War Against Depression Campaign

EACH city and town in the country has been asked to organize to do its part in finding jobs for a million workers now unemployed. Instructions have already been sent out for organizing local committees at the head of this work.

In forming your committee you have naturally called upon the membership of your Legion Post auxiliary unit and the membership of organized labor. We assume that you have called into the membership of this committee representatives of the Chamber of Commerce and every other organization in your community, including leading business men, bankers, newspaper publishers—the managers of your outdoor billboard poster company and radio stations, heads of such groups as Lions, Kiwanis, Exchange, Rotary, etc., and others in civic and social organizations. It should also include the paid executive of the Boy Scouts of America, if there is one in your city, or the president of the Scout Council.

As has been pointed out in previous literature, this *War Against Depression Campaign* does not aim to set up a separate organization to secure jobs where an organization already exists and is working effectively. Rather, this committee should join itself to such an organization so that the great strength of the national campaign can be added to the local movement.

The Organization of the Committee

It has been suggested that, wherever possible, the Commander of the local Legion Post will assume the Chairmanship of local committee. If he can not serve, it is assumed he has appointed a Chairman. Instructions have already included the following two points:

(1) Divide the community into districts or industrial units so that every employer of labor will be contacted in this campaign.

(2) Assign a team, with a captain and a lieutenant to each district. Choose workers from all organizations and groups making up your committee.

The following additional suggestions for effecting work are offered:

(1) Select a Secretary whose duty it will be to keep a record of all work done and to tabulate and file all reports turned in by the workers.

(2) Select a capable publicity committee which should include publishers of the newspapers and the manager of each local broadcasting station, and the manager of the Outdoor Poster Company.

(3) Select especially qualified persons for specific tasks, as for example:

(a) Calling on organizations employing many people.

(b) Calling on managers of large factories.

(c) Calling on managers of public and private institutions.

(d) Calling on public utility executives, etc.

(4) Select a committee to call upon the mayor and other city officials requesting the co-operation and endorsement of the city government and the extension of all possible facilities of the city administration for bringing success to this work.

(5) Select a committee on finance. Your financial needs will not be large, but there will be some expense for sending telegrams and for other incidentals including stationery, records and postage.

(6) Serving under your committee chairman you should appoint a supervisor of the teams of canvassers and a supervisor to have charge of workers calling on industrial plants.

(7) The active workers who will do the field work should all be made members of your committee and should be drawn from the membership of the Legion, membership of the unions in your city, and from the membership of all other organizations with which you may establish relations and who will help.

(8) Remember also that the Federal Council of churches of Christ in America, including practically all the Protestant churches—the National Catholic Welfare Council and the Central Conference of Jewish Rabbis—have endorsed this campaign and have agreed to co-operate. Do not forget to call upon the representatives of these churches in your community and enlist the active support of their people in every division of your work.

What To Do

QUOTA. The committee is now complete and is ready to start. What is your task? Your task is to find work for every unemployed person in your community. That is your objective, but you may find it will help you to create enthusiasm and to help you carry your task through if you set preliminary quotas.

Decide that in the first week you will find jobs or pledges of money for employment for a certain number or sum; in the second week another given number of jobs, or sum of money pledged, etc., thus working constantly toward achieving your total quota.

MASS MEETING. Hold a meeting of your entire committee. At this meeting place the detailed plans of action before your committee. Arrange to hold regular meetings, but not at too frequent intervals. At more frequent intervals hold meetings of the supervisors of the teams of active workers for a check-up of progress and an interchange of information and experiences.

GETTING CO-OPERATION. See that your local newspapers are provided with information about every meeting you hold and have representatives in attendance.

Call upon your local ministers and urge them to devote the sermon at one service to the War Against Depression. It should be at the same service in every church.

Arrange to have each fraternal organization devote a meeting to this subject during the opening week.

The National Boy Scout organization has agreed to co-operate. Call upon your local scout group for co-operation. Scouts should be invaluable in delivering messages and even in making calls upon prospective employers and in house-to-house canvassing.

WOMEN'S ORGANIZATIONS.

It is most important to get the women of your community behind this movement. In many communities there is a social etiquette in such matters and the way will be greatly smoothed if the leaders in women's activities are approached **FIRST**, asked to be patronesses of the movement and given places in the work.

After this is done, secure the active co-operation of the women's clubs, church auxiliaries, and similar groups—giving the definite assignments of work to do.

Getting Started

The practical work of getting jobs divides itself under two headings:

(a) This is to be our first objective of calling on every employer of labor and asking that he put back one wage-earner to work. We want every industry and business concern who employs labor called upon and asked if he, with 999,999 others, will employ one additional wage-earner. After this is completed, then the next phase is ready.

(b) Getting jobs from home owners and the smaller employers of labor.

In all of this work remember, *we are not asking favors.* This is a united patriotic endeavor by all of the American people for the good of all of the people of America. Your work is a part of the national program. You are not asking the employment of a worker as a matter of obliging anyone. Proceeding upon that basis, you will find that:

(1) In approaching home owners and smaller retail establishments in a block-to-block canvass, you will be able to induce residents and merchants on that block to create an enormous amount of work which otherwise might not come to light. This has been done very successfully in Rochester, New York, under the "Rochester Plan."

(2) In approaching the large employers of labor there may be work which they have planned for ultimately, but which can now be hastened as a result of your urging and because a national emergency exists which demands the *united action of all employers and owners of property.*

Thousands of other employers will be doing the same thing at the same time. Emphasize the value of united action all over America. Nobody bought a Liberty Bond during the war because he particularly wanted one. He bought it because a million others were doing the same thing at the same hour for the national welfare.

Also emphasize the fact that in giving a job, *each will receive credit* and that no employer or home owner will want to be left out when the "War Against Depression Service Star" is put in the window. Ask each employer to hire *at least one man*, because 999,999 others are at the same time doing the same thing. Unemployment exists in its present volume (Continued on Page Three)

NOTICE

To all Members of the American Federation of Musicians:


This office has been advised that some local radio broadcasting stations enter into an arrangement with employers who use traveling orchestras to share part of the expense of the orchestra on condition that the orchestra will render services for such radio station by remote control.

As such an arrangement is unfair and has the tendency to destroy employment opportunities for local members at radio stations, the following order is hereby issued in conformity with Section 1 of Article I of the By-Laws of the American Federation of Musicians, and is binding upon members and locals:

"In any case in which a local radio station shares expenses of a traveling orchestra with the proprietor or manager of a hotel, restaurant, cafe, dance hall, or any other establishment, traveling orchestras must have the consent of the local union in whose jurisdiction they appear to render services by remote control for such radio station.

"This law in no wise sets aside the law of the Federation which provides that members of the Federation cannot without the consent of such local render services for a radio station in the jurisdiction of another local other than the one to which they belong."

because everybody has been going his own way. In this War Against Depression Campaign we are trying to get everybody to go in the same direction at the same time. We are all marching again as an army to fight depression.

How to Canvass Your City

THE ROCHESTER PLAN. In building a plan for canvassing your city, two general ideas may be developed. The first of these was covered in detail in the eight-page pamphlet entitled The Rochester Plan, recently sent to all Commanders of the American Legion. In brief—this plan asked all property owners to go over their home, factory, store, plant or grounds to see if some job of repair, alteration or improvement could not be found, and a pledge was secured to cover all or part of this work.

The second variation of this which may be followed, is to have property owners pledge themselves to spend a certain sum of money (in a similar manner to that done in the Rochester Plan) for hiring of people for *chores* such as: Upkeep of furnace, the removal of ashes, washing of dishes, clothiers, house cleaning, mending, tending children, gardening, automobile washing, etc., etc.

This plan has been successfully worked in Green Bay, Wis., as a "block plan." Where sufficient funds were pledged on a block, one or more persons were secured as employees of the block.

You may be able to devise other variations of these two tried plans that will be more suitable to your local needs for your own community.

SOME RESULTS SECURED. America is not bankrupt—either financially or morally. We believe there still exists in our country enough courage, enough brains, enough wealth and enough patriotism to find jobs for the unemployed—provided the means are provided whereby every person and every employer becomes a real part in the movement.

See what was recently accomplished in the city of Rochester, N. Y. After virtually every other plan to take care of the unemployed had failed, a small group of men devised a new plan. They suggested that the community, through each and every person, pledge \$2,000,000 to put idle men and women to work. *It was not charity, but work that was pledged.*

Before the 1,550 voluntary workers had completed three days of solicitation, under the direction of the Rochester Community Chest, sponsors of the movement discovered *they had aimed too low.* Householders able to employ labor for repair work, average citizens who had delayed spending until "better times," and business men awaiting an upturn before expending, subscribed the original quota on the fourth day. They doubled it on the tenth day, and tripled it in time for the final report meeting that night.

Every subscriber was asked to promise to give a man a job or to make retail purchases retarded by the fear of further slump. Subscription cards were turned over to a spending bureau which also became on a small scale an employment agency, dispatching men to jobs in response to calls from signers.

The spending got under way automatically before the initial enthusiasm had a chance to cool. A score or more fulfilled their pledges on the first day. Others followed rapidly in response to checkups from the committee. Today only a small part of the pledged sum has been spent, but business men assert a very definite upward trend in trade and employment has resulted.

Harder to estimate, but equally apparent in the eyes of business men is the new esprit de corps in that community. Fear of adversity not only is passing, they say, but a more optimistic spirit is spreading out into other western New York communities as a result. They pointed chiefly

to the attitude of the man in modest circumstances, who seems to have thrown off his fear of possible loss of work and made work for somebody else by spending, even if he cannot afford to hire labor himself.

Pointers for Workers

The following paragraphs are offered for the use of workers in approaching those from whom employment is sought:

Make it clear at the outset that you represent the national War Against Depression Campaign seeking to secure jobs for 1,000,000 wage earners now unemployed.

Make it clear that the national campaign is being carried on by the American Legion, the American Legion Auxiliary, the American Federation of Labor and the Association of National Advertisers, with the active co-operation of more than a score of other influential national organizations and associations.

Make it clear that no employer is being asked to stand out in front and do something all alone.

Every employer is being asked to do something in concert with a million other employers.

United action is the only thing that can save the situation. We are in a national emergency, the like of which we have never seen in time of peace.

No man in America can say he is not concerned. Neither can any one person all by himself change the situation.

A million, doing the same thing at the same time, can turn this darkness into daylight.

The entire program of this campaign is to do simply and directly the one thing needed to restore normal conditions. More than seven million are out of work. Many of those millions are in a condition of absolute destitution, and many of them are in a condition bordering on desperation—above all they need **JOBS**, not Charity!

Get jobs—that is the aim of this campaign. It does not admit of controversy. It is practical. It can be done. **IT HAS BEEN DONE!**

How to Report to Headquarters

Commanders of each post of the American Legion have been asked to report daily the results of their efforts.

This is important in order to show the total number of unemployed who have been put back to work in each state and for the nation.

It will be easier for you to get more jobs if we can report to the citizens of your city through the newspapers and over national broadcasts that for the first week, for instance, so many thousands who have been tramping the streets cold, hungry and with little ones at home in need and suffering, are now self-respecting American WORKERS. And each succeeding report showing a large and still larger number back at work makes the goal of a million jobs that much easier for you to help achieve. Your task is to get the jobs locally, our task is to let the nation know what is being done all over the country each day. We must work together. Neither of us dare fall down.

How to Report

Send a *paid* telegram daily to..... War Against Depression Campaign, Hotel Biltmore, New York City, reading as follows:

"(.....) employed today"
Signed American Legion Post Name and Number.

(1) Fill in space above left by bracket () with the total number of jobs secured for the day.

(2) Do not include in the daily number of jobs wired any totals for previous periods.

(3) If your city is asking pledges of so

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many dollars for work to be done, translate the daily number of dollars pledged into the number of jobs which these dollars will buy, and wire the number of people who can be thus employed.

(4) Be sure to give Post Name and Number in signature.

(5) These instructions are important, inasmuch as New York headquarters will be in receipt of many thousands of telegrams daily and the problem of tabulating the results must be kept uniform and simple.

Advertise the War Against Depression Campaign

Every possible means of getting the story of the War Against Depression before the attention of the people of your community should be employed.

In the City of Elizabeth, N. J., the Emergency Relief Administration distributed hand bills to all of the home owners and employers of labor in the city.

They secured five important outdoor poster boards and had a big outdoor poster painted upon them.

They went to the newspaper advertisers in the city and asked them to feature the campaign over their own signatures. Many advertisers responded in a very fine way.

These are just a few simple suggestions

which your committee on advertising can amplify according to local conditions.

Already Bearing Results

The best news the United States has heard for three years is now coming in hourly to general headquarters of the War Against Depression in the Hotel Biltmore, in New York.

Men are marching back to work. From cities and towns and hamlets the telegrams are pouring in, telling a story of reviving hope, of human hearts made glad, of children who will go back to school clothed and fed, of fathers and mothers from whose hearts the pain has been erased by the proud new possession of a job.

Men go forth happy again, knowing that they have a place in the scheme of things, that they are no longer industrial outcasts. From every direction, from every state, from every kind of community, there is a thrilling flow of this great good news—*men are going back to work.*

It is the hope of organized labor that every member will join with all of the other forces, with all the other factors and with all the other men and women in this United Action Campaign for Employment. The national goal is a million jobs for workers now unemployed.

Co-operating are a dozen other great organizations. In line are great advertisers, more than 750 newspapers, 800 magazines, advertising men, the radio, artists, the sound pictures, speakers—all in a united voice which demands **WORK!**

Can this campaign throughout the nation for a million jobs succeed? Of course it can succeed. When more than five million organized Americans start for somewhere they stand a good chance of arriving. The army back of this campaign is bigger than our army was in France.

Can it find five million jobs? **YES**—it can find that many, and more. **GET INTO THIS FIGHT FOR WORK FOR THE UNEMPLOYED.**

Congress Sets a Stage

CONGRESS has enacted what is known as the emergency reconstruction bill. It is distinctly the President's measure—his device for getting us out of the jam.

Inasmuch as Congress has had before it no alternative, Congress had to pass the Presidential measure, establishing an enormous credit organization which is supposed to loosen the wheels of industry.

We have, in reality, a group of measures, but they unite into one program.

The only theory upon which this program can be approved by those who care about the accounting surely to be brought by the future is that we are in a desperate fix and it is better to pay a high price for a cure than not to be cured.

This is a slim basis upon which to record approval and give sanction, but let it go at that.

It is assumed that every possible power will be mobilized to create something that looks like prosperity by midsummer.

But the end of the story will be this: The great bankers will take out of the situation such a toll as even they, accustomed to fabulous takings, have never yet had in their acquisitive fingers.

At the end of a long, long story of toll-taking by bankers at the expense of peoples in distress, this is the grand climax, the ultimate, the last Alpine height, glistening with an aurora of gold.

This is no partisan criticism of the legislation just enacted. It is not partisan legislation. Both parties have joined to create a bankers' holiday, out of which it is hoped the people will get at least some circus lemonade and perhaps a ham sandwich.

It will help, and there is no other promise of help. So we take it with thanks. But if we think at all, we must be staggered at the price to be paid in the end.

Banking gentlemen will go on a lot of additional boards of directors before this new legislation has worked its way with our lives and our industry.

Meanwhile the fundamentals of our economic order, which have been almost wholly ignored, will go on, inexorably working their way with things.

Unless there is an enormous and wholesale readjustment of wages and hours of labor, a dozen reconstruction bills will not work a cure.

The business of wage-cutting will have to be reversed with a vengeance. Failing in that, the machines of America will pile up their unsalable piles faster than before and we shall be sailing blissfully and mostly in ignorance to another debacle—one of even grander proportions.

Before long the American people will have to decide whether this nation is for men, or whether it is for bankers and the machines they own.

The problem is to work out the future through democracy. Failing in that we shall have something less beautiful.

These are things to think about while the new legislation worms its way toward action to create something that looks like prosperity, but that is much more likely to be a masked prelude to greater drama and deeper tragedy.

If a meed of prosperity comes, take it and grow fat upon it, you whose doorway it touches, but **DO NOT BE FOOLED!**

Wars? Rumors, at Least

LONG months may pass before we know the inside of the Far East war movements.

The world has shifted from the shoulders of Old Man Atlas and has been sitting on TNT.

Japan has gone bloodthirsty, or land thirsty, or trade thirsty, or perhaps all three.

But did Japan have secret assurance of HELP from some European power?

Who knows? Suffice it for now that the masses of the world's population have been cast again in the role of puppets for the makers of secret intrigue.

How far the intrigue may go seems even at this hour uncertain.

There is not enough democracy in the world. **NOT NEARLY ENOUGH**—even in the United States.

New York building trades contractors have declared they are going to cut wages. New York building trades workers have said that is not going to happen. There is something magnificently courageous about men who stand up in these times and say to employers: "Thus far and no farther."

Labor Queries - - -

Questions and Answers on Labor: What It Has Done; Where It Stands on Problems of the Day; Its Aim and Program; Who's Who in the Ranks of the Organized Toilers, etc., etc.

Q.—What is the stand of organized labor on Philippine independence?

A.—The last convention of the American Federation of Labor reaffirmed its demand for Philippine independence.

Q.—What was the first state to enact a workmen's compensation law?

A.—Montana enacted a law in 1909, but it was declared unconstitutional. The first state to have a law that was operative was Washington, the law being effective October 1, 1911.

Q.—When was the birthday of Samuel Gompers?

A.—January 27. He was born in 1850.

Q.—What is the Neptune Association?

A.—An organization of licensed masters and mates of ocean and coastwise vessels.

Q.—How many international trade unions have branches in Canada?

A.—Eighty-four. Their Canadian branches number about 2,000, with a membership of upwards of 200,000.

Q.—What circumstance contributed most directly to the adoption of the Canadian act legalizing trade unions?

A.—The arrest of 24 committeemen of the Toronto Typographical Union, including John Armstrong, later to become international president, for participating in a nine-hour-day demonstration in the spring of 1872. The charge, at the instance of the Master Printers' Association, was seditious conspiracy. It was not pressed in the courts, as Sir John A. MacDonald's government promptly brought in an act to legalize trade unions.

Out Beyond the Surf--

Where thought, unhampered by necessity or trepidation, sometimes penetrates to truth. Here, where the shallows throw no spray, let us ponder and enjoy the lessons of the art and the work and play of life.

"Prosperity is just around the corner." So we were told a year ago. So we have been told repeatedly. Few now believe it.

The cry of "wolf" too often repeated when there is no wolf leads to disregard for the warning when actual danger does come. The shout of good tidings likewise loses its charm when repeated without fulfillment.

But, be that as it may, here we are, deep into 1932 and the roll of the unemployed grows longer, like the casualty list in a war.

Finally, a great effort has been put under way to see if work can be found.

The American Legion, the American Federation of Labor, the Association of National Advertisers, and a score of co-operating organizations, have put a great drive under way to see if work can be found.

There are those who say nothing can be done. There are those who have hope.

It is beyond question that some jobs will be found. The goal is a million.

This is important: If it is proved that employment can be found and depression ended, we shall all be happy. If it is proved that even this tremendous effort cannot find employment, then THAT will be proved.

One way or the other, **SOMETHING IMPORTANT** will be proved.

Whichever it is, it will be worth proving.

Organized labor is participating in this great joint campaign.

Organized labor ought to put into this campaign every bit of its energy.

Let us help to prove the issue conclusively, one way or the other.

It is doubtless true that unscrupulous employers will seek to do a little wage-cutting under cover of this national drive. It is up to local unions to look out for that.

If it can be proven that the **WORK** is available, that is the vital thing. If we must face proof that the work is **NOT** there, then the question becomes one of readjusting the whole industrial machine so as to make this civilization safe for humanity and there will be no escaping the issue under cover of a lot of words about international debts, export trade and frozen assets.

The campaign is on. Never, except in war, have so many Americans joined in one great national effort.

Let us battle for work. Let us find every hidden job.

And, finally, let us be ready to know much more about our industrial order than we now know.

Now Is the Time

THE beginning of progress for workers is their trade union, says a call for a militant campaign of organization issued by the joint conference of the American Federation of Labor Executive Council and representatives of national and international unions, held recently in Washington.

A truer word was never said. As the calls points out, regardless of other activities of labor, to press an organizing campaign of unlimited scope is the primary duty of the hour. Only as the great mass of the workers put forward their claims through effective organization has progress come.

"The hardships of the past three winters are incontrovertible arguments for extension of union membership and wider programs of action," the conference declared, calling upon every trade unionist in the land to join in the campaign.

The value of trade union organization is exemplified right now in the strike of the New York dressmakers. Confronted with a demand for wage cuts and increase in hours, the dressmakers, 30,000 strong, have struck not only against the employers' demands, but for better wages and working conditions. Even in a time of depression, they are fighting for higher standards. They could not lift a hand in their own defense if unorganized. Their militant stand is an inspiration to every trade unionist to push union organization to the utmost.

President Hoover's nomination of Benjamin N. Cardozo, Chief Judge of the New York State Court of Appeals, to be an associate justice of the Supreme Court of the United States to fill the vacancy caused by the retirement of Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes, received universal approval. Judge Cardozo is recognized as being the one man whose ability to perpetuate the principles of justice so long affirmed by Justice Holmes cannot be questioned.

FEDERATION
FIELD**

Monopoly claims all seasons for its own; places its clammy hand on all human productions, and, in the most unconscionable fashion ever, seeks to regulate supply and demand in harmony with cash register dictation. The monopolistic grip on radio is becoming more deadly all the while and unless Congress does something to modify the situation an intolerable state of affairs will soon confront us. Over the signature of "Music Lover" there appeared recently an article in the Washington (D. C.) Post, which shows that there are those who have the interests of musicians at heart and are willing to make their sentiments known. We quote this letter as follows:

To the Editor of The Post—Sir: I wish to say what I believe to be a timely word in behalf of our musicians. American musicians are in a bad fix. Before the depression came tens of thousands of them had been thrown out of work by the "talking movies" and other mechanical reproductions; they have also suffered by the decline of the legitimate theatre; besides they have to compete with thousands of alien musicians who come into this country in spite of the contract labor law.

An official of the American Federation of Musicians recently testified before a congressional committee that more than 80 per cent of the membership are out of employment. And yet, at this very moment, they are sitting idly by in the face of a development which bodes neither them nor the public any good. I refer to radio and to the part music necessarily has in radio programs. The people own the air for radio purposes, and Congress in the Federal radio act of 1924 legislated ostensibly for the control of radio "in the public interest;" and yet this novel utility, which means so much materially and culturally to our people, is fast being monopolized.

Broadcasting, already under the control of a few great companies, is centered in a few large cities from which the programs are "chained" throughout the country to such stations as can pay the price. Local industries, advertisers, and activities are in effect denied the air, and local musicians and others are deprived of employment. A single New York orchestra by chain broadcast takes the place of the many local orchestras of equally good or better talent. Of course, a local advertiser will be permitted to ride along for a few seconds on a general broadcast program if he has the price. Such a development is detrimental to the "public interest" which it was the declared purpose of Congress to protect.

In this same connection we note that the Baltimore Sun recently carried an editorial in which they held that "musicians had demanded themselves out of a good many jobs." Is the right of "demand" always on the side of capital and never on the side of labor? The Sun editorial is answered in that same paper by Mr. S. T. Ansell of Washington, D. C., from which we quote in part as follows:

The facts are such, it seems to me, as to make it impossible for a fair-minded man to reach any conclusion other than this: that musicians, whether employed in theatres or broadcasting stations, get no more pay than is necessary for a most meager livelihood; that the moving-picture theatres employ just as few musicians as they can; that the local managers are not at liberty to defer to local demands, and what the musician gets in the way of employment, as well as what the locality gets in the way of music or pictures, is determined by representatives closer to the financial interests in New York. The same is equally true of radio musical employment. Radio is fast being monopolized. Broadcasting, already under the control of a few great companies, is centered in a few large cities from which the programs are "chained" throughout the country to such stations as can pay the price. Local industries, local advertisers and local activities have only restricted access to the air and local musicians and others are thus deprived of employment opportunities. Such a development is hardly in the "public interest."

When one notes the increasingly swinish capacity of the monopolistic spirit, it is easy to recall the observation of the late Eugene V. Debs, an honest but sometimes misguided soul, of days gone by, who concluded a Chautauqua Assembly platform address in the city of Des Moines with the words: "I thank God that when he created the sun and stars, he took precaution to place them out of human reach, so that John D. Rockefeller could not obtain possession, equip them with meters, and sell their blessed light to those of mankind able to pay the price."

This life is a strange blend of sunshine and shadow, of joy and sadness, of victory and defeat. As these changing scenes are quite beyond our power of regulation or arrangement, the better philosophy is to consider that a wiser intelligence than humans know is the director and guide. A striking illustration of

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how the unexpected is constantly happening is found in a recent issue of the Toledo (Ohio) Times, and which, by its relationship to one of our own members, justifies reproduction here, and which reads as follows:

"The show must go on."

That tragic old slogan of show business was brought home to Erica Ransome, Toledo danseuse, last night as she directed her pupils through a routine of dance numbers in the Chamber of Commerce while her mother and accompanist, Mrs. Nellie Brooks Ransome, lay dying just off stage. Mrs. Ransome had been at the piano as her daughter's pupils were gayly tripping across the stage in a recital for the Ohio Hairdressers' convention when suddenly she slumped across the keys.

The tempo of the dance was not interrupted as someone gently lifted the stricken figure. Another picked up the music accompaniment and the dance went on. The audience of 1,000 persons was unaware that death had stolen a part in the show. Mrs. Ransome at the conclusion of the number rushed to her mother's aid for only a moment. The grand parade of the evening was ready. She must lead her pupils forth again. Mrs. Ransome died an hour later. Death was due to heart disease.

Mrs. Ransome had been accompanist for her daughter for fifteen years. Before that time she had played in various Toledo theatres. She was active in Conservatory of Music circles, a member of the Second Church of Christ, Scientist, and a charter member of the American Federation of Musicians, Local No. 15.

She leaves, besides her husband, Clarence H., and her daughter, Miss Erica, a son, Clifford, and two brothers, Frank Brooks, Sylvania, and Emerson Brooks, Chicago.

All of which reminds us of the familiar lines: "All the world's a stage, and all the men and women in it, merely players." Which is simply another way of saying that the story of our everyday lives is far more strange than anything in the line of fiction the stage can ever produce.

Were you ever at Fargo? That is not where the West begins, but a certain section of the great Northwest does begin there, and Fargo is the interesting gateway. Standing on the outskirts of the city and looking west, north or south you behold one of the most beautiful tablelands in the world. When that tableland is covered with growing wheat a picture is presented which is beyond description. In summer days, far away where earth and sky seem almost ready to meet, the mirage appears—an optical illusion suggestive of lakes; but as you journey in that direction the illusion continues to be elusive—you never arrive at the water's edge. All this, however, is purely incidental to what we had in mind to say about Fargo. It is the home of Local No. 382 and from the membership of which a Civic Symphony Orchestra has sprung into being. This orchestra is under the direction of Harry M. Rudd, secretary of the Local and who has been delegate to several national Federation

conventions. Musicians, when informed that other good musicians are to be found in a certain locality, always wonder what they play or what they are able to do in a pretentious concert venture. We have before us a program of the latest Fargo Orchestra Concert and it is interesting reading from the critic standpoint. It includes: Overture (Rosamunde) by Schubert; Fifth Symphony, Andante, by Tschaiakowsky; Prelude in G Minor, by Rachmaninoff; Hungarian Dance No. 6, by Brahms; Sigurd Jorsalfar Suite, by Grieg. Other officers of the orchestra are: Mr. L. C. Sorlein, assistant conductor; Concert Master, Miss Roberta Janauette; President, Mr. Frank I. Temple; Vice-president, Prof. J. A. Holvik; Secretary-Treasurer, Mr. Paul B. Person; Librarian, Miss Velva Rudd. In the great open spaces between the Mississippi and the Pacific shore good music is more and more coming into its own.

One commentator observes: "Modern dance music is like a party of gorillas tearing up a wire mattress." We seldom appear inside a ballroom; and yet we hear a great deal of just that kind of musical offering over the radio.

To some people the United States Supreme Court may seem like a governmental body far removed from the masses; and yet the retirement of Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes from that high judicial position has been noted by multitudes supposedly remote from its influence. Justice Holmes retires at the age of 91 years. He could have retired years ago and spent his remaining days in ease, but he preferred to work. Son of the distinguished New Englander of that name, twice wounded as a soldier on the battlefields of the Civil War, a courageous idealist in civil and professional life, he brought to his high place a mental equipment which qualified him for distinguished service. President William Green paid warm tribute to the retired jurist in these words:

He occupies a very large place in their hearts and affections. During all his years of service to the country as a member of the Supreme Court he never wavered in his devotion to those humane principles which he espoused as a young lawyer and later as a great judge. He made the Constitution of the United States an actual force for good and a safeguard of the rights and liberties of the citizens of the United States. He refused to accept the doctrine that the Constitution was inflexible and impossible of application to changing modern industrial and social life. He saw in the Constitution an instrumentality thoroughly adapted to human needs and changing conditions of life.

As a successor to Justice Holmes, President Hoover has nominated Justice Ben-

jamin Cardozo of the New York Court of Appeals. At this writing Senate confirmation has not taken place, but there is no doubt upon this point. Judge Cardozo stands high with all parties in New York and has an overwhelming endorsement of bench and bar. As his decisions have long been tinged with the spirit of liberality, it is believed that the future course of justice will vindicate his appointment.

We acknowledge receipt of a newsworthy Official Bulletin issued under the auspices of Local No. 284, Waukegan, Ill. From its contents we clip the following highly sensible and timely paragraph:

Local musicians, like nearly everyone else, have been hit by the economic depression of the last year and their playing engagements have been fewer than usual. In all fairness they should be given first consideration when orchestras are to be hired. We do not hesitate to say without fear of contradiction that Waukegan and Lake County have just as good orchestras as can be found anywhere. They pay their taxes here, and patronize local stores—they are good citizens. Why, then, should they often be discriminated against?

If a community organization were seized with the idea of pulling off any kind of a free show, or one in which it was desired to minimize expense to the lowest possible degree, it would seldom hesitate to march straight to local headquarters to arrange if possible for a band or orchestra to render "free music" or a "gratuitous band;" or attempt to mooch some kind of musical assistance "for the good of the cause." It is strange they never think of importing a traveling organization for free music for a function of this character. Or would they have to pay the price?

Every political movement this year will undoubtedly have a meaning all its own. But for the public, however, to interpret that meaning will be another matter.

The latest prize fight resulted in receipts of \$77,000. Perhaps a prize fight a day would keep depression away by putting big money in circulation.

Notwithstanding the unusually mild weather the amount of "frozen assets" does not seem to materially diminish.

When the other three hundred million of Chinese population once hear that their country is involved in war a real fight in the Orient may materialize.

These heavy March winds should help us get accustomed to the professional

blow-hards of the entire presidential campaign.

In honor of those old Colonial days now being celebrated, the modern fox-trot bands might play a minuet once in awhile as an incentive to recultivate the gracefulness and rhythm of the terpsichorean past.

The Federal government has launched an "anti-hoarding" campaign. When banks cease to go down like a row of five-pins at every breath of "hard times" and hard-earned deposits are safeguarded by some kind of Federal protection which is worth a tinker's dam, "hoarding" will be reduced to a minimum. Self-preservation is the first law of nature and the man or woman with small earnings is going to protect himself or herself if possible.

Japan's apologies are about as impressive as some other comic valentines which get into circulation along this period of the year.

SHORT STORIES ON WEALTH

By IRVING FISHER
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DISEASE AS ECONOMIC WASTE

Last month I spoke of War as an Economic Waste. We are all hoping that the Disarmament Conference may result in reducing this waste. This month I shall speak of Disease as another great waste which can likewise be reduced.

We may divide the methods of improving public health into three parts: Public hygiene, or the hygiene of the public officers, who provide for sewage disposal, sanitary housing, clean streets, pure air, pure milk and other food, who provide for vaccination, isolation, and so on.

Whenever the hand of the government is felt to help our health, we call that public hygiene.

Then there is semi-public hygiene—the hygiene of large institutions and organizations like hospitals, public schools, business concerns, tuberculosis associations, and the medical profession—added to what the government does.

In particular semi-public hygiene includes the industrial hygiene of large industrial concerns which protect the health of their employes in various ways.

Finally, we have personal, private, or individual hygiene, which I regard the most important of the three. In fact, from a practical point of view, I think individual hygiene is the most important matter I can bring to your personal attention, from the standpoint of raising the average well-being of yourself and of society.

When you consider that income is really for enjoyment, the most important thing a person can do is to keep his nervous system in such a condition that he can actually get the maximum of enjoyment with the minimum of effort and get it through the maximum length of time instead of for a short time only.

The average person dulls his nervous system, partly through ignorance, and partly through intemperance and lack of self-control, and therefore is usually miserable when he might be happy.

It is often true of rich people that while they have tremendous incomes on paper, yet in terms of actual enjoyment they get less out of life than the average working man who lives more normally, has physical exercise, not so many narcotics and other evil influences or the unwise utilization or misuse of wealth.

If we were to have a correct analysis of what income is, in terms of enjoyment, and then have a correct understanding of how to obtain that enjoyment we would see that the greatest folly is the lack of attention to health. As Emerson is quoted saying, "Health is the best wealth."

From the strictly economic point of view, health is fundamental. I wouldn't give up my own health for all the billions of dollars in the world. Even from the standpoint of productive power it has been estimated by Dr. Dublin of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company that human beings are worth as producing machines five times all other capital put together.

In my National Vitality I estimated in 1908 that at least one and a half billion dollars worth of human life could be saved annually.

A very little investment in health will often produce a vast return. The Rockefeller work in curing hookworm in the South cost less than one dollar per patient and probably added over a dollar a day to his earning power. Here is a return of over 100 per cent per day on the investment. Everyone could add to his health and so to his power to produce and consume.

But it is human nature to need a stimulus or prod to do anything; and it is only after personal experience when one finds he is in danger of losing his health that he wakes up a little bit. This is one reason why the greatest step toward induc-

ing individual hygiene is the practice of periodical medical examinations.

I was one of the two men who started the Life Extension Institute for that purpose. The idea has now spread and the whole medical profession now promotes periodical examinations in general.

There are a large number of people, especially in New York, who are getting checked up once a year and gradually change their habits. Practically 100 per cent of the people examined find that there is something wrong, even if very slight. Many take this discovery seriously enough to correct the error in some degree.

We found this to be true. The second annual examination of the Life Extension Institute usually shows that 50 per cent of the defects found in the first year's examination have been corrected. I will say that I have little doubt that if a healthy young man or woman should become enthusiastic (but without first having impaired his or her health in any serious way), he or she ought to double the number of years they can earn and employ their earnings. Moreover, old age need not mean a period of senility. It should be the happiest part of life. The ordinary person begins to fail along about 40, is an old man at 60, and dead before 70, and during the last ten or fifteen years doesn't enjoy life very much; for he isn't able to produce very much, and has lost his usefulness and capacity for pleasure.

Many people think of life extension as meaning merely to prolong the agony. That is unfortunately often done because so many persons get interested in health only after it is too late. They lock the barn after the horse is stolen. But true life extension means not only increased length, but increased breadth and depth of life. It means that they "live more abundantly."

Some day, let us hope, the majority of people will come to see the emptiness of physical wealth without vital wealth. When that time comes we shall be able to reform human life, drop unhygienic habits, live a balanced life as to work, play, rest and sleep and have a heightened enjoyment which now is known only to a few of us beyond childhood. And health includes moral, as well as physical and mental health.

Any wealth at the expense of health is a delusion and a snare. "What profiteth a man if he gains the whole world and loses his own soul?"

As the Worker Sees His World

Summary and Digest of Important Events Here and Abroad.

Detroit's City Council on February 17th voted to petition the Federal Government for credits of \$10,000,000 through the Reconstruction Finance Corporation as a relief measure in the city's financial difficulties.

Negotiations between 16,000 paper pulp workers and the employers in Sweden have been broken off and a lockout is expected, Stockholm dispatches report.

Pennsylvania Railroad employes last year made the best safety record in the company's history, President Atterbury announced recently, in reporting that accidents to workers were reduced more than 27 per cent, as compared with 1930 and 76 per cent as compared with five years ago.

Secretary of Labor Doak on February 16th made public figures to show that 750,000 persons had been provided employment, directly or indirectly, through the Federal Government's building program since March 5, 1929.

Sentences imposed on first offenders are "inhuman" and the laws under which they are imposed are so severe as to defeat their own purpose, the New York Commission to Investigate Prison Administration and Construction reported to the Legislature on February 15th.

Unemployed workmen in Germany at the end of January numbered 6,041,000, as against 4,887,000 in January of 1931, according to government reports.

The Senate Civil Service Committee on February 13th made an unfavorable report on Senator Borah's bill to reduce salaries and mileage of members of Congress.

An average of 28 persons out of every 100 who seek small loans are compelled to do so because of expenditures arising from illness or death, according to a survey compiled by Leon Henderson of the Russell Sage Foundation.

"The great storm of depression would appear, so far as Canada is concerned, to have fairly well blown itself out," says an official handbook of the Dominion government in discussing the prospects for 1932.

A 10 per cent cut in the salaries of all Massachusetts State employes receiving \$2,000 or more is allowed for in the 1932 budget submitted to the Legislature by Governor Ely.

Under an agreement with the National Maritime Board, the wages of sailors, firemen and members of the catering departments in British merchant vessels have been reduced.

Strictly Honorable—A shoe store advertised in its windows with a sign stating, "Shoes Sold on Poker Terms," and below the sign was a plate containing three silver dollars with the sign, "Three of a Kind Take Any Pair."

A customer asked for a pair of shoes, size 9, and after being fitted told the clerk to wrap up two pair, and then tendered him three silver dollars in payment for same. The clerk informed him very politely that the charge would be \$6 for the two pair.

The customer called for the owner of the store and demanded, "Are you going to live up to your terms as stated in the window?"

"Certainly," said the owner.

"Well," said the customer, "any poker player knows that three of a kind always takes two pair."

"Yes," said the owner, "but not four nines!"

E. M. Craig, National Association of Building Trades Employers' secretary, says the winter will see concentrated wage "adjustment" moves. Perhaps the gentleman will find it takes two sides to "adjust" wages that way.
