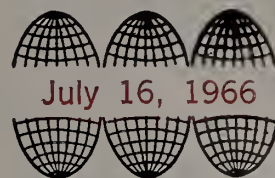

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The Pop Lyric

A few years ago, the sound of teen-oriented disks completely overshadowed the content of the words or lyrics. The point was to keep lyrics as simple as possible, so that they wouldn't get in the way of an exciting concept in sound. A disk's "sound" has not been bypassed by any means, but today many a lyric approach can be as interesting and pertinent to the success of a record as the most colorful of new sounds.

The beginnings of the lyric's newly-gained prominence came with the advent of the message or protest song, telling in broad terms of such matters as civil rights and war. In a logical extension of this growth of realism within the context of teen-oriented music, songs have come around whose storylines have related openly about narcotics, sex and other headlining-grabbing subjects of great social concern. Some of our fine folk-pop attractions and sensitive straight rock writer-performers such as the Beatles' Lennon-McCartney and the Rolling Stones' Richard-Jagger are not exactly looking through the world with rose-colored glasses, but through the often harsh perspective of the naked eye.

When any lyric attempts to tackle distressing aspects of social behavior and is transmitted through recordings designed for general appeal, it must immediately give birth to controversy. To moralizers, the reply to these disks

is that they represent a further withering away of the moral climate. Others who interpret our Constitution guarantees under the widest of latitudes might claim that anything-can-go.

The record industry, which must bear the burden of onslaughts against controversial records, needn't determine its course of action by taking up the banner of either of these factions.

These extremes represent, in our viewpoint, a surrender to censorship on one hand and a complete disregard of responsibility to the public on the other.

There is, however, a middleground, as vague and noncommittal as it may appear. Without forming any committee or organization to oversee lyric content, individuals and companies should proceed on the basis of "good taste." By this phrase we do not mean to infer that controversial subjects are to be *verboden* as material for recordings. If there is a market for musical propaganda, then labels have every right to provide it. Such a market, however, shouldn't be catered to with tasteless, artlessly suggestive product. There are too many truly talented musical purveyors of the social scene for the trade to offer recordings that plunge the image of the record industry to the lower-depths of commercialism.

Let the music of protest be heard. Let the mature application of good-taste be its guiding light.

MGM/Verve Sales Meet: The Lion Moves \$5½ Mil In New Albums

NEW YORK—An estimated \$5½ million in written distrib orders have kicked-off MGM/Verve's line-up of Fall product, represented by 75 albums on nine labels.

The presentation of the new LP's and consequent orders took place at the label's three-day national sales meet at the Waldorf-Astoria last week (5, 6, 7). Pegged on the theme of "It's MGM—the Lion on the Move," the confab was geared to relate to distributors the accent on youth that has seen the label reach new sales heights over the past year. Distributors were also advised to put emphasis on stereo sales, since the latter is approaching 50% of total LP sales.

Distributors got wind of new releases through the use of a projection process which combines multiple split-image motion-picture and slide photography on one screen. This audiovisual device noted that MGM had put emphasis on meeting the demands of "on-the-move" people who want their recorded entertainment in cars, boats and planes. As for the latter area, it was announced that MGM product would be employed by Continental Airlines for passenger entertainment. The company was also scheduled to reveal its tape cartridge plans to distributors last Thursday (7) at a meeting closed to the press.

Nasatir: 'Best Year Ever'

In addressing distributors, Mort Nasatir, president of MGM/Verve, said that the company had lived up to its word to provide the "best year with our line." "You've seen us expand, flex our muscles, fight for and get new artists, reestablish some of our artists and build others, reach out for new markets and try the unexpected." It was his opinion that the new release was one of the strongest releases ever offered to "any group of distributors by any record company in the business."

Part of Nasatir's talk involved an announcement of the promotion of Lenny Scheer to director of marketing (see separate story). Scheer spoke next, noting that the progress of the label could be greatly attributed to the company's concept of "team work."

Tom Wilson, an A&R exec, was called upon to say a few words about a recording session with the Freaks, a far-out west coast rock group. Wilson noted that the label would continue to recognize the world of the teens and its continuing search for the new and exciting. Wilson noted that by 1970 half the population of the U.S. would be 25 years of age or less.

The New Releases

The new albums will be supported by national and regional consumer ad campaigns. MGM/Verve claims an industry first by its use of Bus Cards. Extensive trade advertising, point-of-purchase displays and special racks will supplement the fall sales drive. Also on tap are incentive sales programs, new packaging ideas and vari-

ous merchandising, promotion and publicity projects.

Labels represented among the new issues are MGM, Verve, Kama Sutra, DGG, Verve/Folkways and the budget-priced Metro, VSP, Heliodor and Leo the Lion labels.

MGM newcomers include "Erroll Garner Campus Concert," "The Legend Lives Anew," Hank Williams with newly dubbed chorus-ork backing, "The Classic Roy Orbison," "Movin' On-Luke The Drifter," Hank Williams, "Movie Greats Of The 60's," Connie Francis, "Animalization," the Animals, "Lainie Kazan," "Both Sides Of The Herman's Hermits," "Country Shadows," Hank Williams, "Painter Of Hits," Lou Christie, "No Love At All," Johnny Tillotson and "You're Gonna Hear From Me," Julius LaRosa.

The new Verve line-up consists of: "Go Ahead & Cry," the Righteous Brothers, "El Sonida Nuevo-The New Soul Sound," Cal Tjader & Eddie Palmieri, "Tequila," Wes Montgomery, "Marquis de Sade," Lalo Schiffrin, "Intermodulation," Bill Evans & Jim Hall, "Rain Forest," Walter Wanderley, "Put On A Happy Face," Oscar Peterson, "Dirty Dog," Kai Winding, "Out Of The Storm," Ed Thigpen and "Hoochie Coochie Man," Jiminy Smith.

Lenny Scheer Promoted To MGM/Verve's Marketing Head

NEW YORK—Lenny Scheer has been promoted to director of marketing for MGM/Verve Records. Announcement of Scheer's new responsibilities was made by Mort Nasatir, president, at the label's national sales meet in New York last week (see separate story). Scheer, reporting directly to Nasatir, previously served as director of singles sales and coordinator of indie production arrangements. He joined the company in the sales dept. in 1962. New appointments in view of the Scheer promotion are expected to be announced soon by the label.

Victor To Exhibit At MOA's Chi Convention

CHICAGO—RCA Victor Records is the first label to agree to exhibit at this year's annual convention of the Music Operators of America (MOA). Fred Granger, MOA's vp and managing director, said that Victor would take an exhibit booth and hospitality suite at the Pick Congress Hotel in Chicago, where the convention will take place, Oct. 28-30. As for participation by other record companies, Granger said that "we have every reason to believe that we will have a very good representation of record company exhibitors this year, and, of course, we will do everything in our power to make it a worthwhile convention and trade show for all of our (record) distributors."

There's Gold In Them Singles Oldies

NEW YORK—Record companies are failing to recognize singles oldies as booming sales goodies. This is the contention of Benny Reminick, who runs Town Hall One Stop in Brooklyn, where, besides the regular line-up of current hits, dealers can obtain years-back singles going as far back as 20 years, the age of the one-stop itself.

"We sell more of some titles in the oldie class than we do of many chart items that reach 70 or 80 on the charts," Reminick reports. In fact, Reminick points out, somewhere between 15% to 20% of his total business is in "golden oldies." The sales of oldie singles is "not a queer little quirk, but a national hobby like coin or stamp collecting," he explains. He charges the regular "competitive" singles price for the oldies.

Town Hall has between 15-20,000 different titles in stock, with a range of 5 to 500 of each record. Reminick notes that he became THE place to come for oldies virtually by default. Whenever there is consistent repeat business on a single, it qualifies for Town Hall's "back-file." This policy, Reminick says, is the opposite of other one-stops that are geared to deal only with newer product and do not want to apply too much manpower and time to oldie inventory. "As our oldie line grew, dealers stopped making inquiries to other one-stops for years-back hits and came directly to us," Reminick says.

According to Reminick, LP collections of oldie-goodie sides are not

good enough for the oldie hobbyist. The market for oldies, he notes, consists primarily of teenagers, who favor the 45 speed "They do not want to be inconvenienced by album collections, which often contain selections they are not interested in," Reminick explains.

Reminick feels that labels are losing out on what can "key-off a new round of profits, even a renewed chart stand for oldies." Every five years, there's a new market for old rock 'n roll hits, bringing in audiences who were too young to purchase them, Reminick adds.

Wants Label Stimulation

"Nothing is being done by record companies," the one-stopper claims, "to stimulate this area, perhaps because they are unaware that it exists." Reminick feels that any area of music that can bring 15% to 20% of a large one-stop concern should interest labels in promoting it.

Dealers, too, Reminick says, are reaping the financial rewards of the oldies trade, some of whom are paying their overhead through such sales. And, he adds, oldies sales are a blessing when there are no real big hits on the current singles scene.

What establishes a single as a "golden oldie?" To Reminick, steady sales for a 2 to 3 year period following its hit status. These disks, he explains, have an "intangible appeal," and there are "little epidemic indica-

Labels Gear For Nat'l Sales Confabs

COLUMBIA

NEW YORK—Columbia Records has scheduled its 1966 Sales Convention for Jul. 20 thru 23 at the Dunes Hotel in Las Vegas, with approximately 600 people expected to attend. Top executives slated to participate in the affair, which will be the largest sales meeting in the firm's history, include CBS/Columbia Group president Goddard Lieberman; CBS Records division vice-general manager Clive Davis and Columbia vice William Gallagher, who will serve as chairman of the Convention.

Also attending will be merchandising vice Stanley J. Kavan; Columbia Records sales vice Jack Loetz; operations vice Albert Earl and West Coast operations vp Irving Townsend.

In addition, reps from CBS Records' numerous overseas affiliates will be hosted at the Convention by Harvey Schein, vp-general manager of the CBS international division. Among those expected to attend from overseas offices are executives from Argentina, Australia, Austria, Brazil, (Continued on page 50)

NEW YORK:

HOLLYWOOD:

The question of a song's eligibility for an Oscar constantly crops up in conversations among music men on the coast. According to the Academy "a song must be used vocally in the body of an eligible motion picture. The body of a picture must be interpreted to include the main title and all the dramatic action."

A number of years ago another rule was instituted after "The Last Time I Saw Paris" walked off with the award. The song had been added to a soundtrack long after the tune was on the national charts. The rule, as we understand it, now is that a soundtrack must be recorded vocally for the film before records are available.

Therefore "Strangers in the Night" (from "A Man Could Get Killed") would not be eligible since the film is currently being shown without a vocal track. If the song was eligible

Atlantic Launches Verbum—Spoken Word Album Series

NEW YORK—Atlantic Records has launched a new series of spoken word LP's called the Verbum Series. This new line will feature contemporary works of poetry, drama and other works of literature.

The first release in the Verbum Series is "Allen Ginsberg Reads Kaddish." The work was originally published in 1960 by City Lights Press in San Francisco.

The recording was made at Brandeis University on Nov. 24, 1964, and marks the only time Ginsberg has ever recorded the entire work. (He has read the entire poem in front of an audience on only two other occasions.)

The album also features "How Kaddish Happened," Ginsberg's commentary on the poem. The full text of the commentary appears on the inside of the album. The liner and back cover of the LP contain rare photographs of Ginsberg and his mother taken in the late 1930's.

The first Verbum set on Atlantic is packaged in deluxe style, with a double-fold cover. The cover pic of the poet is by Richard Avedon.

Effie Smith Helms Bang, Shout Promo

NEW YORK—Shout Records, a subsidiary of Bang Records, has announced that Effie Smith will be heading the national promotion of all R&B product on the Shout and Bang logos. Aside from working with distributors and promo men, she will also participate in the finding of new talent on a national basis. She has previously worked in the promotion department of Jubilee Records and is currently active with the National Association of Radio Announcers.

Arnold Shaw To Leave E. B. Marks On Sept. 1

NEW YORK—Arnold Shaw will resign his post as general professional manager of E. B. Marks Music, effective Sept. 1, ending a 12 year association with the firm. No successor was named.

Shaw intends to devote himself fulltime to a career of book and magazine writing and composing; two areas of endeavor in which he has achieved some recognition during his years as a professional music man.

In describing Shaw's forthcoming departure, Herbert E. Marks, president of the corporation said:

"It is with much regret that I am making this announcement. Arnold's work for this firm, not only in the field of popular songs, but also as regards shows, films and television, jazz, special projects and many other phases of our business, has been extremely notable and of great profit to Marks Music." Marks emphasized that his departure was an entirely "cordial one." I shall always treasure the deep friendship that has developed between us in the last dozen years," he added.

Among the giant world successes Marks published during the Shaw regime are: "More," "Wonderful! Wonderful!" "Banana Boat Song," "Cindy, Oh Cindy," "Tell Laura I Love Her," "Broken Hearted Melody," "Lollipop," "Dungaree Doll," "Hotel Happiness," "Port-au-Prince," "Born Too Late" and such revival hits as Dinah Washington's "What A Diff'rence A Day Made."

ROLLING STONES

NEW YORK—The summer music festival at Forest Hills opened with a concert appearance by the Rolling Stones, the Tradewinds, The Standells, and the McCoys. The show was emceed by Gary Stevens of WMCA-New York who introduced the Tradewinds to get the program under way. The group found that there was no electricity for the amplifiers, but this difficulty was quickly ironed out and they played, among other selections, their while-back Red Bird outing "New York Is A Lonely Town." The McCoys and the Standells followed and entertained with such tunes as "Good Lovin'" and "Shout" until the arrival of the Rolling Stones.

As a security precaution, The Rolling Stones were flown in and out of the stadium in a New York Airways helicopter which landed right behind the stage. The Stones performed with one tune right after another in rapid succession including their well-known London releases of "Satisfaction," "Paint It Black," "19th Nervous Breakdown," "Get Off My Cloud," and their currently charted "Mother's Little Helper." Mick Jagger's wild gyrations and singing kept the girls in the audience screaming and running at the stage, especially on "Stupid Girl."

All in all it was a good concert except that it was mared by the reckless hurling of fire-crackers at the performers and the fact that a riot very nearly started when the police attempted to protect the Rolling Stones from the over-enthusiastic fans.

Dionne showed complete mastery of her material and total professionalism in her approach to the audience and the only disappointment of the evening was that she did not take the number of encores that the crowd wanted, which conceivably could have consumed the balance of the evening.

The first part of the show was filled by blues/rock group Jesse Colin Young and the Youngbloods, whose fans were also in strong attendance. The hard quality of the group's sound was mostly lost in the open spaces, but the quality of the playing and singing shone through.

The show was opened with a short set by extra added guests One and 2/3, a comedic, folk oriented trio that has lots of chucklefilled new material and the ability to go to the folk standards with smoothness and vast musical ability.

The series, which continues on a five times a week basis is held in the Wollman Memorial Rink with a seating capacity of 4200 and room for 250 standees. Sellouts have already become the rule rather than the exception.

KAY STARR

LOS ANGELES—Bistro buffs, who bemoan the demise of such redolent rooms as Ciro's, Streets of Paris, Mocambo, Moulin Rouge and Crescendo, can rejoice in the genesis of the Westside Room at the Century Plaza, at once one of the most attractive cookshack clubs in the universe.

Fortuitous perhaps, the choice of Kay Starr as its curtain raiser was inspired. For Sister Kate, who has played all the rooms mentioned above, has been a Starr of first magnitude for over twenty years. She is still the liveliest shouting chanteuse in town with a voice as engaging as her siren smile. Her repertoire, which includes the dramatic "If You Love Me" and "Don't Blame Me", is long on rhythm, country and gospel, peppered with several of her distinguished disk titles. She shuns completely the contemporary tunes—not one of the songs she delivers so winningly was composed in the past fifteen years. This is not to suggest that she tangle with a "Li'l Red Riding Hood" or "Sweet Pea", but there are several current chart selections, movie themes and show songs which would lend immediacy to her act.

She's backed by Frankie Ortega's thirteen piece band with tennis star-pianist Al Lerner and a male vocal group joining in the festivities. The acoustics in this semi-intimate 400 capacity room, incidentally, are exceptional.

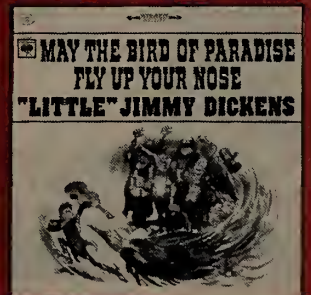

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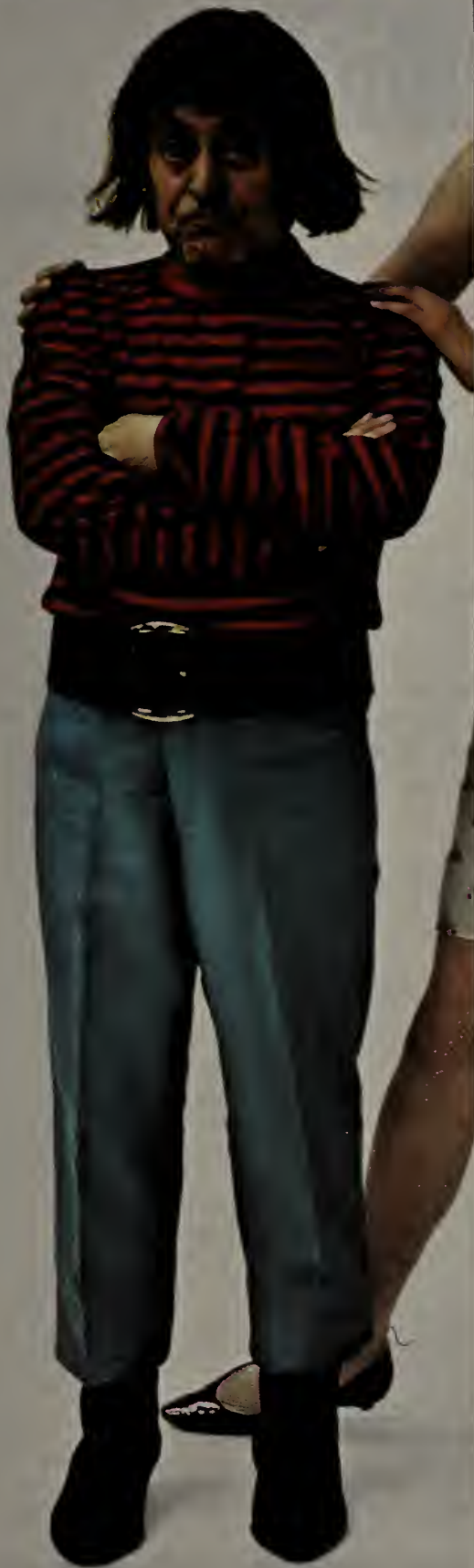

Foster went on to state, "We see in Fran Jeffries, a very exciting potential as we feel she has not yet been properly presented on records and with our special recording plans combined with merchandising her domestically and internationally, we are very confident of her impact on sales." The pact calls for her to be recorded in Italian, French, German, Portuguese, Greek, and Japanese, so as to "penetrate more fully the markets where those languages predominate." The lark is versatile in the global language aspects of recording as was evidenced with her featured performance in "The Pink Panther" flick where she was spotlighted singing "Meglio Stasera," the Italian version of the Johnny Mercer/Henry Mancini tune, "It Had Better Be Tonight."

Fran Jeffries is also under contract to Color-Sonics and recently filmed two tunes for the film-box firm. Monument plans to tie in U.S.A. and foreign promotion with Color-Sonics so as to eventually make the same songs available on records.

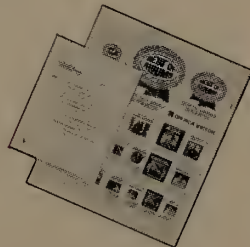

In announcing the appointments of Norman Wienstroer as vice president and Norman Hausfater as treasurer of the corporation, president Robert L. Hausfater detailed the Roberts success formula for promoting and merchandising albums and single records in the many retail outlets now serviced by the St. Louis organization.

The coordination of promotion and sales follow through is one of the contributing factors in building volume at the retail level. St. Louis radio station survey sheets are reprinted in quantity as sales aids for dealers. Title strip cards for 45 rpm singles are furnished at no charge to retailers and in those locations where all labels are serviced, Roberts provides the fixtures and LP divider cards.

Roberts also continues to intensify its dealer coverage. Richard Schweer, who managed the Scruggs, Vandervoort and Barney record departments has joined the sales staff, bringing the total number of account representatives to eight. All LPs are poly bagged and tear tabbed for inventory control and all accounts in the metropolitan area are checked twice a week on single records. Ernest Cobb heads up the one-stop department and special attention is given to all jazz and rhythm and blues product. Promo chief Glen Bruder calls on the dealers to keep them advised of the albums and single records that are being exposed on radio and TV and every effort is made to take advantage of movie tie-ins, and national advertising.

July will be a busy month for Roberts executives with manufacturer's sales meetings in New York, St. Louis, Nashville, and New Orleans on the agenda.

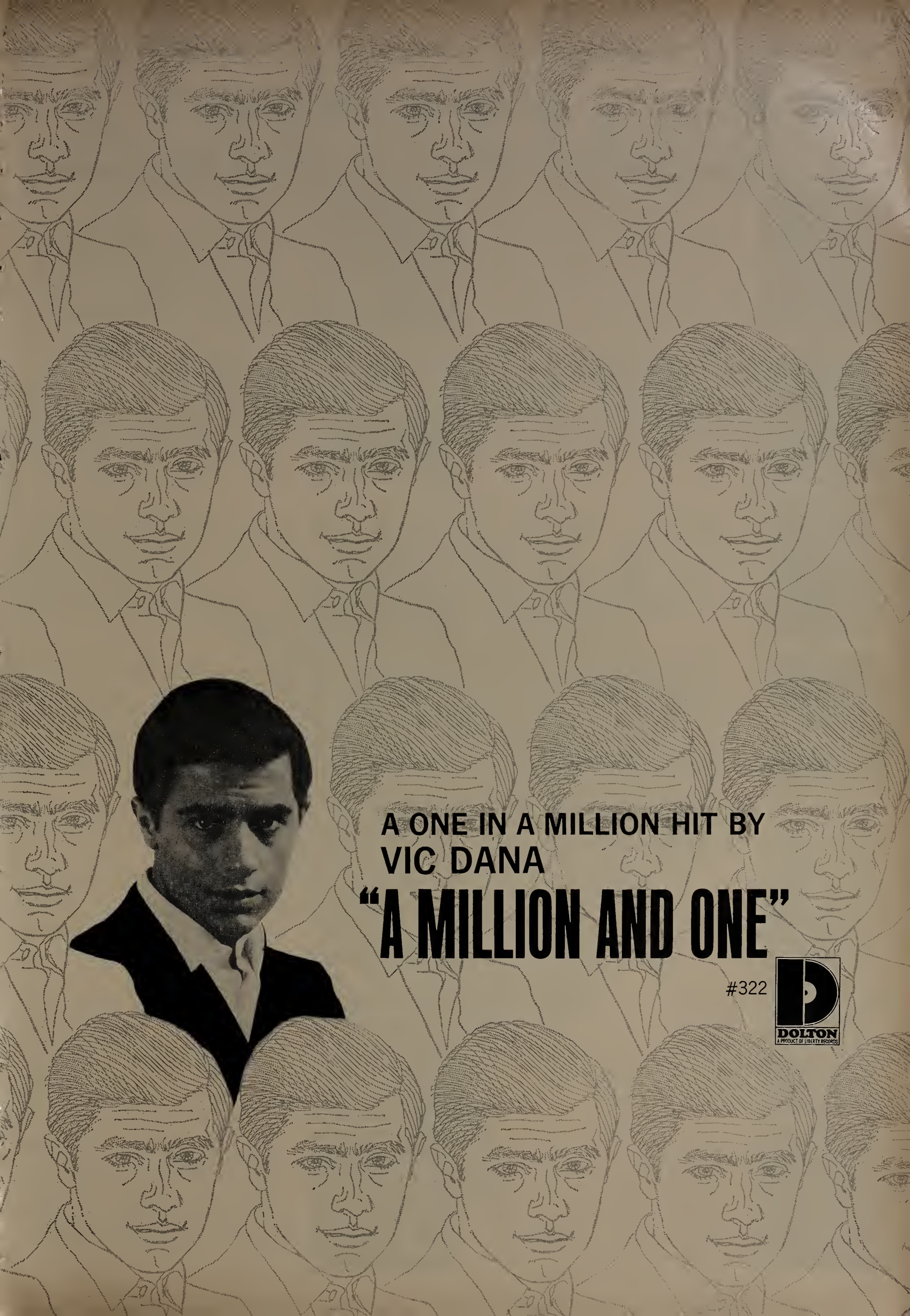

The Hirt 'Horn of Plenty' overflows with tasty goodies which pour forth in abundance, jaunty and spritely, in a session guaranteed to charm flocks of listeners who like to listen. Kicking off the package with a galloping groove called "The Fox," the hornster spews track after track of happies, including "Skokiaan" and "Little Gold Ring." Top-notch material.



THE BEST OF PETER AND GORDON—Capitol T/ST 2549

Peter and Gordon should do hoards of business with this LP that collects some of the pair's most powerful offerings. The boys' highly individual stylings are impressive in their hits "Woman," "I Go To Pieces" and "A World Without Love" as well throughout the balance of the tracks. Undoubtedly the duo's many followers will add this LP to their collections.



ANNIE GET YOUR GUN—Original Cast—RCA Victor LSO-1124

"Annie," with its bullseye score by Irving Berlin, has just completed its revival run at New York's Lincoln Center. But, Victor has it down on wax, including original "Annie's," Ethel Merman's brassy-as-ever lead role. Among the Berlin gems is a charming new number, "Old Fashioned Wedding," which stopped the show nightly. All but one of the original songs in the score are retained. The disk gives "Annie" a sparkling born-yesterday quality.



WHAT'S SHAKIN'—Various Artists—Elektra 4002

Elektra should do well with the vast blues oriented, pop audience that has been built up throughout the country, with this collection set of such artists as the Lovin' Spoonful, Tom Rush and the Paul Butterfield Blues Band. The hit making Spoonful contribute four tracks including a top item in "Good Time Music" while Tom Rush contributes "I'm In Love Again" and the Butterfield Band has "Good Morning Little Schoolgirl." Watch this set's action closely.



WHEN THE SAINTS GO MARCHING IN—Flatt & Scruggs—Columbia CL-2513/CS-9313

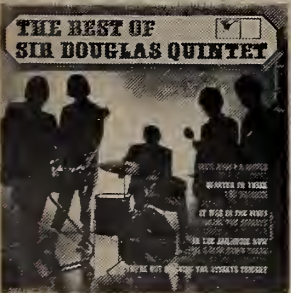
This is the 2nd gospel album for Lester Flatt, Earl Scruggs & the Foggy Mountain Boys. The set is sparked by Earl's hard driving banjo and Lester's vocals. "Cabin On The Hill," "A Stone The Builders Refused," and the title song are excellent tracks. Although this album is not exactly the "blue grass" that the group is known for, it is sure to be sought after by many folk, gospel, and country fans.



MY FATHER THE POP SINGER—Sam Chalpin—Atco 33-191

Atco has come up with an answer to Capitol's Mrs. Miller in this package by Sam Chalpin. A 65-year old, Chalpin should generate quite a bit of interest as he lets loose with a unique interpretation of many recent and while-back biggies from the pop charts. The tracks feature such teen items as "Leader Of The Pack" and "I Want To Hold Your Hand," as well as "Bang Bang."

THE BEST OF SIR DOUGLAS QUINTET—Tribe TR 37001/TRS 47001

The Sir Douglas Quintet should hit a solid sales pattern with this set that collects the group's top items and adds a host of other goodies, many penned by group leader Douglas Sahm, to them. From the quintet's first click "She's About A Mover" on through "Quarter To Three" and "The Rains Came" there's lots of good listening here.



SOUL SISTER—Aretha Franklin—Columbia CL 2521/CS 9321

The soul-filled, gospel/blues voice of Aretha Franklin does very special things to some tremendously popular tunes on this potent set. The lark gives out with her unique readings of such goodies as "You Made Me Love You" and "Ol' Man River" and does something lovely to "Swanee." The package should be a much requested item by good music, blues and pop fans alike.



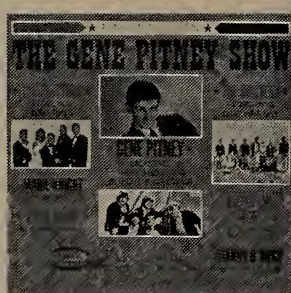
FIESTA FLAMENCA—Juan Serrano—RCA Victor LPM/LSP-3596

An offering of flamenco music by Juan Serrano (with vocals by Pepe Segundo, Chano Lobato, Jose Fernandez, Domingo Alvarado, and Miguel Galvez). The package encompasses a wide range of flamenco music with "Tanguillo—Del Piyayo," "Mirabras," and "Tientos" as blue ribbon tracks. One of countrydom's consistent big sellers, Webb Pierce shows no reason to slow down with this choice morsel. Heading up the playbill with his recent single effort, "You Ain't No Better Than Me," the songster serves up a platterful of country goodies, that include "A Fallen Star" and "Time Changes Everything," as well as a touching performance on "Danny Boy." Should do well.



THE GENE PITNEY SHOW—Various Artists—Musicor MM 2101/MS 3101

Musicor has come up with a winning collection of tracks, which include performances by such names as Gene Pitney, the Critters, the Platters, the Bitter End Singers and Steve Rossi, among others. The lineup presents a sales-proven batch of goodies, highlighted by Pitney's "Backstage" and the Platters' "I Love You A Thousand Times," both of which did extremely well in the singles field. Should score.



THE HUMOR OF ROWAN & MARTIN—Epic FLM 13109/FLS 15109

Rowan and Martin have split many a side with their wild comedy performances on the night club and television circuits and are guaranteed to generate plenty of yocks with this LP. Some of their best known sketches are included in the package, with laughs flying thick and fast on many of the tracks. Among the laugh-filled items here are "The Doctor Interview" and "The Birds And The Bees."

AN HYSTERIC RETURN—P.D.Q. Bach At Carnegie Hall—Vanguard VRS 9223/VSD 79223

With the mirth caused by the first set of P.D.Q. Bach's unclassical classics this second set should excite and delight the fans previously attracted and add a host more. Among the rather unbelievable cuts on this entry are "Unbegun Symphony" and "Pervertimento For Bagpipes, Bicycle and Balloons." The concert at which this set was recorded drew gales of laughter and applause and the LP should do equally well.

ELVIRA—Dallas Frazier—Capitol T/ST 2552

Tunesmith Dallas Frazier has turned artist and has met with success in that area as well. This set contains a dozen Frazier tunes that have been originally recorded by others, in some cases, but are all given the original touch of the writer on this package. Frazier's latest "Just A Little Bit Of You" is a fine item along with the title tune and "Alley Oop."

HOW DO YOU SAY I DON'T LOVE YOU ANYMORE—Freda Payne—MGM E/SE 4370

Sweet sounds is surely the hallmark of this debut set by Freda Payne. The smooth voiced lark proves her versatility as well as vocal qualities via the selection of tunes on this package. Among them are such recent smash sounds as "That Lovin' Feelin'," and "Yesterday" and sweet tracks the likes of "Feeling Good" and the title tune. Loads of nice, easy, pleasant listening throughout.

SUPERCAMP—Tower T/ST 5031

What with the rise of Batman, the Green Hornet and other such "camp" subjects, Tower has come up with this collection of camp-alia. Featuring Goodwin "Goody" Goodload and his Frostonia Ballroom Orchestra, the set is bound to bring back memories to the faithful followers of "good old" musical styles. Items of note here include "Mairzy Doats" and "Lookie, Lookie Here Comes Cookie."

BEN BAGLEY'S GEORGE GERSHWIN REVISITED—MGM E-4375 OC

Ben Bagley has moved over to the MGM label for his latest "revisit" to rarely-heard songs of the Broadway greats. This time around it's George Gershwin. There are at least five long-lost wonderful songs, including "Feeling Sentimental," "Drifting Along With The Tide" and "Back Bay Polka," among the 13 rarities. All are charmingly, sometimes kiddingly done by Barbara Cook, Bobby Short, Elaine Stritch, Anthony Perkins and the Norman Paris ork. Bagley offerings of this type are always considered "musts" by the show music crowd.

AMERICA'S BELOVED MINNIE PEARL—Starday SLP 380

A favorite for many years with Grand Ole Opry fans, Minnie Pearl recently scored big on the country singles chart with her "Giddyup Go Answer," which is featured in this album. The famed performer sparkles with her usual abundance of joy as she fills the package with an excellent selection of material sure to please a great many of her followers. Other tracks here include "History Repeats Itself" and a duet with Red Sovine on "Alabam."

JAZZ BEST BETS

HOT BARBEQUE—Brother Jack McDuff—Prestige 7422

A jazz package with Jack McDuff on organ, Red Holloway on tenor sax, George Benson on guitar, and Joe Dukes on drums. "Cry Me A River," "The Three Day Thang," "The Party's Over," and the title song are outstanding efforts. This one is "soul jazz" and is likely to be readily accepted by jazz fans everywhere.

TELL IT LIKE IT TIS—Richard Groove Holmes—Pacific Jazz PJ-10105/ST-20105

A jazz package featuring Richard Holmes on organ backed up by Ben Webster, Les McCann, Joe Pass, and Gene Ammons. Among the more outstanding tracks on this album are: "Hittin' The Jug," "Blow The Man Down," "It Might As Well Be Spring," and "Denice." This offering is marked by an uncluttered feeling and should go well with jazz fans.

HERE AND NOW—Hampton Hawes—Contemporary M3616

The Hampton Hawes Trio playing pop and jazz standards and sound tracks. Hampton Hawes is backed up by Chuck Israels on bass and Donald Bailey on drums. A fast non-bossa nova treatment of "The Girl From Ipanema" as well as "Chim Chim Cher-ee" and "Days Of Wine And Roses" are outstanding tracks. Sure to be sought after by jazzophiles.

JAZZ FOR THE JET SET—Dave Pike—Atlantic 1457

This is an offering of jazz which, due to a Latin and pop flavor, is not limited to the jazz market alone. Dave Pike's treatments of Herbie Hancock's "Blind Man Blind Man," Bobby Hebb's "Sunny," and his own "Jet Set" and "When I'm Gone" are blue ribbon efforts. Sure to be a fast moving item.

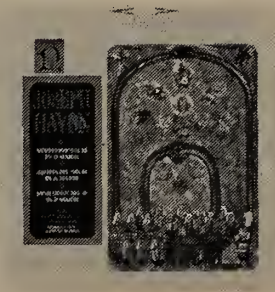
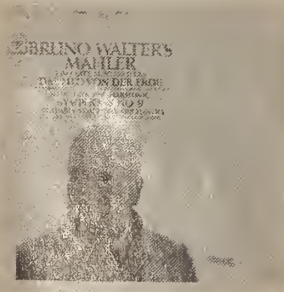
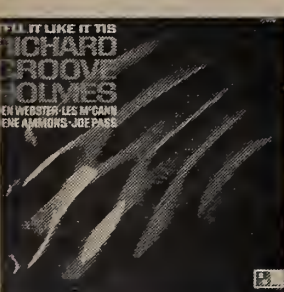
CLASSICAL PICKS

BRUNO WALTER'S MAHLER—Columbia Symphony Orchestra—Columbia D3L-344/D3S-744

Bruno Walter conducting the Columbia Symphony Orchestra in some of the works of Gustav Mahler. The "Symphony No. 64 In A Major" is a blue-ribbon track as is the "Symphony No. 29 In E Major." This one is likely to go very well in classical circles.



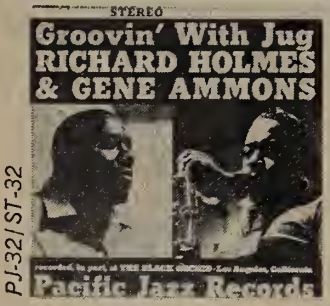
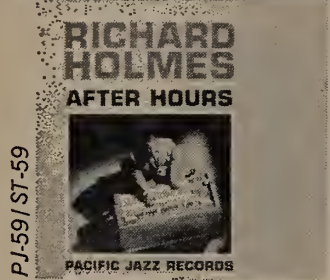
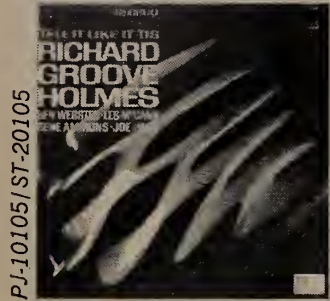

FOCUS ON JAZZ

Part of the Newport Jazz Festival of 1964 was an afternoon panel discussion which concerned itself with how the interests of jazz and the people who perform it could best be served. The panel included performers, commentators, disk jockeys, night club operators, artist and repertoire men, and concert promoters, all from the world of jazz. Because of the varied interests of the participants, myriad points of view were offered. One of the panelists, a disk jockey, took a very adamant stand, stating that the single most important element in the development of a jazzman's career in today's market is the recording. His contention was that a successful recording career was the catalyst for a well-filled calendar of personal appearances, night club, concert, television, et al. Let's concern ourselves with the expansion of that sentiment, the ever-increasing importance of the recording industry and its satellites in the launching and the sustaining of the career of a jazz performer.

Disks Launch P.A.'s

There has been a startling inversion of events that governs the very existence of a performer, and particularly a jazz performer. Years ago, if an artist had a successful track record, based on his appearances at night clubs, dances, or concerts, it would evoke sufficient interest on the part of record company executives to want to record that artist. The philosophy obviously was that after the exposure our performer had enjoyed making personal appearances, there would certainly be many potential customers for his recordings. Today, the people who engage performers for personal appearances want a pre-fabricated audience, one that has been created by the recordings that have made the artist known to the audience before he has ever been seen or heard in person. Thus, the inversion! Where previously it had been appear first, then record, now it is record first, then secure engagements on the strength of whatever successful recordings are out there, endearing you to the listening audience. So, what it actually amounts to is that the booking people want to rid themselves of the element of risk when they hire a performer; that security has to come from best-selling recordings.

Even the most ardent champion of jazz will acknowledge that there are, with each passing day, fewer and fewer clubs where jazz is programmed on a regular basis. For whatever reasons, this situation does exist. Perhaps the availability of so much jazz on record has helped bring this about. With the increase in sales of jazz recordings and the decrease in the number of clubs offering jazz, that might be one of the reasons. However, in defense of live jazz presentation, let us state that the college campus scene has become a very fertile area for jazz performers. In a sense, the college campus has filled the void created by the shuttering of many jazz clubs. Wherever it is performed, the demand for an artist is created by his recordings. That is for sure!!!

To further expand the importance of recordings, we must concern ourselves with the significance of playback equipment. Not too long ago, the

person who owned a high fidelity system was the envy of all his friends and neighbors. And understandably, because it wasn't that long ago that such systems were prohibitively expensive, and because they were reserved only for those who could afford that outlay of money. Today, with the decrease in cost of comparable equipment, just about everyone can afford a modest hi-fi system. As a matter of fact, if one admits to not owning a hi-fi today, he is looked at, askance. This means that there is a greater potential record buying public and the record companies are certainly taking advantage of that potential. The constant outpouring of the increasing number of record companies is almost inundating, and somewhat confusing, because where can all these recordings be heard? No longer is it customary to be able to walk into a local record store and listen to a recording before you buy it. There might still be some stores that offer that service, but they are very rare, indeed.

Deejay Exposure

That leads us to the very important role the disk jockey plays in the development of a jazz artist's career. To begin with, there are not that many jazz programs on the air, and because there aren't, the jazz listener seeks out each one with a passion. Where else will our listener and potential customer be able to be kept abreast of the latest releases? Where else will he be made aware of a new talent on the scene? Where else will he be given the opportunity to listen before he buys? Actually, the jazz deejay probably exercises the greatest single influence in establishing a performer's worth at the box office, be it a concert hall, a night club, or at a sales counter in a retail record shop. Unlike pop jockeys, most jazz deejays retain the freedom to program what they choose, and this autonomy only heightens the importance of what they do. Experience shows that most jazz disk jockeys are basically jazz fans, and as such, they feel a great responsibility to themselves, their audience, and to the artists whose recordings they play. Of course, if it isn't in the grooves, no matter how much our deejay likes it, or how often he plays it, the chances of a record breaking out are very remote. But if it is in the grooves, our deejay is the man who can get it across to the public. Therein lies his strength.

A classic illustration of how important the right record can be to a jazz artist is the record, "The In Crowd" by The Ramsey Lewis Trio. This record comes to mind because it is of a most recent vintage; certainly, there have been others like it in the past. Ramsey and his fellows had, up until "The In Crowd" breakout, been a regular working group, with a better than average following among the jazz set, and a group that commanded a reasonably good price for personal appearances. Came the BIG record, and the asking price tripled, there were television appearances by the dozens, and the name Ramsey Lewis became almost as well known as The Beatles. What stronger case can be made for the importance of recordings for the success of a good performer?

Deems Taylor Dies

NEW YORK—Deems Taylor (80), composer, critic, and former president of ASCAP died July 3 at the Medical Arts Center in New York. Taylor is perhaps best remembered for having composed two operas, "The King's Henchman" and "Peter Ibbetson." "The King's Henchman" was commissioned in 1925 by the Metropolitan Opera Company, and set a record for new American operas by being performed for three successive seasons after its debut at the Met in 1927. Taylor is survived by his daughter and grandson.

Purcell Signs Bonnie Guitar Pact

HOLLYWOOD—Gerard W. Purcell Associates has entered into an arrangement to handle the personal management, production and publishing activities of Bonnie Guitar. Bonnie Guitar is currently riding the country charts with "Get Your Lie The Way You Want It" on Dot for which she also produces independently. Purcell will also take over all of the artist's publishing firms which will be based in their west coast office. The firm will also handle recording, publishing and writing activities of Bonnie Guitar's daughter, Alexys, who also records for Dot.

W-P Sets Richard Holmes Promo

LOS ANGELES—Bud Dain, national sales promotion manager of World Pacific Records, has set a summer promotion on a half-dozen albums which feature the artistry of Richard "Groove" Holmes. The program is underway through July 29, 1966.

Holmes, currently riding the charts with "Misty" on Prestige, has several top items in the Pacific Jazz catalog including the new release, "Tell It Like It Tis." The others are "Richard Holmes, After Hours," "Somethin' Special," "You Better Believe It," "Groovin' With Jug" and "Groove."

A special display piece has been created by the firm's merchandising department and is available through World Pacific distributors.

Isaac Stern Completes Series Of Concerts, Sessions In U.K.

NEW YORK—Violinist Isaac Stern recently completed a series of concerts and Columbia recording sessions in Great Britain. Included were performances at the Llandaff Cathedral in Wales on June 15, the York Festival in Yorkshire on June 17, and London's Royal Festival Hall on June 19 and 23.

Stern played with and conducted the London Symphony Orchestra in works which included Vivaldi's Concertos in C Minor and in E-Flat; Mozart's Sinfonia Concertante for Violin, Viola and Orchestra; Bach's Violin Concerto in A Minor; and two compositions by Haydn, the Sinfonia Concertante for Violin, Oboe, Cello and Bassoon and the Violin Concerto in C.

Following the concert performances, the violinist recorded each of these works in London at Croydon Hall on June 24 and 25 for future release by Columbia Masterworks. Stern's recordings were produced under the supervision of Thomas Frost, executive producer of Masterworks A & R.

Columbia To Release LP On Bernstein Park Dates

NEW YORK—The New York Philharmonic, under the baton of Leonard Bernstein, has begun a series of 4 free park concerts, in conjunction with which, Columbia Records is releasing a specially-priced 2-LP set entitled "Leonard Bernstein Conducts A Concert In The Park," containing works performed in the concerts.

The Maestro and the Philharmonic have already put on a park concert in Milwaukee and on Jul. 26 they will appear in Central Park in New York, followed by a Jul. 29 appearance at Prospect Park in Brooklyn and a Jul. 30 concert at the Long Island Festival of Arts. The concerts are being presented under the joint sponsorship of the City of New York, the Joseph Schlitz Brewing Company and the New York Philharmonic.

Repertoire for all of the concerts includes Beethoven's Symphony No. 3 ("Eroica") and Le Sacre du printemps ("The Rite of Spring") by Stravinsky.

In addition to the widespread publicity being given the concerts in such magazines as Time and Life, Columbia Masterworks has designed a series of special ad mats, streamers and display pieces to publicize the LP. Production of the albums came under the supervision of Masterworks A&R director John McClure.

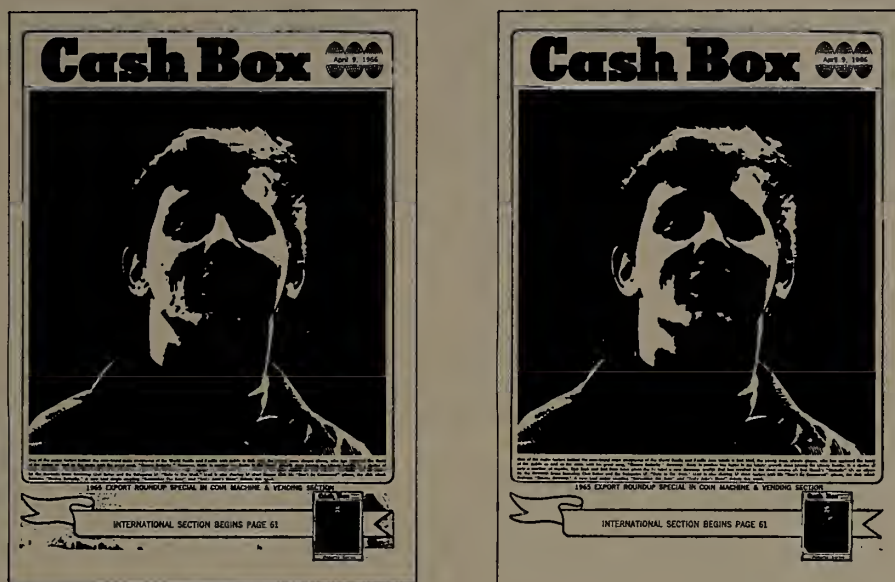
New Pubbery Bows In Galveston Area

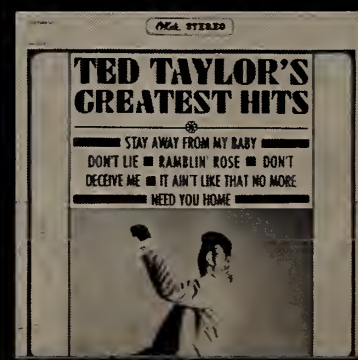

A&M's 'Guantanamera' Predates Castro Regime

HOLLYWOOD—In order to avoid any possible confusion in regard to a single by the Sandpipers tagged "Guantanamera," A&M Records last week underscored the point that the tune was written prior to the Cuban uprising and has no association whatsoever with the political situation in that country.

Tune was written by Marti, an exile from Cuba, and Angulo. Pete Seeger has also written an adaptation of the original song. "Guantanamera" is published by Fall River Music.

A&M had been informed that Fidel Castro embraced the song claiming it is associated with him. To squelch any possible political misunderstanding Jerry Moss, co-owner of the label, told Cash Box that the Cuban dictator's interest in the song is completely his own affair.



NEW VISTAS—Vet arranger John Abbott has joined the staff of Laurie Records and will be working directly with label president Gene Schwartz. His previous association with the label has included arrangements for "I'll Never Love Again" by the Four Coins and "Gingerbread" by The Tear Drops.

Abbott has also handled the arranging chores for the G Clefs on Seville, Frank Lyndon on Bang Records and the Daytrippers and Sonji (the ex Mrs. Cassius) Clay on American Music Maker Records.

He's also the arranging force behind "Coffee House Rendezvous," the song which is part of a documentary film on "The Coffee House Revolution for Teenagers," which was sponsored by The National Coffee Association.

TRO Acquires 2 New Legit Scores

NEW YORK—The Richmond Organization has acquired the rights to 2 new legit properties. Both shows will be in production in London later this year, with plans for Broadway presentations later.

David Platz, managing director of Essex Music of England, TRO's affiliate there, and vice president and director of international operations for TRO, who was in New York this week for conferences at the TRO offices here, said "The Three Musketeers," is set for late fall production by Bernard Delfont, while Leon Gluckman, currently represented on Broadway with the hit South African revue, "Wait a Minim," will stage a new musical, with the current working title of "Ordinary Audrey," in September.

Music for "The Three Musketeers" was written by Laurie Johnson, who co-authored "Lock Up Your Daughters" with Lionel Bart. Lyrics are by Herbert Kretzmer, who is remembered for his work on the hit, "Our Man Crichton." The show will be directed by Peter Coe, who also directed "Oliver."

"Ordinary Audrey" will star Anna Quayle, who received top reviews for her performance as the female lead of "Stop The World, I Want To Get Off". Music and lyrics are by Ted Dickson and Myles Rudge, respectively.

Temporary Injunction Stops Cartridge City From Selling Performances Of Col Artists

NEW YORK—Columbia Records has won the first round of its legal battle to curb the unauthorized duplication of its records and tapes.

A temporary injunction was recently granted in New York State Supreme Court by Judge Samuel M. Gold restraining Cartridge City, Ltd. and Cinematic, Ltd., of Garden City Park, New York, from selling without authorization tape cartridges containing the performances by artists under contract to Columbia.

The suit had been brought by Columbia on June 7 and charged the firms, which sell both cartridge players for automobile and home use as well as pre-recorded tape cartridges, with selling "dubbed" performances by such exclusive Columbia artists as Barbra Streisand, Jerry Vale, Andy Williams and Robert Goulet. The label charged that these performances were not only being duplicated without their authorization but that the quality of these dubbed tapes was inferior to their recordings from which the performances were taken. The complaint asked for an injunction, an award of damages and an accounting by Cartridge City of profits derived from the unauthorized duplication.

The action by the Court was hailed by Henry Brief, executive secretary of the Record Industry Association of America (RIAA) as a "prompt and decisive response which, it is hoped, will once and for all put an end to the growing practice of appropriating legitimate property of record companies for the private gain of a few individuals and dealers.

"Record companies have invested tremendous amounts of money as well as a great deal of creativity in recorded performances which have won favor with the public. No one should feel he has a license to appropriate those performances simply because technological progress has made the dubbing of such performances so easy. We hope the full force of the law will be brought to bear upon the violators."

Chalpin Files Suit Against Finley, ITCC & Others

NEW YORK—A \$2,500,000 damage suit has been filed in the Supreme Court of New York by Ed Chalpin of PPX Productions, this city, against Larry Finley, president of International Tape Cartridge Company (ITCC) and seven other defendants.

In his complaint, Chalpin, who claims to be one of the original partners in the formation of (ITCC) the tape duplicator and licensee, in May of 1965, charges conspiracy to deny him his interests in the company and failure to receive payment with regard to later selling out his share in the firm.

The other defendants are Finley Industries, Edward S. Joseph, Dextra Corp., ITCC's parent company, Stereo Devices, Audio Devices, E. Earle Smalley, Vance Foster and ITCC itself. Smalley is the chief executive officer of Dextra.

Originally, the complaint notes, ITCC was formed by Finley, Chalpin, Joseph and Foster. About a month after the formation, Chalpin decided, the complaint goes on, to exercise his agreement with Joseph to sell him his interest in ITCC for a sum of money. The complaint alleges that Joseph, a lawyer and 10% owner of ITCC, failed to make full payment and violated an escrow agreement, whereby certain documents, including Chalpin's resignation as a director and officer of the company, could not be delivered to Dextra unless full payment was made. Chalpin also claims he was not given notice of various meetings of ITCC's officers.

Capitol Sets 8-Track Pricing Structure

HOLLYWOOD—Stan Gortikov, president of Capitol's distributing arm (CRDC), announced last week prices and discounts for the label's 8-track stereo tape cartridges. According to Gortikov, the following pricing structure will take effect with Capitol's first stereo cartridge release on July 25:

One-album cartridge, both pop and classical (equivalent to one LP in length) will carry a suggested total price of \$7.98. Two-album cartridges, both pop and classical (equivalent to two LP's in length) will carry a suggested total price of \$9.98. Broadway show and soundtrack cartridges will carry a suggested total price of \$7.98. Basis trade discount will be 38% off the suggested total. Consistent with CRDC's pricing policy on disk albums, one price will prevail to all classifications of customers. An additional 2½% will be allowed on all tape cartridges purchases of \$200 or more.

In announcing the policy, Gortikov stressed that CRDC's price structure differs in several ways from those currently being practiced by other distributors. While single-album packs retail for \$1 more than most competitive cartridges, the total price on the two-album cartridge is the same as competitive product and \$2 more than the single cartridge.

CRDC's basic trade discount of 38 percent also differs from the industry "norm" of 33½ percent. Gortikov said CRDC has set a higher figure in

order to follow more closely the prevailing industry discount structure for LP disk albums and to improve retailer margins.

Gortikov pointed out that while "The tape cartridge offers a burgeoning new market for recorded entertainment, such an exciting item from its inception should not be destined as a 'loss leader' with inadequate margins. Adequate, realistic margins are necessary to offset the high risks faced by all manufacturing and distribution echelons because of the mechanical vulnerability, high out-of-pocket costs, and low salvage value of 8-track cartridges."

"CRDC's prices," he said, "were arrived at after a great deal of research into the market. Considerably more facts are known at the time original competitive prices were initiated. The new CRDC schedule yields more realistic margins than those inherent in previously-set competitor prices and discounts."

Gortikov also said that CRDC's prices were aimed to give emphasis to the value of the double-album cartridge, "A package that provides the consumer with twice as much music as the single-album cartridge for only \$2 (total) more."

"Many labels," he concluded, "have ignored the 'reasons for being' of the 8-track principle, namely, its capacity for extensive musical playing time. This unique characteristic makes the 8-track cartridges ideally suited to double-album couplings."

Dot-Martin Prod. Deal

LOS ANGELES—Randy Wood, president of Dot Records, announced last week the signing of a contract with Tony Martin and his newly formed production company, Nitco Productions, for release through Dot of at least 3 singles and 2 albums a year.

The first single under the new pact, a Dick Pierce-produced recording, was released last week. It couples "Alfie" with "Who's Afraid?"

From the chanter's previous association with Dot came two albums—"Fly Me To The Moon" and "Tony Martin—His Greatest Hits," which are still among the best-sellers in the label's catalog.

Martin is currently doing several engagements in New York and expects to promote the single in that area.

Simon & Garfunkel On European Jaunt

NEW YORK—Columbia hit-making duo Simon and Garfunkel, currently riding high with "I Am A Rock," have recently embarked on a tour of Europe for extensive television appearances.

On June 23, the pair left for Paris, where they spent four days taping a number of TV shows, and, beginning June 28, they made a series of TV appearances in Holland. From July 1 thru 3 they also did a variety of video shots in Stockholm, followed by a trip to Aalborg, Denmark, where they participated in the Danish government's celebration of the Fourth of July.

Last week (5-9) they were guests on several programs in London, while plans are underway for them to do a TV special for the BBC during their stay in England.

Following their tour of Europe, Simon and Garfunkel will return to the States, where they are slated for appearances at the Malibu Beach Club in Long Island on July 15; Hampton Beach, N. Hampshire on July 16; and the Carousel Theatre in Framingham, Mass. on July 17.

Tentative plans are in the works for the pair to tour the Soviet Union later this year.

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Epic Has Summer Selling Streak

NEW YORK—Epic Records is enjoying a major summer selling streak in singles and albums for the fifth consecutive year, according to an announcement made last week by Len Levy, the label's vice-president and general manager.

Epic is currently well represented on the Top 100 with singles by two British groups: "Over Under Side-ways Down," by the Yardbirds, and "Please Tell Me Why" by the Dave Clark Five. Public interest in the Dave Clark Five is at its peak as a result of the group's current tour of the U.S.

In the country field the label is

cashing in with the fast-rising "Almost Persuaded" by David Houston, which shows signs of becoming the songster's biggest Epic single to date.

The Okeh label is creating R&B attention with "Poor Dog" by Little Richard and "It's An Uphill Climb To The Bottom" by Walter Jackson.

Some 3000 of Town Hall's oldies line are included in "The Town Hall Golden Oldies" catalog, produced and edited by Reminick. This catalog is sold to the oldie hobbyist for 50¢. Pointing up the strength of the oldie trade is the fact that dealers are being sold the catalog for 30¢, one of the rare instances in which dealers are asked to pay for a catalog of a company's wares. "Even retailers who had a wise-guy attitude when first confronted with a cost factor for the catalog are buying," Reminick says.

An outstanding feature of an oldies line for a dealer, Reminick says, is that such inventory is never obsolete. Sales can come at any time.

Claims the one-stopper: "It's like money in the bank."

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Seeger School Ban Ruled Unconstitutional

NEW YORK—New York State's Court of Appeals ruled last week that it was unconstitutional for a Long Island school board to have barred Pete Seeger from giving a concert, last March, in the school auditorium.

The performance, which was sponsored by the East Meadow Community Concerts Association was publicized and sold out long in advance of the planned performance, when the school board of the Union Free School District No. 3, which had granted permission for the concert in Dec. 1965 withdrew that permission on the grounds that Seeger had given a concert in Moscow and that some of the songs he sings are critical of American policy in Viet Nam. The board further alleged that Seeger was a "highly controversial figure" whose presence might trigger a disturbance dangerous to school property.

The majority opinion stated that a school board is permitted to bar the use of a school auditorium for an unlawful purpose, "but in the case before us justification asserts for canceling the permit is the unpopularity of Seeger's views rather than the unlawfulness of the plaintiff's concert."

Harnick, Strouse & Adams To Write Special Material For AGAC's 35th Anniversary

NEW YORK—Sheldon Harnick, Charles and Lee Adams will join creative forces to write original material for the 35th Anniversary Ball of the American Guild of Authors and Composers (AGAC). The music and lyrics by Harnick, lyricist of "Fiddler On The Roof," and Strouse and Adams, composer and lyric writer of "Superman," will be produced by the writers guild on Oct. 27, 1966 at the Plaza Hotel here.

The unusual collaboration of these three members of AGAC will be a highlight of the evening, according to Edward Heyman, chairman of the Anniversary Ball.

Charles Strouse has been appointed head of the entertainment committee for the Guild affair, which will celebrate 35 years of achievement in behalf of the professional American composer and lyricist of popular music in the realms of improved contracts, royalty collection, copyright reform, etc.

Lorber Inks Invitations

NEW YORK—The Invitations have been signed to an exclusive recording contract by Alan Lorber Productions.

Lorber will a&r the group's first session this week.

Rock Era Writers Moving In On Broadway

NEW YORK—Writers deeply involved in the growth of rock 'n roll will be making their first Broadway musical stands next season.

Jerry Lieber & Mike Stoller, who have penned and produced some of the industry's biggest teen-market hits, will be represented with a musicalized version of Robert Gover's best-selling novel, "\$100 Misunderstanding," which Hilly Elkins is putting on next season (see separate story). Also, Sherman Edwards, composer of Johnny Mathis' first hit, "Wonderful! Wonderful!" and some film songs for Elvis Presley, has penned his initial Broadway musical. Called "1776," it involves the events and personalities that surround the writing of the Dec-

laration of Independence. Edwards, a former high school history teacher, is writing the words and music and book for the show, expected to debut sometime in the late fall or winter. Edwards is also the writer of "See You In September," the old teen hit currently enjoying a revival via the Happenings on B. T. Puppy Records.

Although definite plans have not been revealed as yet, it is known that Don Kirshner is grooming some of his Screen Gems-Columbia writing talent for Broadway properties. A more distant possibility is an eventual Broadway (or London) musical with words and music by John Lennon & Paul McCartney, the Beatleites.

Mercury Unveils New Cartridge Units At NAMM Meet

CHICAGO—The two-pronged offensive, announced early in June by Mercury Records' home entertainment division and its recorded tape division, and designed to establish the Philips system of stereo cartridge tape record-and-playback system in the U.S., is on display this week at the NAMM convention in Chicago.

The firm is showing home-oriented and automobile stereo cartridge units at the show and an initial release of 49 pre-recorded stereo tape cartridges to playback on the Philips system.

Engineered solely to convert existing recorded music playback systems in the home to the additional use of Philips stereo cartridges are two economy-priced cartridge tape units. The walnut cased units with hinged lids are a little larger than a table-top cigarette case, measuring 8"x5"x2 3/4". The TP 4400 stereo playback unit lists at \$49.95, while the TR 4450 stereo playback and record unit lists at \$79.95. Both units boast fast forward and rewind of an hour-long cartridge in only 70 seconds; one knob fingertip control; completely solid state circuitry; full AC operation and UL approval. The TR 4450 also comes equipped with a VU recording meter.

The third new Mercury unit in the unveiling functions independently of any other music playback system. The TR 8700, listing at \$159.95, is a completely portable stereo cartridge tape recorder, which has a powerful 14-transistor, six diode, four varistor circuitry; 1 7/8 ips constant speed capstan drive; push button controls for start, stop, fast forward and rewind; independent volume and tone controls; input and output connections, including stereo headset jack plus facilities for recording and playback thru radio, phono, TV set or other tape recorder. The tape recorder has twin 3"x5" speakers, remote start/stop built into two omni-directional microphones; and two VU meters showing the levels on each channel, plus battery condi-

tion. The 10-pound stereo tape recorder comes in a hi-impact polystyrene case, is battery powered on four 1/4 "d" cells and has a built-in AC adapter enabling the unit to be plugged into any standard AC outlet, simultaneously rejuvenating the batteries. The TR 8700 price also includes five pre-recorded tapes from the combined Mercury, Philips, Smash, Fontana and Limelight catalogs. Optional equipment includes a pin plug patch cord and a telephone pickup.

Perry Winokur, product manager of the Mercury home entertainment products division, said that the Philips tape system has demonstrated many important practical advantages during its two-year marketing cycle in Europe and the Orient. It is, he asserts, the only cartridge playback system that provides rapid selectivity of individual excerpts of recorded music within the cartridge through its exclusive fast forward and fast reverse feature. Additionally, no other system provides for personal recordings. The Philips system provides for either recording through its own self-contained mike or through a jack in a radio, record player, or tape recorder. A blocking device prevents accidental erasure of pre-recorded tapes, making another important functional advantage, Winokur said.

To provide an adequate selection of pre-recorded music for these units, Tom Bonetti, production manager of the firm's recorded tape division, stated that the first Philips system release of 49 stereo cartridges will include 26 albums from the Mercury catalog, eight from Philips, seven from Smash, three from Fontana and five from Limelight. Among the artists included are Johnny Mathis, Roger Miller, the 4 Seasons, the Smothers Brothers, Antal Dorati and John Coltrane, to name a few.

Currently, plans call for Mercury's recorded tape division to release subsequent Philips-tape cartridges in stereo only. The design of the Philips recorder head and the placement of the tape tracks is such that the monaural head can pick up both stereo tracks to provide excellent mono reproduction. This compatible feature makes it possible to play Philips system pre-recorded stereo cartridges on monaural units, such as the \$79.95 TR 8000 which Mercury has been marketing for four months. Winokur and Bonetti will helm a sales meeting of the entire Mercury sales force nation-wide Saturday (9).

Joanie Sommers was recently captured as she and producer Allen Stanton went over the charts for the lark's Columbia latest single "Alfie." The Bacharach-David tune, which was inspired by the British film of the same name, has just been released.

Mickie Most/Donovan Pact

NEW YORK—English indie producer Mickie Most, responsible for many trans-Atlantic hits with such artists as the Nashville Teens ("Tobacco Road,"), the Animals, and Herman's Hermits, has added another of his countrymen, Donovan, to his roster of artists. "Sunshine Superman," the initial effort under the agreement, has just been released by Epic. The Most/Donovan/Epic pact was negotiated through the producer's manager, Alan Klein, who also finalized the new long-term contract between Mickie Most and Herman's Hermits.

Nobody's paying attention to the lyrics of the winning song in the 6th annual German Pop Music Festival held recently in Baden-Baden. The song "Beiss nicht gleich in jeden Apfel" (Don't Bite into Every Apple) earned Polydor's Wencke Myhre the first place prize. The prize winning song was written by Hans Last and Werner Raschek and published by Minerva Music. Hansa Records Elisa Gabbai (I) finished second with her "Nur wenn du bei mir bist" (Only When You're with Me) written by Kurt Lindenau & Rolf Piro and published by Tutti Music with 79 points, just one point ahead of Polydor's Roy Black (R) who sang "Irgend jemand liebt auch dich" (Someone Loves You, Too) written by Christain Bruhn and Michael Holm and published by Edition Intro, which finished third. Wencke's winning entry garnered 146 points. The festival, which is an annual event, has accounted for sales of close to a million records every year since the festival started and is the meeting place of the German industry every year. The complete story of the festival appears on this week's International News Report page.



HOLLAND

The representing firm in Holland for American Polaroid cameras has introduced the "Swinger", a cheap type for the teen-age market. Phonogram worked out a cooperative campaign, by recording a Lodewijk Post original "Kiek Kado" (Snapshot Present) by Rob de Nijs for the Philips label. The song sings the praises of the fun offered by the possibilities when using the Swinger camera as an effective instrument for flirtation, boy hunting girl with snapshots made on the spot. Shortly after release of this hit single, Rob de Nijs with Swinger camera and accompanied by three pretty young girls with small tape recorders playing the Kiek-Kado song, went out into main streets of large Dutch cities, where the popular singer Rob de Nijs made snapshots of passers-by who received a signed print of their pictures. . . . Large Dutch dealers cooperated in the record promotion and had the singer sell his hit indoors.

English group the Fortunes, Decca artists, made two very successful tours through Holland during the second half of June. They played six concerts in all parts of the country. Their tour had a strong effect on the sales of Fortunes recordings like "Here It Comes Again," "You've Got Your Troubles" and of course their version of "This Golden Ring."

Otto Vriezenburg, Phonogram label manager for Philips popular, drew our attention to French singer Georgette Lemaire. The young Parisienne, a very attractive woman whose voice reminds the listener of the late Piaf's, could certainly develop into a world star, the more so as her repertoire includes the great French standard chansons but with a more contemporary flavor and arrangement. Philips France recently contracted Georgette Lemaire and PPI/Phonogram will release her first LP and a single from this album early in July, to pave the way for large publicity expansion concerning Lemaire this winter.

It is remarkable that a persisting demand keeps existing for so-called "popular electronic music." Holland possesses a musician who is very much specialized in this particular field, Tom Dissevelt. Many of Dissevelt's LP productions created with the help of Philips electronic equipment, have reached interesting international turn-overs, so that continuation was certainly to be justified. Dissevelt's latest LP is called "Fantasy In Orbit," electronic sound impressions (surprisingly emotional and romantic!) of the most recent American achievements in space conquering. The Philips-album is available both in monaural and stereo pressings.

The English "Mini Fashion" blew over to Holland, in particular the skirt lengths. Dutch beat-group the Young Ones have recorded "Mini-Minnie," devoted to the standard type of modern girl who is strictly obedient to the latest fashion. (Philips)-Phonogram hastened to rush-release a fine Dave Berry recording of "Mama" on the Decca label. Also hot off the PPI presses came "Turkey Stomp" by the Living End and "Hey Joe!" by the Leaves, both on Fontana.

Parlophone hits the July market with new single tracks by Cilla Black ("Don't Answer Me") and the Hollies ("Bus Stop"). Columbia in Holland unfolded Dutch singer Greetje Kauffeld's German made LP "Sunday Melody" last week. Also for release went the label's 7-inch "Attica Nights," featuring the music of George Zambetas and Jerry Allen's single "Fuzz Duck," the latter being pre-released earlier this month.

Liberty has a new Ventures album on the stands, containing the group's "Batman Theme," "00.711," "Secret Agent Man" and "Green Hornet."

His Master's Voice's Rien Heeremans reported the release of the Swinging Blue Jeans' "Sandy"/"I'm Gonna Have You" and now prepares extensive distribution of displays and colorful, eye-catching posters in favour of Bert Weedon's "Kick Off" single, featuring the signature tune of an exciting series of Worldcup football games on TV during the second half of July.

Bovema's Capitol chief Roel Kruize gave special notice to dealers concerning AVRO's TV program "Rooster" which featured the Beach Boys' "Sloop John B." The group's new album "Pet Sounds" has been subject of an extensive promotional campaign this week, which also covered the teenager music-press. The Beach Boys are now well at the peak of their popularity in this country.

Newspapers in Holland did big feature articles on Yehudi Menuhin last week, when the famous HMV violinist appeared in concert with the Concertgebouworchestra under Pierre Boulez in Amsterdam.

Parlophone sent attractive pictures with special attached "Paperback" strips to dealers for further promotion of the Beatles' new double hit "Paperback Writer/Rain." The record is still doing great business in this market.

Bovema's His Master's Voice label released Adamo's new EP-disc containing four highly selective songs of recent vintage, "Elle Etait Belle Pourtant," "Tu Me Reviens," "Ton Nom" and "Du Soleil, Du Boulot." Also out this week is Toon Hermans' "Marie"/"Vandaag" (Today) single. Hermans, who should launch his One Man Show on Broadway in the fall, postponed this unique U.S. stint on his doctor's advice until next year and now prepares his new show.

More than 40 years of steady tradition in the repertoire of songs being used by children of elementary schools will be firmly broken by the Haarlem publishers "De Toorts." A huge selection of fresh, new songs written by the country's best specialists of the kind, will yearly be distributed among subscribers. Bovema's Columbia label closely cooperates with "De Toorts" to release 30 songs on three 7" records, scheduled to hit this market in the course of July. The press and AVRO-TV have paid special attention to the recordings made by school children under the supervision of Chris Rabé, who teaches music at the Municipal Training School for Schoolteachers in Amsterdam. Rather than make use of professional children's choirs, the series "Zingen Van Allerlei Dingen" are meant to stimulate the idea of spontaneous class singing. The cover designs will also be made by children.

It is now certain that the NCRV-TV will air the much talked about Sinatra TV show "A Man And His Music." Broadcasting is scheduled for September in order to give it full publicity. In the meantime, Sinatra is still high on the Dutch charts with his big hit "Strangers In The Night" while the first sales reaction on his golden standard series show surprising figures.

Peter Alexander, hot German Ariola singer, is also making a TV show. Negram, distributor of Ariola in Holland, is currently negotiating with Fred Bredschneider of KRO television for the Dutch airing. On the way to the Dutch market are a new single and a new long play album by the artist. Single is called "Ich Liebe Das Leben," the album is called "Pariser Geschichte" as a successor of his big selling LP "Wiener Geschichte."

Hot Elektra/Vogue artists in Holland at this moment include Tom Rush, Josh White, the Greenbriar Boys and "Spider" John Koerner.

Robert Oeges, managing director of Negram-Delta, visited Vogue, Paris last week in order to discuss preparations for the 5 winning dealers of the Mode show window contest who will make a long weekend trip to Paris in the near future. Oeges talked with Cabat of Vogue.

The new Kinks hit "Sunny Afternoon" sold more than 20,000 records in its first week, an all-time high with the Negram Company. It looks as if there's no weak summer season for this active firm. The record will rocket to the top of the Dutch charts.

Pete Felleman of Artone's Funckler Dept. released Margie Ball's fourth single waxing for the label, "After All" c/w "Will You," both penned by the 18-year old Bandung-born thrush. Being among this year's Dutch singers competing in the forthcoming Knokke Song Festival (Belgium), dark-tressed Margie is expected to cut a good figure with her own stuff.

Festival recording artists Les Surfs visited Holland in order to make a guest appearance on the new Catherina Valente Show, video-taped at the Carré Theatre in Amsterdam. Recent Artone releases from the Festival catalogue include new recordings by Michel Delpech, Pierre Sauvill, Rosalie Dubois, Reinaldo, the Executives, Les Surfs, Raphaël and Frida Boccaro.

From the Epic line the following new single material has been released by Funckler in Benelux: the Remains with "Diddy Wah Diddy," Bobby Vinton with "Dum-De-Da" and the Village Stompers with "Second Hand Rose" b/w "A Lover's Concerto." In the classical field the following album additions have been made available: The Cleveland Orchestra conducted by George Szell performing works of Beethoven, Debussy, Ravel and Tchaikovsky, Igor Kipnis playing Italian Baroque Music for Harpsichord, and Maurice Sharp presenting "Music For A Golden Flute."

Simon & Garfunkel visited Holland for the first time for TV appearances on local NCRV-TV, on June 28 and 29. CBS recently released their hit singles "Homeward Bound" and "I Am A Rock" b/w "Flowers Never Bend With The Rainfall" and they are still climbing the Dutch single charts. The TV recording of Paul Simon and Art Garfunkel will be aired later on. Simon & Garfunkel were accompanied by their manager Mort Lewis and his wife.

Dutch classical magazine "Luister" recently awarded the CBS Album containing Tchaikovsky's Piano Concertos Nos. 2 & 3 performed by Gary Graffman and the Philadelphia Orchestra conducted by Eugene Ormandy, the traditional "7 Stars." The review hailed this Album as "phenomenal" and also praised the technical merits of this recording.

Among the recent CBS additions to the single field is Susan Christie's "I Love Onions" b/w "Take Me As You Find Me." This single already promised a break-out on the U.S. charts and CBS has high hopes for this funny tune in Holland.

New CBS additions to the popular LP field include a wonderful LP by Tony Bennett, entitled "Songs For The Jet Set" featuring "If I Ruled The World," an album by the German CBS group the Gisha Brothers, entitled "Dance Party In Stereo," the Immanuel Fisher Choir with their first CBS LP "A Jewish Holiday Album" as well as an album entitled "Beat Meets Folk" featuring such various artists as Pete Seeger, Boy Dylan, the Brothers Four, Paul Revere & the Raiders and the New Christy Minstrels, and an LP record by Jerry Murad's Harmonicats, entitled "What's New Harmonicats" featuring such items as "Turn! Turn! Turn!," "Yesterday," "Mr Tambourine Man" and "Like A Rolling Stone."

One of the most important releases of this week is the Original Broadway Cast of "Camelot" featuring Richard Burton, Julie Andrews and Robert Goulet.

The young CBS pianist Andre Watts made a very successful appearance at the Amsterdam Concertgebouw. Andre Watts performed the Liszt Piano Concerto No 1 with the Amsterdam Concertgebouw Orchestra conducted by Karel Ancéril. The concert was given in connection with the Holland Festival and the audience cheered Andre Watts after his wonderful interpretation of the Liszt Concerto.

CBS Switzerland In The Works

SWITZERLAND—After the opening of CBS Records Austrian subsidiary, a similar policy has been adopted in Switzerland and CBS Records Inc. of Zug will take over the Swiss distribu-

tion of CBS records at the end of the year. The CBS catalog is very strongly established in the Swiss market, where it has been handled previously by Phonag.

Basart & Gerig Form Holland Partnership

HOLLAND—Basart, one of the most active Benelux publishers, has formed a partnership with Hans Gerig of Cologne to exploit the Gerig material

in Holland and Belgium. The new firm established in Amsterdam will operate under the name *Nederland Gerig Basart NGB*.

Local Hits Making 'Down Under' Scene

SYDNEY—The developing music and disc industry picture here indicates a growing pattern of locally originated production in both writing and recording activity, in a country whose hit parade has for some time past looked much like a carbon copy of British and American charts.

Right now, the changing picture finds several important locally-originated disks hitting, including the big name Easybeats with "Come And See Her" and "Hitch Hiker" by Bobby and Laurie, but at least one music entity, Essex Music of Australia Pty. Ltd., operated by Barry Kimberley, is generating substantial additional action along the same lines.

Kimberley, general manager of the firm, which is affiliated with The Richmond Organization in the United States, has just jacked up three new

local recordings of songs reaching here from other nations. In addition, Kimberley is working closely with a number of established and up-and-coming writers on the Australian front.

The new Australian-recorded disks include the Normie Rowe waxing of "The Stones I Throw," written by Robbie Robertson and originating through TRO's Hollis Music in the United States; a side by Tony Worsley, titled "Knocking On Wood," written by Les Van Dyke, and published by Down Beat Music Ltd. in London, England; and "Strange," recorded by Ray Brown. The song was written by J. and R. C. Stapley and Merle Kilgore and first published by Al Gallico Music in New York.

Kimberley's efforts on behalf of Australian writers, also led to a recent recording by Anthony Newley on RCA Victor in America of the song, "Why Can't You Try To Digger-ido," written by local composers, Frank Hardy and David Boyd. The Allen Brothers, of Australia, also recently cut "First Kiss" and "My Secret," for Pye Records here. The songs, both written by Elaine Goddard, who is also associated with Essex Music of Australia, were later both released in the Allen Brothers version on the now defunct Colpix label.

Schein, deRougemont Trip

PARIS—At the end of August, Harvey Schein, vice president of CBS International and Peter de Rougemont, vice president of European operations, will visit Scandinavia to assess the market and formulate future plans with CBS and Epic licensees in Finland, Sweden, Norway and Denmark.

Delyse's Mahler Disk Rates As Firm's Best

LONDON—Delyse's recording of Gustav Mahler's "Des Knaben Wunderhorn" is proving to be the company's greatest achievement to date. The critical acclaim accorded to the work by the British Press has reached American ears and the album is to be released there in November by Capitol Records through Angel Records. As already reported in Cash Box, Delyse recorded the album in Watford Town Hall using British artists Janet Baker and Geraint Evans, a British Orchestra The London Philharmonic and a British conductor Wyn Morris. Delyse's managing director Isabella Wallich, who produced and recorded the work, is a niece of the celebrated recording pioneer F. W. Gaisberg.

German Pop Music Fest: The 'Apple' Of Its Eye In Artist & Material

The top event of the year, the German Pop Music Festival, was held recently in Baden-Baden and Polydor's Wencke Myhre ran away with first place with the song "Beiss Nicht Gleich In Jeden Apfel (Don't Bite Into Every Apple)," written by Hans Blum and Werner Raschek and published by Minerva Music.

The song garnered 146 votes to beat out Hansa's Elisa Gabbai and "Nur Wenn Du Bei Mir Bist" (Only When You're With Me) written by Kurt Lindenau and Rolf Piro and published by Tutti Music which gathered 79 points and another Polydor artist Roy Black who picked up 78 points with "Irgend Jemand Liebt Auch Dich" (Someone Loves You Too) which was written by two time festival winner Christian Bruhn and young composer Michael Holm and published by Intro Music.

The Festival's Beginnings

The whole thing got started back in 1961 when the German authors got together with the record industry and under the direction of Erich Schulze of GEMA the first festival of Pop Music in Germany was born. At that time, only members of the GEMA could enter, and the voting was divided between the test of television viewers, the audience in the hall and the juries in the radio stations in Germany. Winner in the first year was a tango, "Bailando A Dos," performed by Alfred Hause and his Hamburg Radio Orchestra. The song was low in votes through TV and audience tests but the radio station block gave their companion enough votes to garner him first place. The song did not do well sales wise in Germany, and it was decided to do away with instrumental tunes for future festivals. In 1962, the tune "Zwei Kleine Italiene" (Two Little Italians) performed by Conny Froeboess of Electrola ran away with first place, and also did a tremendous sale not only in Germany but all over Europe. The tune was written by Christian Bruhn and Georg Buschor who also wrote the winning song in 1964. In the second year of the festival, the tunes dominated the hit parade for months after the festival was over and interest became keen to get a song placed in the contest. In 1963, a young Danish cutie Gitte took first place honors with her "Ich Will 'Nen Cowboy Als Mann" (I Want To Marry A Cowboy), which also racked up terrific sales. The tune was written by publisher Rudi von der Dovenmuhle and A&R man Nils Nobach. 1964 saw the Scandinavian wave continue as Siw Malmkvist took first place honors with "Liebeskummer Lohnt Sich Nicht" (It Doesn't Pay To Be Love-sick) and in 1965 the U.S.A.'s Peggy March ran away with the contest with "Mit 17 Hat Man Noch Traeume" (At 17 You Still Have Dreams). The tune was written by Heinz Korn of Gerig Music. All the above mentioned tunes were absolute chart toppers here but 1965 saw a split in the festival as the record industry was accused of controlling entries and the tunes. Dr. Schulze resigned as head of the festival, but soon afterwards, the "Organization for the advancement of German dance and Entertainment music" was born to take over the leadership of the festival.

3 Firms Absent

This year's event was marred by the absence of 3 major record firms, Teldec, Electrola and Metronome which did not send artists to the event, but all of the glitter and glamour, the excitement and the publicity that belong at a festival were on hand for the well run event.

The 1966 festival was open to all citizens and residents of long standing in Germany and over 400 tunes were judged by the jury to pick the

18 songs for the preliminary rounds. The prelims were held in Berlin with the television audience picking the top 12 tunes for the finals. The final event, which has long been a meeting place for the entire German record industry and representatives of many other countries, started with a party on Friday evening at the Windeck Castle where the city of Baden-Baden hosted the industry press. The annual Baden-Baden radio awards for the most performed songs of 1965 according to GEMA records were presented to Christian Bruhn and Georg Buschor for their 1964 festival winner "Liebeskummer Lohnt Sich Nicht," which was the first time that a festival tune had won the "Golden Sparrow." The tune was published by Peter Meisel's Intro Music. The "Silver Sparrow" award went to the tune "Humba Humba Taetaerae," which has become a standard carnival hit in Germany written by Tony Haemmerle and published by Johann Michel's Melodie Der Welt Music, and the "Bronze Sparrow" was awarded to Lothar Olias and Walter Rothenberg for "So Ein Tag So Wunderschoen Wie Heute" (A Day As Wonderful As This One), published by Hans Sikorski Music. The tunes are not new, but the awards are given according to actual collections by GEMA for performances and mechanical fees and represent real money making hits.

Voting Results

A press conference was held on Saturday where the festival organization and future were discussed. The main problem arising was the fact that the artists get more push than the composers of the tunes, and the festival committee has decided to consider having 2 or more artists perform each song next year to give the songs more weight. The evening of the festival carried by national German TV showed the following results during the voting.

Song number 1 "Es Koennte Liebe Sein" (This Could Be Love) sung by Polydor's Lill Lindfors picked up 23 points from the radio station jury, 15 points from the TV viewers and 11 points from the audience for a total of 49 points and 5th place. Song number 2, "Wanderer Ohne Ziel" (Wanderer Without A Goal) sung from Ariola's Tielman Brothers garnered 12 points from the radio stations, 13 points from the TV viewers and 6 points from the audience for a total of 31 points and 7th place. Song number 3 "So Alt Wie Die Welt" (As Old As The World) sung from Polydor's Brigitt Petry racked up 30 points from the radio stations, 13 points from the TV viewers and 8 points from the audience for 51 points and 4th place. Song number 4 "In Der Grosse Manege," performed by Polydor's Wolfgang Graf, picked up 4 points from the radio stations, 11 points from the TV viewers and 4 points from the audience for 19 points and 12th place. Song number 5 "Aber Du Laesst Dich Nicht Seh'n (But You Don't Let Me See You) performed by Polydor's Margot Eskens gathered 8 points from the radio stations, 18 points from the TV viewers and 1 point in the audience for 27 points and 10th place. Song number 6 "Wie Der Wind" from Mary Roos from Ariola got 15 points from the radio station jury, 14 points from the TV audience and 15 points from the audience in the hall for a total of 44 points and 6th place. Song number 7, "So Ist Ein Boy" (That's What A Boy Is) done by CBS stars the Jacob Sisters gathered 4 points from the radio stations, 19 points from the TV viewers and 7 points from the audience for a total of 30 points and 8th place. Song number 8, "Nur Wenn Du Bei Mir Bist" (Only When You're

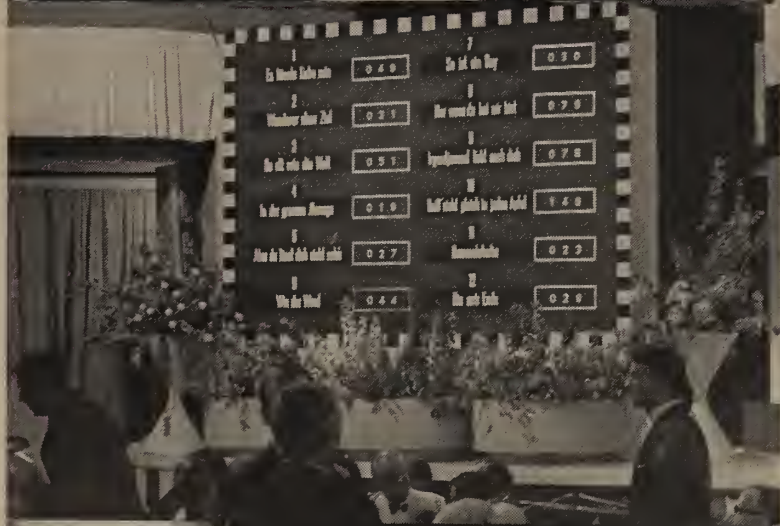


GERMANY

Although the Beatles' tour of Germany and the German Pop Music Festival took up most of the news space for this week, there's still plenty to report. For instance, it looks like the Walker Brothers are finally breaking through in Germany. Their hit "The Sun Ain't Gonna Shine" is an absolute best seller here and the group is finally getting the publicity they deserve. The path is set for a fine career here for the two expatriot Americans who went to England to make their career. Of course, Philips releases their records here. Other top U.S. talents to finally make the grade here include the Mamas & The Papas who are now in the top 10 with their "Monday, Monday" and of course, the Beach Boys enjoying their 2nd number 1 with "Sloop John B" and Nancy Sinatra who also has her second smash hit here with "How Does That Grab You Darlin'?" The "outsiders" making the grade are the Peels who hold down the number 2 slot with their "Juanita Banana." It took a couple of German versions to make the public realize what the lyrics were all about but as soon as that happened, the record broke and is now over the 100,000 mark in sales. The group even broke tradition by appearing on their own Karate label here and their second record "Scrooey Mooney" even appears on the same label though distributed by a different firm here.

England is well represented chart wise as well here with the Beatles, the Rolling Stones, Chris Andrews and Cliff Richard all holding down top 10 slots. Peggy March of the U.S.A. is also a top tenner but is almost considered a "German" artist as she had one hit after another here in the German language. It's foreign artists leading the chart lists as usual in Germany. Of the 16 top 10 tunes listed in our two lists, 8 are English language tunes and 8 German language tunes. 6 of the tunes are actual German compositions and of all the artists listed with different versions of the tunes, 6 of the artists, Heidi Bruhl, Draf & the Magics, Freddy Quinn, Bernd Spier and Peter Alexander and Vicky (whose father is Greek) are German and 13 including the above mentioned artists and Nana Mouskouri from Greece, Mal Sondock from the U.S. and Billy Mo from Trinidad who all sing in German, are foreign artists.

Interesting statistics from the 3rd biggest record market in the world. That's it for this week in Germany.

CANADA

A tremendous boost for Canadian talent was the recent article in the entertainment section of a Saturday edition of the Toronto Daily Star. It devoted an entire page to the developing "Toronto sound" in particular and Canadian talent on records in general. The article, including pictures, likens the burgeoning record business in this country to England in that period just immediately prior to the world-wide acceptance of the Beatles et al. It could happen here—soon. Things are really swinging on Canada's west coast. The word comes along from pretty Peggy Keenan, P.R. gal at Vancouver's CKLG. Big record, number one as a matter of fact, currently is "Barefootin'" by Robert Parker. 'LG Morning Man, Roy Hennessy, calls "Cool Jerk" by the Capitols, "Oh How Happy" by the Shades Of Blue and "Love Letters" by Elvis as really big winners on his early AM spin sessions on CKLG. The hit bound action of the Presley single ties in nicely with the Vancouver preview of his new movie, "Paradise Hawaiian Style." "Friday's Child" by Nancy Sinatra appears to be a top tenner on the coast outlet for sure. Best of the Canadian releases currently being played heavily on CKLG is "Brainwashed" by David Clayton Thomas and the Bossmen. "Strangers In The Night," both versions, are getting heavy exposure by all Vancouver stations, reports Peggy. The James Brown P.A., set for July 19th, will be under the sponsorship of CKLG, and is to be held at the P.N.E. Forum. Herb Alpert's new single, "Work Song" and "I Saw Her Again" by the Mamas and Pappas seem sure things for top ten action at CKLG. Good to hear about west coast doin's from such a well-informed source. Barry Paine has a flock of big singles at Compo of late. "Friday's Child," although very different to the last two Nancy Sinatra chart outings, appears to be headed for the success, both on the air and in the retail outlets. "One Too Many Mornings" by the Beau Brummels on Warners is increasing slowly across Canada. "Happy Summer Days," by Ronnie Dove is a confirmed smash in all Canadian centres reports Barry. Two top attractions from the Compo family have appeared recently in eastern Canada. Wilma Burgess of Decca fame, and the Everly Bros. have both appeared in person in the area. Both have done big business.

It's going to be a sizzling summer at the Sparton H.Q. in London. Harold Pounds long distances that he can't keep distributors stocked on the firm's four big single smashes. "Sweet Pea" by Tommy Roe, "Let's Get Stoned" by Ray Charles, "Dirty Water" by the Standells, and "Hey Joe" by the Leaves are all selling in top ten quantities, and happily for Harold, all at once. Some stations have declined to program the Charles single, but it hasn't hurt sales one bit says Harold. A great new LP, just released, will keep things bubbling for the Standells. It should take over where the single (it's on the album too) leaves off and blast radio transmitters across Canada throughout the Summer. John Pozer in touch with Ottawa with word on the new Don Norman release. He reports that the side that was originally figured to be the "B" side has broken wide open. "All Of My Life" is set for a U.S. release on MGM reports Pozer. It is very big in the Ottawa area, appearing on playlists in that city and neighbouring centres of Cornwall and Smiths Falls. Orval Prophet has a new single out on Sparton in Canada, and Starday in the U.S. "Acres Of Heartaches" is reportedly going the pop route in many towns, said Orval on the phone last week. He has just completed P.A.'s in two Ontario spots, Sudbury and Sault St. Marie. Don Wayne has been on a promo trip down the east coast of the U.S., working on "1-2-5" by the Haunted. Reportedly the record has broken on WPTR, Albany, which won't do its U.S. hit potential any harm at all. The Don Messer Tour has been appearing throughout Ontario with S.R.O. crowds in most towns. Their Apex records have enjoyed brisk sales in all centres as a result of the P.A.'s. Joey Hollingsworth is touring in Japan with the Brenda Lee show, reports Apex's Al Mair. Rick Nelson's "You Just Can't Quit" is now firmly established as a hit in Ontario, and figures to show up well in all of Canada. The Sammy Davis show at Toronto's O'Keefe Centre week of June 27th, will sell much record product for Sammy and the Apex folks in Toronto. Al Mair waxes enthusiastic over a new group about to debut on Decca. The group in question is Little Charles and the Sidewinders. One Toronto R&B shop came in for a big initial order on the outing well before it was released. The group have been packing 'em in at Toronto's Le Coq D'or, and will tour the entire Province under Big Land management in August if all goes well.

Dave Leonard sends along word that two of his Monticana attractions were to be featured with the Rolling Stones show at the Montreal Forum (6/30). Bartholomew Plus Three and the Cat's Paw were to be included on the bill with the Stones. Hottest record around the RCA Victor layout of late has to be the Dunhill outing by the Grass Roots, "Where Were You When I Needed You." Dunc Anderson, RCA's man in Winnipeg, reports that the sound is moving really well with all of the pop formatted outlets in his territory and could be one of the biggest singles of the Summer. The Mamas and the Pappas' figure to hit the top ten everywhere in Canada, says Stan Kulin, with their latest, distributed in Canada on RCA Victor. "I Saw Her Again" was an instant smash on Canada's west coast.

Reports coming out of Toronto indicate that a label switch is in the offering for the disk attraction, "Little Caesar and the Consuls." New label has not been officially identified, but word soon should be forthcoming.

Cash Box's man in Canada, John Murphy, is the subject of a forthcoming article in the Canadian Edition of TV Radio Mirror.

Knox Coupland tells C.B. that the RCA Victor plant will close for Summer vacation from Friday July 29th, until Monday August 15th.

Word just in that the "1-2-5" sound by the Haunted will be released in the U.S. by Bell. It has been one of the consistently hot singles in Canada for the past several weeks. The Montreal branch of Quality Records alone has sold over ten thousand copies to date.

Hottest new single in some long time is the Quality distributed release on the Casl label, by the Carlton Showband with Arlene King. The song, "The Merry Ploughboy" has been featured across Canada for several weeks on the Carling's Breweries radio and TV commercials. Prior to the release of the 45, deejays were swamped with requests for the song used on the beer ads. Lee Farley reports dealers in the Toronto area were ordering 50's and 100's the first week the disc was released.

Record biz vet, Liam Mullan has returned to the wax wars as Quality's Sales Promotion topper for Western Quebec, H.Q.'d in Montreal. The area covered by the Montreal branch will be split in two from the point of view of promotion with Mullan in charge of Western Quebec, and Maurice Richard (not the ex-hockey star) handling similar duties for Eastern Quebec.

J. Robert Wood has been named to replace Russ Simpson at Vancouver's CKLG. The pop formatter has been making considerable gains in the west coast rating picture, according to P.R. gal, Peggy Keenan. Biggest hit sound on the outlet currently says Peg, is the latest by the Yardbirds, "Over Under Sideways And Down".

Adrian Bilodeau, head man of London's Liberty-Imperial group, has hits a plenty in the LP department currently. A good many items are from the World Pacific catalog, with a giant developing for the Johnny Mann Singers on their latest Liberty release, "Daydream".

AUSTRALIA

A recent American visitor to this country was publisher/songwriter, Aaron Schroeder; he was accompanied by the vice-president of his international music corporation, Abby Steinberg. The main purpose of the visit was to look over local conditions and evaluate the possibility of expansion of his catalogue.

During his five days in Australia, Aaron Schroeder met many leading publishing and record company execs. He left Australia bound for Manila and other far eastern markets.

An interesting new release from W & G records is an EP set by Helmut Zacharias and His Orchestra. The master is leased from the Hansa organization in Germany, and it features four originals by Zacharias; publishing rights are held by the W & G subsidiary, Woomera Music.

Scope Records, produced, pressed and distributed by Astor Records, has hit the market with their first release "I Can't Stop Loving You Baby," which features a local group called the Last Straws. All songs recorded by the Last Straws are originals by the boys. Neville Smith, head of Astor Records, says he has great faith in the future and potential of the Last Straws. Scope records is handled nationally by Astor.

Castle Music has picked-up publishing rights to both sides of the new RCA single by local boys the Cardinals. Both titles, "All My World Was You" and "You Know" were written by group members, John Shaw and David McKay, respectively.

Among the latest overseas singles released through EMI are "High On Love" by the Knickerbockers (London); the I'des of March are featured on a new London single with "You Wouldn't Listen"; from England come the Unit Four Plus Two with "For A Moment"; Sam The Sham is out with "Lil' Red Riding Hood"; Bobby Vee with "Look At Me Girl" on Liberty, and Ronnie Dove has "Happy Summer Days."

Local productions through EMI include Buddy English with "If You'll Stay" c/w "Question"; Max Hamilton with "Foolish Little Boy" and "Now Hear This"; and the Allusions have "The Dancer" and "Roller Coaster Man" released on Parlophone.

We have had many reports from recording artists on the important role that station 6KY in Perth (Western Australia) is playing in the promotion of Australian recordings. It seems that the station has been a key factor in paving the way for several successful concerts in Perth for local talent. These artist's reports have been substantiated for us by 6KY staff deejay Tony Doherty who has a show six days each week on 6KY. Tony Doherty "migrated" to Perth from the East coast some months back, and we understand Tony is doing very well indeed in his new surroundings.

Festival Records have taken over manufacturing and distribution rights to the new All-Australian label called Down-Under; which is operated by L.K.B. Productions Pty. Ltd. First releases are Kevin Bible & the Book with "Rockin' Pneumonia" c/w "I Found A New Love"; and Wee Liz with "Tiny Little Pebble" and "Lonesome 409."

Johnny Chester, recently appointed A & R director for Phono-Vox records, advised that the first locally recorded product for release are already under way. Denise Drysdale is first out with two songs that have been especially written for her, "Not Goodbye" and "Turn Your Head." Phono-Vox has also signed a young New Zealander by name of Eddie Lane; and the Australian group the New Trends.

The Beatles are at the top of our best seller list with "Paperback" "Writer." A sudden entry for the first time this week is "Tar And Cement" released on Capitol and featuring Verdelle Smith. Making it's initial entry also this week for RCA is "Monday, Monday" with the Mamas & the Poppas; which makes it into equal number ten spot.

Tony Geary, from Albert Productions—the recording division of the music publishing house of J. Albert & Son—who produce the records by Bobby & Laurie and the Easybeats, advises Cash Box that EMI in England has scheduled the Bobby & Laurie hit "Hitch Hiker" for release on July, 15th. At the same time United Artists in England will be releasing "Come And See Her" by the Easybeats, on the U/A label. The Easybeats leave Australia on July 10th heading for the United Kingdom. They have just completed a one-hour television spectacular which will be shown during their absence.

With Me) done by Hansa's Elisa Gabbai picked up 29 points from the radio stations, 18 points by the TV viewers and 32 points from the audience for a total of 79 points which earned her second place. Song number 9 "Irgend Jemand Liebt Auch Dich" (Someone Loves You, Too) done by Polydor's Roy Black got 22 points from the radio jury, 30 points from the TV viewers and 26 points from the audience for a total of 78 points and 3rd place.

Song number 10, "Beiss nicht gleich in jeden Apfel" (Don't Bite into Every Apple), won the festival by getting the most votes in every division. The song was sung by Polydor's Wencke Myhre and she received 54 votes from the radio stations, 40 votes from the TV viewers and 52 votes in the audience for a total of 146 points. Song number 11 "Gammelshake" done by Margret Fuerer and the Penny Pipers from Elite Special took 2 points from the radio stations, 19 points from the TV audience and 2 points from the audience for 23 points and 11th place and song number 12 "Bis an's Ende aller Tage" (Until the End of Time) sung by Hansa's Michaela Prunerova took 17 points from the radio stations, 10 points from the TV viewers and 2 points from the audience for totals of 29 points and 9th place.

The festival ended with a breakfast for the press, the writers and authors where the prize of the German press writers went to "Gammelshake" for the best lyrics of the festival.

Alternate Festival

The record industry is planning an alternate festival next year which will give Germany two major festivals. The main problem confronting the original German pop music festival is how to combine the idealistic with the materialistic and present a high quality festival free from the any influences and strictly right for the promotion of German pop music and for the German public and their tastes. Although the quality of the presentations was generally high and the material generally good, several of the selections, it was felt, definitely did not belong in the final 18 of a pop festival in 1966.

The main steps to improvement offered was to let 2 soloists, perhaps one local and one foreign artist, sing each selection to put more weight on the songs, and the selection of a jury really up to the minute on pop music who can pick tunes that are right for the times and tastes of the German pop public. Press manager Stephen Von Baransky was praised for a "fabulous" job of organization, and the show went off without a hitch.

JAPAN

The much-awaited Beatles are coming to Japan in the end of June. When the announcement was made on May 3, willing visitors rushed into Yomiuri Newspaper Co., promoter and one of the biggest newspaper co., sending a letter on ticket proposal which counted more than 230 thousand in a week. Performances are scheduled to be held at Nihon Budokan in Tokyo five times opening on June 30, accommodation of which is only 50 thousand in five performances, so 180 thousand enthusiastic Beatles fans will fail to enjoy the performance, 230 thousand, the figure of willing visitors, is so great when compared with 170 thousand which Ventures gathered in their last summer performances, having covered almost one month, when the electric guitar was on the boom. Due to the announcement made by Toshiba Records, releaser of Beatles Records, 20 million copies of Beatles records have been sold in Japan until now. The other day, an anniversary party was held to honor Yuzo Kayama, popular singer of Japan, on his amazing record sales achievement counted at more than 3 million. However, even this figure looks small, compared with that of Beatles. Toshiba Records further mentioned that since the Beatles sold in only one year as great an amount of records as Presley sold in ten years (which counted 100 million), how great and popular they are. Therefore, such promotion to invite them to Japan was tried many times in the past, however, they were not carried out because of too high a guarantee and the difficulty on the concert hall. In spite of the conditions related above, this time performances were carried successfully with the request from the Beatles, negotiator Kyodo Kikaku said, on account of the greatness of Japan's pop market (next to America's) and partly due to the fact that while pop records sales achievement is the 2nd, that of the Beatles is the 7th the world over.

Cash Box of Japan reports this week, the new releases for July put on the market by every record company here in Japan.

Philips department of Nippon Victor released three of chanson LPs to coincide with the Paris Festival when all of TV and radio programs broadcast chansons as special numbers.

Chanson LP albums are "B.B. Chanson Album," "Serge Gainsbourg" and "France Gall," all of which are recommended by paper critics. Among other releases made by Philips, "Best Of China Hits Vol. 1" is notable and its Vol. 2 will be scheduled to be released in a few days. In SP, "Namito Kiborino Kuma" (Wave and wooden-carved Bare) written, composed, and sung by folksong singer, Mike Maki, "The Ballad Of The Green Beret" by Royal Navy Band, "The Sun Ain't Gonna Shine Any More" by the Walker Brothers, "Un Prince Charmant" by France Gall are continuously seen in its ad.

World Group of Nippon Victor advertises "Europe Screen Themes Vol. 2" on Reprise in the wake of that of Vol. 1 released last month, "Golden Johnny Rivers" on Impulse being in the wake of the popular earlier release "Johnny Rivers Rocks The Folk." Golden—"Hammer Of Angel," "I Gotta Woman," "Midnight Special," "Mountain Of Love," "Twist And Shout," "Stop In The Name Of Love" and 8 others. "Golden Hawaiian Music/Billy Vaughn" on Dot and "Golden Hawaiian Delux/Hawaiian Islanders" on Cameo are definitive releases of Hawaiian music of the firm. The former one was made at the request of Japan when Vaughn came to Japan for a tour recently.

"The Best Of Harry Belafonte Vol. 2" is the best among the releases made by Nippon Victor including "John Henry," "When The Saints Go Marching In," "Cotton Fields," "I Love Her So" and 6 others. "The Complete Of Latin Delux" is the delux album, consisting of three LPs, gathering all of famous latin musics with leading orch. and singers such as Perez Prado, Xavier Cugat, Ros Trez Diamantez, Chet Atkins, Catelina Valente and others.

GREAT BRITAIN

Australia's top pop star Normie Rowe of Sunshine Records has been signed to a long term contract with Polydor Records in London. The announcement follows negotiations held with leading U.K. disk companies and Ritchie Yorke who handles international operations of Sunshine Records of Sydney. Yorke told Cash Box that he has selected Polydor because he feels they can do the best possible production and promotional job for Normie Rowe in this territory. Rowe arrives in London in September and will immediately record his first release for this market. The length of his stay in England although not yet definite will be for a minimum of three months. His U.K. produced disks will be released in every possible territory of the world including the U.S.A. where they will be released on the Atlantic/Atco label. Eddie Jarrett of the Grade Organization is setting up extensive TV shows, club dates, one-nighters etc. to ensure maximum exposure of Rowe's talents. Jarrett is also agent for the Seekers, Cliff Richard, the Shadows, Frank Ifield and many other top names.

Coincidental with the commencement of their independent distribution operation Decca Records has announced certain organizational changes designed to give the dealer an efficient service. The entire independent operation will be handled by Selecta which now becomes a division of The Decca Record Company. Decca's area sales managers will now be part of this division working as regional sales supervisors. S. A. Beecher-Stevens, sales and marketing manager has unfortunately been hospitalized and will be out of action for several weeks. Other changes have also taken place elsewhere in the Decca Organization. Tony Hall, the company's exploitation chief, takes over the responsibility for the Luxembourg programmes and press for pop records.

The celebrated American composer and exclusive RCA artiste, Morton Gould, paid his first visit to Britain recently as guest conductor in the BBC's Light Music Festival at the Royal Festival Hall. He also directed two BBC broadcasts. Gould's compositions include "Pavanne" and the film scores for "Cinarama Holiday" and "Windjammer." He also penned the music for the American TV series "World War One" shortly to be screened in Britain. Gould who has his own publishing company G & C Music Corp in association with Chappells had meetings with Teddy Holmes of the London office. A highlight of his visit was a party held in his honor hosted by Decca Records and Chappells. During his stay in London, Gould recorded an album with John Cacavas of Chappell Inc., New York, for world release.

Leonard Whitcup, managing director of Music, Music, Music Inc. America publisher of "The Ballad Of The Green Berets" recently made his first trip to Europe visiting London and Paris. In Paris he met Madame de Rieux of RCA who released both the original by Barry Sadler and the French version by Bernard Tappy entitled "Passport To The Sun." In London he met up with many publishers including David Day of Francis Day & Hunter whose German company publishes Freddy's version "100 Mann & Ein Befehl" on Polydor plus eight other versions. As well as his publishing interests Whitcup is a well known song writer.

The Mindbenders who recently hit the No. 1 slot in the Cash Box Top 100 with their international smash "A Groovy Kind Of Love" are following up their disk success with a tour of the States which commences July 2nd in Pittsfield, Mass. and takes them to Lincoln Park, Mass. (3rd); Atlanta (4th); Florida (5th); Birmingham, Alabama (6th); Fort Worth, Texas (7th); San Francisco (8th); Arizona (12th); Tucson (13th); Indiana (14th); Monticello, Indiana (15th); Hammond, Indiana (16th); Jasper (17th) and Cincinnati (18th); Arnold Park, Ohio (19th); Peru (22nd); Dayton (23rd); Clearlake (24th) and Texas (25th-29th). During their month long tour they will appear on Dick Clark's TV shows "Shivaree" and "Where The Action Is." To coincide with their American visit Fontana is releasing a new single "Ashes To Ashes" from the pen of Toni Wise who gave them their "Groovy Kind Of Love" smash. Before striking it rich as artistes in their own right the Mindbenders were the backing group for Wayne Fontana.

Publisher Fred Jackson of Fanfare Music has set up a new production company I.P.S. (Independent Producers Service) in association with Canadians Lenny Williams and Jerry Martin. First release "Long Time Between Lovers" by Mick Luvzit is released on Decca and published by Titles Music, a subsidiary of Fanfare.

Quickies: Trini Lopez, currently in London filming "The Dirty Dozen" has waxed the title song from the film "Made In Paris" penned by Burt Bacharach and Hal David issued on Reprise and published by Robbins Music. . . . Allan Sherman opened a two week season at the Savoy Hotel and Warner Bros. issued his send-up version of Barbra Streisand's "Second Hand Rose." . . . Latest teenage pop idol of France, Edouard, who shot to fame on the strength of knee length hair and a disk entitled "My Name Is Edouard" gets British exposure via CBS Records who have rush-released the single with a special pictorial sleeve. . . . ARGENTINA

RCA has released a very interesting two LP set, titled "The Story Of Jazz," covering from 1908 to 1946, with recordings by artists like Jelly Roll Morton, Duke Ellington, Dizzy Gillespie and Sidney Bechet, among others. The album has been compiled with the cooperation of jazz critic Nestor Ortiz Oderigo, and is a good addition to the existing jazz material on the market. In the pop field, RCA is outing the music from "El Galleguito de la Cara Sucia," the new film by Juan Ramon, and the album recorded by Palito Ortega in Nashville, a couple of months ago.

CBS reports the release of another important work, this time in the folk music field: "La Independencia." The album has been cut by folk guitar player Jorge Cafrune, with music by Adolfo Abalos, Carlos Di Fulvio and Waldo Belloso and lyrics by Leon Benaros. Besides, there is also the first album by los Hermanos Abalos, recently inked by the label, and another one by the Cuarteto Imperial, once more with tropical music.

Disc Jockey Records reports the release of the new album by Charles Aznavour, featuring "Reste," "Aime Moi," "Sur Le Chemin De Retour" and several other recent recordings. It is worth mentioning that the film "Cherchez L'Idole," presenting Aznavour, Hallyday and several other French artists, is being screened on these days in this city. Disc Jockey is also releasing an album by Dalida, and a locally produced LP with Tango music, by the Tango Trio.

Julio Korn Publishers is promoting "El Conductor," a big Mexican hit already recorded by los Molineros for Diskorn and Enryque Lynch in Peru for Sonoradio, released here by Disc Jockey. Other JK items are "Claudia" cut by Perez Prado in Mexico and local artist Joe Brass (Odeon Pops), and "Tiburón A La Vista," cut by Tito Alberti for Music Hall.

Fermata reports that its Record Division is preparing the release of an album by Fred Bongusto, who hit the charts some time ago with "Se Tu Non Fosse Bella," included in the film "Un Dollar Bucato." There is also another one by Brazilian artist Adilson Godoy, cut originally by RGE in Brazil, and a single cut by Ferbra, also in Brazil, containing "Adios Cantareira" and "Un Amor Asi." On the publishing side, Brenner's company infos that Luis Dimas has recorded "El Gran Fuego" for Music Hall.

The Press Department of Odeon infos that the company and its artists have received several awards at the recent First Argentine TV Festival, held in the city of Rosario. Ramona Galarza, Mariano Mores, los Shakers, Nestor Fabian, Claudia, and Susy Leiva are the winning artists, and the company was considered the "Most Popular of 1966." Among the current releases we find a new single by los Ariscos ("Destino de Adios"), another one by los Wairas ("Quiero Oir Tu Voz") and "Slipping Down" by Joe Brass. There is also a single by the Mockers: "Nena Mia."

Danzarin music publishers report that they have obtained from GATT of Italy the rights to publish "The Rambler's Ballad," recorded in Italy by singer Raul Pisani. Maestro Roberto Pansera has formed the Agrupacion Buenos Aires, devoted to tango music and recording an album for Philips.

Music Hall is adding several new albums to its "Difusion Musical" popular price series (475 pesos). There are albums by Edmundo Rivero, one of the best all time tango singers, los Quilla Huasi, Juancito Diaz and Marcos Tames and the El Chañarcito group. Luis Calvo, Music Hall's VP, and will be strengthened even more in the near future.

Ala Nicky records is continuing the hit line of the VIP's recordings by their new "Girl" single, currently among the top sellers of this country. On the International side, there is a single recorded by Armando Docetti in Italy: "La Spiaggia Sara Vuota" and "La Pioggia e Diventata Nera." The diskery is also working on the recordings by Osvaldo Piro, an artist with good possibilities in the tango music field.

Liliana Paz of Smart Publishers reports the arrangement of the representation of "Anche Se," recorded in Italy by Gino Paoli and Ornella Vanoni. Spanish lyrics for this tune have been prepared, and local recordings are expected. There are also several Brazilian tunes on deck like "Somos Iguales," recorded by Altamar Dutra, and others.

Phonogram reports the release of a new Compact 33 by folk artist Chango Rodriguez, one of the prevailing names in the local music scene. There is also another one by los Quilla Huasi, and a Compact 33 by los Fronterizos. The diskery has obtained plenty of promotion via the "Casino Philips" TV program, on Channel 13, where the complete Philips cast presented tunes included in the ten LP set "Argentina Canta Asi."

Edami Publishers are working on "Si Dios Me Quita La Vida," a bolero penned by well known composer Luis Demetrio. There are several recordings available, and among them one by Olga Guillot (Odeon) and Javier Solis (CBS). The pubbery is also promoting a Mexican evergreen, "Du Cu Rru Cu Paloma," now recorded by instrumental group Joe Brass.

Hy R Records report the release of an album by folk artist Carlos Aban, and another by Azur Chami. From the Combo label, HyR is marketing an album with Sicilian music, cut by Maria Clementina and Salvatore Di Paola.

idol, Wanderléa, has a new LP ready with strong numbers in "Em Meus Sonhos," "Não Vai Baby," "Canção Do Imenso Amor," "Vá Embora" and "Com Todo O Amor." Another LP of the latest releases by Lafayette, presenting successes. For the North public, Carlito cut a new "double-compact." New teen twosome Leno & Lilian having good success with single "Devolva-me" b/w "Pobre Menina." While his album is being prepared, Luiz Carlos Clay is launching a single with "Eu Nasci Pra Você" coupled with "Uma Casa Sobre O Mundo." Another Luiz is also exclusive with CBS, Luiz Carlos, who also has a single with "Impossível Compreender" and "Vou Fechar A Porta." Ricardo Lopes also cut a single with "Serei Feliz Contigo" b/w "Veneno Lento."

Discos Mocambo sending also news of latest releases: an album of Petula Clark, interpreting international hits. Maestro Burt Bacharach is also present with an LP of his good arrangements. The album "Quadrilha," with folk music of the Northeast appeared right for the June popular festivities and had good sales. Author of hit "Aline," chanter Christophe appears with a long playing disc with other of his successes. Exclusive artist of the company, Maria Odete is appearing in many TV and radio programs with her rendition of "Boa Palavra," by Caetano Veloso, which was classified in fifth place in the Second Festival of Popular Music.

Roberto Carlos and Erasmo Carlos, the teen idols of Brazil, organized a 24 hour show at the Theater Record, televised by Channel 7 of São Paulo, to which the entrance was paved in blankets, which were later distributed among the poor people of this capital. During the whole day and night, thousands of cars passed by and left clothes, pullovers, trucks stopped in front of the theater and thousands of blankets were offered for the artists' campaign, which received the name of "Quero Que Me Aqueça Neste Inverno" (I Want You To Warm Me This Winter), taken from the hit number of Roberto Carlos "Quero Que Vá Tudo Pro Inferno." The theater was constantly crowded and all artists of the company together with others that came to give their collaboration were presented to the audience. Before the end of the giant show, there were so many fans of the young men outside the theater, who couldn't get in, that a stage was improvised in a truck and Roberto sang for thousands of people who waited outside, under strong police protection. On the theater stage an enormous mountain of cloth and blankets gave a good picture of the success of the good hearted campaign. Besides that, many people brought financial donations, objects of value, etc. to be exchanged for warm clothes for the poor. It was an absolute success and another obvious indication of the popularity of this young man Roberto Carlos, who is an absolute idol among people of all ages in this country. Congratulations Roberto Carlos!

Discos Continental's latest releases include a new album by romantic ballad chanter Francisco Petronio, singing "boleros" in Portuguese versions, of which "Triunfamos" is already a hit here. A special promotion is being made by the company, to introduce a new chantress-composer called simply Elizabeth and the release of the lark's first disc. Already released single of new chanter Gilberto Lima in the so-called "A Go Go," with "Vai Ser Bom" b/w "Bosque Da Ilusão." After the great success of "A Volta," with which the vocal twosome Os Vips were in the local charts for long, a new single comes out with "Oração De Um Broto" coupled with their own composition "Longe, Tão Perto," which is already having very good airplay. Another new name in the Continental cast is Renato Junior who appears in a single with two teen musics of his own "Encontro Perdido" b/w "Pensando No Amor." "Cavaquinho" soloist Valdyr Azevedo cut a single in his personal style with "Hello Dolly" coupled with "Nostalgia."

Francisco F. da Silva informs from the Vitale pubbery: in 1960 a group of young (14 to 18 years old) teen chanters were trying to introduce the then popular rock and roll rhythm in Brazil; it was not a very successful movement due to a series of restrictions from the people who led the national radio. These young-men were making efforts to record this type of music on a label called "Young" which doesn't exist any more. From that group came some of the names that are presently among the top teen artists of the country, such as Demetrius, Prini Lorez (then Zézinho), Marcos Roberto, Dori Edson (then Dori Agiolella), Gato (present guitar soloist of the Jet Blacks) and Hamilton Di Giórgio, who was considered by his colleagues and the public the top composer and interpreter of that movement. After a long absence this later artist returns to the recording activities and will soon be presented again to the Brazilian public, through a well planned promotion. Tony Campello of Discos Odeon will be responsible for this promotion as he did with Deni & Dino, Sérgio Reis and his sister Cely Campello, who is also returning. Vitale signed a contract of exclusivity for more than twenty works by this author, some with Afonso Soares, for the top interpreters of the teen music in this country: for Roberto Carlos, Hamilton composed "Acelerei," "Sonho De Papel," "Coisinha Linda," "Mania De Falar"; for the vocal twosomes "Deni & Dino" and "Vips," he made "Como Eu Gostaria De Te Amar," "Menina Feia," "Espera," "Pertinho De Mim"; for Cidinha Santos and Angelita, "Mil Razões Pra Te Amar"; for Gilberto Montenegro and eventually Agnaldo Rayol, "Canção De Outono"; Jean Carlo, "Dêem-me A Mão"; for Wanderlea, "O Que Tem Você"; for Wanderley Cardoso, "Por Favor Vá Embor"; and finally for himself, Hamilton chose "O Mar" and "Porque Sou Assim" (called psychologic music).

A few more releases from Discos Odeon follow: recently pacted chantress Clara Nunes has an album released titled "A Voz Adorável De Clara Nunes" with chances for success. Also new in the Odeon cast is Miltoninho, who has his first LP ready under the name "Samba+Samba=Miltoninho!" and is a good disc. From the international field we have an album with French chanter Richard Anthony, another with Frank Pourcel's Orchestra titled "É Um Mundo De Melodias Vol. 3" (It's A World Of Melodies); Portuguese chanter entertainer Max appears in "Portugal E Suas Canções." And finally the new Beatles' album "Rubber Soul" appeared and jumped to first spot immediately.

Wilson de Moraes informs from Rio de Janeiro from the Euterpe pubbery that the company recently pacted for sub-edition in Brazil "Mes Mains Sur Tes Hanches," penned by Adamo and "Una Limosna," which is currently in number one spot in Mexico.

From the promo department of Discos Chantecler, the news is as follows: a new single by songster Carlos Cesar brings the "Bolero" by Cardenas "Triunfamos," a candidate to success, coupled with "Sómente Esta Noite," by Nizio. An album by expert harpist Luis Bordon, exclusive artist of Chantecler, titled "Bordon Tropical Vol. 2" bringing some Paraguayan hits together with international standards; the accompaniment is by a private instrumental group of the diskery. Born in Brazil of Japanese descent, Rosa Myiake has all that it takes to please the young generations. The young lark, a candidate for teen queen appears with a single "Bye Bye Querido" b/w "Hitori Botti Ga Sabishimo" (With Nobody), dedicated to the Brazilian Japanese colony. From the represented Roulette label, an LP introducing international attraction the Barry Sisters—in this album, called "At Home With The Barry Sisters," the vocal twosome interprets Hebrew numbers, arranged by Abe Ellstein, with hits such as "Have Nagila," "Tumbalalika," "Bublitchki Bagelach," "Yingile Nit Vain" and Yuges Mir Noch Amool."

As promised we now have details about Musidisc's purchase of an important disk plant in Petrópolis, near Rio de Janeiro: Nilo Sergio prexy of the diskery had this dream for a long time which he finally realized—buying "Fonográfica Brasileira." Musidisc can now press its own discs following the road of quality indicated by the record company with its own well equipped recording studios. The plant is one of the largest in Brazil and was installed by specialists from Brazil and the U.S.A. in 3 thousand sq. meters. Nilo Sérgio is completing the plant with new equipment and will soon be ready for activity.

From the Brazilian RCA Victor we have news of the release of a new album by Italian singing star, well-liked in this country Rita Pavone, titled "Stasera Rita," with twelve of the tiny lark's latest hits, some of which are in English. Awarded chanter Wilson Miranda has a new "double" in the market with four strong numbers "Canto De Ossanha," by Baden and Vinicius, "Amanhã," Walter Santos and Tereza Souza, "Primeira Solidão," by Marcos and Paulo Sérgio Valle and "O Bem Maior," penned by Geraldo Vandré (one of the winners of the 2nd. Festival). Also a single with the first and third numbers. From the hit LP of the hit film "The Sound Of Music," RCA is releasing a "double" with four of its hit numbers. As we had predicted, songstress Maysa returned to disc activity, producing her own records, starting with this RCA single with the Carnival's first prize, which is now in number one spot in the local charts "Tristeza," backed by a composition of the lark called "Canção Sem Título" (Song Without Title). RCA is introducing star chanter from the USA Johnny Rivers to the Brazilian public, with his hit "Susie Q," which is appearing on the charts. A new album by the top orchestra of the label "Namorados Do Caribe" appears with the English title "The Latin Sound From Brazil" with view toward export, with a selection of the biggest hits of the Modern Popular Music from the country today, under the direction of Maestro Zaccarias. Cardinal Archbishop of São Paulo, Dom Agnello Rossi, said a mass for the anniversary of old-time chanter Nelson Gonçalves. The University XI August Choral sang the hymns and religious music during the mass and, outside the church the band of the Civil Guard of the State of São Paulo. The ceremony was attended by authorities, artists, press representatives and many fans of the deep-voiced romantic chanter.

News flashes from CBS to Brasil come next: Veteran comedian Zé Trindade, has a new "double-compact" for the June festivities. Teen chanter Jerry Adriani has a new album which is having very good airplay. Another teen



FRANCE

Last summer, two new names appeared in show business: Hervé Vilard ("Capri C'Est Fini") and Christophe ("Aline"). They were the two big winners of the summer. Hervé is cut by Philips and Christophe by AZ. Since that time they have each recorded 4-EP's. After one year it is impossible to say which one is the winner, but they are, both, two stars. Last September we also saw 2 important come backs: It was the François Deguelt and the Sacha Distel's ones. At this time Henri Salvador, with its Rigolo label team, joined the Barclay team. At the same time CBS represents three more labels: Epic, Okeh and Old Town; Distel left RCA Victor to join the Ducretet Thompson label. In September, behind Christophe, Shawn Elliott (Roulette) with his song "Shame And Scandal In The Family" was at the second place in the French chart.

Peter, Paul and Mary were a fantastic success at The Olympia music hall in September. Just after them Adamo took the place as lead on a 4-week program. This young Italian born author and composer has been a most important records seller during 1965. With five EP's he was near the 2 million records mark. His most important success during this end of the year is "Mes Mains Sur Tes Hanches." Publisher of all his songs is Pathé Marconi and his record producer is Voix de son Maître, one of the French labels of the EMI group.

During the first days of October there was the annual Vogue convention. According to Cabat, turnover of Vogue for this year has been 24% over 1964. It was up 75% during August. In October a contract was signed between 20th Century Fox and Barclay, who will represent this American label in France and Scandinavian countries. At the same time CBS budget a classical collection "Classiques Favourites" is taking a new start: a new attractive presentation and the cheapest price for stereo, 9,95 + I F.

In November the leads of the Olympia programs are Richard Anthony and Sandie Shaw during three weeks and then Les Compagnons de La Chanson. Eddie Barclay decided a new policy for the promotion of his labels. He decided to go during several week-ends to French cities and invite for lunch most important record dealers of the town. During the last days of November the Sheila song "Le Folklore Américain" reached top of the chart. A new publishing company "Danymusic," located at 28 rue de la Reine Blanche, makes a very good start. It is managed by French singer composer Danyel Gérard.

The Academie Du Disque Français awarded its annual "Grand Prix National Du Disque" at the beginning of December. Three prizes were really important in that list: Male singer: Henri Tachant (Barclay); Female singer, Isabelle Aubret (Polydor); Comedy: Francis Blanche (AZ). In December we see Claude François taking the first place of the chart with "Même Si Tu Revenais" (Tutti publishing).

Thirty-nine year old Philippe Boutet, who has been in the music business since 1950, working for Barclay, is creating and managing a puberry in France for CBS. The Théâtre Du Chatelet begins rehearsals of the musical event of the year: "Mr Carnaval" a musical comedy by Charles Aznavour. Main artists will be Jean Richard and Georges Guétary. Most important song of the show is "La Bohème" that Aznavour recorded himself for his December 45 RPM release. We learned that Bel Air is now a dead company. Nicole Barclay, who managed this record firm since her divorce from Eddie Barclay, has closed her firm. Her two only important artists Leny Escudero and Rika Zarai left her during 1965. Rika Zarai is now cut by Philips and Leny Escudero by Polydor. We had the pleasure of discovering a new French label: Impact records, this label is distributed by Festival records. Its prexy is André Chagneau (festival président) and its general manager is Roger Marouani. We see also, "La Bohème" by Charles Aznavour reach the first place of the chart.

The fantastic start of young female singer Mireille Mathieu (Barclay) at the beginning of the year, shows the fantastic importance of good song contests on the TV. In February Georges Mayerstein announced that this firm will, "from now on," sell all LP's at the rate of 19, 95 F.

This decision is considered as an attack by several other manufacturers. Another kind of war is the one Antoine, the French Dylan style sensation, will organize in show business. In his song "Les Elucubrations," he attacked female accordion player Yvette Horner and French singer Johnny Hallyday. Johnny will answer in May with a new song called "Cheveux Longs Idées Courtes" ("Long Hair And Short Ideas"). Antoine is a Vogue artist and Johnny Hallyday is cut by Philips.

The Eurovision Song Contest in Luxemburg is a disaster for France: "Chez Nous" the song presented by our National Broadcast Company ORTF, just had one point. It was sung by young French singer Dominique Walter.

"The Grand Prix Du Disque De L'Académie Charles Cros" has been awarded in March. Winners were: Guy Bontempelli, Guy Béart, Joan Baez, Esther Ofarim. At this time the No. 1 of French chart is Claude François with "Le Jouet Extraordinaire" (Philips).

Barclay, Philips, Pathé have started to produce tape cartridges. They believe this will be an important part of the market in four or five years, but actually nobody seems to be very much interested now.

Always speaking about Los Marcellos Ferial, they have especially recorded for England, where it will be released by Pye, a tune entitled "Febbre Per La Coppa Del Mondo."

Two EMI artists, Gilbert Becaud and Adamo have been star guests of our top TV show "Studio Uno." Gilbert presented in Italian "Io T'Amo" and "Quando Il Poeta Mori." Adamo performed his present hit "Amo."

The CGD songstress Caterina Caselli, who has the exposure of the San Remo contest 1966, will again be under the spotlight with her new record, a finalist of the "A Disc For The Summer Contest" and entitled "L'Uomo D'Oro." CGD reports that sales of this disc are passing 25,000 copies per week.

By the way, Caterina Caselli will take part in the last five TV programs of the top series "Studio Uno."

A new name, who has been on the record scene from many years, has just recently entered in the short list of the top record sellers: we refer to Tony Del Monaco the CGD artist, whose waxing of "Vita Mia" is reported in our charts. The disc has reached a total of 150,000 copies sold.

Mina (Ri.Fi) will be of course the protagonist of the last five programs of "Studio Uno." She will present two new songs, just recorded under the Ri.Fi label: "Se Telefonano" penned by Ennio Morricone, and "Taratata" Italian version of the U.S. hit "Try Your Luck."

Ri.Fi has informed Cash Box that Iva Zanicchi will appear on June 20 on the stage of the "Olympia" in Paris; According to Ri.Fi, the top talent of Adamo will introduce her to the French audience during the program "Musicorama."

Michele, one of the top artists of RCA Italiana, will be awarded in Milan with a gold disc for the first million disks sold. He will be feted during a reception organized by RCA where top representatives of Italian press have been invited. Two discs we wish to review among those received this week: first is "Chiaro Di Luna Sul Mare," "Era Piu' Di Un Anno" by Donatella Moretti (RCA Italiana). There are at least three years that the name of Donatella Moretti appears regularly in the releases list of RCA Italiana, but in spite of the promotional efforts conducted on this artist, she never reached top sales. This new disc shall be considered as another good one to be joined to the list of the Donatella's attempts to reach the top sellers category: The first song "Chiaro Di Luna Sul Mare" penned by Migliaccia, Zambrini and Enriquez (and published of course by RCA Italiana) is a pleasant, flowing melody but it is not strong enough to push into the charts the name of Donatella. By the way, there is not a strong originality to the arrangement signed by Morricone. No better is the "b" side "Era Piu' Di Anno." Second disc is "Non Cercarmi Piu'," "Ciao Mare" by John Foster (Cellograf-Simp). In this disk we wish to stress "Ciao Mare" which is interpreted of course in the usual sweet style of John. The song is a good one: a catching melody originally done and well arranged. We like this disk even if there are not aggressive characteristics which will make it a sure hit. By the way "Non Cercarmi Piu'" is a banal composition, that has no reason to be interpreted by a talent like John Foster. Arrangement signed by Mescoli is good enough.

Right now, there's a flurry of cigarette tax increases snowballing through the cities and counties of the State of California like a renegade bear, gathering up operators and retailers in its misguided, mismanaged path, about to cause some of the most bizarre confusion to be seen in the cigarette operating industry in a dog's age.

The notion to hike taxes on cigarette sales has been rather contagious among various state legislatures across the breadth of the land during the last year and a half but the follow-the-leader thinking of California's municipal lawmakers over the past two weeks can only be termed an epidemic.

During the last week in June, the following tax increases on per-pack cigarette sales were approved by these California municipalities: Pomona increased to 5¢, effective July 1st; Torrance up to 4¢, effective also on July 1st; Newport Beach to 3¢, effective August 11th; while the charter cities of Santa Barbara, Sunnyvale and Tulare adopted 2¢ city cigarette taxes in the interim. These hikes were passed in spite of well organized and massive citizen and business protests, which included cigarette vendors, tobacco distributors, grocers, druggists and other retailers whose pleas to hold the line were collectively rejected. And now the Los Angeles City Council, which on June 15th had defeated a proposal to raise that city's 2¢ tax to 7¢ by a vote of 11 to four, has caught the fever from its neighbors and decided to take up a brand new proposal for an increase to 4¢ per pack. While up north, the City of San Jose is reportedly considering a boost in its tax to 3¢.

These developments across the State offer very serious consequences for cigarette operators. The absence of uniformity in the tax breakdown from area to area (even, in some locales, from one side of the street to the other, depending on city boundary charters) will cause havoc with everything from price selection, to slug rejector alteration to sales curbs by a disgruntled and confused citizenry and possibly lead to rampant bootlegging.

In order to throw a crimp in this wheel-run-wild, a committee headed by the California Tobacco Distributors Assn. is giving serious consideration toward proposing referendums in these cities to prevent enforcement of the taxes until voters can pass on them at election time next November.

But with the various tax increases already passed, the committee is fearful that it will become difficult, if not impossible, to prevent most charter cities from raising their 2¢ taxes to 3¢ or to prevent those who haven't done so (to date) from passing a cigarette tax at a high price. And since there is no apparent limit to the authority of charter cities on the amount of tax they can impose and no action to bring about uniformity can be expected before next January in the State Legislature, mass confusion and poor collections are imminent.

The best policy operators can follow now is to work with their associations, watch the movements of their own city councils and report immediately on any new developments in their areas of operation. NAMA's Western Counsel Sid Kallick is on top of the battle and can be reached at (213) GR 7-5547.

If California operators can possibly turn back the cigarette tax snowball in their own state, it may pave the way for an eventual nationwide cure of an epidemic which has knocked the status quo of cigarette operation into an exceedingly dangerous tilt.

RCA Victor Records To Exhibit At The 1966 MOA Show

CHICAGO—"We are pleased to announce that RCA Victor Records will exhibit at the Annual MOA Convention and Trade Show Oct. 28-30 with an exhibit booth and also a hospitality suite at the Pick Congress Hotel," advised MOA's executive vice president and managing director Fred Granger last week.

"We now have every reason to believe that we will have a very good representation of record company exhibitors this year and of course we will do everything in our power to make it a worthwhile convention and trade show for all of our phonograph record exhibitors," he concluded.

Coin Shortage Seen Finally Over As The Treasury Dept. Resumes Regular Yearly Dating

WASHINGTON, D.C.—On July 6th, the U.S. Treasury Dept. announced that it would resume the regular yearly dating of minted coins according to the year of issue, an indication that the long coin shortage is finally over.

All coins minted thus far this year have borne a 1965 date as the Treasury Dept. attempted to reduce the demand for coins by collectors and hoarders.

Beginning August 1st, all coins minted will carry the 1966 date and beginning next January, they will bear the 1967 date.

According to sources in the Treasury Dept., coin inventories by mid-June in the mint and at the Federal Reserve Banks around the country were more than three and a half billion far above the inventories at the comparable dates of the previous three years. Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Robert Wallace stated that coins bearing the 1965 date, and also those bearing the 1966 date, will be manufactured in quantities exceeding total mint production during any calendar year prior to 1965 when we launched our crash program.

"This means that the recent coin shortage will not result in a gap in the annual dating of the United States minor and subsidiary coinage, and that there will be large numbers of all denominations of such coins bearing the dates 1964, 1965 and 1966." He further advised that special mint sets of 1966 coins would be manufactured beginning in August.

All dimes and quarters now being minted by the Treasury Dept. are of the cupro-nickel "sandwich" formula. Silver dollars are being manufactured with a reduced silver content and no silver dollars are being produced at all.

Wurlitzer Announces Subcontract Job

CHICAGO—Officials at the Wurlitzer Company in this city announced here last week that the firm has received subcontracts amounting approximately to \$6,500,000 for production of certain military supplies of a highly technical nature.

The firms which granted the subcontracts were Motorola, Inc., Zenith Radio Corporation and Raytheon Company. Wurlitzer is reportedly manufacturing other essential military goods and is scheduled to complete delivery on the above mentioned contracts is a period running slightly over one year. Wurlitzer further announced its plan to hire an additional 300 employees for its North Tonawanda, N.Y. plant where the work is scheduled to be performed.



PROFILE ON:

EARL FEDDICK: Coin Tables Are His Product

Earl Feddick is president and founder of the Valley Mfg. Co., a firm involved in the woodworking business since the 1940's and which, in the last decade or so, has found considerable success in the manufacture and marketing of coin-operated pool tables. Feddick began his career in a retail toy store in downtown Bay City during the last war. A shortage of toys during this period prompted him to begin making his own. During the years which followed, Feddick diversified his company into the building of radio and television cabinets followed by shuffleboards. In the late 1940's, he introduced Bumper Pool® to U.S. coin machine operators. Today, Valley operates manufacturing facilities in Michigan and Minnesota and deals exclusively with six-pockets and Bumper® tables in both coin-operated and home models as well as cue sticks. The production accent is moving toward assembly line automation, in order to fill a demand which Feddick says is usually greater than the supply. A telephone interview conducted last week asked the Valley chief some questions and received some answers on the position of coin-operated six pockets in today's market and the position of Valley itself in that market.

Q. What is the position of coin-operated tables in the European amusement market?

A. It's always been a very difficult thing to establish a market for tables in Europe. Consider the duty, shipping charges and especially the fact that labor over there is cheaper but at the same time, highly skilled. We've been over there several times and investigated it carefully. There are men in Europe who've spent their entire lives in woodworking, from the time they were teenagers. These people could turn out a quality table, as good as ours and sell it cheaper. It's very difficult to compete. Sure, we ship tables to Europe regularly but I can't call that area an important sales factor.

Q. Do you think that adverse local legislation in this country has hindered the natural growth of six-pockets?

Q. Looking at the present condition of the domestic coin-operated pool table market from the vantage point of your desk, would you describe it as growing, static or saturated?

A. I would have to say it's holding its own. By that I mean we are still selling a great many pieces . . . more it seems than we're able to make. True, there are areas in this country where pool table sales are beginning to take off . . . for instance, where some amusement machines have been knocked off location, but generally speaking, sales today are fairly constant.

Bootlegging Feared In Wake Of N.J. Cig Tax

NEW YORK—Reports from cigarette vending operators and retailers from the State of New Jersey reveal that the State's big toll roads have become busy corridors in bootleg cigarette activity. According to the State's Cigarette Tax Bureau chief Amos Tilton, the bootleg operations are highly organized and becoming a lucrative avenue for profit for the

underworld.

Some State officials now fear that since New Jersey has enacted its 11 cent per-pack tax, some bootleggers may decide to stop and sell their contraband wares in the Garden State. Most of the bootlegged cigarettes on Jersey's roads have been purchased and brought up from North Carolina which has no tax.

A. It has but it's easing off now. Coin-operated tables are going through the same period as the sport of bowling. In the beginning, bowling wasn't found in all the posh spots and fine communities it is today. Now it's not only accepted but it's one of the greatest sports in the land. Likewise, more and more communities are allowing pool tables in taverns these days. The trend is good and why not . . . the sport is terrific.

Q. Speaking about the sport, do you think the introduction of your regulation-sized magnetic cue ball has boosted customer play on location?

A. Definitely! This ball has the same weight, same size, same draw as the rest of the balls. You get better English, the whole play of the game is professional. Customers find out they play a better game. They may not know why but they play a better game and they play more. You know, somebody in the trade called me recently about an idea he had which would allow people to play all of the regular games on a coin-op table . . . based on the principle of our magnetic cue ball. What he proposes could be done but the basic fact remains that the most popular game we have now, and for obvious reasons, is 8-ball. This is a short, competitive game. It's the game customers are used to and the game which makes the operator the most money.

Q. Is the popularity of Valley Bumper Pool as high as in years past?

A. We still make them and sell a lot of them. We even sell some to the home market.

Q. What else do you make for the home market.

A. We still build pool and Bumper pool for the home market. Our pool tables can be taken apart for easy entry into a recreation room. Easy to take apart and reassemble and they are as sturdy and rigid as if made in one piece solid construction. Production of home line is limited due to heavy demand for coin equipment.

Q. What's the forecast from Valley regarding new products?

A. Our experimental people are constantly working to improve our tables also working on new ideas for the industry. When something worthwhile is available the industry will be informed. Currently, we are adding to our facilities both at Bay City Michigan and Shakopee, Minnesota, in size as well as equipment. Equipment is a temporary problem because the new type of automated woodworking machinery presents an eight to 14 month wait for delivery. While our cue plant has been constantly improved during the past two years, it, in the not too distant future, will be the most efficient and up-to-date in the country with an appreciably increased capacity that will include two-piece specialized cues with interchangeable shafts for 57 inch and 60 inch. Here at Bay City, we have moved our parts and accessories to a separate building that has made for better service to our customers. Service and quality is and always has been our objective and our every effort is directed to this end.

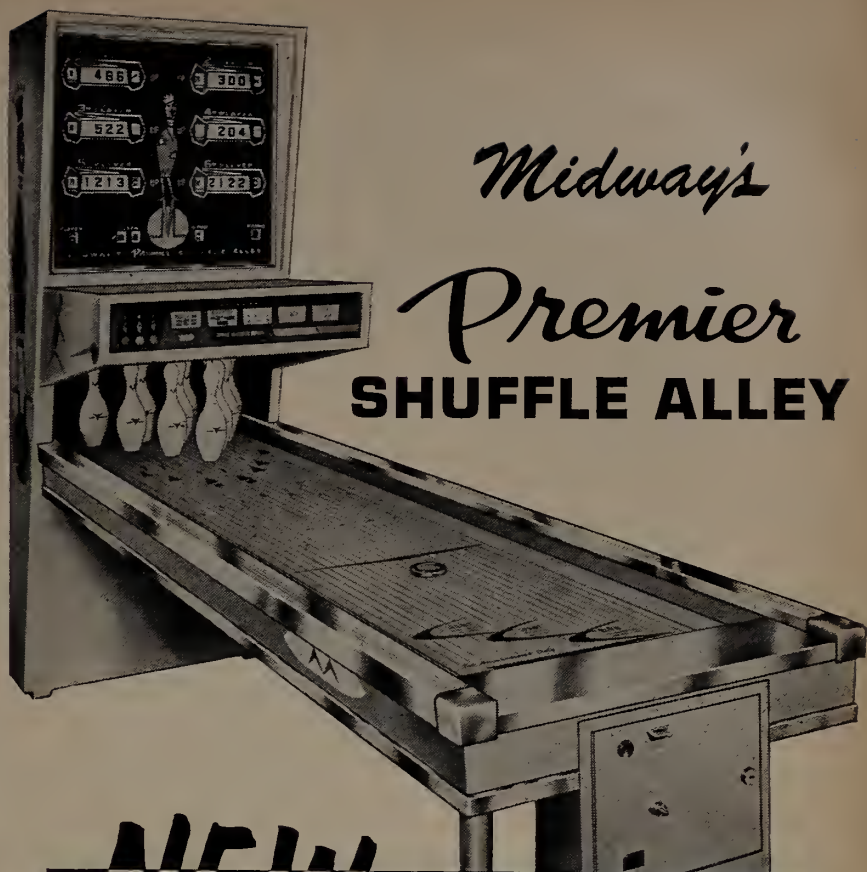

Operator Interest Praised By Shohat At World Wide Class

CHICAGO—Harold Schwartz, director of the Music Division of World Wide Distributing Company, in this city, heaped considerable praise on "one of the largest and most attentive groups of students we have ever had" at a service school class, featuring Seeburg's "Electra" coin-operated phonograph, in the World Wide classroom on the premises of the huge northside building, Wednesday evening, June 29.

Mike Shohat, a Seeburg field engineer, took the class, consisting of some 30 "students" through a thoroughgoing step-by-step instructional program in each separate phase of a complete cycle of operation, stopping at each level to 'create' (simulate) service calls. He then proceeded to explain in detail the "why's and wherefore's" of the service calls and the reasons they occurred.

Shohat then took his very attentive class of veteran servicemen through a logical procedure for correcting these normally nagging service problems. He strongly emphasized new techniques using a simple test probe light to accomplish this, which graphically points out areas of breakdown.

Schwartz further explained that Shohat took the mystery out of 'solid state' components by explaining that particular trouble areas are related to certain diodes and silicon control switches where just one silicon switch the size of a mere fraction of a fingertip actually takes the place of seven tubes, reducing service potential by more than 90%. This, he said, staggers the imagination of the average service specialist.

Many of the students who attended this instructional session remarked that they were greatly impressed and enlightened by the explanations by Shohat of the exciting, new technology, and the benefits of 'solid state' components.

Some of the outspoken comments included:—"It's really very simple"—"I though there was more to it than that"—"It sure is a lot easier to locate trouble now"—"It takes less time to repair than the old tube type units".

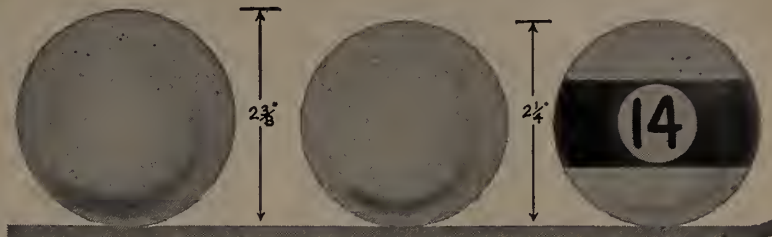

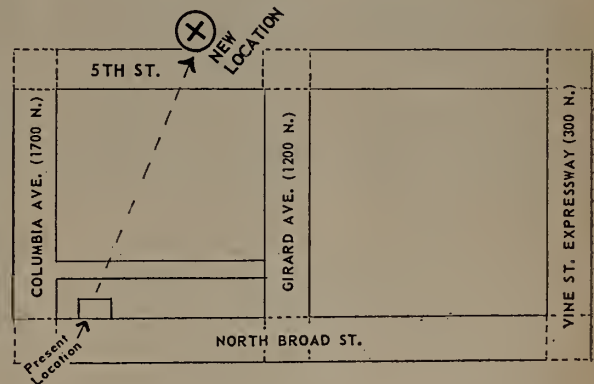

Robbins Proposes On The Job Training To Relieve Mech. Shortage

"... schools will help but they're not enough."

CHICAGO—One of the most pressing problems in all phases of the coin machine industry, according to Joe Robbins, vice president in charge of sales at Empire Distributing, Inc., in this city, is the drastic shortage of skilled (or, for that matter, unskilled) help. This unfortunate lack, he asserted, embraces all levels of coindom—from the operator level all the way up to the manufacturing ranks.

He said: "In all phases of the coin machine business good, promising employables are hard to come by. This unfortunate circumstance has resulted in heavier burdens on the remaining personnel employed by operators, distributors and manufacturers.

"Schools, of course," he added, "will, in part, help to relieve the situation caused by this dearth of talent in the future. However, at the present time, even with the schools, there just isn't enough personnel around to provide an adequate desirable pool of students for the schools in question.

"I fervently believe that the only logical answer for most operators, as is the case with distributors, is to institute on-the-job training, or a combination of on-the-job training and night school. In most communities night school courses are available in electronics, amplification circuits, etc."

Robbins feels that because of the importance and seriousness of this problem it should be a factor worthy of serious consideration on all levels of the coin machine business.

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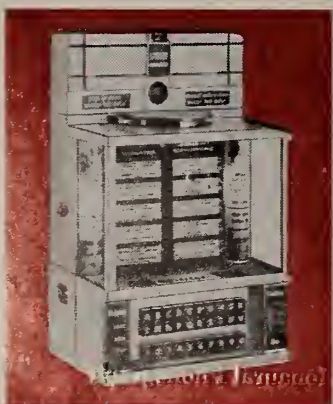
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
