) and the Philharmonic Orchestre of the Hague conducted by Willem van Otterloo. The classical record of the month is "Telemann" (Dxy 835750) with f.e. Konzert D-Dur für drei Trompete, Pauken, zwei Oboen, Streiche und Continuo, Orchestre "Pro Arte" Munchen, conducted by Kurt Redel.

In the Polygram chanson-field new releases are: Philippe Clay "Abecedaire"/Manger Porteur b/w "Incontestablement"; Frank Fernandel: "Non, Rien Au Monde" b/w "Aujourd'hui"; Anne Sylvestre: "Lazare Et Cécile"; Johnny Halliday: "Le Diable Me Pardonne" b/w "Tu Oublieras Mon Nom"; Paul Louka: "La Femme A Jean" b/w "Adieu Louise". The titles of Anne Sylvestre, Johnny Halliday, and Paul Louka are controlled by Primavera Music Publishers Brussels. Paul Louka had a very successful appearance in Brussels Music Hall "Ancienne Belgique" (Old Belgium) and we really hope that this talented Belgian artist will reach the top in the chanson field. AUSTRALIA

Aztec Services and Stadiums Pty. have combined to present what they term as the first all-Australian big show which kicks off in Melbourne on March 1st. Then it will play Ballarat, Brisbane, Newcastle, Sydney, Adelaide, Perth, and will wind-up at Shepparton on March 11th. The show will feature some of the hottest acts on the local pop scene at the moment: Normie Rowe and the Playboys, Bobbie and Laurie and the Rondells, M.P.D. Limited, and the Easybeats. National publicity is being handled by Bill Gordon publicity services.

The new album by the Beatles, "Rubber Soul," which was released only this week is already a runaway best-seller for EMI. If sales of this package are any indication, the group hasn't lost any of its popularity as is being claimed in some quarters here. They also happen to have the top single across the nation too with "Day Tripper" b/w "We Can Work It Out," which is still on top of our national best-seller list, a position it has enjoyed for several weeks. Not bad for a group that's supposed to be losing fans.

During their recent "back home" concert tour, Australia's world renowned group the Seekers were presented a Gold Disc from EMI to mark sales in this country of 50,000 copies of "The Carnival Is Over." This figure in Australia is generally accepted as the local equal to one million sales of a single in the United States. In addition to this, there was the rather unique presentation to the group, from album station 3XY, of the station's special DIGMO (Destroying the International Garbage Music Organization) Trophy for being the most outstanding Australian group.

Festival Records has issued an album set entitled "Nat 'King' Cole In The Beginning," which carries many of the great old sides by the original trio such as "Honeysuckle Rose," "Sweet Lorraine," "Early Morning Blues" and "Scotch'n' With The Soda." This should catch some solid sales with the lovers of the early Nat Cole Trio.

It is almost certain that Nancy Sinatra will have the next smash around Australia with her Reprise single "These Boots Are Made For Walkin'." The air-play on this side is quite staggering.

We understand that the A side of the new single by local star Merv Benton has been banned by some of the leading Top 40 stations in some of our major cities. The title (we believe it's a revival) is "You Got What It Takes (To Take What I've Got)"; the coupling is "Shake, Rattle And Roll," and the record is on the W & G label.

As yet, there is no sign of the local release of the Bobby Fuller click on the Mustang label. It is called "I Fought The Law."

Under our new decimal currency system which was introduced throughout the nation, the general price structure for records is as follows:

Record retailers, of course, purchase at wholesale prices, and the 25% Federal Government Sales Tax is computed at the wholesale level. While our money is not the same value as that of the United States (although there isn't a great deal of difference between ours and the American dollar), it can be readily seen that record prices in Australia are considerably higher than those of the U.S.A. and for the rest of the world for that matter. The trade has for several years been looking for a reduction in sales tax, but with no success to date. It is hoped that the Record Manufacturers Association will continue its appeals to the Federal Government for the much needed reduction in Sales Tax.

EMI is out with a whole flock of hot new singles from their various overseas catalogs including "As Tears Go By" by the Rolling Stones; Pinkerton's Assorted Colours with "Mirror, Mirror"; "Listen People" by Herman's Hermits; "Waitin' In Your Welfare Line" by Buck Owens; "This Golden Ring" by the Fortunes; the Exciters with "A Little Bit Of Soap"; "Lightin' Strikes" by Lou Christie; and "Up Tight" by Little Stevie Wonder.

The latest issue of the APRA (Australian Performing Right Association) bulletin indicates that we can expect the new copyright legislation to become effective later this year. There is wide trade interest in the proposed amendments to the existing act, because it is of vital importance to many sections of the industry, especially to record companies and music publishers who are all of the opinion that the changes should swing their way. It's quite obvious that all parties cannot benefit from the alterations, so the new act will be eagerly awaited.

While Elis is cutting for Philips, "Zimbo" is still with RGE and they all are pacted by "Emissoras Unidas" for Theater and TV.

Discos RGE's latest releases: the vocal group from Rio de Janeiro "Anjos Do Sol", after a hit single comes on strong with another "Marido E Mulher" b/w "Café Diferente." The group has planned a trip to São Paulo where they will be presented on radio, TV and in night-clubs. . . . An album from "Barclay" presents 50 hits by Eddie Barclay's Orchestra, which includes such numbers as "Tenderly", "Stella By Starlight", "The Lady Is A Tramp", "Holiday For Strings", "Night And Day", "Carioca" and "Till." . . . From the same source comes a single by Charles Aznavour, with two numbers taken from his two hit albums recently released—"Les Deux Guitares" b/w "C'Est Fini".

As suggested by several friends from the local diskeries and pubberies, we will start a series of predictions for the year and we will see at the end of '66 which come true. MEXICO

Constantin Th. Metaxas, general manager of the DUSA record company, arrived in town February 17th, after a trip to Germany where he interviewed executives of Philips Records.

Louis Couttolenc and Guillermo Infante, president and general sales manager of RCA, made a business trip to Monterrey, Laredo and San Antonio Texas, to promote the RCA Mexican catalogue.

Panamericana de Discos (Musart Records) held a party to celebrate, with all its artists, the best selling year of the company—1965. Eduardo C. Baptista, president of Musart Records, was host.

CBS Records held an executive party. Assisting were Armando de Llano, vice president and general manager of the company, Raul Bejarano, commercial manager; Manuel Cervantes, artistic coordinator; Oscar Sarquiz, manager of the international department, and Gilberto Parra, A & R man.

Andre Midani, general manager of Discos Capitol de Mexico, continued his tour through the country looking for new talent. Midani is the precursor of the "new wave" that is being introduced in the U.S., England and other countries. The "New Wave" consists of songs in which the singer complains about problems of the world. The first record released in Mexico is sung by talent Nacho Mendez and is named "Me He Preguntado Muchas Veces" (I've Asked Myself Several Times).

From San Salvador we received a letter signed by young Mexican singer, Cesar Costa, which told us about his successes in Tegucigalpa, Nicaragua, San Salvador. Now he is performing in Panama.

Los Panchos, a famous Mexican trio, had to stay two additional weeks in the Chateau-Madrid of New York. Besides that, Los Panchos did a TV show with Ed Sullivan, and after that, performed in Melville, Pennsylvania. By March they must fulfill a contract in Japan, Orient and Europe.

Capitol Records released an album called "Inglaterra" (England), in which international A & R man Rene Leon included some of the best songs sung by Herman's Hermits, the Dave Clark Five, the Animals, Freddie & The Dreamers, the Hollies and the Yardbirds.

American hit "Barbara Ann" was immediately recorded in Spanish in two versions: the first one on Orfeon Records made by Los Locos del Ritmo and the second one at CBS with the new r & r group Los 4 Crickets.

Gamma Records released hit tune "My Love" by English singer Petula Clark. We received information that this song will also be recorded by several Mexican artists; among them are Anina, who was successful with her version to "Downtown."

Three new singles have been released by RCA. The first one with Argentinian singer Juan Ramon is titled "Maria Ninguem." The second one by Neal Hefti includes "Batman Theme" and "Batman Chase." These recordings were chosen by the new international A & R man Enrique Gutierrez Zamora.

Several new albums were released by Discos Capitol de Mexico in the past week. Among them are "Rubber Soul" with the Beatles, "Tropical" with Victor Ruiz Pazos, "El Romantico Mayab" with Trio Los Montejo, "Ole Flamenco" with Alma Fugosa de Espana, "Pasodobles" with Gran Orquesta de Profesores Solista, "Judy Garland and Liza Minnelli (Live at the London Palladium)" and some extended plays by the Beatles, Wout Steenhuis, Maria Bravo and Alicia Lizarraga.

Female duet Las Hermanas Jimenez signed a contract to perform in Chicago and New York. Their debut was in Chicago on January 29th. Also from RCA have been informed that arranger, conductor and pianist Chucho Zarzosa gave a jazz concert in the city of Guadalajara at Teatro Degollando.

A series of new recordings were made by Jose G. Cruz at Philips Records with the new r & r Los Supremos. The songs include "Let's Hang On," "Dond Estas" (Where Are You) "Estey Enamorado Contigo" (I'm In Love With You) and "Stop In The Name Of Love."

Latest news from Orfeon Records: Los Hermanos Martinez Gil signed a contract to record at least six LP's. Matador Silverio Perez and his wife Pachis also signed a two year contract to sing folk songs. Ska conductor Tono Quirazco and his orchestra will perform in three carnivals: Vera Cruz, Mazatlan and Guadalajara. Imelda Miller, bolero singer who used to be an exclusive singer of Musart Records, signed a contract with Orfeon. She will start to record immediately.

Good new sound by the Guess Who's on Quality is "Believe Me," written the group's lead guitarist, Randy Bachman. It has that currently commercial, raunchy-type sound that should have it doing chart biz in both Canada and the U.S. in very short order. "California Dreamin'" continues to make much chart headway in Canada. Stan Kulin reports number one chart spots for the song by the Mamas And the Papas at CHLO—St. Thomas, and top ten spots in several other key areas. Bill Smithers, Quality's man in Montreal, has been making the city's deejay rounds of late with lovely Carmel Quinn in tow. Needless to say the deejay fraternity made him and his charming guest most welcome. Bill tells C.B. that the recent "Tijuana Day" promotion at CFCF, including a long-distance conference call from Herb Alpert, in which the radio audience could participate was a real success. A large helping of Tijuana-type music filled the Montreal airwaves on the day in question. Claude Jobin is the new promo man in Quality's Montreal branch, specializing in promotion of French-language record product. The current big album at the branch is the set by the Baja Marimba Band, "Animals Only."

W&G will have the rights to the Gaiety release, "Walking The Dog," by Jerry Palmer for Australia. Decca will have World rights as reported in this space last week, but Gaiety distributes in the U.S., RCA Victor in Canada, and W&G in Australia. The second release is winning acceptance with spinners around the U.S. It's the outing by the Dudes, "Let's Not Pretend Anymore." Stan Kulin at RCA, Montreal reports that the Palmer record rates high on the list of current RCA smash singles. That list is extremely long, and extremely active. It includes such big items as "Theme From Batman" by Neal Hefti, and perhaps the hottest of the hot right now in every Canadian market, "Ballad Of The Green Berets" by Barry Sadler.

John Toews, product manager for the Mercury-Philips group at London is just back from a western trip. Calling on London branches and distribs in Winnipeg, Calgary, Edmonton and Vancouver, he was delighted with chart and sales action on several big singles. "Working My Way Back To You" by the Four Seasons seems to be well up everywhere. "We Know We're In Love" by Lesley Gore, "My Ship Is Coming In" and both sides of the Roger Miller newie are all shaping up into big sellers across the west. Big album currently on Philips, reports John, is "The Gold Vault Of Hits" by the Four Seasons. Their even newer set, named after their current hit single, has just been shipped to key deejays by London's very active promo-gal, Gaye Galin.

A couple of stronger singles in recent London releases have been doing well at Canada's Lakehead. "Tchaikovsky One" by the Second City Sound has been a real winner with adult audiences, while fantastic phone request action has been noted at CKPR for the latest single outing by the Ventures, "Secret Agent Man." The side was first broadcast as an hourly theme by the station, but phone action put it on the pick list. If the phone action results in sales in the area, or even strong demand, the side will be charted in short order.

Another big phone action record in that market has been another adult-type sound, "Granada" by Fritz Wunderlich. It's on Verve-Folkways and is very

Lead vocalist Bernie Beaumont wrote what appears to be the "A" side, "What Are You Doin' To My Friend." It is a good beat item.

The Rolling Stones are sure to have another giant single with their latest London Goodie, "19th. Nervous Breakdown." It's long but has a terrific driving beat that'll please their fans and win them even more in top ten lots. Former Montreal spinner, "Lord Tim" Hudson, now at KFWB in L.A. will wed Dean Martin's daughter, Claudia.

"Daydreamin'," latest outing by the Lovin' Spoonful, should develop into a big winner in no time at all.

Reg Ayres at the Quality branch in Winnipeg has high hopes for the latest release, this time on Reo, by Dee & the Yeomen. "A Love Like Mine" looks like a strong follow-up to the group's chart entry, "Take The First Train Home." Trans World Records of Montreal are distributing the good bluesie side by Slim Harpo, "Baby Scratch My Back."

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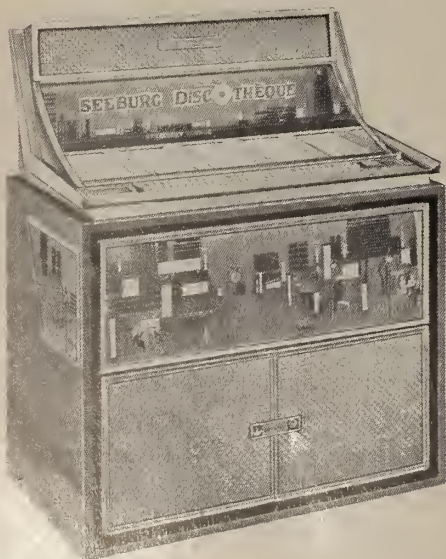
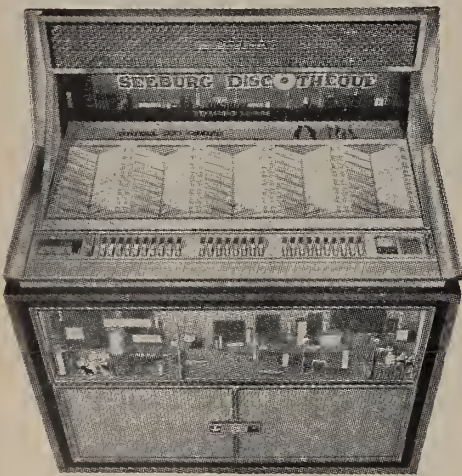
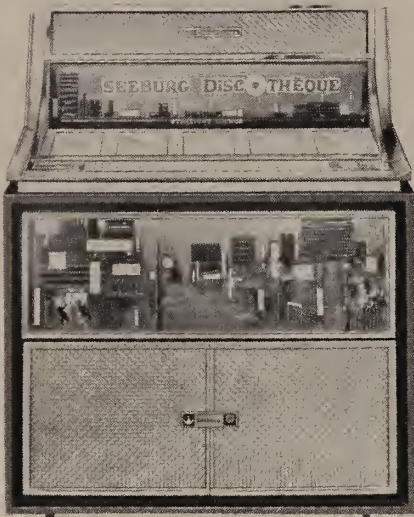

Editorial

The Little LP . . . A Cooperative Venture

We take up once again the subject of the little LP and juke box programming, at the risk of sounding like a broken record repeating itself. But there is an urgency here. Money is being missed and the chance to make up for its loss and pile profits on top is here—right now.

The story goes like this: At the MOA Convention last September, it was noticed with regret that very few record companies were exhibiting. Some of those that had been on display a few years before were not there in 1965. When MOA asked a few of them why, the companies replied, somewhat to their surprise, that they either hadn't really been asked, didn't think they were wanted or weren't quite sure of the value of exhibiting. MOA said they were needed and Bill Cannon's liaison committee was formed.

Here is an example of near-disastrous lack of understanding—which still stands a chance of being disastrous. Several companies which never before made little LP's or have not made them for several years, are now producing them. Most record one-stops are stocking them, and now it is up to the operator.

There is no use in claiming that one side was deaf to the other or that the other side did this or that. Here's the point: both sides are anxious to make money and do business. Let's take it from there.

Bill Cannon has said: "Remember that the overhead on these LP's is not high at all. After the overhead is paid, the rest is pure profit."

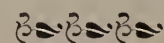
No one knows exactly how the legislation now before the Federal Congress will turn out, but the industry has been taught one thing during the past few years—taxes, decrees and ordinances have cut down the operator's profit margin. The little LP offers a chance to hike it back up.

When a record company makes a little LP, it must go to the original tapes, if still available, or make new ones, decide which tunes to include, edit the tapes, make masters, adapt the jacket to the smaller size, order album cover stock, print title strips, pay shipping and advertising costs—and hope they sell. They have made it clear that the albums they are now producing are trial items. If not successful—if operators do not buy them and program them and try them with as much good faith as the companies have shown in making them—they will be discontinued. And all that money will go down the drain.

The money that goes into a juke box is being drained away by various sources. Here is a chance for the operator to keep more of it in his pocket. Could anything make more sense?

Through MOA's hard work, many record companies have been convinced to try it once more. If they find it doesn't work this time, they may probably never come back.

We urge operators to buy the little LP's and try the little LP's—don't let this chance go by. Go buy!

Rosen To Milan; New Cinebox Unit And Filmo-Disco To Be Released

PHILADELPHIA—"It will now be full steam ahead for Filmotheque-Discotheque," declared David Rosen, who heads up the national distributing firm for the new combination-phonograph audio-visual device, as he left this week for Milan, Italy. Armed with completed reports of the extensive field tests of the new design created for the Cinebox conducted by the engineering department of his David Rosen, Inc., Rosen headed for the plant of Innocenti. Arrangements were completed earlier by Rosen and Angelo Bottani for Innocenti to manufacture the newly-designed machine.

Bottani is president of the International Phonovision Society in Milan, Italy, which created the Cinebox. Rosen, who is the exclusive distributor of Cinebox in the United States, has adapted the machine with a juke-box mechanism. Under the trade name of Filmotheque-Discotheque, Rosen

has the only 2-in-1 movie-music machine with both the movie and the music mechanisms in a single machine.

In addition to the engineering reports, Rosen took along with him the figures of his sales department which reportedly show increasing interest in the movie-music machine in both purchases and lease. Rosen also pointed out that "while Filmotheque-Discotheque is one of the two companies actually shipping out movie-music machines to locations, the Rosen company is the only one with a 2-in-1 machine." He stressed the fact that his field reports show that the newly-designed Cinebox is just as easily adaptable for the juke box mechanism as the original model.

Innocenti, said Rosen, will go into full-scale production in keeping with completed tests of the prototype machine conducted both in this country

and in Europe by Bottani. He also indicated that, upon his return to the United States and with start of mass

production, final decision will be made on the appointment of territorial distributors in this country.

Uncle Sam's Service School

NEW YORK—Number 45 Rivington Street is the address of the Adult Training Center. Here the Federal government's Manpower Development Training Program works with 550 students to develop their skills and prepare them for better and more demanding jobs. In Room 302, fifteen of these students are now in training for one of the newest courses—Coin Machine Repair.

Through the efforts of the Music Operators of New York and all the coin-phonograph manufacturers and their local distributors, the gap is being closed between the number of trained mechanics available and the great demand for them in Metropolitan, N.Y.

All of the students (there are twelve now and three more are expected within the next few weeks) have backgrounds in basic electronics. Joseph Frazier is an example. He trained as an electronic tester and radar repairman in the Air Force. Maurice Anderson was also an electronics tester. Having come into the course two weeks late, he is working doubly hard. Both men agree: "The course is great. I'm learning as fast as I can and when I get through I'll know these machines inside and out. I hope to go with one of the companies as soon as possible."

Training begins—literally—from the group up. Course instructor Henry Golden, a juke mechanic veteran from the late 1940's, said: "When the machines arrived I had the students pick them up and carry them up the three flights of stairs to the classroom. That's what they're going to have to do when they're on the job. Each man has been tested and screened by the Division of Employment of the State of New York, so that we know his background in electronics. There's a refresher course and then we move on to these diagram panels here." He walked over and pointed them out, eight circuit diagrams.

"Each of these circuits has something abnormal about it—in other words, something is wrong with it and the student must correct the mistake. Each panel simulates a service problem that could occur on a juke box. After he has studied these diagrams, he goes to the machine itself."

Walking over to a Wurlitzer unit, he said, "The students run their own tests of the mechanisms, trying to find the cause of the problem. Then they can check their results against the service manuals which the companies have provided." Sometimes I cross a few wires beforehand," he smiled, "and set a few little traps."

While the students worked in pairs at their counters going over diagrams, others were at the model juke learning how to load records, clean a coin mechanism and spot trouble before it starts.

The door to the classroom opened and several gentlemen entered. At the front was Mr. Henry, principal of the school since its creation in 1942, talking with Ben Chicofsky of MONY, Al Denver, MONY president, Rolf Bjornson, supervisor of the Board of Education of the MDPT and industry representatives: Harold Kaufman and

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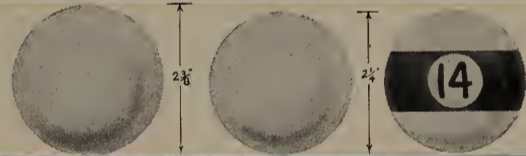
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Max Gulden from Musical Distributors (Wurlitzer), Irving Kempner from Runyon Sales (Rowe AMI), Wurlitzer regional service representative Hank Peteet and MONY legal advisor Theodore Blat.

"The industry has cooperated so closely with us," said principal Henry, "making the machines available, supplying all the tools and information needed. They are anxious for the men to begin on-the-job training on Saturdays as soon as possible. Students are paid to learn; a base salary is given and increases made, according to the number of dependents in each man's family."

"We make these payments so that they can learn full-time, which they do—six hours a day, from nine in the morning until three-thirty, five days a



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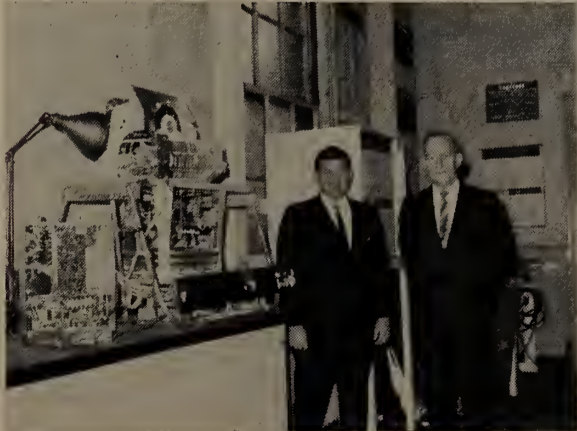
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week. The course lasts 36 weeks. We begin courses or discontinue them on the basis of what the market demands

and the industry has shown by their interest and support that there is a market for these students."

On Location: Focus On The Phonette

The Pine Crest Diner Restaurant
Bayshore, Long Island

NEW YORK—For something like thirty years, the word "diner" has conjured up pictures of a roadside stop where a hasty sandwich and a cup of coffee were taken before passing on. The diner used to mean short order cooking in a dwelling that looked like an abandoned freight car (which often was literally the case) with wooden tables, wobbly chairs and sugar that stuck in the jar. All that is generally past history, now that the new look in diners has arrived.

A first-rate example of the modern diner, the 'Pine Crest' on Sunrise Highway in Bayshore, Long Island, has been offering superb restaurant facilities to both local and transient traffic and has provided music operator Bill Kobler (Jabco Vending Service) an excellent location.

Much effort and imagination have gone toward the diner's interior decoration. Plaques and coats of arms hang on the walls—or rather, push out from them. Modern light fixtures, in contemporary design, hang over each booth, with its waxed wood finish and turquoise upholstery. A counter circles half-way round towards the kitchen doors, behind which a high-salaried chef is preparing lobster for the evening trade. This is the diner part of the Pine Crest. Beyond the booths and the counters, the restaurant section spreads out white oval tables and chairs and couches of royal purple stand at the ready. A miniature bar is off to the corner for cocktails.

Three weeks ago, operator Kobler and his service team spent three days installing fifteen new Rock-Ola Phonette wall boxes throughout the booths and on the counter. With volume selector controls and personal speakers (and a brand new Grand Prix II console in the basement), operator Kobler says he was able to solve a problem for the management and boost the collections he received from his previous music installation.

"Under the old system, with the speakers hung on the walls and mounted in the ceiling," Kobler revealed, "a young fellow might play a rock 'n roll tune, which the folks in

the restaurant section might or might not care to hear. There was no personal volume control before and this new wall box is just what we needed."

The concept of the Pine Crest, as a combination diner-restaurant in high style, is the idea of owner Nick Angelis, who conceived, designed and supervised the building, even down to the color schemes. Why this particular design and why this idea of the combination? Manager John Stefanou tells:

"The old 'diner' is going out in city areas. I know because I owned and operated several of them. I came out of the Army in 1945 and bought a small place on Franklin Street. I worked hard and moved up to 108th Street and Amsterdam. Then I went to Astoria and opened a diner on 35th Avenue, right across from the Paramount Studios. I bought a house on Long Island and when Nick Angelis opened here, I took this job. Two years ago, when the Pine Crest was built, it was to meet a market. More and more people were—and are—moving out of Manhattan to Long Island. They want a restaurant. Since we're right by the highway, we also have a 'diner' section, although our menu is quite complete. We offer full-course luncheons and dinners. We have this combination for both kinds of customers, young and old. That's one of the reasons we

liked the Rock-Ola Phonette installation."

Kobler, the operator, tall and soft spoken, turned the selection tables of a Phonette and talked about the installation:

"I thought and John thought that these new wallboxes would appeal to the customers, and I brought in a Grand Prix II so that I could program little LPs. I expected collections to go up by 25% but it looks as if they'll go beyond that. There are two different listening audiences here. The kids want the hot singles, so of course I put them on and they are played. But with the albums I get reaction from the older customers—that's why I have Tony Bennett, Doris Day, Jerry Vale and Robert Goulet. Plus Boots Robinson and Roy Orbison for the kid with a quarter."

"One thing I've found with little LPs. They are primarily a promotion product for the record companies, using the juke box as an outlet. Like writing a play and hiring actors to speak the lines. But I think the little LPs could be more successful if the six tunes on them were all hot. An album—a standard twelve-selection album—usually features four to six hot tunes, some of them originally singles. These are the ones where everybody worked hard to get a selling sound. The rest of the tracks are at an easier pace. But I

think that if the record companies really want to get the full promotional value out of the six-cut albums, that they ought to take the cream tunes and put them on."

The promotion is keyed to concentration in the trade papers, radio stations, and other direct media.

The current record release schedule offers entertainment for adult locations, featuring such Li'l Wally tunes as: "Herman Take Me Home" c/w "You Call Everybody Darlin'" by Dora Hall, "Your Cheatin' Heart Is Showin'" c/w (a smash single) "Need You" by Li'l Wally, "Innocent" c/w "Pretty Violins" by Wally and his ork, and others. Jagiello exhibits his records and supporting promotions every year at the MOA Convention, and is considered a big producer for the music operators.

"Li'l Wally" Jagiello is scheduled to appear on the Lawrence Welk TV show, March 19, thus inducing an additional push on the records programmed in the nation's coin-operated phonos.

Simultaneously Jagiello is arranging a "Li'l Wally" Miami Beach vacation trip (August 30-Sept. 6), referring to it as a "Polka Fun" holiday, complete with his polka band and other activities.

Chicago-born Jagiello has appeared

Jagiello and his polka band, as part of the "Polka Fun" holiday tour promotion, will be appearing at the Fontainebleau, Miami Beach, Sept. 2.

TIPARILLO OFFERING PLAN TO QUIT CIGS

NEW YORK—For cigarette smokers, the General Cigar Co. has developed a method for kicking the cigarette smoking habit by gradually switching to Tiparillo. **Seeburg Stockholders
Hear Record Figures
For 1st Qtr. At Meet**

CHICAGO—The Seeburg Corporation reported to stockholders, Wednesday, Feb. 16, at their annual meeting in the Sheraton-Blackstone Hotel that their sales and earnings for the three months ended January 31, 1966, were the highest in any first quarter of the company's history. The results represent a significant turnaround for the company, a leading manufacturer of vending equipment, coin phonographs and musical instruments, which suffered an earnings decline in fiscal 1965 as a result of substantial non-recurring costs.

Sales were reported at \$23,032,907, compared with \$20,926,824 for the first quarter of 1965. Net income for the period was \$988,288, compared to \$939,338 the previous year. Earnings per share were 40 cents in both years, although there are presently 2,472,980 shares, 122,865 more than the 2,350,115 shares outstanding a year ago.

Delbert W. Coleman, chairman, told the meeting that problems that affected results during the last nine months of fiscal 1965 now lie behind. "The non-recurring expenses connected with construction of the new principal plant in Chicago and the accompanying start-up costs and production delays are now at an end," he said. "The new plant is turning out Seeburg products with the efficiency and quantity for which it was planned. Profit margins are improving steadily, and indications are that the balance of 1966 will witness a continuation of the gains we are presently experiencing."

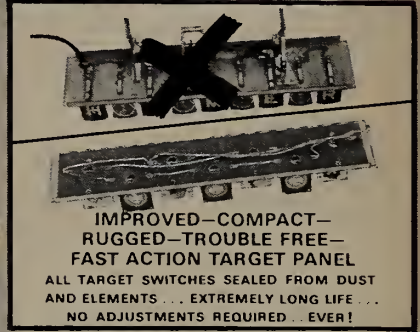
Milwaukee Mentions

Outlook For Candy, 1966: Sweet And Sour

CHICAGO — Candy manufacturers surveyed by the National Confectioners Association have mixed emotions about the business outlook for 1966, it was revealed in the 7th annual edition of NCA's management report, "The Confectionery Industry Speaks."

Ninety-three percent of the candy, chocolate and chewing gum manufacturers who participated in the NCA survey expect sales to rise this year.

At the same time, only 58 percent of these manufacturers are looking forward to an increase in profits, as compared with 71 percent who forecast greater profits the year before.

Reflecting an optimistic view of the future, 74 percent of the respondents are planning to introduce new items this year, the survey showed.

On the other hand, the average estimated amount of funds expected to be spent on expansion in 1966 dropped slightly to \$231,801, down from the \$233,742 estimated the year before.

Sixty percent of the manufacturers believe production costs will rise in 1966, as compared with 46 percent who held this view last year.

The most pressing problems confronting the confectionery industry, as indicated by the candy manufacturers surveyed, are (in this order) import competition, industry competition and labor problems, Federal regulations, competition from other food products, raw material shortages, and state regulations.

Among other survey highlights, it was revealed that an average of 49 percent of manufacturers' sales are channeled through wholesale outlets. Thirty-eight percent said that supermarkets were the biggest eventual outlet for their products. Thirteen percent ranked drug stores as their biggest outlet; 12.5 percent, small independent food stores; 12 percent, confectionery stores; 9 percent, department stores; and 9 percent variety stores.

In answer to the question, "What are the best candy sales holidays?", Christmas ranked first with 26 percent of the candy manufacturers, followed by Halloween, Easter, Valentine's Day, Mother's Day, and Thanksgiving.

American Tobacco: Record Sales And Increased Dividend

NEW YORK—Dollar sales and net income of The American Tobacco Company and its presently consolidated subsidiaries achieved record highs in 1965, Robert B. Walker, president and chairman of the board, announced today. Domestic unit cigarette sales reached an all-time high.

Dollar sales in 1965 were \$1,231,629,000, an increase of \$28,200,000 over the previous record of \$1,203,429,000 set in 1964.

Net income in 1965 increased by 10% to \$80,527,000 or \$3.05 per Common share compared with \$73,195,000 or \$2.69 per Common share for 1964.

Walker attributed this gain to increased volume, to continued manufacturing efficiencies, and to maintaining advertising costs close to the 1964 level. Also contributing to the gain in net income were reduced federal income taxes and a nonrecurring profit on sale of property abroad which amounted to \$1,237,000 after deducting U.S. and foreign taxes.

Cigar sales were below the record levels of 1964, an unusually high year, but greater than 1963, a more normal year.

Smoking tobacco sales declined in 1965 from the abnormally high levels of 1964.

Federal and other taxes on income were \$77,920,000 in 1965 compared with \$75,464,000 in 1964.

Earnings per Common share are calculated on the basis of 25,925,316 shares outstanding as of December 31, 1965, and 25,999,116 shares outstanding as of December 31, 1964. (The Company's Preferred Stock was retired July 1, 1965.)

The board of directors on January 25 voted an increased regular quarterly dividend of 45 cents per share, payable March 1 on the Common stock to stockholders of record of February 4, 1966. Payments have been 42½ cents per share quarterly since September 1, 1965, when they were increased from the earlier 1965 rate of 40 cents.

Vending Wage And Hour Law Demands To Be Main Topic At NAMA Spring Meets

CHICAGO — Current wage-and-hour law demands which affect vending company employees will be the main topic for discussion during the vending management workshop at the eleven 1966 Spring meetings of the National Automatic Merchandising Association, according to Thomas B. Hungerford, executive director.

"More than 150 letters and telephone calls from NAMA members in the last hundred days illustrates how deeply concerned vending operators are about these new problems," Hungerford said. "We know that many others are affected and interested and, therefore, expect participation this year to exceed the record attendance at the Spring meetings in 1965."

In analyzing the wage-hour law, Richard W. Funk, NAMA legislative counsel, will discuss what the law requires of vending operators, the exemptions from the law that are applicable to specific types of employees, and how the exemptions are interpreted by the federal wage-hour administrator, Hungerford said.

Other topics that will be covered during the workshop include the benefits of utilizing progressive wage and salary policies, and case histories of how a number of vending service companies switched to profitable 40-hour work week programs in conformance with the wage-hour law.

The workshop will be moderated by Gilbert H. Hansey, NAMA director of conventions.

The 11 meetings will begin March 12 in Washington, D. C., and are scheduled through June 18. Nine of the meetings will be held in cooperation with NAMA state councils, whose annual meetings coincide with the program dates.

The program format will be simi-

lar at each session, and all meetings are scheduled on Saturdays. According to Hungerford, all vending operators are welcome to attend and may choose the meeting most convenient to them. No registration fee will be charged.

Annual meetings of the state councils, general vending business discussions and an address by an officer of NAMA are scheduled from 10:30 a.m. to noon.

NAMA president W. J. Manning, Jr., senior vice president James T. McGuire, vice president Meyer Gelfand, and treasurer William H. Martin will alternate as speakers at the state councils' morning meetings.

The NAMA President's Reception, hosted by Universal Match Corporation, will precede the group luncheon.

A keynote address entitled "A Small Vending Operator Speaks Out" will highlight a group luncheon at noon.

The vending management workshop is scheduled from 2:30 to 4:00 p.m. and will be followed by a sponsored hospitality reception from 4:15 to 5:45 p.m.

An Ambition Realized
In The Canadian Mkt.

TORONTO—As the first communist broadcast broke out over Radio Prague in 1948 a chemist and manufacturer named Jaromir "Jerry" Janda thought of his family and his business—his wife, his two sons, a factory and a warehouse. The government had just taken over his business and it would soon take over his freedom. He had to get out.

"Canada," says Janda, "was without question the country for us. We could educate our boys and there would be a good future for them and for my wife and me. It was a young country, a rich country with very few people. I thought it simply must go forward and to get in early is a good thing to do." This was in 1949; the Janda family left Czechoslovakia and came across the sea to Toronto.

Once arrived, he again went into the chemical business, manufacturing medicines, eye drops and cosmetics. From that, he went into the candy business. One day a call came in for penny gum to be used in bulk vendors. Taking a chance, Janda produced a limited supply. They sold well and he made more. He bought a few machines and set them up. They turned in large profits. He bought more and more and soon had a route going. So was born New-Way Sales Limited, in 1955.

Janda sold his candy factory, bought more vendors with the proceeds and expanded into the games and amusements field with Jerry's Coin Machines. Then the boom fell.

The city of Toronto decided that there was something wrong with pin ball games and passed the usual ordinance which has become familiar to coin operators around the world: no games within city limits.

So Janda moved his games and rides to Wasaga Beach in 1958, creating a large summertime business. He built a house and moved in, ready to settle down. Then the government of Ontario Province decided they would like Janda's land as part of a new highway project. Once again, Janda moved.

Meanwhile in Toronto, quarters had been taken on Queen Street and an association formed with Rock-Ola and Bally for distribution of phonographs, coffee vendors and games. Janda moved back to Toronto and began to build again. New-Way Sales Ltd. outgrew its offices and a new address was taken down the street.

Today, New-Way occupies two floors—the top for executive and staff offices, the lower for two showrooms (one for new equipment, one for used). Downstairs is a stockroom, warehouse and workshop.

As an operator and distributor, Janda's firm handles Rock-Ola phonographs and vendors, amusement games by Williams-United, Chicago Coin and Midway Manufacturing, dollar bill changers by Standard Coin Changers, milk vendors by Norris Milk Dispensers and the National Shuffleboard line. This is in addition to its line of used equipment and its parts department. As an operator, the company has 1000 machines reportedly on location, some for sale on demand, after a complete overhauling. Last year Janda bought a piece of property on the main street of Wasaga Beach, and has erected an arcade alley Joyland—a bowling alley, dairy bar, a pool room, Candy Floss room, a restaurant, kiddie rides and amusement games.

New Way Sales Ltd. operates juke boxes in Jamaica, kiddie rides in Ontario chain stores, and shuffleboards in city hotels.

In the European tradition of keeping the business in the family, Janda Sr. is president and general manager, while his oldest son Jerry Jr. is secretary-treasurer. The junior Janda is in direct charge of the store locations, parts, receiving and shipping and takes charge of the firm when his father is away. He has been with the company for four years. 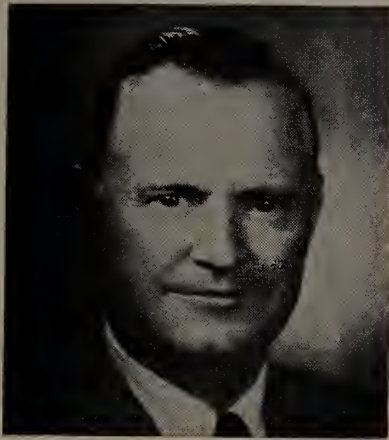

Canteen Sales, Earnings
Seen Continuing At Top
Pace At Annual Meeting

CHICAGO — Sales and earnings of Automatic Canteen Company of America "are continuing at a record pace," Patrick L. O'Malley, President, reported to shareholders attending the company's annual meeting here Feb. 15th.

O'Malley also announced that Canteen has strengthened several key marketing areas through acquisition of vending distributorships in Atlanta, St. Louis, Tacoma, St. Petersburg, Charlotte, N. C.; and New Orleans.

"These acquisitions will measurably enhance our already fast-moving sales picture for 1966. In Atlanta, for example, we are re-entering an important market from which we have been absent since 1960," O'Malley added.

O'Malley anticipated that earnings for the fourth period ending Jan. 22 would continue the trend achieved in the first quarter, or three periods, of the company's current fiscal year, for which Canteen reported a 51 per cent profit gain. (As previously reported, earnings for the first quarter ending Dec. 25, 1965, were \$2,574,000 or 38¢ per share, 51 per cent higher than first-quarter 1964 earnings of \$1,704,000 or 25¢ per share. First-quarter '65 sales were \$69,204,000 compared to \$63,203,000 a year ago.)

Shareholders approved changing the company's name to "Canteen Corporation." Management had asked permission for the name change to "more properly describe expanded activities of the company into manual food service, contract catering, restaurant and concession management in addition to vending."

Following the annual meeting, Canteen's Board Of Directors met and announced that a quarterly cash dividend of 20¢ per share would be made payable April 1st to shareholders of record of March 15, 1966.
